**NEXT MONDAY, JUNE 4,

**WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.**

**Persia Quake.**—According to advices to the newspaper Pioneer published at Allaha Bad, British India, from Teheran state, 1,000 persons have been killed by an earthquake at Turbat-I-Haidari. Many villages were devated in the earth shocks which covered a period of several hours.

**Hail Storm.**—A disastrous hail and wind storm passed through the Slaton, Texas, territory last Sunday night, with 1 to 3 inches of rain. Crops are a total loss in the path of the storm. Two homes were destroyed. Several thousand dollars damage was reported from a wind and hail storm at Lubbock.

**Insanity Cure.**—A cure has been announced in Chicago for paresis, the brain disease which is responsible for a large percentage of insane hospital inmates. Treatment of 42 cases has resulted in more than half being cured.

**Merchant Marine.**—Washington news dispatches this week say the Shipping Board will investigate thoroughly the offer of more than one billion dollars received Monday for the government's entire merchant marine.

**Powder Blast.**—Five men were killed and three injured in an explosion at the Hercules Powder Company at Fayetteville, Ill., Monday. The cause of the blast has not been determined.

**Clara Phillips.**—A New Orleans dispatch says Clara Phillips, Los Angeles girl convicted of the murder of Mrs. Alberta Meadows with a hammer, declared there Monday that she was innocent of the crime and that she was returning to California of her own free will to prove it. She said Peggy Coffee, alleged witness to the slaying, was the actual slayer.

**Won't Cut.**—Austin dispatch Monday said the House by a vote of 31 to 79, went on record as opposed to the reduction of the \$600,000 reclamation and flood control appropriation. Opposition to reduction of the \$3,000,000 rural aid school appropriation and to reduction of the per capita school apportionment below \$13 a year was also voiced by the house.

**JOHN T. SUTTON, LAWYER,  
CAME TO MILLS IN 1876**

The first lawyer to locate in Mills with the intention of staying was John T. Sutton. He came to Williams Rancho in 1876, but stayed only two years. There was but little outside of the county seat.

In 1879 M. C. Smith came from Brownwood and beside practicing law he edited for a few months the Williams Rancho Racket, a paper established by W. S. Marshall.

About the same time George Whitaker came from Burnet and practiced his profession for 20 years.

John L. Lewis came to the county in 1884. He opened an office in this city in 1885. He moved to Hamilton where for four years he served as county judge. His home is now near St. David, Arizona.

Milam Still from Ohio dropped in the early days but did not long remain. He was an educated, refined young man and made many friends. X. X.

**INTEREST IN REVIVAL  
HOLDS TO VERY LAST**

Ever increasing, the interest in the Baptist revival meeting conducted by Rev. (Cyclone) Crimm will reach its climax only with the last service tomorrow night. In point of attendance last Sunday night witnessed what is thought to be the largest crowd ever assembled in a church house in this city—estimated on size ranging from 1500 to 2000 people.

Like the twister from which he derives his cognomen, Cyclone Crimm has thrown those who are on the outer edges of the church influence in a maelstrom of confusion, ever drawing them toward the quieter center, and depositing many in the vortex of complete peace.

Even a short resume of the sermons delivered by Rev. Crimm would be prohibited on account of space, for he has, during the three weeks revival, touched almost every moral and religious question, but the one he delivered Tuesday night of this week is thought by many to have been the best one.

**U. S COTTON CROP FOR  
1923 ESTIMATED 10,950,000**

J. W. Jay & Co. of New York sent the following telegram to their southern correspondents. This corrects an article appearing on page two of the Eagle, which had been put to press before the telegram was received:

"Experience has shown that the May crop indications are seldom realized. Our May indicated yield of 11,650,000 was based on the government's key figures of last year, viz. 221.5. Since our report went to press we have received figures indicating that the government par yield for May, this year, will average for the belt about 208 pounds per acre. Calculating upon this new basis, the indicated yield for our May report would be around 10,900,000 bales."

**11,650,000 BALE COTTON  
CROP FORECAST, 1923**

The following information concern-  
ing the 1923 cotton crop is  
taken from figures compiled by  
J. W. Jay and Co., cotton commis-  
sion merchants, New York:

The average percentage condi-  
tion for the United States is 70.0;  
for Texas, 74.5; Georgia 63.8.

The indicated increase in acre-  
age for the season 1923-24 is 7.5.

The indicated yield with nor-  
mal weather henceforth is 11-  
650,000 bales.

Only two states, California and  
Arizona, have better outlooks for  
cotton than Texas. All other  
states are listed at poor.

Condition of Texas cotton:  
Normal to one week early in  
northeastern counties, elsewhere  
ten days to three weeks late. Cul-  
tivation and stands fair to good.

Sight temperatures too low and  
some complaints of high winds  
over a scattered territory. Rain-  
fall needed in southern and some  
central counties and seed germina-  
tion a little slow because of dry  
weather; elsewhere have ample  
moisture. Slight shortage of la-  
bor in some localities, but on the  
whole with clear weather expect  
sufficient until harvest time. Cut-  
worms in some southern counties.  
No other general complaint of in-  
sect activity. 82% planted, 20%  
to be replanted. With occasional  
rainfall and reasonable tempera-  
tures the outlook for the state is  
fair to good. Report up to and  
including May 16.

**Resume.**

The labor situation south has  
changed radically since last year  
when farm workers were plenti-  
ful, willing and cheap. During  
the fall and winter months negro  
families, in constantly increasing  
numbers, have been leaving the  
south, going principally to the  
northern and eastern industrial  
centers. During the past few  
months the movement of the ne-  
groes from the south has contin-  
ued in constantly increasing vol-  
ume and our correspondents now  
express much anxiety about the  
labor necessary to work the cot-  
ton crop, should the weather con-  
tinue unfavorable.

The 1923-24 cotton crop starts  
off poorly. The season averages  
fully two years late. The weather  
has been too cold and too wet.  
Much cultivating, planting and  
replanting remains to be done.  
Chopping is later than last year.

While our correspondents in  
Alabama, Louisiana, North Caro-  
lina, South Carolina, Oklahoma,  
Georgia and Florida make men-  
tion of boll weevil being present  
it is too early for much damage  
from this source. About all that  
can be said at this time is that  
the insect now infests practically  
the entire area in which cotton is  
raised, excepting the irrigated  
sections in the far west.

The present cotton year has  
now progressed to a point where  
it can be stated with a reasonable  
degree of certainty that the car-  
ry-over of American cotton July  
31, 1923 (all kinds and all sources)  
will be around 2,000,000 bales.  
On July 31, 1922, according to  
Secretary Hester, the mills of the  
world had in their warehouses  
2,029,000 bales. Thus the pros-  
pective carry-over July 31, 1923,  
of 2,000,000 bales is about the  
quantity mills had in stock July  
31, 1922. Assuming that of this  
quantity mill stocks, afloat and  
enroute to mills, will require 1-  
500,000 bales, there will be  
around 500,000 bales left on July  
31, 1923, which quantity includes  
the farm reserves, linters, etc., in  
fact every known bale of Ameri-  
can cotton of every kind, every-  
where.

New crop cotton can hardly be  
expected to reach the mills before  
the last half of September and  
the reserves of raw cotton have  
gradually been reduced until the  
supply no longer exists sufficient  
for the mills to continue their  
present rate of operation. Cur-  
tailment in some volume seems a  
necessity.

Perfect growing weather  
throughout the coming season  
and a minimum of insect damage  
is essential for the welfare of the  
cotton trade.

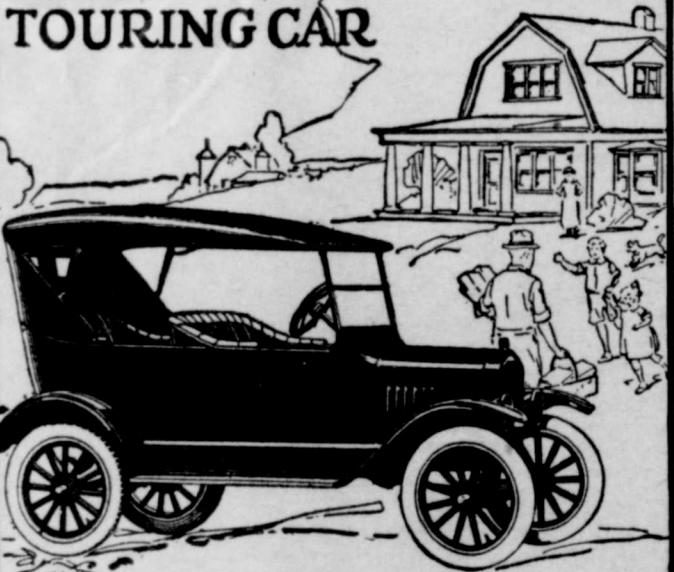

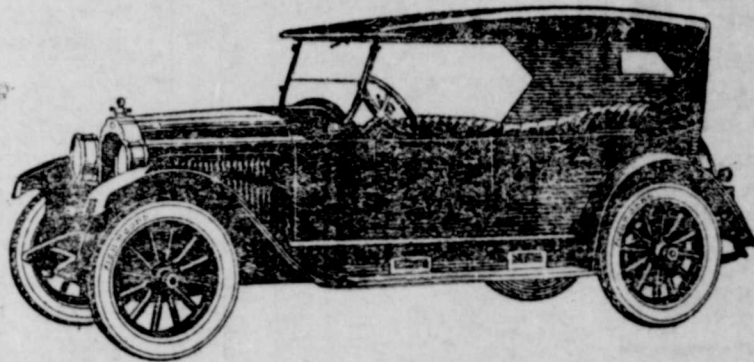

### FRANK POER SERIOUSLY HURT LAST SUNDAY



### WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

**Friend Dead.**—Jesse W. Smith of Ohio, an intimate friend of President Harding and of Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty, committed suicide in Washington Wednesday morning in the Wardman Park Hotel in a suite of rooms which he occupied with the Attorney General.

**Wins Race.**—Making 500 miles at an average rate of 91.44 miles per hour, Tommy Milton Wednesday won the "Castor Oil Derby" at the Indianapolis Speedway, and incidentally \$29,500. He sent a strictly American made car to victory against cars of other nations.

**Released.**—A Shanghai, China, dispatch Wednesday says Maj. Robert A. Allen of the United States Army and W. Smith, an Englishman, who were captured by Chinese bandits May 6, have been released.

**Pressure.**—A Paris, France, dispatch Wednesday says if German's resistance in the Ruhr is prolonged into next winter France will "at once begin considering means of applying greater pressure," said Premier Poincare in the Chamber of Deputies. M. Poincare said he was "convinced" Germany would be unable to resist much longer.

**Strike Ended.**—The strike of metal workers throughout the Ruhr, which involved more than 50,000 men, according to Essen dispatches, was ended Wednesday the men resuming work. They were granted the 50 per cent increase in wages for which they went on strike, but were refused their demand for a bonus of 150,000 marks each.

### CITY ORDINANCE.

**CHAPTER**  
AN ORDINANCE TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS, LEVYING TAXES FOR THE SAID CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS, UPON ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY AND UPON CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS FOR THE YEAR 1923, AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF THE SAME.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS:  
That there shall be and there is hereby levied a city tax for the year 1923, on all real estate situated, lying and being in said City of Goldthwaite, Texas and on all personal property that was in said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first day of January, A. D. 1923, not exempt from taxation by the laws and constitution of the State of Texas, for the purposes hereinafter provided, on the One Hundred Dollars assessed valuation on all said property as follows:

1st. For general revenue purposes, to be known as the General Fund, forty-five cents (45c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation which is hereby set aside for the general current expenses.

2nd. To provide interest and to create a sinking fund for outstanding water works bonds, twenty-five cents (25c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation.

3rd. For a road, street and bridge fund to be known as the Street Fund, twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollars Valuation.

4th. To provide for the payment of time warrants issued, and to create a fund known as the Permanent Improvement Fund, the sum of twenty-five cents (25c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation. This item is in lieu of and not in addition to a levy provided in a certain Ordinance passed on January 8th, 1923, providing for a Permanent Improvement Fund.

It is further ordered that an annual occupation tax be levied and the same is hereby levied equal to one half of the occupation taxes levied by the State of Texas, on the respective occupations now taxed by law, the same to be used for general revenue purposes.

All such taxes, so levied except the occupation tax shall be due and payable on the first day of October, A. D. 1923, and on and after that date the City Tax Assessor and Collector of Taxes is hereby authorized to collect and receipt for the same, before and until the first day of February, A. D. 1924, and if said taxes are not paid by such time, there shall be taxed against such property and the owners of said property, ten per cent additional on the amount then due as penalty as provided and permitted under the law of the State of Texas, and the said City Assessor and Collector is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce the payment of said taxes according to the laws of the State of Texas, and ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, and all taxes not paid on or before the 31st day of January, A. D. 1924, shall be deemed delinquent taxes, and same together with the above penalty of ten per cent shall be apportioned among the several different funds and the City Tax Assessor and Collector shall by virtue of his office seize and levy upon and sell such property whether real or personal for payment of taxes thereon according to law.

It is further ordered and provided that the taxes levied shall if not paid on or before the 31st day of January, 1924, bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the first day of February, A. D. 1924, until paid.

An imperative public necessity exists that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and the same is hereby suspended and this ordinance passed to its third and final reading and passed by unanimous vote of the City Council, all members present voting in favor of this said Ordinance.

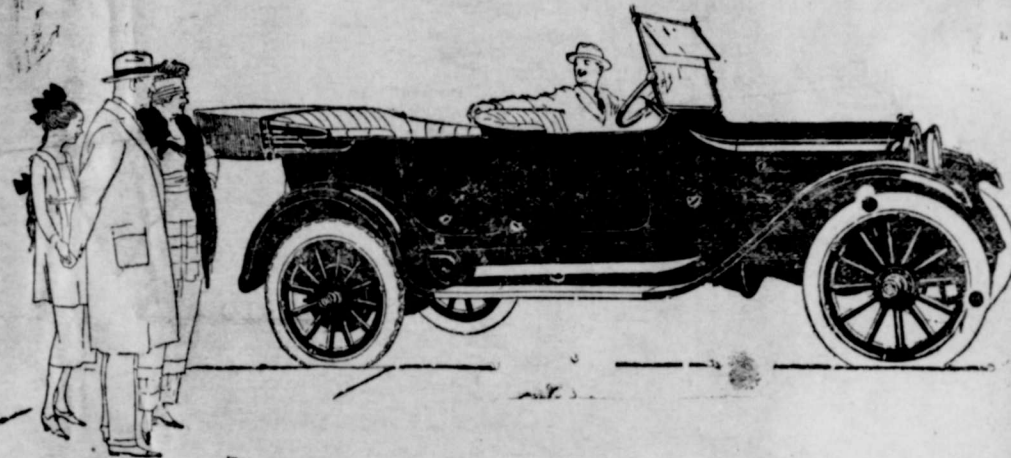

## BARNES & McCULLOUGH IMPROVING LUMBER YARD

The firm of Barnes & McCullough have made extensive improvements on their lumber yard here the past few weeks, and are not through yet.

Seeing in the condition of the crops and livestock prospects for an area of prosperity for Mills county, Mr. McCullough has increased his facilities for string building material.

Beginning his improvements, Mr. McCullough built a large warehouse for storing wire—of which he carries one of the largest stocks in this part of Texas—just back of his window and door warehouse and alongside his lumber sheds. Then he connected his lumber sheds and warehouses together with suitable walls and doors, throwing all into one building. On the back, or facing Parker street, he enclosed his shingle and brick storage places in a high fence, leaving suitable driveways through for rapid handling, these driveways being provided with gates.

On the south side of his lumber shed he is now closing each individual stall with sliding doors, which when completed, will enclose all the southern side—protecting the lumber from the action of the weather, and presenting a more sightly appearance. He intends, in addition to this, to tear out some of the older sheds and rebuilding all the lumber sheds under one roof. Finally the entire structure will be painted a uniform color.
