MORE ABOUT PETALUMA

(By W. P. Weaver, County Agent)

So many readers of my last week's article have asked for more information concerning the California Poultry Association that I am asking space for a further account of my visit.

Their unprecedented success is largely due to efficient methods, volume of production and the even climate.

By efficient methods we mean proper feeding and housing, keeping the premises sanitary and free from insect pests, and cooperative marketing.

The Petaluma poultrymen never fight fleas, mites, blue bugs, lice or internal parasites. He prevents their appearance. He doesn't even meet them half way. He has found that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure and always keeps on hand and uses regularly the necessary materials and equipment for pest control. This is one of his strong points. No producer can make much money on a few hens though they be the highest producers. The Central California Producer stocks from a two to a ten acre tract with from 3,000 to 20,000 hens. He keeps only the highest producers, gives them best care and all his attention and is making a success. He could not meet overhead expenses and make a living on a small flock.

The cooperative marketing feature was gone into pretty thoroughly last week. However, we believe this to be the chief cornerstone of their success. We noticed that three samples of eggs always appeared side by side in the shop windows: 1st, uniform size, grade No. 1, price 37 cents; 2nd, mixed sizes, overlarge and small 31 cents 3rd, small, marked "pullet eggs," 27 cents. Everyone knows how the best Texas eggs are handled.

The Association's June statement shows that 28.8 per cent of the month's sales went to San Francisco and Oakland, while eastern markets and "other sales" took 39.1 per cent, and 42.1 per cent of the receipts went into cold storage. So their success cannot be attributed altogether to a nearby market.

The Petaluma Association is cooperating with the University of California in research work in an effort to determine the cause of blood spots in the yolk, and the effect of different feeds on the color of the yolk, and other problems.

The small runs are cut into the small divisions. Some of these divisions at all times furnish green feed for the flock, while the constant cultivation insures the ground against infection.

Recently we read the reports of the Eastland County Committee and the Brady Chamber of Commerce Committee, sent out there to inspect this famous poultry center. Both reports agree with my opinion that California's advantage over Central Texas lies in climate and their marketing system and that we have a decided advantage in the price of land and availability of feed.

After making a careful survey of their conditions and knowing ours, we sincerely believe that they have nothing on us but climate and they haven't enough of that to even up on the decided advantages of cheap lands and feeds that spread out all over Central Texas in general and Mills County in particular.

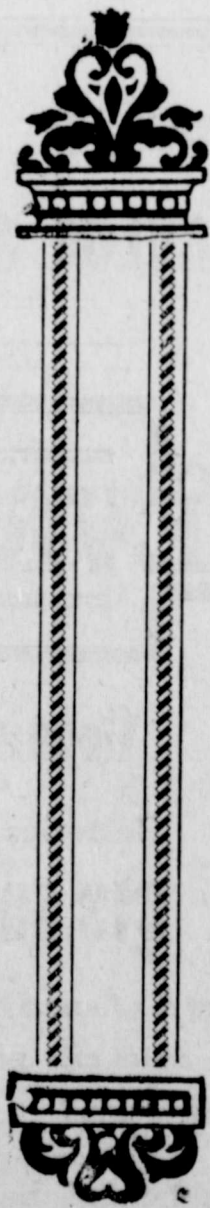

REDUCTION IN LONG DISTANCE PHONE RATES EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1.

The reduction of long distance rates announced by the Bell Telephone Company will be adopted by the West Texas Telephone Company effective October 1st.

The reduction are in accord with the nationwide changes made by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company which have been made possible by mechanical economies effected in the transmission of long distance messages by the larger telephone companies.

Cut Rate Period Extended
One of the most interesting changes from the public standpoint is that which adds an hour and a half to the reduced rate period. This will begin at 7 p.m. instead of 8:30 p.m. as at present. It is estimated that the phone users over the country will be saved \$3,000,000 annually by the changes.

To all points 150 miles or more distant the rates are substantially reduced. Within state boundaries, however, reduced rates begin with points 100 or more miles distant. For example, the basic

station to station rate from Goldthwaite to Shreveport, La. will be \$1.60 instead of \$1.95; to Dallas 90c instead of 95c. Longer rates will be reduced proportionately.

Midnight Discount Eliminated.

Midnight discounts are discontinued under the new system, but the longer reduced rate period and the substantial reductions applying in basic rates to distant points means that this change will make little difference in the cost of night calls.

Between 7 p. m. and 8:30 p. m. the discount will be approximately 25 percent of the day station-to-station rates and from 8:30 p. m. to 4:30 a. m. about 50 percent of the day rates. These discounts will apply where the day station-to-station rate is 50 cents or more with a minimum reduced rate of 35 cents.

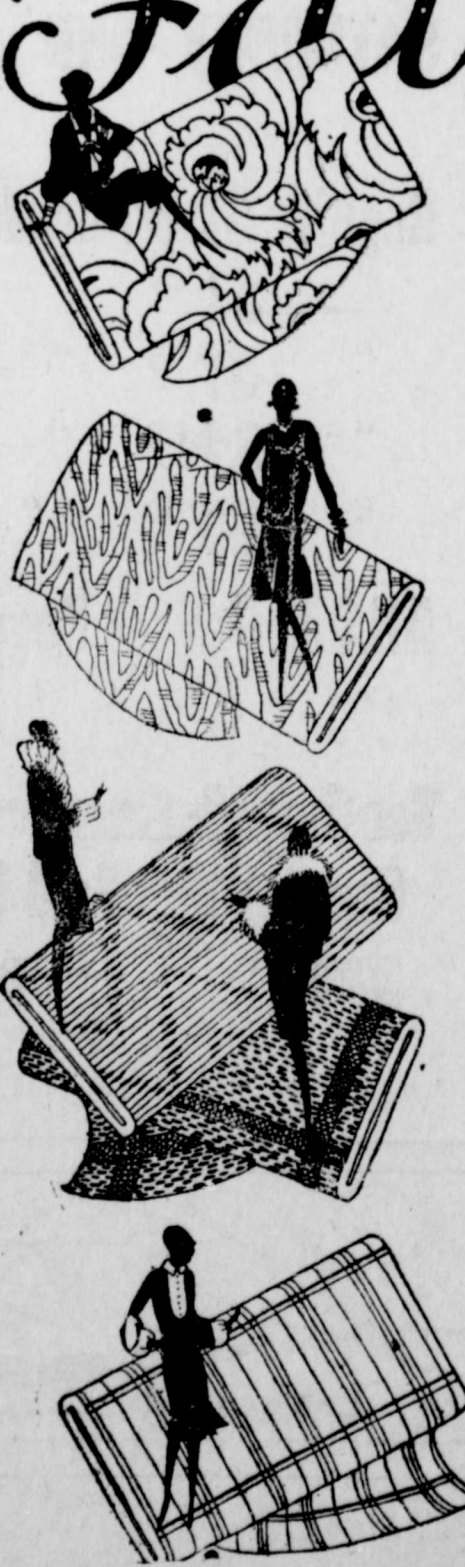

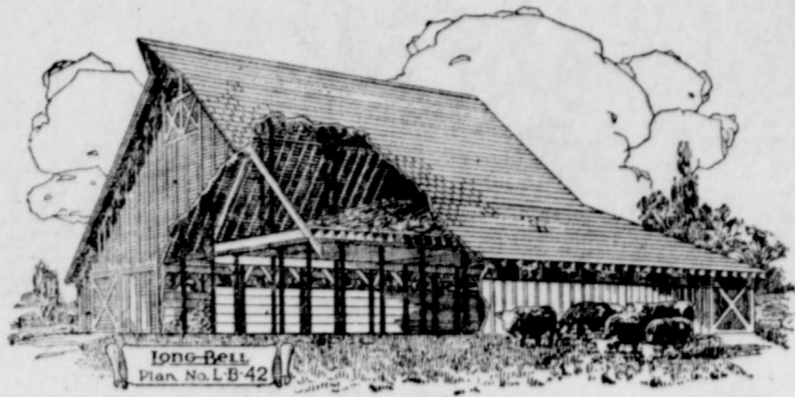

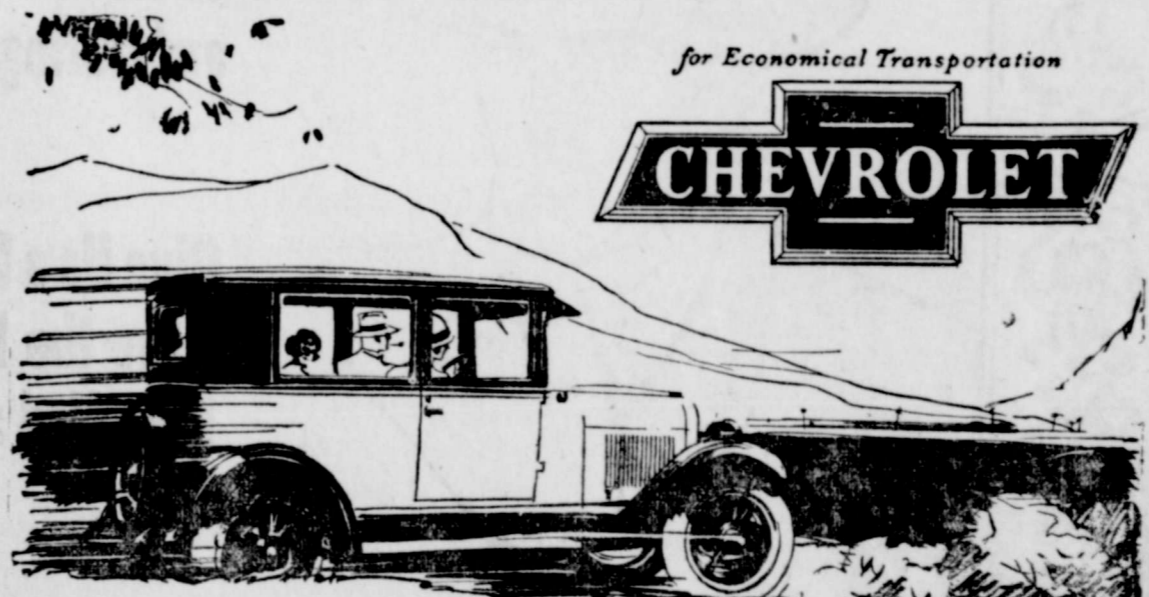
