FAIR ASS'N DIRECTORS MET LAST WEDNESDAY

The directors of the Mills county Fair Association met in the office of County Agent W. P. Weaver last Wednesday afternoon. Twelve of the fifteen directors were present. Plans for the forthcoming fair were discussed and formulated.

The association voted to and have borrowed \$1,000.00 from the Trent State Bank for the purpose of building stables, fixing the race track and cleaning the grounds and exhibit building stalls for the fair. \$250.00 was appropriated toward liquidating an outstanding debt.

At a meeting last October committees were appointed to take care of the different branches of the fair and these committees will begin immediately to work toward making Mills County's First Fair a live one in every respect.

The courtesy of the Trent State Bank in loaning the association the \$1,000.00 on the credit of the association has assured the success of the fair this year.

It was decided to charge a general admission fee of 25 cents per day for adults this year or a season ticket for 50 cents. This admission charge allows free access to every part of the fair except the grandstand. Charges to enter the grandstand will be 50 cents, the same as they were last year.

All old U. C. Veterans and their families will be admitted to every thing FREE. The few old vets who remain will be royally entertained during the three days.

Next week the Eagle will announce the chairmen of the different committees and the more completed plans of the Fair.

The date was set for July 20, 21, and 22.

Hon. Walter C. Woodward in his announcement for re-election to the office of State Senator falls into three errors. I call attention to them not to appear critical but merely to "keep the record straight."

He speaks of his services in the last Legislature while as a matter of fact he was not a member of the last Legislature but is a member of the present body.

He also states that the Legislature of which he is a member passed the general appropriation bill in the regular session something that had not been done before in more than fifty years.

Of course he did not speak of the "card" for the journals of the House or Senate will disclose that the twenty seventh and thirtieth Legislatures remained in session until the expenses of the State for the next two years had been provided for. The appropriation bill of the 28th Legislature was passed on about the 135 day of the session and the bill of the 30th Legislature was passed about the 90th day of the session. Strong efforts were made to force adjournment so as to force special sessions but the attempts were defeated from day to day.

When our law making bodies convene in regular sessions there is but one thing absolutely necessary to be done. That one thing is to pass the appropriation bills providing for the maintenance of the government for the next two years.

I always seemed to me that to fail in that duty was to fall far short of what the people have a right to expect.

For many years, as far back as I have investigated, the legislatures of Texas have given our governors absolute veto power over items of appropriations contained in the general bills. By adjourning as soon as the bill is out of the way, they surrender their right to pass an item or the entire bill over the governor's veto, thereby making his authority of items of expense undisputed.

This habit of adjourning without holding a rein over the veto power has caused much trouble in the past and may do so again.

The present legislature of which Sen. Woodward is a member will long be remembered as a very efficient one and to our own senator much credit is due.—

AMOS WHITE RECEIVED HIS LAST CALL

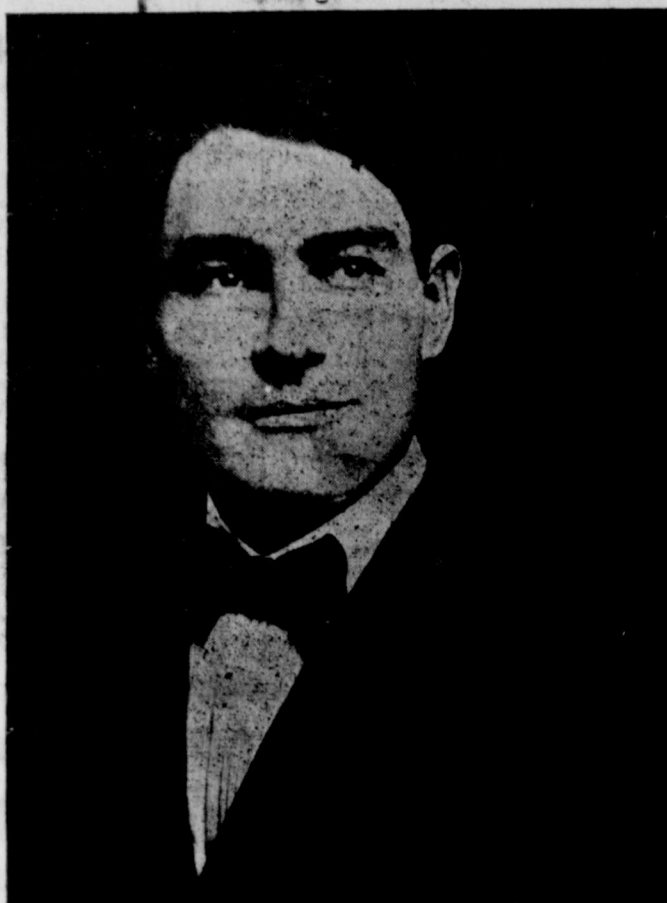

SPRAY

Melon Lice and Cucumber Beetles Can be Controlled

By R. R. Reppert, Entomologist
Dusting with Nicotine Sulphate dust has become the approved method of controlling the melon louse and cucumber beetle, and as these insects begin their work early in the season, a brief description of the method is in order.

Nicotine Sulphate of forty per cent strength, the kind used extensively as a liquid spray, is mixed with an inert carrier of fine texture. In this section the most available substance that is suited to this purpose is hydrated lime.

Varying mixtures may be made, the most common strength containing two per cent actual nicotine sulphate. For this strength five pounds of the forty per cent nicotine sulphate must be mixed with one hundred pounds of hydrated lime. For a three per cent strength seven and a half pounds and for a four per cent strength ten pounds of the nicotine sulphate must be used.

A two per cent dust will control the louse, but a six per cent nicotine sulphate or fifteen pounds of the nicotine sulphate to one hundred pounds of hydrated lime is best applied for the control of the cucumber beetle.

The dust is applied by means of any of the various dusters on the market or by means of a bag fastened to a box. It is not effective at temperatures below seventy degrees and hence should be dusted over the plants on a warm day. When the air is quiet so the dust cloud will hang over the plants.

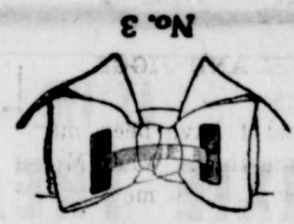

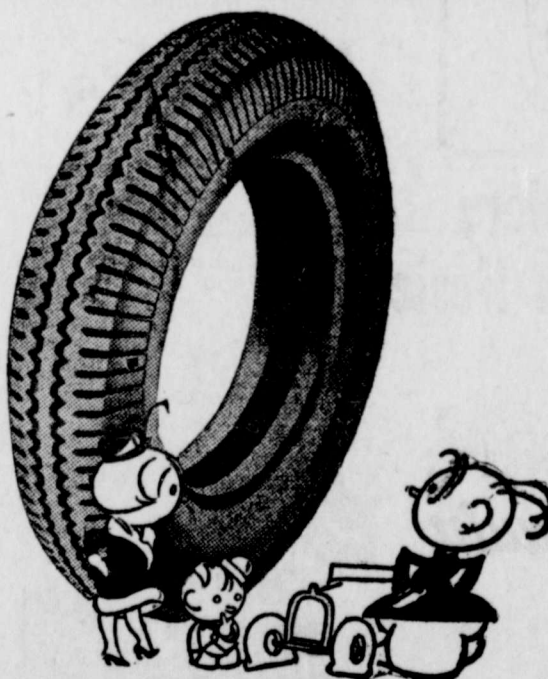
