**POULTRY AND PECAN SHOW AT GOLDTHWAITE DECEMBER 11, 12 AND 13**

The Mills County Poultry Association will stage its Fifth Annual Show at Goldthwaite Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 11th, 12th and 13th.

Mrs. C. A. Eacott, secretary, and R. F. McDermott, superintendent, assisted by County Agent W. P. Weaver, are preparing for an increased number of entries over last year. They anticipate the biggest and best show ever seen in this part of the state.

R. M. Sherwood, A. P. A. judge, and head of the Poultry Department at the Texas Experiment Station at College Station, has been secured to do the judging. It will be remembered that Mr. Sherwood judged the show at Mullin two years ago and gave the best educational demonstration in placing ever seen in the county. Every one was pleased with his decisions and highly instructed by his lectures.

Breeders are solicited to enter their fine birds. Liberal premiums are offered on chickens and turkeys for both pens and singles, young and old. Ask Mrs. Eacott for a premium list.

Already fifteen entries for the peccan show are in the county agent's office. Others have notified him of their intention to place an entry. We have some excellent natives. Exhibit jars are available for all entrants. F. R. Brisson, county agent San Saba county, and pecan expert, will judge the pecans. We invite all growers to be present at this judging demonstration.

The Boys' and Girls' Club exhibit will be placed with the poultry show. The entry fees and premiums are the same as last year. But don't forget, a \$25.00 gold watch will be given by L. E. Miller, the Jeweler, for the best pen of chickens in the girls' show, and a \$25.00 watch for best pen in the boys' show. Promoted 10 or more entries are placed in each show. That means that if 10 girls enter the contest, the watch will be awarded and if 10 boys enter a watch will be won by some boy.

We have fine birds in Mills County. In evidence, we mention that Covey & Grubb entered their fine turkeys at Brown county fair this summer and won 1st old tom and 1st and 2nd pullet.

W. G. Smith entered his turkeys at Coleman last week and won 2nd old tom, 2nd and 4th pullet and 2nd trio against strong competition. He was beaten in every class by Taylor, Richland Springs.

**CHEVROLET MOTOR CO. CUTS FREIGHT COSTS**

Flint, Mich., Dec. 4.—A plan begun by the Chevrolet Motor company in 1922 to cut down freight costs of shipments by paralleling each of their assembly plants with a factory for the Fisher Body Corporation, which builds all Chevrolet closed bodies, will be completed by the first of the year when the final factory for the Fisher Body Corporation will be in operation at the Tarrytown, N. Y., assembly plant.

A factory for the Fisher Body Corporation to build Chevrolet bodies is now in operation at six of the seven Chevrolet assembly plants. The one at Tarrytown, N. Y., is the last to be completed. There has been a close connection between the establishment of Chevrolet assembly plants and the gradual reduction in price of the Chevrolet car in the last five years particularly since the Fisher Body Corporation factories have been established at each Chevrolet assembly plant.

During this period has come about a number of reductions in the price of Chevrolet cars, due in great measure to the economies effected by such assembly plants, which include also the body building factories. From early in 1920 through 1924, a period of five years, there have been reductions in the price of the Chevrolet cars, totaling approximately 35 per cent.

In addition to the economies effected and the consequent price reductions, there has also been a steady marked improvement in the quality of the Chevrolet cars. New features have been incorporated from time to time which added to the comfort and convenience of the owner.

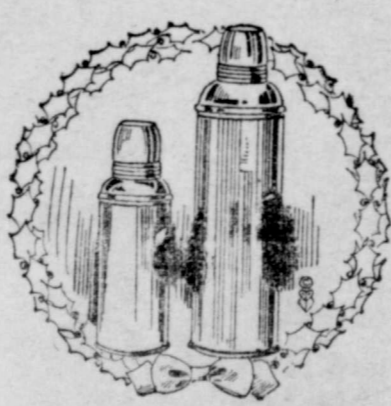

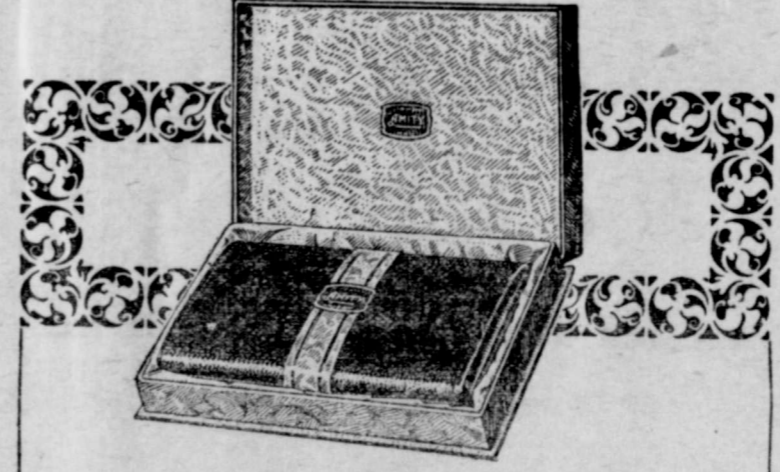

**BEWARE OF DIPHTHERIA.**

"This is the time of year when diphtheria begins to appear among our school children," according to Dr. Malone Duggan, State Health Officer, "and every parent should watch his children carefully to be sure that an ordinary case of sore throat with a rise in temperature does not terminate with this dangerous disease."

Youngsters in rural districts are especially liable to diphtheria for they have not become naturally immune through frequent small doses of the disease producing germs as have city children who are constantly surrounded by them.

**Contact Spreads Diphtheria Germs.**

We formerly thought that diphtheria increases with the coming of cold weather but the real reason for its appearance at this time is that winter brings the opening of schools and the mingling of children in closed rooms. This contact affords better opportunity for the infection to be carried from one child to another on hands and books. The common drinking cup should not be permitted in any school or public place. Teach your children not to put pencils or other objects in their mouths, to cough or sneeze into their handkerchiefs, and to wash their hands carefully before eating.

In 1923 there were around 1400 cases of diphtheria reported in Texas and 189 deaths. Up to November of this year, with two winter months yet ahead, there have been 1238 cases and 70 deaths. Death from diphtheria usually indicates neglect on the part of some one for if this disease is quickly recognized and properly treated there is no need for it terminating fatally. The discovery of antitoxin has given us an aid in combatting the disease and this treatment, if properly and promptly given, makes recovery nearly certain.

**Diphtheria Can Be Prevented.**

But any child can now be made immune to diphtheria through three injections of toxin-antitoxin, which is just as sure protection as a typhoid or smallpox vaccination. Your family physician can give your child this treatment and eliminate any chance of this dread disease. Every boy and girl should have this protection before entering school and it can be safely taken by a babe of a few months.

Make this a slogan of your school district—"Let there be no diphtheria among our pupils." Time, money, suffering, and death are saved by this simple treatment. Every child between six months and six years should be given this protection. Let your doctor give your child these doses of toxin-antitoxin.

**Typhoid Fever Deaths Are Unnecessary Deaths.**

For several weeks now the writer has been getting messages from his old home neighborhood about one of our old schoolmates and boyhood companions—a bright, likable, capable boy he was with more ability and promise than was possessed by most in the school. First, the news came that he had typhoid fever. Then for several weeks he fought a hard, prolonged, but in the end steadily losing fight. Now a letter from the old home neighborhood contains the paragraph:—

"I believe I wrote you of John R. —'s death. He was buried a week ago yesterday. He left a wife and six children, the youngest four or five months old."

To any report of a death from typhoid fever nowadays there is always added a poignant sense of the utter needlessness of the death. Any death from typhoid fever now is unnecessary death. The most complete and thorough going tests have demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt that vaccination against typhoid fever is one of the greatest discoveries of modern times. Every father and mother who reads this should not only take this vaccination, but see that it is also taken by every other member of the family once each three years.

Unfortunately, some people had an idea that the typhoid vaccination is about as troublesome or painful as smallpox vaccination. This is not true at all. Typhoid vaccination usually occasions no more bad results than a short-lived headache, and the treatment taken is effective for three years thereafter.

On a recent evening in Geneva, at  
the Hotel des Bergues, took place  
a dinner of especial significance and

similar banquets in the United States

It was the first International  
Golden Rule dinner and was attend-  
ed by a brilliant roster of guests  
from twenty-odd countries, the pre-  
siding officer being M. Paul Hymans,  
President of the Council of the  
League of Nations.

of the guests, the menu was any-  
thing but Lucullan, the spirit of the

supported by the serving of the  
same ration that is issued to war

the worthiness of the charity.

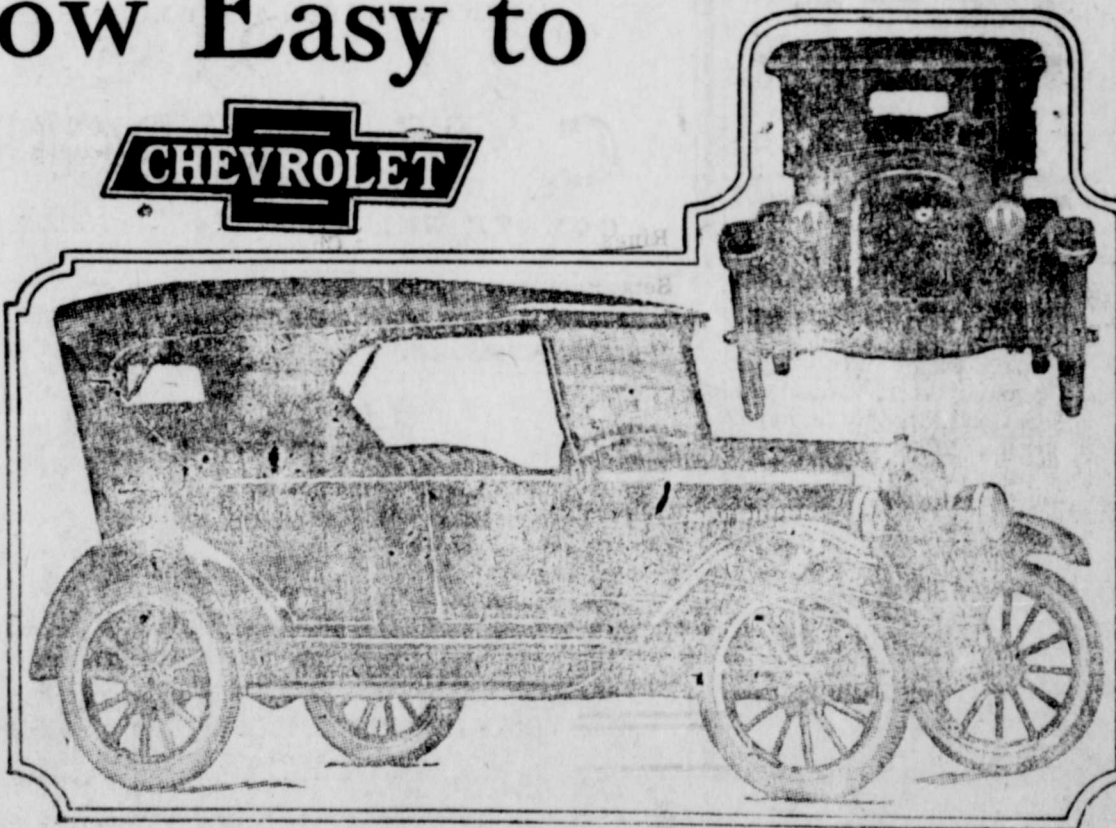

Many an old trunk or chest contains letters that may bring the finder a profitable reward. Send these to Mr. Harold C. Brooks, Box 226 Marshall, Michigan, and he will immediately write you, stating whether they are of value and, if so, will offer you full value for them. He is a private collector of rare stamps and envelopes and will pay more for those he is seeking than a dealer. Besides the Confederate issues, certain United States and foreign stamps are wanted provided they are on the original envelopes and mailed between 1845 and 1870. Although the rare issues are especially desired he also buys many of the commoner kinds, and many people are in this way getting Christmas money with but very little trouble and no expense.

The Advertising Manager of this paper has known of Mr. Brooks for many years and you may place fullest confidence in his integrity. He will advise you frankly, offering what he regards the envelopes as worth to him and in case the envelopes are not satisfactory they will be returned to the sender.

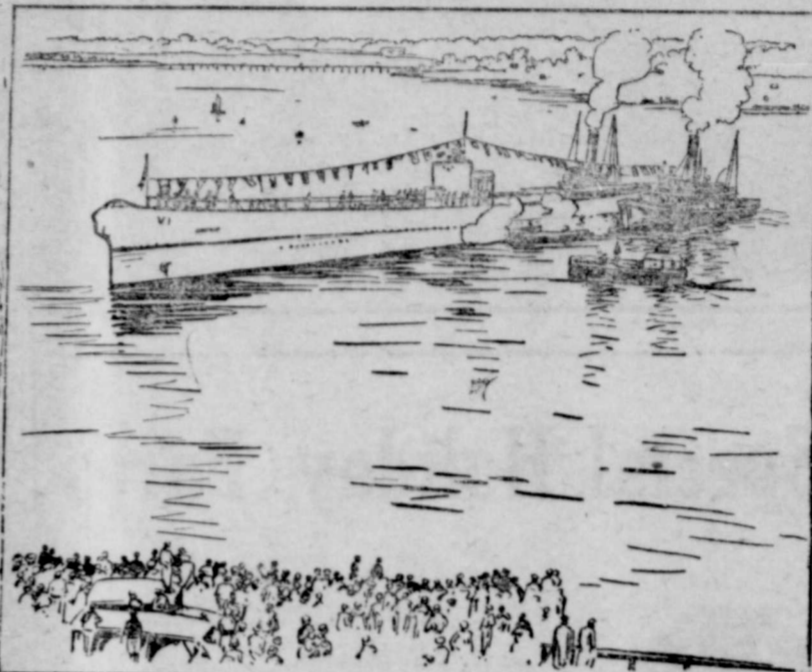

# What the World Is Doing

As Seen by Popular Mechanics Magazine



Shortly after Launching: the Giant Submarine "V-1" with its Gay Pennants Is Welcomed to the Sea and Preparations Are Made to Complete it for Voyage across the Atlantic

**Giant Sub Able to Cross Atlantic with Crew of Eighty-Seven**

The fighting efficiency of Uncle Sam's navy will be greatly increased, officials believe, by the "V-1," the giant submarine, nearly twice as large as any previously built here. It is said to be capable of sailing as fast and as far as the battle fleet in any kind of weather and will not need the services of a "mother ship." The huge boat, the first of a fleet of nine similar fighters to be built, crosses the Atlantic and return without replenishing its supplies of fuel. With a displacement of 2,104 tons, it develops a speed of twenty-one knots at the surface and nine knots an hour submerged. It is 341 feet six inches long, has a maximum breadth of twenty-seven feet eight and five-eighths inches and will carry a crew of seven officers and eighty men.

**Over Thousand Accidents an Hour Cause Heavy Loss in U. S.**

An average of twenty-one accidents occur every minute in the United States, according to figures compiled by the government, those caused by automobiles leading in number. Baseball is said to head the list of mishaps in athletics and sports, while polo has the lowest figure in a similar report made up by an insurance company. This record does not include accidents to campers or persons on hiking trips or pleasure tours. One insurance company reports that fifty-six policy holders were accidentally killed in the past ten years while engaged in recreation.

A good filler for cracks in stoves and furnaces is made by mixing equal parts of salt and wood ashes into a paste.

**An Artistic Storm Door for the Home**

There seems to be no happy medium between the expensive glassed-in porch and the ugly, drab storm doors used on the more modest houses. One home owner could not afford the glass porch, but he could see no reason why he could not make the storm door as artistic as possible.

Almost every storm door on the street was painted a dull gray, regardless of the color of the house or its trimmings. His house had rich brown shingles, trimmed with cream, so he made the storm door of tongued and grooved cypress, which has a pretty grain, put in a generous window, and stained the door with a dark-oak oil stain, then finished it with spar varnish. The door was hung with iron T-hinges painted with gold-bronze paint, which gave a pretty effect against the dark-brown stain.

The result was a sturdy storm door which harmonized with the quiet tones of the house and was not an eyesore. This hint may be useful to other householders who are dissatisfied with the appearance of the front of the house in storm-door time.

**Logging Radio Stations**

Neatness and compactness are the outstanding features of a new device for logging radio stations. The call letters and other data concerning the various stations are printed on a strip of paper, which is held on two rolls and turned forward or backward by means of two small knobs. When a station is received loudly and distinctly as possible, one of the knobs is turned until the call letters of that station are found, and the dial readings are jotted down so that the same station can be tuned in later without delay. There is plenty of blank space on the paper so that call letters, etc., of new broadcasting stations can be added.

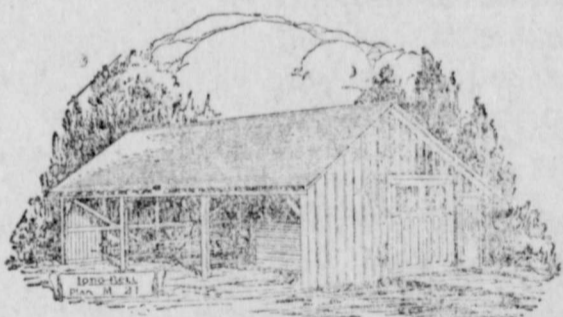

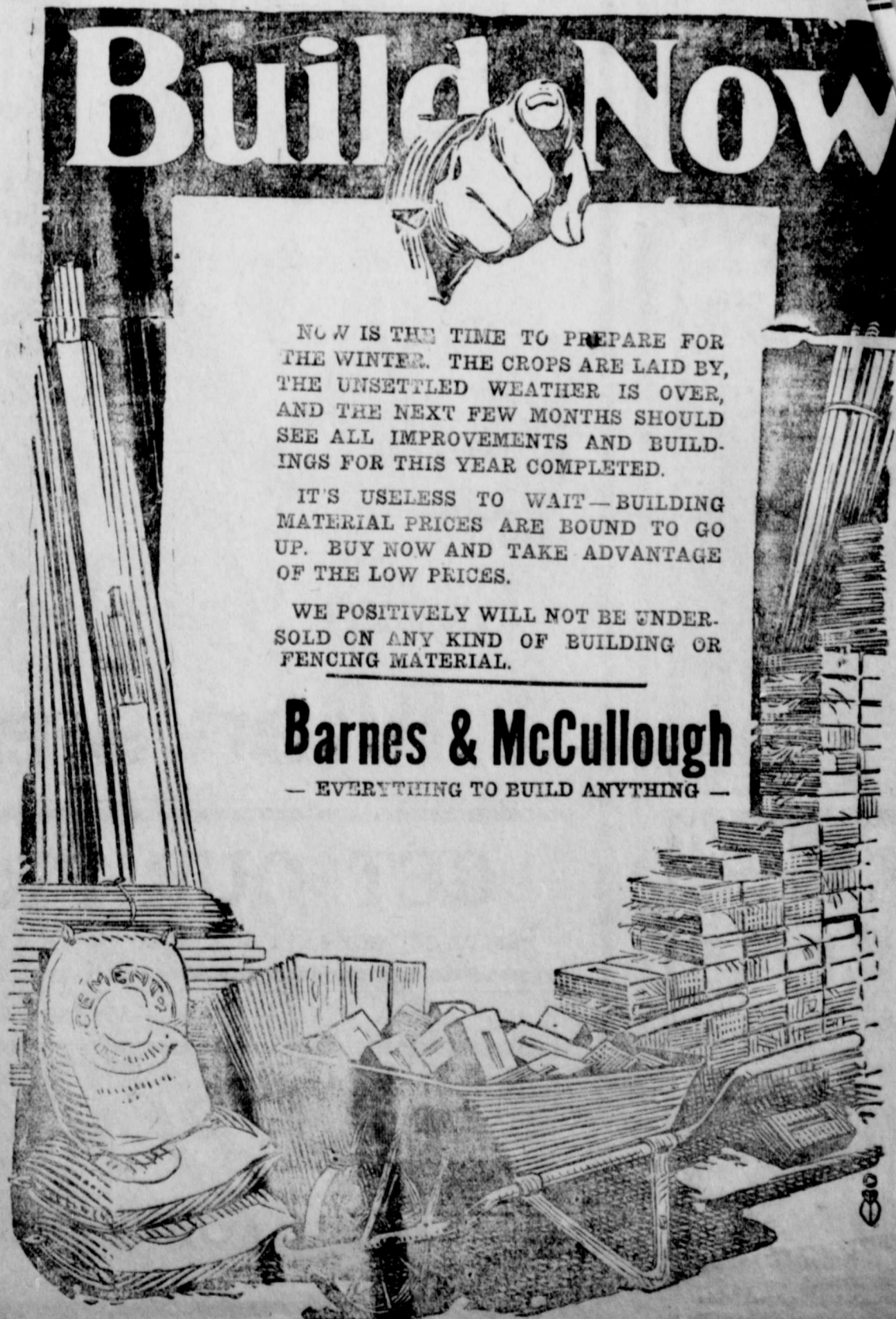
