On this day a special price was paid by the produce men of the city for roosters and prizes were given by the different merchants to those bringing in the greatest number of roosters, the largest of different breeds, etc.

While at no time was there a very large crowd of people in town, on account of every one being extremely busy planting cotton, quite a large number visited the town during the day and the merchants report good trading.

The potential value of removing 700 roosters from the yards of the people of Mills county will run into hundreds of dollars during the summer months in the increased price of infertile eggs and the saving of many which otherwise would have rotted.

In the crowing contest among the boys at four o'clock that afternoon, Gaylord Mullan won the prize of \$2.

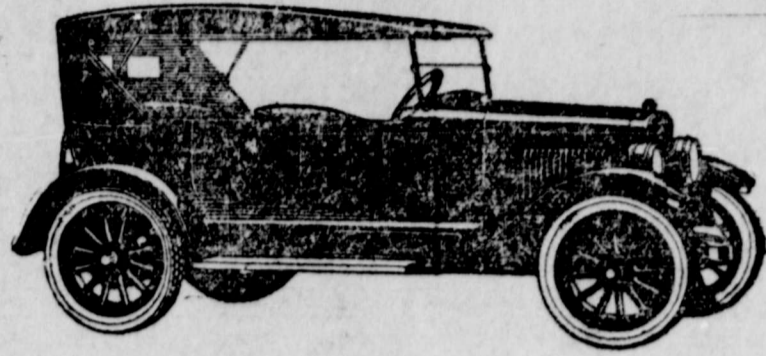
Entre Nous Club.

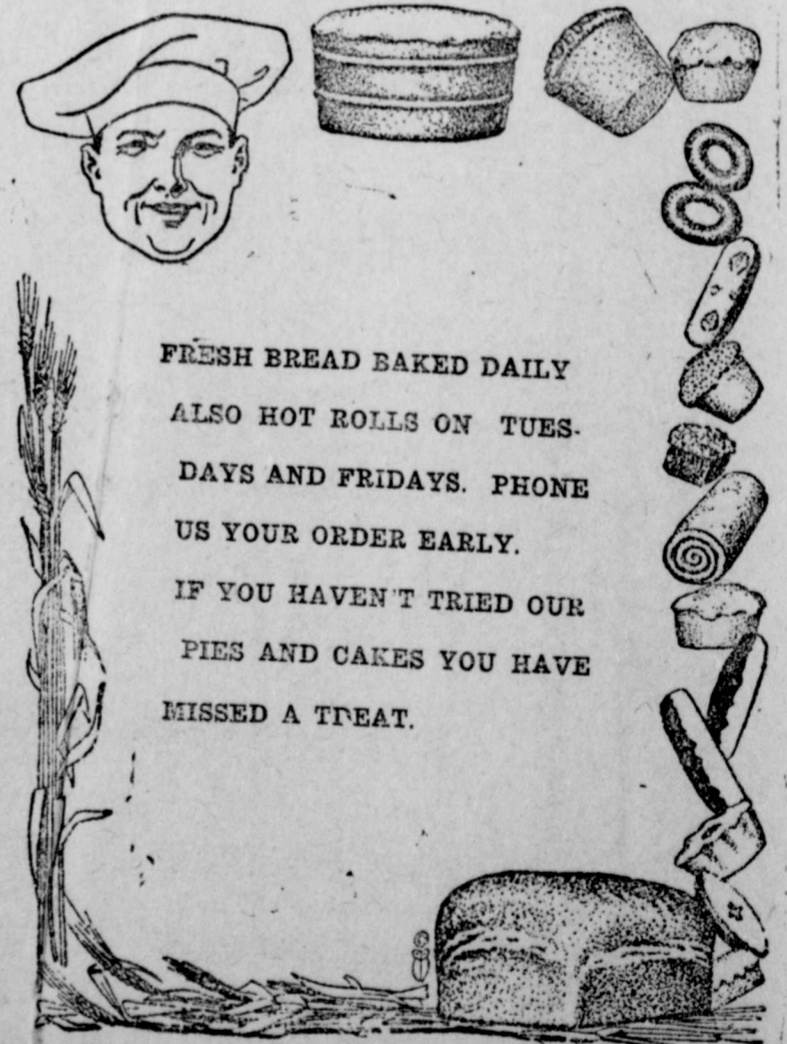

### FOULBROOD LAW.

The following is the new "foulbrood law" passed by the Thirty-third legislature:

Regulation I.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, honey bees in the State of Texas shall be kept only in movable frame hives permitting of ready examination.

The keeping of bees in box hives, gums, logs, barrels, or other domiciles not equipped with movable frames permitting ready examination of all combs is unlawful. Bees kept in any form of hive except one containing movable frames permitting ready examination are subject to treatment or destruction by the state entomologist, his assistants or inspectors, at the owner's expense as provided by Section 16, chapter 51, General Laws of Texas.

Regulation II.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, no honey bees, used honey combs, used bee hives, used or second hand apiary fixtures or appliances shall be moved or shipped from one county to another unless they are accompanied by a health certificate or special permit given by the state entomologist, his assistants, or inspectors.

Regulation III.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, all apiaries or bee yards wherein American Foulbrood is known to exist are hereby declared to be under quarantine. The removal of any and all bees, queen bees, colonies, nuclei, combs and apiary appliances or fixtures is prohibited, except under such cases as the state entomologist, his assistants or inspectors may permit or approve. Such quarantine shall exist until such time as the state entomologist, his assistants or inspectors shall determine and declare such apiary to be apparently free from American Foulbrood.

Regulation IV.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, no colony or colonies of bees affected with American Foulbrood shall be treated except by permission or upon the recommendation of the state entomologist, his assistants or inspectors.

### WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

**Women Injured.**—Fifteen women and two soldiers were injured in Dublin, Ireland, shortly after midnight last Sunday in a battle caused by an insurgent uprising. Explosion of a mine which it is claimed was planted by the rebels caused most of the casualties.

**"Revolution"**—Communist militiamen were called upon in Moscow, Russia, last Sunday to disperse embattled clergymen attending the all-Russian Church conclave, when a row was started by the suggestion of one delegate that some day there would be a revolution in the United States, and that America would have a real brotherhood, like Russia.

**Bid for Peace.**—A Berlin dispatch the first of this week says Germany bids 3,000,000,000 gold marks for peace. The German cabinet, during a meeting Sunday, decided to offer that amount to the allies as war reparations.

**Bonar Law.**—London dispatches last Sunday stated Premier Bonar Law, tired of his office and almost speechless, had slipped out of England Saturday, shrouded in all the secrecy of war time and was "somewhere on the Atlantic." No statement concerning his whereabouts for this month were given out.

**Steamer Down.**—The steamer Seaconnet sank near Newport, R. I., Monday with a loss of probably seven lives. One woman and fourteen men succeeded in reaching the Vineyard Sound light-ship.

**Shoot at Burglars.**—An attempt at 1 o'clock last Sunday morning to rob the State Bank at Rosewood, an inland town of Upshur county, was frustrated by citizens who opened fire on four men attempting to get into the vault of the bank. Officers captured two of the men, after chasing a fast touring car.

**Board of Bishops.**—The Board of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, meeting in semi-annual conference at Wichita Falls Wednesday, have been considering problems of world wide interest, including matters pertaining to virtually every country into which Christianity has found its way.

**Oklahoma Looters.**—Pat McClure, serving a 5-year term at Lavenworth federal prison for forging postoffice money orders, according to newspaper dispatches, has made affidavits to officers of Okemah, Okla., which have resulted in the arrest there of E. E. Ewen, proprietor of a mercantile establishment, in connection with the operation of a gang of thieves who are suspected of robbing a number of stores in Oklahoma.

**Evolution.**—An offensive designed to drive every textbook which embodies evolutionary theories and every teacher who subscribes to such beliefs, out of the tax supported schools of the South and nation was launched in the Tuesday morning's session of the World's Fundamental Congress at the Fort Worth Baptist Church.

**Denied Bond.**—After having been arrested in Fort Worth Tuesday morning charged with shooting and dangerously injuring his neighbor, Henry Bates, while the latter was milking his cow at his farm, R. J. Wright, 59, was denied bond. "He cursed me by electricity," was the excuse given by Wright for shooting Bates. An examination will be made of his sanity.

**Jumps in Lake.**—Mrs. Anna Vomacha, 30, of Chicago, tried to murder her two children, 7 and 6, and kill herself by jumping into Lake Michigan and dragging them after her Tuesday afternoon. A hobo, sunning himself on the water front, dove after them and after fighting the woman, rescued them from the water.

**Gasoline Down.**—A reduction of 3 cents per gallon in wholesale and retail prices of gasoline was made in Fort Worth Tuesday morning, bringing the retail price to 20 cents.

**Jealousy.**—Jealousy is ascribed as the motive for the placing of a blast under the home of Alfred Warren in Paducah, Ky., which exploded and killed his wife.
