

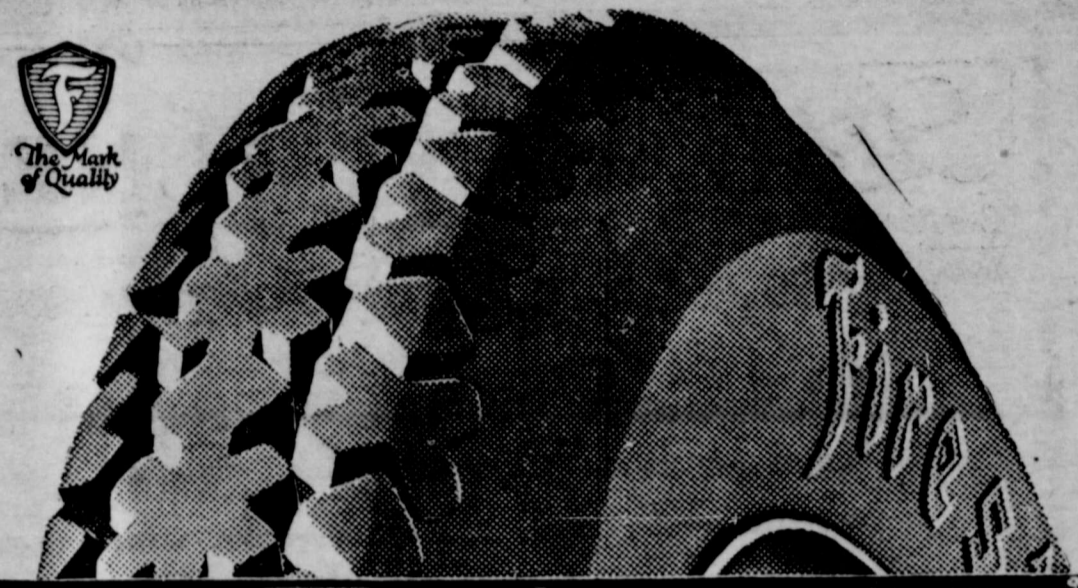

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Cyclone.—A cyclone which struck Mitchell county early Monday morning resulted in over 18 persons being killed and a hundred wounded. Most of the dead and injured were asleep in their beds when the storm struck.

Todd to Hang.—Wayne Todd was sentenced in Weatherford Wednesday morning by Judge F. O. McKinsey to be hanged Thursday, June 21. He was convicted of murder of James McNeal at the fall term, 1921. Todd is now 21 years old.

Russia.—Russia, as a Soviet State, will not perish through rupture in Anglo-Russian relations, according to Leonid Krassin, Communist envoy, who rushed to London to settle the dispute between England and Russia. "It has been attempted to end the Soviet by guns," but that has failed," he said.

State Bankers.—The Texas State Bankers Association at its second day session Wednesday morning adopted a resolution introduced by Nathan Adams of Dallas, commending the state legislature for having to the present date consistently refused to enact any legislation levying any unreasonable taxes on citizens and industries and urging it to continue its program of economy and retrenchment.

Jay Gould Is Dead.—George Jay Gould, the American financier and sportsman, died at a villa near Mentone, France, of pneumonia Wednesday. He had suffered since March 20. His death recalls the bitter struggles of his heirs for his fortune and his two matrimonial ventures the last of which cost him \$3,000,000.

May Veto.—In a conference in Austin with members of the Legislature Wednesday, Governor Neff said he was seriously considering the veto of the appropriation bills totalling 38,100,000 dollars and sending them back to the legislature in order that they might be considered at the same time as the revenue bills and made to harmonize therewith.

Killed During Raid.—M. A. Stroup, 38, was killed during a raid on a still, 8 miles east of Breckenridge, early Thursday morning. Officers had located the still and kept an all-night watch for the operator. Early the next morning Stroup was seen making a fire under the cooker. The officers ordered him to throw up his hands when he came up shooting. The officers returned the fire, resulting in Stroup's death.
