WESSON NO. 4 WILL BE SPURRED IN SATURDAY --- CONSIDERABLE EXCITEMENT AMONG OIL MEN.

THE LOCATION HAS BEEN MADE AND THE MACHINERY IS BEING PLACED ON GROUND

Several Leases Are Changing Hands In The Bayou Section

Mills County people are optimistic over prospects of getting oil here

At last Mills county is going to get another serious oil play. Wesson No. 4 well will be spurred in Saturday if there is no delay occasioned by rain and within thirty days the black lime at 2200 foot level should be encountered and it is confidentially expected by persons who have watched the oil situation in this county closely that oil will be found in this well. It will be remembered that Wesson No. 1, before it was ruined by a mis-placed shot of nitroglycerine, stood 200 feet in oil after barely touching the black lime. After this well was ruined the company dug two more wells within the vicinity—one a hundred feet south and one a hundred feet north of the old well without striking any oil. Following the drilling of Wesson No. 3, the company of drillers of which Mr. Gregory—the holder of the present drilling lease—was a member, were forced to abandon the field for a time. Mr. Gregory, however, believes that there is oil there and has shown his faith by contracting for the drilling of Wesson No. 4. Vaughn Ralph of Ralph Bros., contracting drillers came in on last Sunday night's train. He quickly traced the drilling machinery—which should have been here several days ago—and it arrived Tuesday morning. Wednesday all the machinery was placed on the ground except the boiler which was enroute and it is thought by Mr. Ralph that the well can be spurred in Saturday.

The Wesson No. 4 well is located 2558 feet almost due north-east of the Wesson No. 1 well. This location was run by Mr. Gregory's geologist Monday.

Considerable leases are changing hands near the well and interest is being manifested in other portions of the county. Several other blocks are being pooled and it is thought possible that other well will be dug in the near future. However, it is probable that most of the other operators will wait to see what Wesson No. 4 does before beginning drilling.

Mr. C. M. Gregory, owner of the leases—which it is reported total more than 12,000 acres—came in this morning and possibly will remain on the ground until the well is completed.

Mills county has gone through her 10 years of wildcatting and it is now time for an oil well in the county if there is any oil here. The citizens are optimistic that Mr. Gregory will bring in the oil if and he strikes it and most of them are optimistic that he will strike the flowing gold.

L. E. MILLER RETIRES AS PRESIDENT OF THE MILLS COUNTY C. OF C.

After an administration of three years, L. E. Miller—last week—retired as president of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce. However, it was only after Mr. Miller thoroughly convinced the membership of this organization that he would not serve longer that they consented to let him drop back into the ranks. He is now a member of the board of directors, and no doubt, will work as untiringly as ever for the good of the town and county.

Mr. Miller organized the Chamber of Commerce—almost single-handed—and has been the main-spring of its existence ever since. He is a live wire, a pusher, a town builder and the fruits of his labors during the time he headed the Chamber of Commerce will bless Mills County citizens—especially the farmers—for years to come.

Among the improvements which the Chamber of Commerce under Mr. Miller was instrumental in accomplishing are: A cold storage plant which assures the farmers a regular produce market, a commercial hatchery of 12,000 egg capacity, a dairy for Goldthwaite, and the organization of the Mills County Fair Association. In addition to this the Boys and Girls club work, the poultry show, the Farm Bureau, and the Mills County Interscholastic League meet and many other worthy causes have been helped financially—otherwise by the chamber of commerce.

Two pieces of work which the Chamber of Commerce, under Mr. Miller has accomplished are: securing of the Pecan Belt Highway and the saving of Highway No. 74. Work is now being done to secure the highway from Linger-ville through by Indian Gap and Caradan to Goldthwaite and prospects are bright for us to secure this highway.

All in all, the three years during which Mr. Miller led the destinies of the Chamber of Commerce have been productive ones and have seen Mills county advance considerably despite the short crops.

--FARM FACTS AND FANCIES--

By W. P. WEAVER, County Agent.

More Cotton on Fewer Acres and More Feed on More Acres

At this time, no doubt all farmers have definitely decided on the 1926 crop program and the number of acres to be planted to cotton, feed, and food crops. It is hoped that the warnings against the one crop system has been heeded and that every Mills county farmer will try to grow "more cotton on fewer acres and more feed and food crops on more acres" and thereby contribute to stabilizing the cotton market and producing food for the family and for the stock on the farm.

Texas farmers pay \$2,000,000.00 annually for feed and food ship-

ped into the State that could be grown in Texas. This is folly. All agree that feed and food, paid for with cotton, comes higher than home-grown.

While land is drying out so planting can be done, let us consider the motto "More Cotton on Fewer Acres" and if possible revise the cotton acreage downward. Look well to the feed crops and to the garden. Get as far from one crop farming as possible.

More Hogs

Mills county farmers should gain much help from studying the methods of the Danes, who grow

no corn, yet lead the world in bacon production. This surprising fact is due to their wise use of dairy by-products, to their spirit of cooperation, and to the high degree of intelligence and skill they show in feeding and caring for their pigs. The total area of Denmark is but a little over one-fourth that of Iowa, yet measured in money this little country exports about one-sixth as much pork products, mostly bacon, as the entire United States.

Yes, and they sell us butter by

the ship load.

Proper Terracing

He who allows his soil to wash away and plants only one crop, so the soils are more depleted each year, must also be a dreamer.

We know our soils are sadly depleted. Terracing and crop rotation is our only hope. Thousands of farms in Texas are terraced each year. Where the work is properly laid out and the terraces put up to a sufficient height and width they usually stand the

test of such rains as have recently fallen.

Terraces break for the following reasons:

1. Not put up to a sufficient height.
2. Not built to a sufficient width.
3. Insufficient outlet.
4. The gullies not filled to a sufficient height and width to allow for settling.
5. Outside water allowed to come into the field.
6. Big rains before terraces have time to settle.

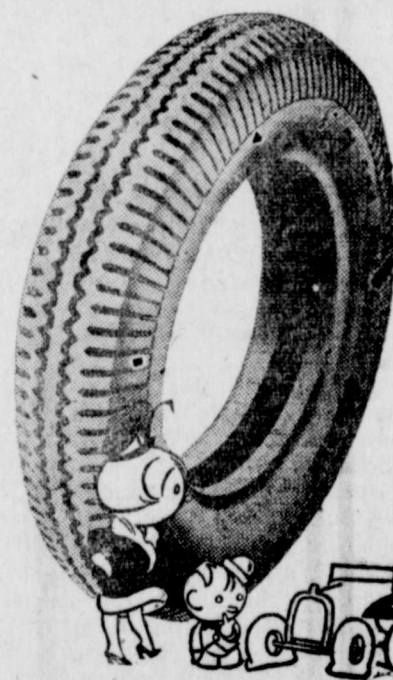
