**MINUTES OF THE MILLS COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION HELD AUGUST 2**

The Mills County Democratic convention was held in the district court room here last Saturday afternoon. Hon. John W. Roberts, chairman of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee, called the meeting to order and reported the findings of the committee for the primary election held on the 26th day of July. On motion and second the report was adopted.

Motion and second was made that P. H. Clements be elected chairman of the convention and F. P. Bowman secretary.

The chairman then appointed as a credentials committee J. C. Darroch, J. H. Goodnight, and Mrs. Nora Berry. The committee reported the following delegates entitled to a seat in the convention: T. L. Adams, J. H. Goodnight and J. E. Perkins from Star; N. A. Ducey, W. H. Nelson, D. E. Long, Ben Long, D. Hartman and Laura Nelson from Big Valley; Austin Cook, Sam Rahl, Robt. Johnson, Steve Weathers, Earl Fairman, Lee Jones, Mrs. L. P. Conroy, Mrs. I. O. Harvey and F. P. Bowman from Prec. No. 19 Goldthwaite; D. D. McBride, A. T. Pribble, J. C. Darroch, L. E. Patterson, J. D. D. Berry, C. T. Williams, Mrs. W. E. Miller and Mrs. Nora Berry from Prec. No. 1 Goldthwaite.

J. W. Burdette was invited to participate in the convention in the interest of Nabors Creek, and R. W. Geeslin was invited to participate in the interest of Caradan precinct.

The following delegates were elected to represent Mills County at the State Convention at Austin: Thos. J. Renfro, A. H. Daniel, L. E. Miller, T. L. Adams, Mrs. Nora Berry, Mrs. I. O. Harvey, J. C. Darroch.

John W. Roberts was elected to represent Mills County at the Congressional convention to be held at Abilene; P. H. Clements was elected delegate to represent this county at the convention of the 3rd Supreme Judicial District at Austin; F. P. Bowman was elected delegate to the convention for the 27th Judicial District to be held at Belton. A. T. Pribble was elected delegate to the Senatorial convention to be held at Coleman; and J. H. Goodnight was elected delegate to the Representative convention of the 104th District to be held at Goldthwaite.

Hon. J. C. Darroch then offered a resolution from the floor condemning in clear-out and no uncertain terms the Ku Klux Klan, as a political organization. The resolution, which appears below, was adopted by the convention by unanimous vote. Chairman P. H. Clements then made some timely and emphatic remarks in reference to the danger of the invisible hooded empire, which some people are attempting to set up in Texas, and which he showed was a menace to our democratic form of government and to the manhood of our state. He was roundly applauded.

**Anti-Klan Resolution.**

Vigorously condemning the Ku Klux Klan and instructing delegates to the state convention to recommend the passage of legislation requiring "all secret organizations to file, under oath of their executive officers a full and complete list of their membership" formed an important part of the business of the Mills County Dem-

The resolutions adopted by the convention last Saturday follow:

Whereas, the constitution of the United States and of the state of Texas guarantee to all citizens the equal protection of the laws, freedom of religious worship, and the right of trial by jury; and whereas, those constitutional guarantees are the principal bulwarks of the liberties of the American citizen;

And whereas, there has sprung up in the United States and in the state of Texas a secret political organization, dominated by fanatics and money grabbers, and commonly known as the Ku Klux Klan, which has shown itself by its practices to be opposed to these constitutional guarantees, and which seeks to dominate the politics of the country by edicts issued from its assemblages in secret conclaves assembled;

And whereas, such practices and secret control of our political affairs are contrary to the very principles upon which our government was founded and upon which it has endured and become the admiration of the entire civilized world; and whereas, the said Ku Klux Klan has brought about and continues to bring about serious strife, distrust and dissatisfaction throughout the land;

Therefore, be it resolved by the Democrats of Mills County, in convention assembled, that we condemn the Ku Klux Klan as a secret political organization, and declare that it has no rightful place or worthy mission in our body politic.

And, we recommend the passage of legislation prohibiting the parading of the said Knights of

**DAY FESSLER KILLED IN DIFFICULTY YESTERDAY MORNING AT 1 O'CLOCK**

About two o'clock yesterday morning Deputy Sheriff Carl Bledsoe received a telephone message requesting him to rush to Chas. Langford's home, on the Ware ranch, about 12 miles southwest of Goldthwaite. Mr. Bledsoe and R. V. Littlepage rushed to the place and found that Day Fessler had been killed, two or three loads of No. 4 shot from a shotgun having been emptied into his face and chest.

Elam Kelly, who had telephoned the officers, surrendered and was brought to town. County Attorney A. T. Pribble and Justice of the Peace Jas. Rahl were called to the scene and the body examined. Immediately after the examination the remains were brought to Goldthwaite to the E. T. Fairman Undertaking Parlors in the hearse.

Domestic troubles are said to have caused the shooting. Day Fessler and Mrs. Elam Kelly—formerly Miss Josie Brister—with Mrs. Kelly's little four-year-old daughter had attended church at Lometa, it is reported, and upon arriving at the Langford home—where Mrs. Kelly had been staying—the killing took place.

Mr. Kelly had visited the Langford home about dark that evening, according to what was told the officers, and upon finding that his wife and Mr. Fessler had gone, apparently became considerably wrought up and, grabbing a double barrel shot-gun and some shells belonging to Mr. Langford ran to his horse and left, not being seen any more until the time of the shooting.

According to information Deputy Sheriff Carl Bledsoe received from witnesses, Mr. Fessler and Mrs. Kelly had just stepped from the car when a shot was fired possibly 30 yards to the left. Mrs. Kelly and little daughter rushed into the house and immediately afterward Mr. Fessler awakened Mr. Langford and stated that he had been shot. Mr. Fessler rushed on through the house and fell off the edge of the front porch, with one leg still on the porch. Mrs. Kelly got a pan of water and was washing his face when—according to Mrs. Kelly—Mr. Kelly came around the side of the house and shot Mr. Fessler again. Mr. Fessler had many small wounds in the face and chest and most of the muscle was shot from his right arm.

The shooting occurred between 1 and 1:30 o'clock Friday morning. Mr. and Mrs. Kelly—it is reported—had been separated for two or three months and had been having difficulties for the past two years.

The remains of Mr. Fessler have been embalmed and are at the E. T. Fairman Undertaking Parlor awaiting word from his mother, who is in Iowa. He leaves a mother, of Iowa, a father, M. G. Fessler of this place, two sisters, Mrs. Sam Ward of Cleburne and Mrs. Luther Roach of near town, and two brothers, J. E. Fessler of California and Ray Fessler of this place, all of whom have been notified of his death.

Up to noon yesterday Mr. Kelly had not made bond, awaiting the examining trial. But it is thought that bond will readily be granted him.

Both men were raised in this county.

PERSISTENCE

By THOMAS ARKLE CLARK  
Dean of Men, University of  
Illinois.

I FOUND the old man sitting by the  
roadside of an English country by-  
way breaking stones to be used in  
keeping the road in condition. I had  
seen him frequently as I passed to  
and fro to the village, but today I  
stopped a while to rest after my long  
walk and to talk to him.

He had been a stone-breaker all his  
life, and he took not a little pride in  
the fact that the smooth level road  
over which I had traveled owed much  
to his labors. Great piles of rough  
stone lay along the highway—piles  
that suggested unending toil to me,  
but he seemed to regard them only as  
an opportunity.

I took up one of the hammers that  
lay on the ground and tried my hand  
at the work with rather ill success.  
A few fragments were splintered from  
the rock, but it did not break. I was  
hitting too vigorously, he said; I was  
expecting to accomplish with one hard  
blow what it would take a half dozen  
or more to do; I wanted results im-  
mediately.

"Time and patience," he said, "time  
and patience, and the stones finally  
yield, and the piles of broken stone  
grow."

I have thought of his philosophy  
often since. Impulsive youth finds it  
hard to wait; if results do not come  
in response to our first efforts, we  
grow irritated and discouraged and  
give up the task. If the construction  
in the translation seems involved, if  
the experiment fails in our first at-  
tempt, if we do not solve the problem  
or make the sale, or accomplish the  
task, the first time we hit it an intel-  
lectual blow, we have a tendency to  
throw down the hammer and say that  
the thing is too much for us. Most  
of us need a little more persistence.

When I have worked with a man  
or a task or a problem for a long time  
and have got nowhere, when dis-  
couragement is about to overwhelm  
me, I often think of the old English-  
man sitting by the roadside quietly  
and persistently hammering at the  
heavy stones. "Time and patience,  
time and patience, and the stones fi-  
nally yield," he said, and I take cour-  
age as I recall him. If we work long  
enough at a thing, if we refuse to give  
up, we are likely to win.

### "SAFETY FIRST" EFFORTS BEING MADE BY RAILROAD

Renewed efforts on the part of the railroads are being made this summer to lessen the number of deaths and injuries at railroad highway crossings. One of the leaders in this campaign is Isaiah Hale, safety superintendent of the Santa Fe railroad.

Statistics gathered by Mr. Hale show that 80 per cent of all crossing accidents involve motor vehicles, and for that reason the automobile at railroad highway crossings is a serious problem and should command the attention of every thoughtful citizen.

While our population increased 60 per cent in 30 years, fatal railroad crossing accidents increased 345 per cent, injuries in such accidents 652 per cent, and the number of motor vehicles from 0 to 15,092,177. In 1923 there were produced in this country 4,014,000 automobiles, an increase of 23 per cent over 1922.

Last year there were 2,268 persons killed and 34 injured at railroad highway crossings. It is estimated, based upon previous reports, that during the present year 2,800 persons will be killed and approximately 8,000 injured. Every day in the year 7.6 persons will be killed and 21.8 injured.

While it is agreed that the ideal solution is the elimination of such crossings by putting them above or under the railroad tracks, the cost is prohibitive. Therefore, it is logical to assume that education of the traveling public to the exercise of a reasonable degree of care when approaching and passing over railroad crossings is the only practical way of reducing accidents.

"Crossing Crossings Cautiously" will save many, possibly hundreds of lives.

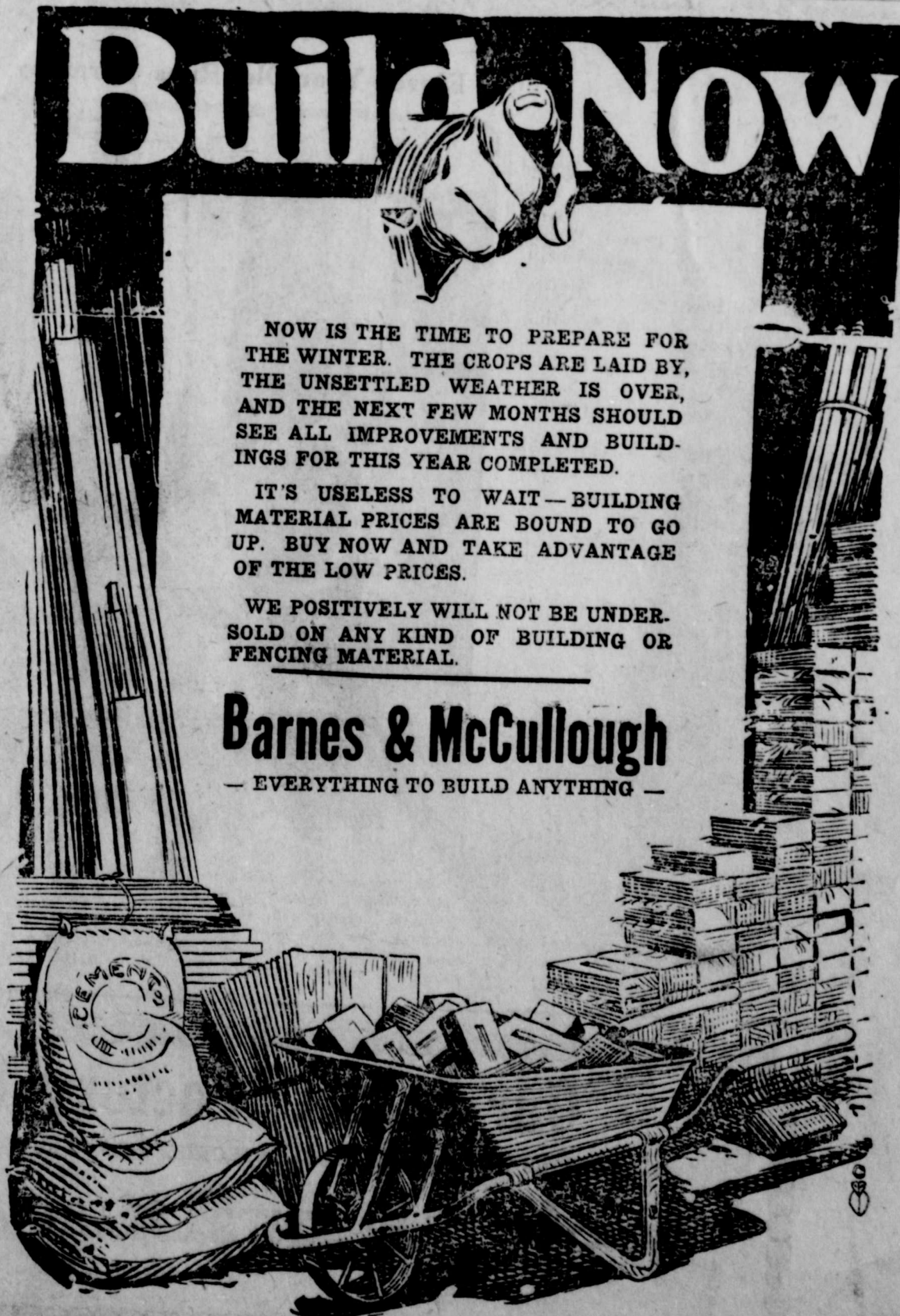

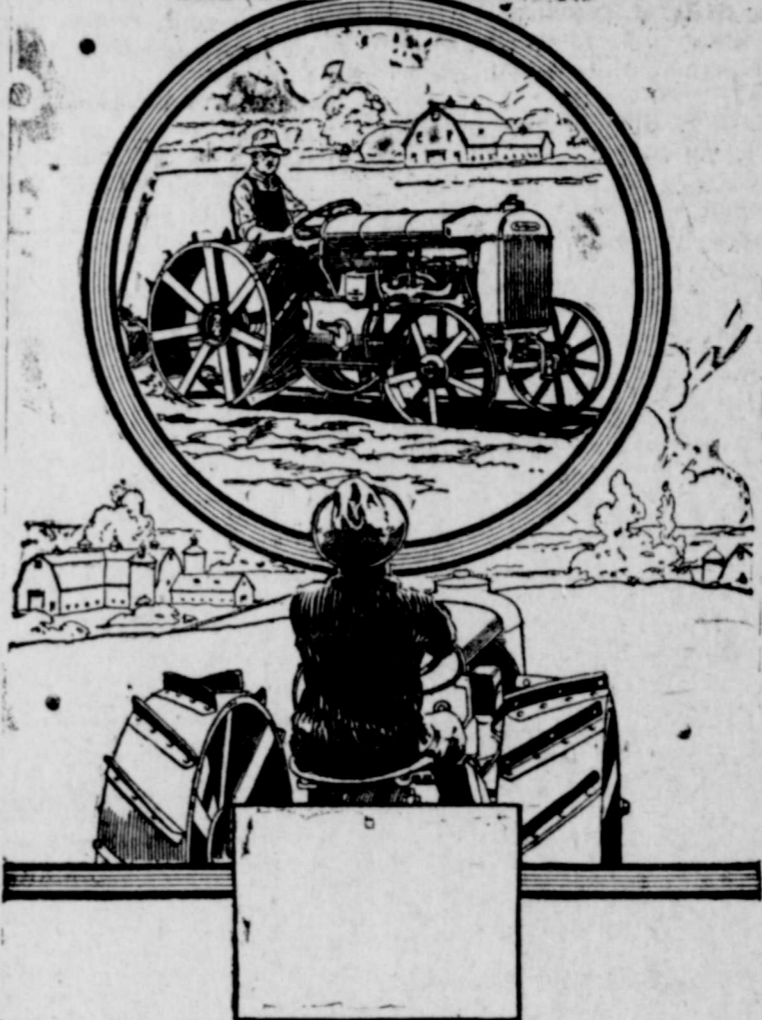

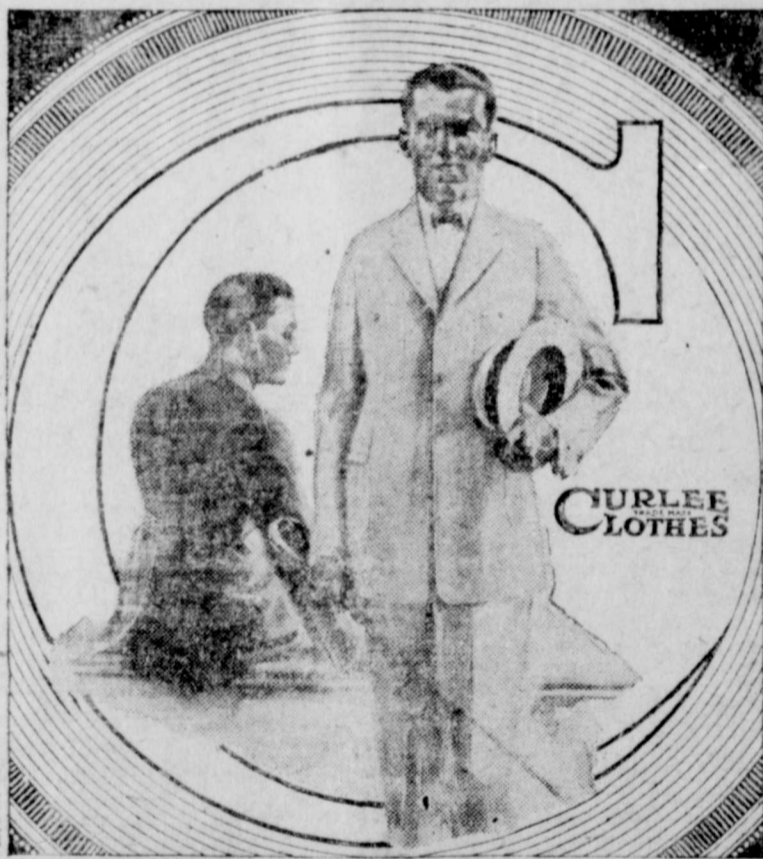
