"What hath God wrought!" If Samuel Morse were alive today he might well exclaim with reverence at the perfection of an invention that has put the remotest farm home in touch with the world.

My father was a farmer and a ranchman, and I well remember that we children in the home saw and heard so little beyond our neighborhood that our world was very narrow to us. There was little that we knew beyond our own little sphere of life.

How different it is with the children in our home today! We live on a farm and ranch three miles from a small town in West Texas. But, the children in our home are about as progressive youngsters as you'll find anywhere. They have heard some of the world's most famous artists, in the way of music, both in the United States and in foreign countries; they have learned to appreciate good music by contrast with the inferior; they have heard lectures by some of the most learned men in the United States.

But better than all of these educational advantages to the children, is the fact that the radio has banished loneliness for the whole household, and has kept the children at home more. Many times they have chosen the joys of home life to going to parties or cheap shows.

From a commercial standpoint, the radio has been worth hundreds of dollars to my brother, the farmer and ranchman. The weather forecasts have saved him many a plumber's and garage bill by informing him of a coming blizzard; they have saved him the loss of many a sheep and lamb by warning him when to give them extra care. The announcement of prices on stock and farm products has helped him to get the best prices.

The blessings of the radio to the shut-ins, especially on the farm home, are immeasurable. I will remember the pleasure it brought to my invalid father who was confined to his room at home for nearly a year before he died. Many a Sunday morning he heard a powerful sermon, and a prayer so distinct and earnest, that, in the silence of the home, brought him, as it were, into the very presence of God. He was always a great lover of music, and the feeble he grew, the more passionately fond of music he became. Imagine our joy on being able to tune in and delight his soul by flooding the room with sweet music from distant parts of the earth! As he listened, he was drawn closer to his Maker and the better world that he was fast approaching. He had no fear or dread of death and who shall say that that brought

sweet music by infinite vibrations did not tune his soul in with the infinite Maker and help to take away the sting of death.

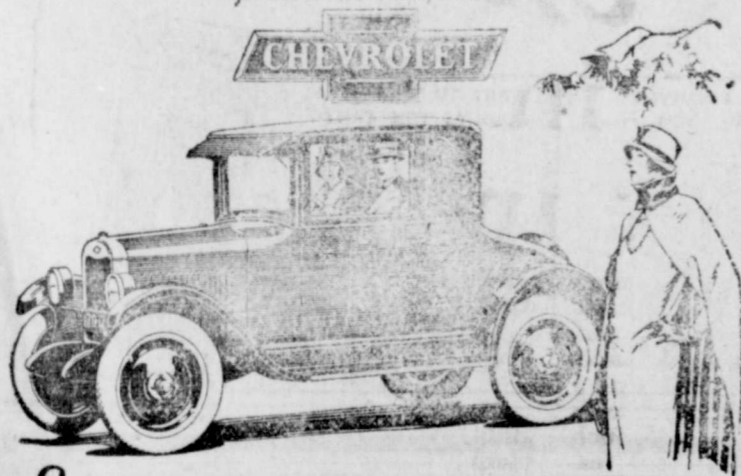

Cigarette Smoking

It hardly seems possible that any one would be so foolish as to do what I am about to do, raise a protest against cigarette smoking. Before the Great War such protests were common. Rail roads, great banking institutions, and numerous corporations had even gone so far as to prohibit the use of cigarettes among their employees. But the war destroyed the conscience of the nation on the tobacco question and we have got to build up from the bottom again. In this paragraph on smoking I am simply going to make a few statements and quotations, and after weighing the facts, the students, and others, may determine that their attitude towards this matter will be.

According to the percentage furnished me by the 29 observing students in various high schools 5 per cent of our high schools are smoking. The individual percentages registered by my observers are as follows: 50, 20, 80, M 40, 75, 12, 20, 25, 35, 85, 75, 15, M 50, 30, 50, 25, 99, 73, 50, 10, 80, 66, 10, 50, and 75 per cent. Seven charge the girls of their families with smoking according to the following percentages: 15, 5, 2, 15, 3, 30, 40, 3, 5 per cent. One writes that Robert one of the girls in her class smokes occasionally when he is at the school.

er the efficiency of American young men than alcohol. All are agreed that smoking injures the heart, arteries and kidneys. The tobacco smoker is slowly yet surely committing suicide."

Mr. J. J. Kelso, superintendent of neglected and dependent children of the province of Ontario for twenty-one years upon oath declared: "In our work among delinquent boys, we find that those boys are all cigarette smokers."

Such evidence is inexhaustible. But this ought to be sufficient for thinking boys. The cigarette habit will undermine you mentally, physically and morally, and you ought to quit while you can. If you have never become addicted to the habit let me urge you never to begin it.

Few Religious Problems
The students answering my questionnaire have few religious problems. None who replied to my inquiry seem to be troubled with doubts or intellectual difficulties. And all except two are members of some church. A large number, however, say they find it hard not to yield to the temptation to follow the crowd on Sunday morning after Sunday school and leave before the preaching service. Had it ever occurred to you that you were making it hard for some one else to be true to conscience when you fail to stay for church on Sunday morning? Well, you are.

I want to say a few words right here to these young people about church going. You ought to make it your habit to attend at least one good church service each Sunday. It is reasonable to suppose that the minister of your church is the best prepared one in your church to instruct you religiously. He has had special preparation for that task, more extensive training along that line than your Sunday school teacher. So many Sunday school teachers, good men and women, are so inadequately prepared to teach God's word. If your minister is not the best prepared one in your church for this task he ought to be. And you need his instruction and help. Every high school student should be a member of some Sunday school but attendance upon the preaching service, in my judgment, for the high school student, is far more important than attendance upon the average Sunday school session. And I say this without undervaluing the Sunday school for all ages for I am a Sunday school enthusiast. If you attend Sunday school, and others leave upon being dismissed, you stay. Take a stand; don't drift. Be a leader rather than a follower. Ability to stay for church when the crowd goes home after Sunday school shows purpose and will power and may determine your future happiness and success along many lines. I would rather be with the minority and right than with the majority and wrong.

And if you stay others will stay. "No man liveth unto himself."

A Word To Preachers
I am now going to spread before you what these young people say about preachers and sermons. Just a few quotations. Perhaps these expressions will explain the absence of many of our young people from the preaching service. "The sermons I heard do not seem to be designed to interest youth."

Young folks don't like to be scolded from the time the sermon begins until it ends. One girl begs permission to say that the kind of a sermon she likes is a modern one. "I think she means one that has not grown stale or worn from years of using. "Plain, simple, humorous," is the way another student puts it. "Sermons which are noble, uplifting, inspiring, and full of life appeal to me."

"I like sermons on Bible characters."

"I like sermons about later life and what to avoid."

"I like sermons that are illustrated with incidents from every day life because they seem more real."

"I like sermons not too long drawn out. Ones dealing with modern problems."

"Sermons with lively experiences and pep and get through with it in a half hour."

Most preachers can, if they will, profit by these suggestions from the high school students.
