In 1925 I planted cotton from the 19th to 23rd of May. Just 33 days after planting I found the first square and 39 days after there were blooms. Cost of chopping was kept at home again. So it pays to plant when the ground is in the right condition and cooperate with your neighbor in fighting the boll weevil. This year I expect to plant from the 10th to the 25th of May, if it becomes good spring weather by that time.—W. C Stark.

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



This commonly occurs when rheostats are turned too far, and is the principal reason for tubes In opposing the flow of current, the



If the wire becomes hot enough to char the insulation on which it is wound, it becomes loose, adjacent coils touch each other, and the rheostat loses its smooth operation. ontact on the resistance at all times When turned to the extreme left, the wiper arm should leave the wire and come to rest on the insulated strip. breaking the circuit. Always select the proper type of rheostat for the kind of tube used and do not attempt to put too many tubes on one rheostat. When buying a rheostat, select one that is simple and compact. A Farm Ice House That Saves Ice and Work

A trapdoor is, of course, provided in the floor and is kept closed to keep the warm air from getting into the pit. A layer of heavy tar paper over this floor covers all the cracks and furnishes additional insulation. The refrigerator is simply an ordinary dumbwaiter which can be low-ered into the ice pit. This opens into the kitchen and the lift is raised by means of a crank or counterweight. The usual dumb-waiter construction is used. This method provides a lower temperature for the food than can be obtained


