GOLDTHWAITE SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 13.

The time for the opening of the schools has been set, September 13, by order of the board of trustees. It is important that all who expect to attend the Goldthwaite schools during the term of 1926-1927 enroll the first day. In this way they can get an even start with their classes.

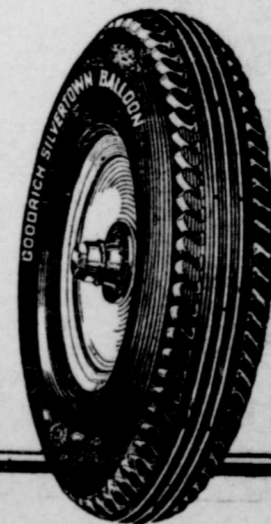

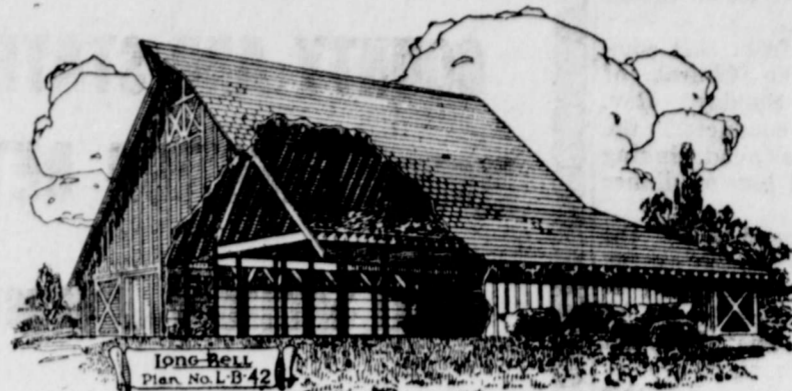
His cheerful conversation and abounding good nature will long be remembered by those who know him well.

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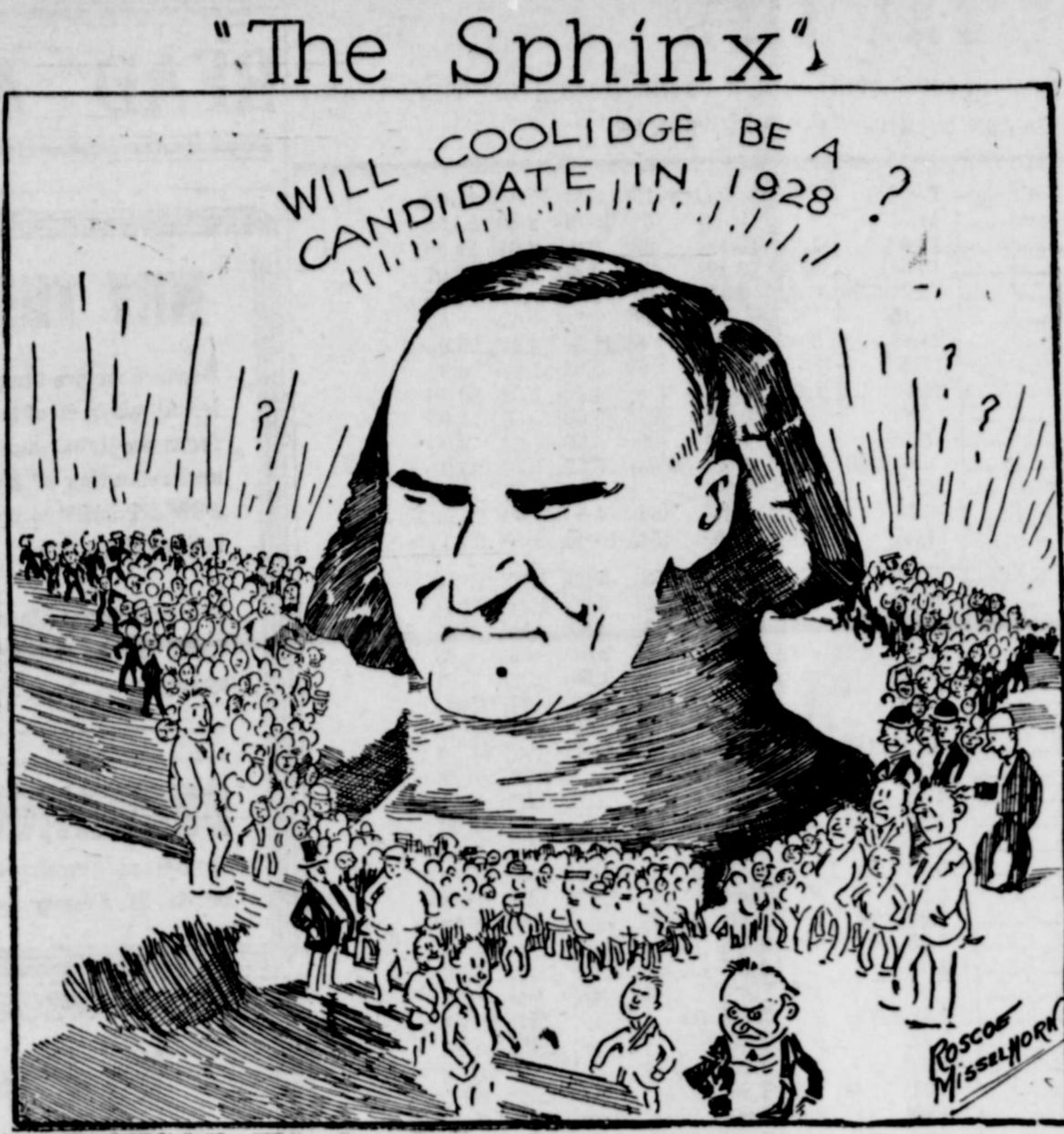
