WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Cotton.—U. S. Department of Agriculture summarized the crop conditions for Southern States as follows: The week was probably the most favorable of the season so far for the general growth and cultivation of cotton.

Agitation.—Several hundred Japanese business and professional men and students, meeting in the Nippon Club at New York Wednesday, adopted a resolution severely condemning agitation in Japan as manifested by the recent demonstration in the Imperial Hotel, Tokio, and by proposals to boycott American goods and to expel missionaries.

Express Rate.—Express rates throughout the country were ordered re-adjusted this week by the interstate commerce commission, which authorized general increases in the eastern zone, approximately 8 per cent, and slight reductions in the west and the south.

Millerand.—President Millerand of France has resigned. His successor will be named at a joint meeting of the two houses of parliament at Versailles. The French law requires that a successor be named within 48 hours.

Prisoners.—Six prisoners made their escape from the fifth floor of the Tarrant County jail at 1:30 Tuesday morning after sawing two bars which held them confined in their cells, and grabbing, choking and binding the night jailor, and then making their escape down the elevator.

J. A. THOMAS ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDACY FOR THE STATE SENATE, 25TH DIST.

In this issue of the Eagle will be found the announcement of J. A. Thomas of San Angelo for the State Senate from the 25th District, subject to the Democratic primary in July. Incidentally, the election of a Senator this year—there are now two in the race—will fill a vacancy that has existed in this district for about a year.

Mr. Thomas was born and reared in Williamson County, Texas, being 50 years old and twenty years of his life has been devoted to the practice of law. For two terms he was Tom Green County Attorney, retiring then of his own accord. He was elected three times as District Attorney, resigning before the end of the third to resume his private practice of law. He has an excellent record before the bar and as a good citizen. He is a life-long Democrat, and has been active in councils of the party. He wishes to assure the voters of Mills County and this section of the District that all support given him will be appreciated and that he will endeavor to deserve the trust reposed in him if elected.

Mr. Thomas declared that generally speaking he was for an economical administration of the State government, consistent with good business judgment; for fewer and better laws and for the simplification and improvement of existing statutes in the interest of court procedure and in other respects, and would likely favor the repeal of some existing laws and the enactment of but few additional ones; and to work at all times for the best interest of the State's educational system.

Mr. Thomas states that in his long experience prosecuting he came in contact with a good many of the technicalities and quibbles in the law which prevent the courts properly dispatching business and administering justice, and believes he is in a position to do some effective work at Austin trying to straighten them out.

The sixteen counties in this Senatorial district are: Sterling, Irion, Schleicher, Coke, Tom Green, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Coleman, Brown, Mills, Comanche, McCullough, Mason, Gillespie and Kimble.

TO BE HERE NEXT WEEK

Fort Worth, June 13.—Edwin A. Elliott, traveling representative of Texas Christian University of Fort Worth will be in Goldthwaite the middle of next week for personal conferences with Goldthwaite students interested in going to college this fall. Elliott is making an extended tour of the Goldthwaite section of the state and reports that high students are preparing to go to college in the fall as never before.

SPECIAL COURT BARS FERGUSON FROM BALLOT

Austin, June 12.—The Special Supreme Court of the State of Texas, two of whose members were appointed to take the place of justices disqualified by themselves to try the case, today upheld the lower court in the injunction suit to prevent the name of James E. Ferguson from being placed on the Democratic ticket as a candidate for governor.

The Special Supreme Court held that the Senate, sitting as a court of impeachment, was a legal court having the right to remove Ferguson from office under the constitution of Texas; that the verdict of the Senate was final; that under the constitution Ferguson having been so removed, can not hold the office of governor; and that the lower court acted within the law in issuing its injunction barring the State Democratic Committee from placing Ferguson's name on the primary ballot. This ends the litigation which sought to settle the validity of the Senate act in the Ferguson impeachment proceedings.

Woman Killed.—An unidentified woman about 35 years old, who is believed to have lived in Dallas, died in a Fort Worth hospital at 11:30 Thursday of injuries suffered when an automobile turned over on the Fort Worth-Dallas pike. A man suffered severe bruises.

99 Years.—John Cavaner was found guilty of murder at Groesbeck Thursday and his sentence was fixed at 99 years in the penitentiary. He was convicted of the killing of his wife at their home April 21. A plea of insanity was made by the defense.

46 Killed.—Three officers and 43 enlisted men were killed and between 10 and 20 injured when a powder blast wrecked the No. 2 turret of the United States battleship Mississippi, according to official information given by the Navy Patrol Station at the San Pedro, Cal., port.

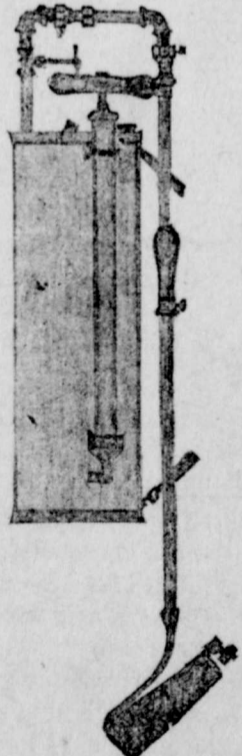

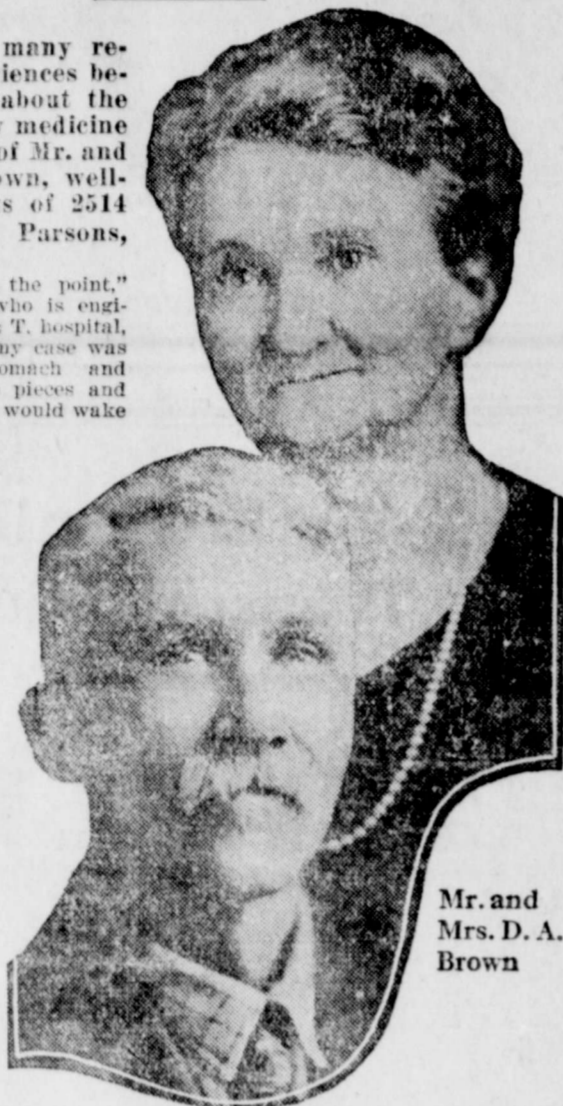

TEXAS FOUL BROOD LAW.

Regulation I.—It is hereby declared that on and after March 1, 1922, honey bees in the State of Texas shall be kept only in movable frame hives permitting of ready examination.

The keeping of bees in box hives, gums, logs, barrels, or other domiciles not equipped with movable frames permitting ready examination of all combs, is unlawful. Bees kept in any form of hive except one containing movable frames permitting ready examination are subject to treatment or destruction by the State Entomologist, his assistants or inspectors, at the owner's expense as provided by Section 16, Chapter 51, General Laws of Texas.

Regulation II.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, no honey bees, used honey combs, used bee hives, used or second hand apiary fixtures or appliances shall be moved or shipped from one country to another unless they are accompanied by a health certificate or special permit given by the State Entomologist, his assistants or inspectors.

Regulation III.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, all apiaries or bee yards wherein American Foulbrood is known to exist, are hereby declared to be under quarantine. The removal of any and all bees, queen bees, colonies, nuclei, combs, and apiary appliances or fixtures is prohibited, except under such cases as the State Entomologist, his assistants or inspectors may permit or approve. Such quarantine shall exist until such time as the State Entomologist, his assistants or inspectors shall determine and declare such apiary to be apparently free from American Foulbrood.

Regulation IV.—It is hereby ordered that on and after March 1, 1922, no colony or colonies of bees affected with American Foulbrood shall be treated except by permission or upon the recommendation of the State Entomologist,

Salute King and Queen Hog, for this is the day of the hog in the U. S. We used to have a saying that "the pig is King," but the hog is corn on hoof with grass and a shot of termilk thrown in for balance. He used to be known as the pig, but now he is the hog. He is a mortgage lifter. Now the farmer and buys the farmer a pig, a radio set, a grand new set of up-to-date farm machinery, and puts a light and plant in the home to help wash, wash, iron, and clean according to the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers.

Three-quarters of a billion worth of hogs were on the first of the year. Owing to crops of corn the past three years was cheap and hog raising increased until the Government figured there was an excess of 7,000,000 hogs over normal. Increased population and wages of labor fully employed, plus 13,000,000 automobiles increasing the summer appetite of office workers also speeded up consumption materially. The hog market melted away and farmers are pocketing some \$200,000,000 more cash this year on the hog crop than it was expected they would get. That \$200,000,000 comes out of the pocket of the

cash to be distributed all through the farm and retail trade channels of the Corn Belt.

The old days of a "pig in a pen" are gone forever under modern American hog raising. The pig does a lot of hustling for himself to save the farmer the valuable time and labor. He rubs against an oiler to eliminate any stray cootie that may pester his hide. He uses his snout to manipulate an automatic waterer or a self-feeder, helping himself to water or feed as feeding floors save feed and hasten the notion strikes him. Out in the fields, the farmer sends his boy or a hired hand to plow, harrow and plant corn for Mr. Hog. Bigger implements are employed all the time to get bigger crops with less time and fewer hired men. Beans are planted with the corn to permit the farmer to harvest part of the crop themselves while fattening. Everything on the Corn Belt farm is centered around the hog. He is the market for most of the crop, and he is given everything he needs for quick maturity of the greatest number of pounds of pork.

The various breeds of hogs undergo the most practical tests of farm and market for supremacy. At the present time, the Poland-China and Duroc-Jersey are running neck

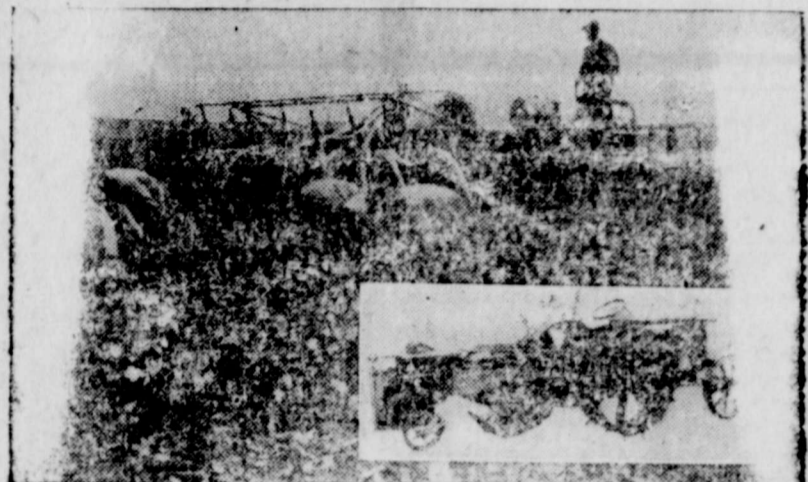
and neck for popular favor. The Hampshire has been advancing rapidly in the last fifteen years, having won the last six earl of grand championships at the International Live Stock Exposition. However, the Berkshire has more barrow grand championships at the International to its credit than any other breed. The attention being given quality in order to compete in foreign markets against Danish and Irish bacon is bringing the spotlight on the Tamworth and Yorkshire breeds, as well as rejuvenating the old Berkshire. Hence, at the present time, there is a tendency to veer a little more towards the bacon hog, perhaps, in spite of old Corn Belt standards of "getting there first with the most hog" at the market. Lard has always sold well to Germany and the South, taking care of this by-product of the fat hog nicely.

Boys and Girls Pig Clubs and Ton Litter contests have all focused more attention than ever on hog raising, so that earlier maturing hogs, hogs that will give bigger gains per bushel of corn, and sows that will farrow and raise litters of eight pigs or more is the tendency of the age in reducing overhead and increasing profits.

Will These New Inventions Cheapen Sugar and Gingham?

CHICAGO—The entire world of consumer and producer may hold its breath to see if two necessities are to be revolutionized as to their cheaper production. These are sugar and cotton, crops on which inventors have been struggling without practical success for a quarter century, according to the Research Department of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The cotton picker holds to the principle of individual boll selection which is so essential, because not all bolls ripen at one time, necessitating going over the cotton fields two or three times to get the cotton when it is all ripe instead of picking many green bolls. It operates on the vacuum cleaner principle, eight pieces of hose being carried ahead in the harvest by pickers who touch the nozzles to bolls to permit the suction of the cotton through the hose for deposit in the wagon behind the machine. It is figured this picker eliminates the hand laborers and opens the way for complete modern machinery introduction into the field of cotton growing.

The sugar beet topper will lift, clean, top and windrow 4 acres of beets per day. It is in this field that so much agitation has been directed against child labor. Utah, Colorado, Nebraska and Michigan areas producing sugar beets are particularly interested. Such a machine is expected to eliminate large hand labor items and bring bigger areas under beet cultivation that will mean cheaper sugar again.

It solves the negro migration and boll weevil problems to a large extent while insuring continued American supremacy and dominance of the world's cotton production. These machines are being brought out by an Ohio manufacturing concern with years of success in the manufacture of farm equipment.

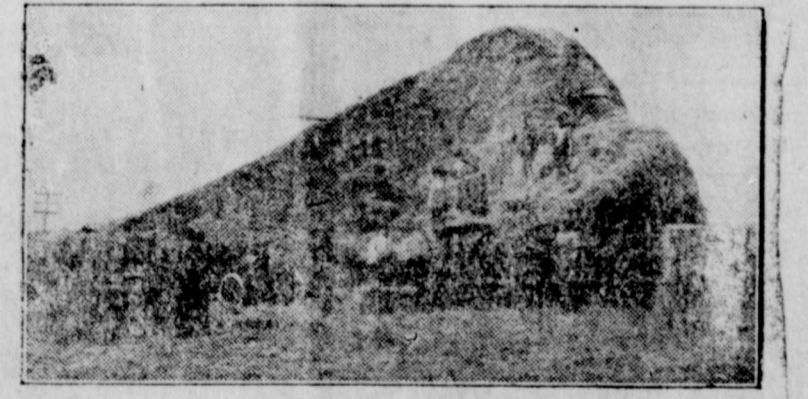
Bee Being Put on Business Basis

The busy bee of tradition and poetry is at last being put on a business basis, according to implement dealers all through the great farming sections of the country. This is especially true in the sections where the clover hays are being put into the crop systems and where the hard roads offer such attractive automobile markets. More

and more farmers with clover and alfalfa hays are taking on a few stands of bees and finding they are a nice sideline from their hay business especially where the clover-hulling is used to thresh the seed. In this case the full bloom of the crop is allowed to develop and the crop ripens enough to give the best seed. Wider cuts of mowing machines, side delivery rakes and hay loaders all are tending to speed up the hay crop and harvest it as wanted by the farmer, whether for seed or for hay.

Baler Saves 20 to 30 Percent over Old Method

Big city building booms that have put wages in the building trades up higher than even the war contract period are reflected in many ways. One is that farmers are not building because they can't put up buildings, either barns or houses while costs remain at such an advance over prices. Hence, the farms of today are way behind in building, just as they are far in the rear of all lines of farm equipment from fence to power. In fact, the U. S. Government says that from eight to ten billions in equipment are needed on the U. S. farms in the next ten years to bring them up-to-date and present-day efficiency demands. The hay press seems to be staging a comeback on the housing shortage and high



Baler Beating Farm Building Shortage

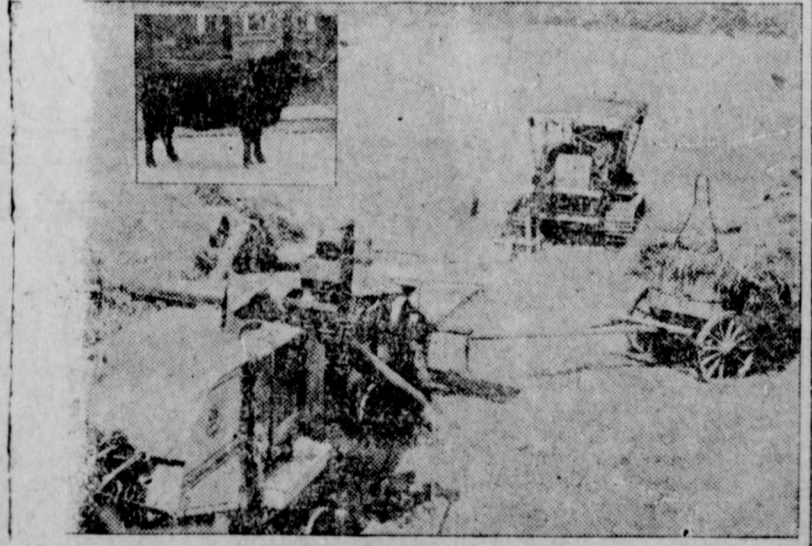
price of feed. The best farm managers claim that from 20 to 30 percent of the hay stacked outside is lost from weather and poor stacking, and those who can get it under the roof are doing so. Yet few farms are equipped with buildings to house all the hay in the loose. Hence, the baler steps into that breach and gets all the hay under cover, paying for itself in the amount of feed it saves while beating the high cost of building. With the hay crop standing right up next to corn as the most important American farm crop, rating around a billion and a quarter last year in farm value, the baling and housing of the entire crop would have

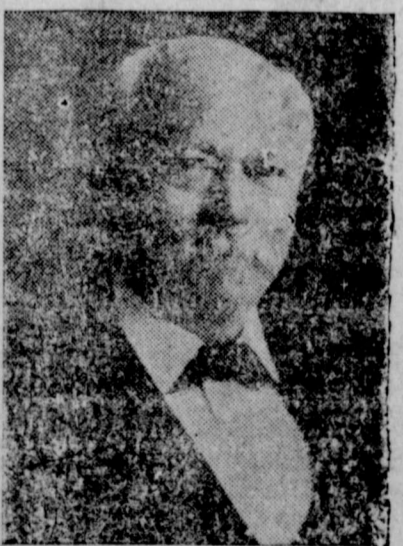

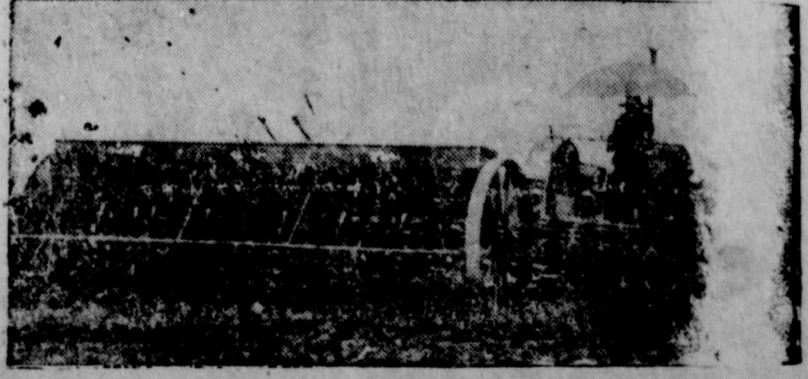


The South is Rapidly Changing from the Old to New in Agriculture

HONOR

By THOMAS A. CLARK
Dean of Men, University of
Illinois.

There is apparently in the minds of
many people a peculiar significance
in being put upon one's honor, what-
ever that may mean, and a peculiar
freedom from responsibility when not
upon honor. An act may be recog-
nized as objectionable or even as actu-
ally evil, but many people feel no
compunctions of conscience in com-
mitting it, unless they are upon their
honor. Then they would lose a leg
rather than offend.

I remember not long ago having a
conversation with a young fellow with
reference to certain immoral things of
which he had been guilty. He agreed
with me ultimately that if the past
could be forgotten he would not in the
future again offend. It was not long,
however, until I discovered that he had
broken his agreement.

"Did you not promise me," I asked,
"that you would not do this thing
again?"

"Why, I believe I did," was his re-
ply. "but I did not promise upon my
honor."

A few years ago a boy came to my
office and asked me to lend him thirty-
five dollars. He was playing in hard
luck, he was out of work, and if he
could borrow the sum of money for
which he asked, he could get to a dis-
tant city and find a job. He would
pay the money back in three months,
he said. I let him have it, and not
hearing from him for a year or two,
I wrote him.

"I was not of age when I borrowed
the money of you," he finally replied
to my letter, "and so I am under no
legal obligation to pay it." And he
has never done so. He was not on
his honor, you see.

It is a curious thing this honor. Un-
der certain conditions a man feels
bound by it. He must be honest and
truthful and upright. He must insist
upon honesty and uprightness in oth-
ers. Then he leaves a room or turns
a corner, and the whole situation
changes. He may lie or practice de-
ceit or even steal, and a few think
the worse of him and he not anything
the worse of himself.

It is a false honor, this I have been
describing. Real honor is based upon
principle, it is the outgrowth of char-
acter. It is not influenced by time or
situation or circumstance. It is a part
of a man's everyday life; it controls
and directs his action wherever he is,
and it needs no oral or written ex-
pression to make it binding.

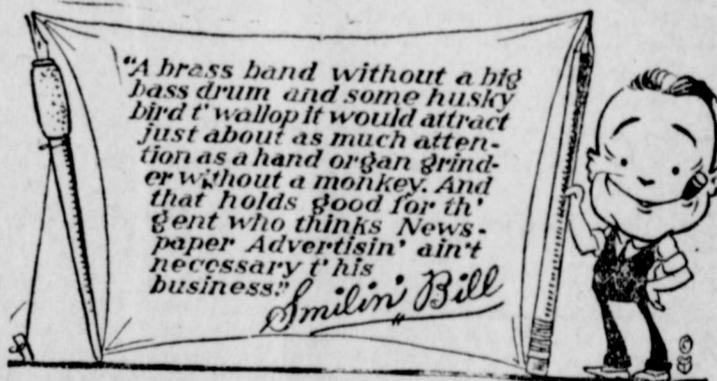

your vote and influence. It is
your office. The people are al-
ways just and fair. They will be
fair with any man. I know you
will be fair with me. At such
times as I can get away I shall see
every one I can. I am depending
upon my friends. I know you will
not fail me. I desire to vindicate
my record as judge by an election
by you the people, as a heritage
to my family. I have served you
faithfully.

Whether it shall be your will
that I be elected to succeed my-
self, or whether it be that I retire
to private life, I shall never cease
to be grateful for all that you
have done for me, and I can say
in all good conscience that what-
ever you do, I can lay down at
your feet the commission placed
in my hands as pure, and unsoil-
ed, and uncorrupted, as it was
the day it was given to me.

What the World Is Doing

Water Veil Guards Walls of Skyscraper

Connected to powerful pumps, a network of 291 sprinklers on the outside of the new Union Central Life Insurance company's building in Cincinnati, Ohio, has been installed to bathe the structure's upper stories in a protecting curtain of



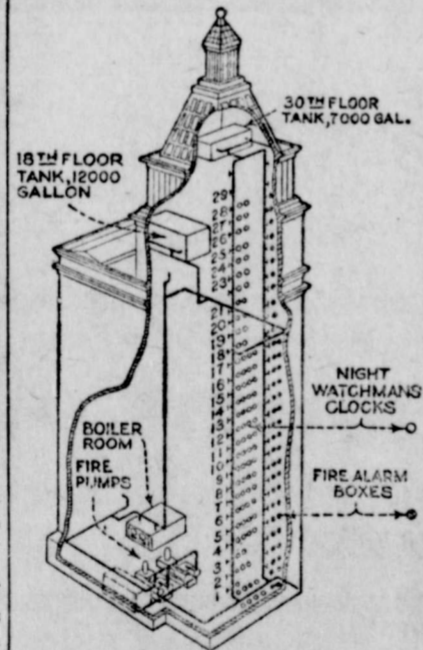
water in case of a severe fire in the neighborhood. The sprinklers are similar to those used in interiors, but operate only when the pumps are started.

This installation, said to be the first of its kind on a building of this type, was adopted largely because of the lesson taught by a disastrous fire in Chicago, in 1922, when flames leaped an eighty-foot street, melted windows of heavy wire glass and devoured the contents of several upper floors of a steel skyscraper. The blaze proved that a modern "fire-proof" structure, though amply guarded against flames by interior sprinklers, may not be immune from an outside attack. The conflagration further showed that, even if the flames do not actually break through, the wire-glass windows, capable of withstanding from 1,500 to 1,700 de-

grees Fahrenheit, radiate sufficient heat to endanger books and papers and other inflammable materials.

The system is divided into six units, each placed where it will best protect the exposed sides of the building. Water is supplied directly from the city mains and from storage tanks in the upper floors. Approximately 5,000 linear feet of galvanized pipe, weighing 14,000 pounds, were required to connect the sprinklers.

The "feeders" are attached to the



building by fasteners in holes drilled into the exterior terra cotta. Sprinklers are turned downward so they will drain, and are pointed directly at the windows. In case of danger from an outside fire, pumps are started, control valves on the top floor where the entire system is managed, are opened, and, in a short time, the upper stories are bathed in a protecting film of water, pouring at the rate of 2,550 gallons a minute at fifty pounds pressure, upon the outside of the windows.

Beard Is Removed with Mud and Use of X-Rays

Shaving beards from men's faces has been accomplished by a special mudlike paste that is undergoing experiments at the hands of a New York doctor. After the mass has been applied, it hardens and is torn off. To finish the operation, X-rays are then directed against the skin. The originator of this method claims that it is beneficial and if used regularly will remove scars and similar marks of long standing. It is also said that the sticky treatment does not leave any ill effects on tender skins.

Births Outstrip Death Rate in World's Largest Cities

Annual death rates in the twenty-seven largest cities of the world are only about three-fifths of the birth rate, according to figures compiled by a French statistician. His reports show that for every 10,000 inhabitants, an average of 250 births and 154 deaths occurred in the large metropolitan centers for the year ended July 1, 1923. Alexandria and Cairo, Egypt, stood high of the birth and mortality lists with 576 and 530 births, respectively, and 259 and 282 deaths per 10,000 inhabitants. Bombay had the highest death rate.

Hot-Weather Comfort for Autos

An automobile top, exposed to the sun's rays, absorbs an amount of heat that renders it rather uncomfortable for the occupants, especially during the summer time. Experience has shown that the application of a coat of aluminum paint to the under side reduces the absorption of heat to a great extent, and painting the outside with the same kind of paint helps still more. Practically one-half of the heat absorption can be prevented by applying aluminum paint to either inside or outside.

Longest Span Nearing Completion

Work is rapidly progressing on the longest suspended bridge span in the world, between Bear Mountain and Anthony's Nose, north of Peekskill, to carry a 38-foot roadway with a capacity of 5,000 motor cars an hour, over the Hudson river. The span will be 1,632 feet long, which is 32 feet longer than that of the Williamsburg bridge, at present the longest suspended span in the world. The total length between the abutments will be 2,253 feet. The bridge towers will be 350 feet high, and the span will have a clearance over the river of 157 feet.
