ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR THIRD TRADES DAY

At a meeting of the directors of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce at the room in the court house Monday night, it was decided to give \$100.00 in cash prizes, the same amount as was given last month, on Monday afternoon, July 2, Goldthwaite's third Trades Day. How the \$100 will be divided has not been decided, but there will be one grand prize and many others, as there was last Trades Day. A list of premiums and entertainments for the day will be published in next week's issue.

Beginning with today, merchants who are members of the Chamber of Commerce will give Trades Day Tickets with each one dollar purchase or paid on account, and it is a simple matter of economy for the customers to ask for the tickets. Most everybody in the county is familiar with the method of drawing the tickets, but for the benefit of those who have not attended a Trades Day in Goldthwaite: The tickets with the owners' names written on the back of them are deposited in a sealed box in the sheriff's office at the court house.

On each first Monday at four o'clock the box of tickets is turned over to the participants for drawing, the business men making only one requirement, that the person whose name appears on the ticket be present to get the prize, otherwise the ticket must be thrown away and another one drawn. The usual procedure has been that three or more men, not members of the Chamber of Commerce be selected to conduct the drawing, to see that there is absolutely no chance for errors.

All members of the Chamber of Commerce who are issuing tickets are barred from participating in the drawing in any way; also their immediate relatives and clerks, and should their name be drawn the ticket will be destroyed and the prize allotted to the owner of the next ticket.

Call for and save your tickets, be here next first Monday, July 2, and get your prize.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

State Bankers.—State bankers from all parts of Texas gathered in Fort Worth Tuesday to take stock and plan their own protection for the future.

Release.—The Release of the American and other captives held by Chinese bandits since May 6 was officially reported to the State Department at Washington last Tuesday in a cablegram from the American Consulate at Shanghai. A message from Consul Davis was received.

"Usurpers."—A news dispatch from Paris, France, this week says a Bulgarian volunteer army now numbering 100,000 men and steadily increasing in size, is preparing "to punish the usurpers. These troops are guarding the frontiers and suburbs of Sofia.

Reversed.—An Austin dispatch Wednesday says the 99-year sentence given William Meador from Ward county for murder in connection with the killing of Asa Rawls, was reversed and remanded by the Court of Criminal Appeals on the ground of error in the charge to the trial court.

Booze Issue.—The Texas House of Representatives Wednesday adopted a resolution "deploring" the action of the New York Legislature in repealing the state prohibition act. A little later the Senate adopted a resolution "deploring" the action of the House.

Car Theft Ring?—Garland Grace, deputy sheriff, his three younger brothers and five other men are at liberty at Eldorado, Ark., under bond of \$15,000 each, three others are in jail in Texarkana and 14 others are sought on warrants issued by federal officers who charge that all are members of an automobile stealing ring which has been operating many months through five states, with headquarters in the oil fields at Eldorado.

Modify.—A Washington dispatch this week says there are increasing indications in high official circles that President Harding might ask Congress, when it re-assembles next fall, to modify the prohibition law as it affects the carrying of liquor on board foreign vessels in American waters.

Floods.—Oklahoma City was threatened with the third flood in three weeks the first of this week by rapidly rising waters of the North Canadian river. Two thousand homes were thought to be endangered.

People to Decide.—Catching the contagion from New York and Wisconsin, the Illinois House of Representatives voted Tuesday in favor of submitting to a referendum to the people of the State the question of repeal of the Illinois search and seizure law of 1919, and the prohibition enforcement act of 1921.

NEW AUTOMOBILE TAX LAW NOW IN FORCE FOR TRUCKS

The local Tax Collector's office has received the following concerning what constitutes a commercial motor vehicle from J. D. Fautleroy, State Highway Engineer. This has reference to the new tax law for automobiles passed by the legislature. The new law for passenger cars goes into effect January 1, 1924, while the law governing trucks is now in effect. The registration of passenger cars will be 40c per 100 pounds and 17½ cents per horse power. Trucks go according to weight and horsepower. The following constitutes a commercial motor vehicle:

Dear Sir:—

Any motor vehicle, no matter what its carrying capacity may be, if it is designed and used for carrying property is a commercial motor vehicle. This takes in all Fords and other light trucks. It includes vehicles owned by farmers, merchants—in fact none are exempt except those owned by the government, state, counties, cities and sub-divisions thereof.

At the American Legion meeting last Saturday night, plans were discussed for arranging for the Thirty-seventh Annual U. C. V. Reunion and American Legion Picnic, which will be held at the Reunion Grounds one mile south of the city on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, July 25, 26 and 27.

A committee composed of Earl T. Fairman, Frank W. Taylor and Charlie T. Wilson was appointed to meet with the Chamber of Commerce and ask their assistance in giving the few remaining members of the Jeff Davis Camp U. C. V. and the people of Mills and surrounding counties the best reunion yet out of the thirty-seven held in this county. At the meeting with the Chamber of Commerce Monday night, the directors pledged assistance to the American Legion, and will cooperate with them in every way possible. This matter will be brought before the Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday night and definite plans worked out.

A called meeting of the American Legion will be held in their club rooms tonight, when necessary committees will be appointed and other arrangements made for staging the reunion. A membership drive will also be planned and started. Every member of the Mills County Post is requested to be present tonight.

REGULAR MEETING OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NEXT MONDAY NIGHT

Next Monday night is the regular meeting night of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce and all members are urged to be present, as matters of importance will be decided on. Persons interested in the advancement of Mills County, who are not members of the Chamber of Commerce are urged to be at the meeting next Monday night in the basement of the court house. According to reports from L. E. Miller, president of the Chamber, it is growing pretty fast, new members being added and more interest shown. Come out Monday night and see what they are doing—you can't afford to drag.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

American Flag.—It is the duty of American people to maintain in this country "the things for which the American flag stands," President Harding declared in Washington Thursday in a brief address before the national flag convention of the American Legion.

"Killer."—When the third called session of the Legislature adjourned sine die in Austin late Thursday night it went on record as a "killer" of bills. Out of 154 introduced in both branches not one-third were presented to the governor.

Fight.—A dispatch from Sofia Thursday says Premier Stamboulsky is reported to have been halted near Tatar Bazardjik and is said to be making a stand against the government troops with several hundred peasant guards. Several casualties have already occurred.

"Clean-Up."—The federal government's "clean-up" of the liquor situation in Detroit was begun Thursday, when injunctions were issued against the proprietors of approximately 50 places in the Detroit district where liquor is alleged to have been sold.

Engine Explodes.—One trainman is dead and two others are in a Sherman, Texas, hospital in a serious condition as a result of scalds received when the engine on which they were working exploded in the Madill, Okla., yards late Wednesday.

Cabinet Resigns.—The Belgian Cabinet, headed by Premier George Theunis, resigned Thursday afternoon in consequence of the controversy over the legislation providing for the use of the Flemish language in the Ghent University.

No Other Soon.—Another special session of the Legislature will not be called for the present, Gov. Neff announced late Thursday afternoon after the work of the third session had been completed.

JACKSON CROSSING.

Jackson Crossing is just below the mouth of Blanket Creek on Pecan Bayou. It is five miles west of Mullin and near the upper iron bridge. It was part of the public road leading from Williams Rancho to the settlements on the Colorado river and was well known to the pioneers sixty years ago.

There stockmen would arrange to meet in the days of the "rodeo" or roundup, for just on the west lies Jackson Valley at that time an open glade convenient for holding their herds.

The crossing and valley got their name from Moses Jackson, who came to Mills county in 1856 or 1857, and camped for some months at a spring about four miles northeast of where Goldthwaite now stands. He moved from that place to a spring west of Pecan Bayou, where Mrs. Houston Roberts and son now live.

In October, 1858, Mr. Jackson, his wife and three children started to the Bayou where by appointment they were to meet a Mr. Kirkpatrick and another to cut a pecan tree which had been selected and make boards. The mother and children went along to gather pecans from the tree to be felled.

Just as they descended the hills into the valley they were attacked by a band of Comanche Indians, and all were killed and scalped except a boy 12 and a girl 10, who were carried away by the band. The savages continued their raid through Lampasas, Coryell, Hamilton and Comanche counties and in about two weeks came back into Brown county near where the town of Blanket now stands. On Salt Creek they were overtaken by pursuers from counties named. A number of the Indians were killed and many head of horses recovered. By mere chance the Jackson children were discovered where the Indians had abandoned them two days before.

The boy's mind was never quite normal after his terrible ordeal. The girl became Mrs. Stroud and lived many years near Hamilton.

Some sand-stone slabs without inscription mark the graves where this tragedy occurred.

McKINNEY BOY PASSES RIGID TEST AT STATE U.

The following article, taken from the McKinney Courier-Gazette, will be of interest to many Eagle readers. Edward Greenwood is a son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. L. Greenwood of McKinney, and a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Fairman of this city:

"H. A. L. Greenwood, the photographer, and wife are in receipt of an interesting letter from their son, Edward, a McKinney High school graduate, who is a student in the State University at Austin. Edward writes that he with many other University boys took the life-saving test there recently, and only six, including himself, passed the test, making a total of 94 points out of a possible 100.

Edward writes: "Last week a Captain Law from St. Louis was in Austin giving life-saving tests for the American Red Cross. One of the boys in the house and myself decided to take the tests, so we applied for an appointment with Law. Friday and Saturday afternoons we were in water almost constantly, doing all kinds of practical life-saving work.

"We had to carry a man four different ways in the water and swim with him sixty feet. We had to float, tread water, get the

drowning person on the bank unassisted, restore breathing by artificial respiration, swim with clothes on, take them off in the water and then swim one hundred yards, dive for a 10-pound weight from the surface of the water (3 times). Then we had to practice breaking struggle holds. There were also minor tests.

"All told, six university boys passed these tests, including myself. We all received a Red Cross Life Saving emblem to be worn on our bathing suits. I make 94 points out of a possible 100 on the examination. The emblem is a most beautiful one, with the letters, 'Live Saving Corps, American Red Cross.'"



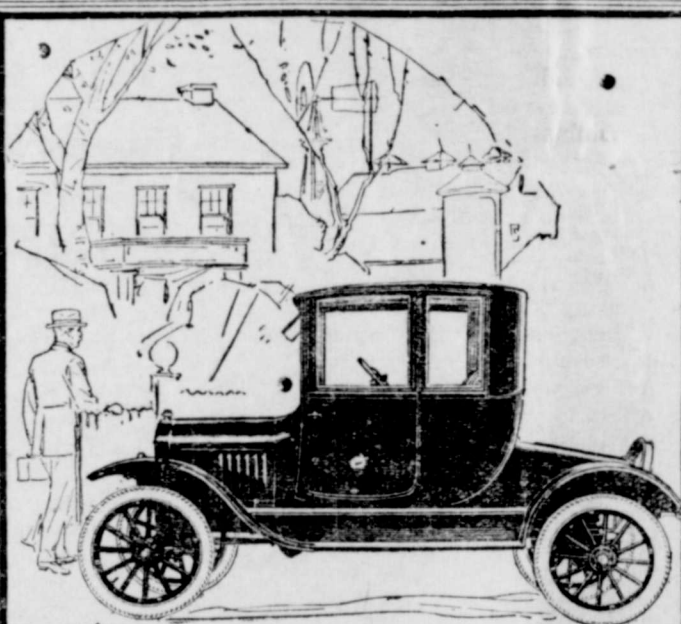

HOUSEWIVES CANNOT AFFORD TO BAKE.

Bakers who help, by advertising message and personal word, to spread the truth that American women cannot afford to bake the family bread, are doing a service to society and propagating a much-needed gospel of simple economies.

Some day, it is to be devoutly hoped, the elementary schools will teach the principles of elementary economies in such a way that no adult of even the most meager education will think the mistaken thoughts that now are encountered on every hand.

Today we find leaders of organized labor, whose disciples as well as themselves should know better, preaching the doctrine that higher wages can be obtained with less production—the silliest and most mischievous of ideas, and yet one that finds ready acceptance among those who are always hoping to get something for nothing.

We find countless thousands, some of them men of prominence, public leaders, who think and teach that all business profits are exorbitant and any business profit is a sin and a shameful thing.

We find men operating bakeries who think they are beating the game of making a living because they are able to persuade the members of their own families to work for them at no wages at all, where other bakers have to pay strangers a living wage.

And we find vast numbers of housewives—perhaps a majority of all there are—who not only count the value of their own time as nothing, but have no conception of the value of many other items that must necessarily be included in a proper analysis of the cost of home-made bread.

How many housewives are there who realize that a correct summing up of the costs of baking bread at home would prove that in many cases a single loaf costs nearly a dollar? Are there any who, in comparing home-made bread with baker's bread, think to include in the cost of the former their own time at the kneading board and the oven, the value of the fuel used, the time spent in cleaning up the pan, the board and the other utensils used, as well as the actual ingredients of the loaf?

Surely a knowledge of economies is needed by the people, and by none more than housewives and small bakers. If the elements of the subject are taught in grade schools no baker would contribute his own time and his family's time to his business without adequate remuneration, and think he was beating the game. No housewife would devote an uncomfor-

table hour and a disproportionate amount of fuel to the task of baking a loaf whose ingredients alone cost her as much as a "store loaf" and fondly imagine she was saving the whole price of the baker's bread—as many do imagine.

The idea that any housewife's bread is superior to baker's bread in quality, cleanliness or flavor is pure sentimentalism—nothing else. Not ten per cent of the home-kitchen baking processes are as clean and sanitary as the conditions of a modern bakeshop. Not ten per cent of the home-baked loaves are as accurately mixed or as scientifically baked as the average baker's loaf. Not any of the home-baked bread is produced at as low a price as is paid for the average loaf of baker's bread.

In the modern bakery, supplies are purchased in large quantities, and hence at prices much lower than any housewife is able to obtain. The mechanical work is done by machinery, so that an hour of the baker's time accomplishes a hundred times as much as an hour of the housewife's time. The baker's profit on a loaf is a mere trifle, for he must depend upon the sale of thousands of loaves to pay for his own daily bread. No home baker can compete with these conditions, if she has the right understanding of costs and the value of her own labor.

Within the past few years there has been some talk among women's organizations on the proposal that all housewives should properly receive at least a nominal remuneration for the time

they actually devote to household duties.

We are not concerned with the merits of that idea; but what we do know is that there would be no home baking of bread under these circumstances. The husband who demanded an itemized bill for his wife's services, and found therein an item of sixty cents to a dollar for baking time, would immediately become a confirmed advocate of baker's bread, and would see that he got it and nothing else from that time on.

GOLDTHWAITE BAPTIST CHURCH.

Last Sunday was a great day in the history of the Baptist Church. We had three great services. The house was filled for the morning service. The theme was Almost Persuaded. One of the saddest things in life is to be almost ready to trust Jesus and to never trust him. The afternoon service reminded us of the ministry of John the Baptist and Jesus. At least 1000 people gathered at Lake Merritt for the baptizing. The pastor, pressed almost into the water by the throng, read from the Word of God, and commented on the Scriptures. The crowd was very patient and attentive. Then the ordinance of baptism was administered to 40 candidates. The pastor first led a number of Sunday School boys down into the water, and buried them beneath the calm waters of the lake. Then came a number of men, about eight of them being members of the Pastor's class. Next was a fine bunch of Sunday School girls and finally a number of young ladies and mothers. This service was a picture of salvation. It declared to the world that their sins had been washed away by the blood of the Lamb, and that they were going to walk in the new life. POISONED BAITS FOR GRASSHOPPERS.

The most effective remedy yet discovered for grasshoppers are the following poisoned baits:

The mixture known as the poisoned-bran bait has proved to be a simple, reliable and cheap method of destroying grasshoppers, and has been applied with signal success throughout many portions of the United States. It is made up as follows: Wheat bran, 25 pounds; white arsenic, 1 pound; lemons or oranges, 6 finely chopped fruits; low-grade molasses, such as refuse from sugar factories, or cattle molasses, known as "black strap," 2 quarts; water, 2 to 4 gallons. The bran and poison are thoroughly mixed while dry, the fruits are then finely chopped and added, and lastly the molasses and water are poured over the bait and the whole thoroughly kneaded. A coarse flake bran is most desirable, although where this can not be obtained early ordinary middlings or alfalfa meal may be substituted; a low-grade, strong-smelling sirup or molasses, however, is essential to the entire success of the undertaking.

Five to seven pounds of the mixture should be estimated per acre.

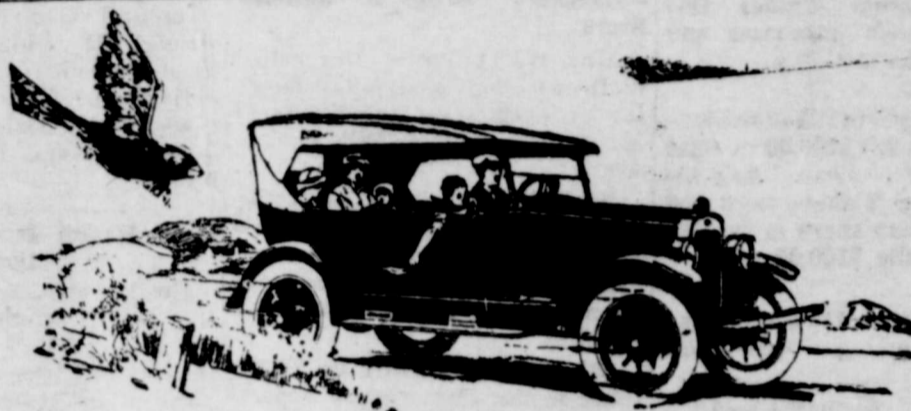

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Present Views.—British and French cotton trade representatives met in Washington the first of this week with a delegation of American cotton men to discuss the United States cotton standards act as applied to the American export trade.

Discuss Peace.—The British cabinet held an extraordinary session in London Monday night and for more than an hour discussed methods for finding a path to real peace in Europe. A new conference will probably be called in which the allied powers will try to finally settle with Germany the problem of reparations.

Wants Out?—A London dispatch Monday says the wires are being kept constantly hot between London, Paris, Berlin, Rome and Brussels in moves the various governments are making to find a compromise which will enable Premier Poincare to save his face while withdrawing the French troops from the Ruhr and the Rhineland.

Flood.—With five known dead, property loss running into the millions, and all rivers and streams in the state out of their banks, Kansas was Monday in the grasp of one of the worst floods of its history.

To Pen.—J. W. ("Hog Creek") Carruth, oil promoter, who plead guilty in Federal Court at Fort Worth Thursday of last week to mail fraud charges in connection with fake oil promotion schemes, will be taken next Monday to Leavenworth penitentiary to serve a year and a day and pay a fine of \$5,000.

Inspector Killed.—Ben Tumlinson, 25, cattle inspector, was killed on a ranch near Bishop, Texas, Monday, when his revolver fell to the floor and was discharged.

Bill of Rights.—A bill was passed in the House at Austin Monday providing for the teaching of the Constitution in the public schools.

Taxes Lower?—A Washington dispatch says national finances are now in such good shape, as the end of the fiscal year approaches, that the next Congress will find it possible to reduce income tax rates all along the line, congressional leaders declare.

Man Drowns.—After a successful effort to rescue Miss Margaret Mier, thrown into a creek when the automobile she was driving was hit broadside by a train near Texarkana Monday Clarence King, 21, was drowned before he could swim to the bank.

Commuted Sentence?—An application for commutation of the death sentence to life imprisonment in the penitentiary has been made to Governor Neff in behalf of Wayne W. Todd. Todd was given the death penalty in connection with the killing of a Fort Worth service car driver on Aug. 31, 1921. He is scheduled to be hanged on June 21.

Booze.—One hundred and fifty liquor laden ships were reported to be lying off the 3-mile limit of American territorial waters last Sunday. The Federal government has armed 12 of its ships and ordered their commanders to sweep its territorial waters clear of the swarms of small craft plying between shore and the host of rum-laden vessels outside the 3-mile limit.

Boiler Blast.—Two oil field workers were instantly killed and another was badly scalded in a boiler explosion at the pump house of an oil company at Currie early Monday morning. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

Lightning.—Loss estimated at \$100,000 was caused by the Southwestern Traction Company during a heavy storm last Saturday night, when fire started by lightning destroyed the power house, machinery and car barns located between Temple and Belton.

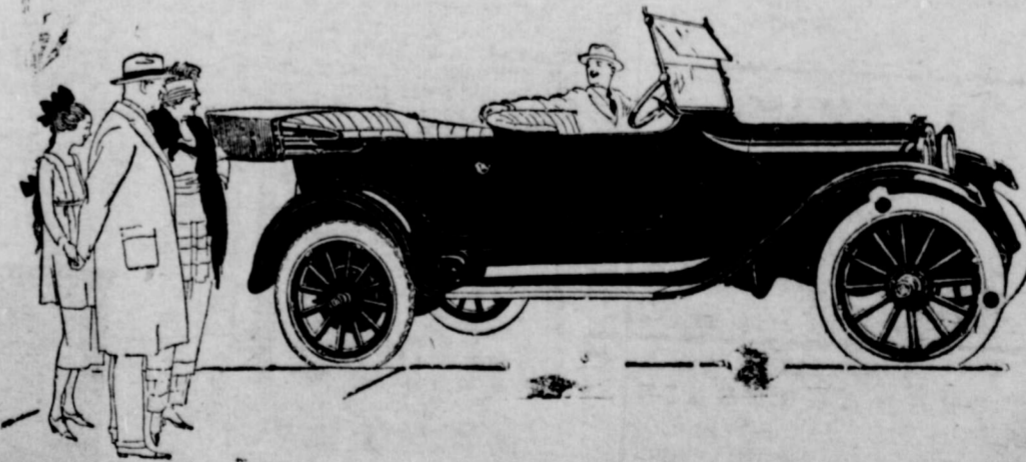

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, directing the Legislature to provide for construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways; providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of amendment herein proposed, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided for herein an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

SECTION 9a. The Legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State; and in order that the state may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition of those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for hereinafter in this section.

When said system shall have been designated and taken over for the State as provided in Section A hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been therefore constructed by the Counties in the State.

Provided, also that save for the State highway system, in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes and bridges within their respective boundaries and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and Laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

“OFFICIAL BALLOT.” “For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways.” “Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways.”

ment shall erase by marking a line through the words “Against the Amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways.” Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words, “For the amendment to Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways.” And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

SEC. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

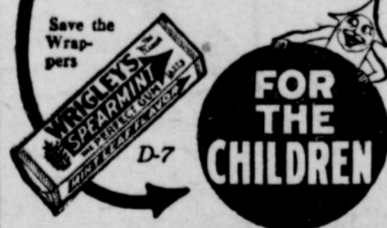
