

Up to May 1 Southern Baptists had contributed in cash on their 75 Miltion Campaign, the five-year program for the extension of their general mis-Mionary, educational and benevolent work, the sum of \$53,832,852.79, leavlag a total of \$21,167,147.21 to be raised between now and the end of 1924 if the original goal of \$75,000, 900 is attained, it is announced by the general headquarters.

When the status of the Campaign was reported to the Southern Baptist Convention at its recent session in Atlanta, the Conservation Commission was instructed to lay plans to complete the raising of the \$75,-\$00,000 by the close of the present calendar year in order to clear the way for another forward program that will claim the support of the denomination during 1925.

Dr. L. R. Scarborough, general director of the Campaign, has been talled back to Nashville to lead in the task or raising the \$21,000,000 additional needed to complete the Campaign goal. He will undertake with the assistance of the various state and associational boards, to effect an organization that will enlist Bantist church in the South. representing a combined membership of 3,500,000, in a definite share in the completion of this forward pro-Kram.

Approximately 6,000 messengers from every state in the South attended the Atlanta session of the Convention and the entire body voted unanimously to get behind the effort to raise the full amount of money needed to complete the Campaign. Where Money Came From



vestigation of the epidemic of mouth disease in your community. 2 Now this disease is wide spread. I have inspected horses from Llano 3 to Mullin; however, I found more talk than disease. But I found a few with a very sore mouth, which yield to treatment very readily, and I would suggest that you thoroughly wash the mouth out with a 1% permongonal of potash one time a day and touch up the raw surfaces with tr john and gleerine, equal parts. Take them off grass! don't feed any hay, but give plenty of a soft wheat bran mash. I think if you will do this you will stop your troubles.

#### Crystal Sets May Hear London Stations

It certainly would be a great surprise to many radio listeners to receive London broadcasting stations on their crystal sets. However, this and other dreams of imaginative rato fans may soon be realized when the new transmitting apparatus invented by Guglielmo Marconi, the radio wizard whose inventions made radio communication practicable, is perfected. This signal piece of construction work in the radio field, which is based on extensive experiments conducted by the inventor and his colleague, Mr. C. S. Franklin, promises to revolutionize completely the present methods of long-distance transmission. The gist of the new invention, according to Mr. Marconi's announce ment at a recent meeting in London, over which he presided, is that the radio waves are concentrated in the form of beam that can be projected in any desired direc ion. In this way all the power can be sent in one direction, thus intensifying the strength of the signals considerably over unheard-of distances, and the electrical energy required for such directional transmission is much less than the amount otherwise used. Marconi also stated that in his recent experiments with the new method he communicated with being stretched over a collapsible frame. St. Vincent, on one of the Cape Verde islands, located approximately 2,400 miles from England, with much less power than otherwise used to span this distance, and receiving the signals much more clearly, and that he was led to believe that owners of crystal sets in America would casting stations. 
