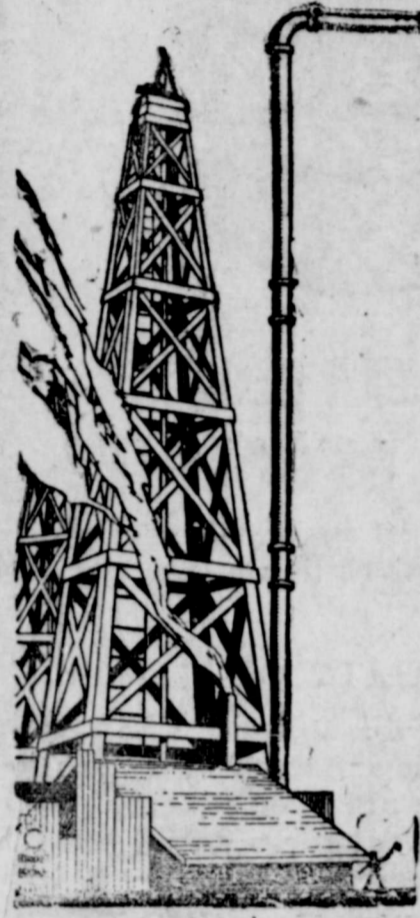

Rapid Operation on 2,500 Acres Expected to Come In as a Gusher Well — Noted Geologists Approve the Structure!

FORT WORTH OPERATOR ELATED OVER PROSPECTS

Completion of the Smith Interests well, five miles west of Goldthwaite, is expected by Christmas! This is the information given us by R. A number of recent sales of oil leases have been noted that ran into unusual and startling sums—a thousand dollars an acre being regarded as nothing very unusual for such a sale, and with an acreage the size of the Smith Interests block, a sale at that price should

I think you people down here have one of the most wonderful potential oil fields I ever saw, every indication points toward certain areas of this county being underlaid with a tremendously rich oil pool and when my big drills get down to the expected levels, I believe I am going to bring that oil to the surface and make Goldthwaite a Christmas present of a fine new oil well, for I believe I will have that well completed by the time Christmas rolls around."

The well being drilled by Mr. Smith is, as most of our readers

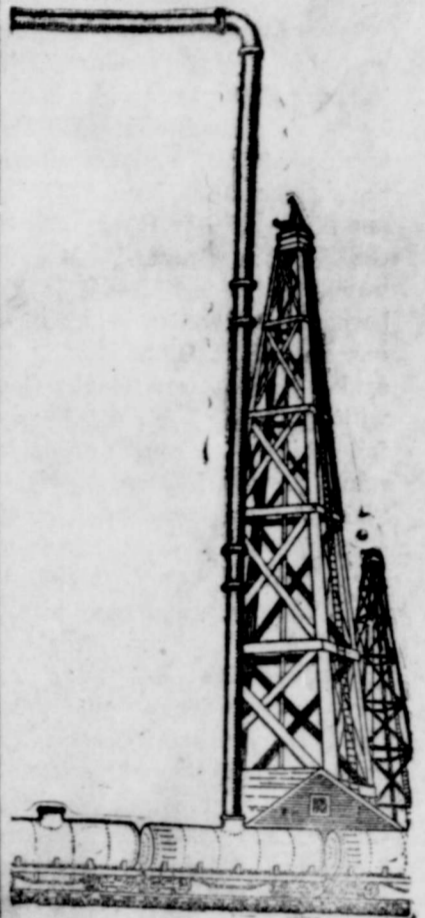
CHURCH ANNOUNCEMENT

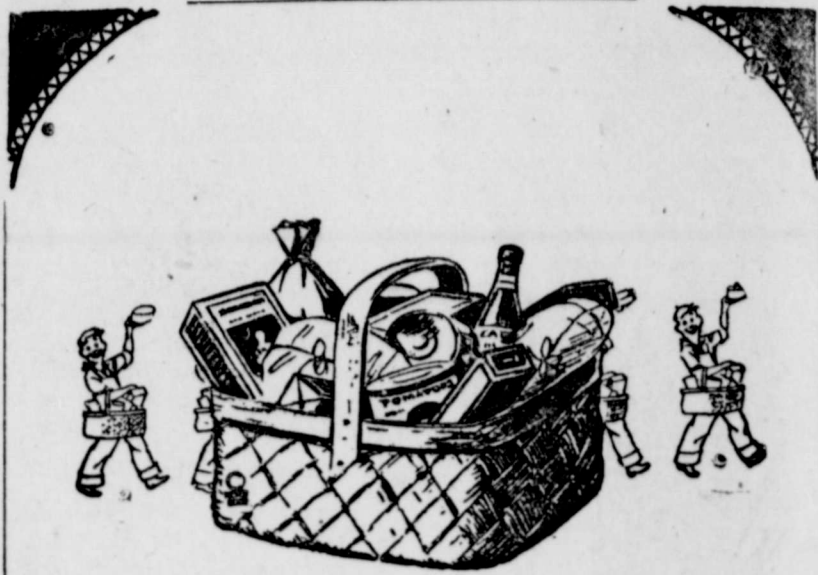

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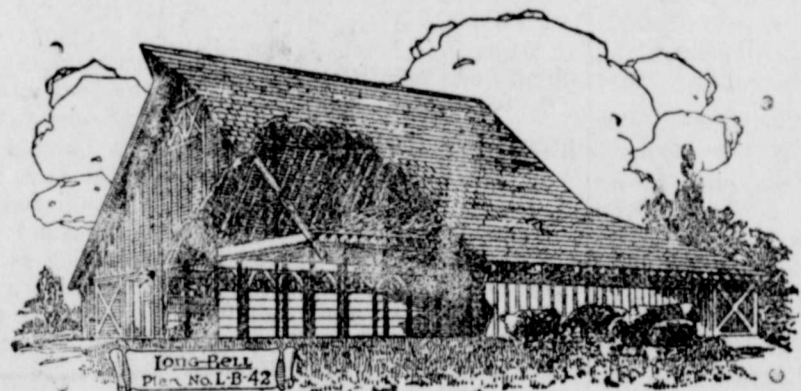

CHURCH ADVERTISING

(Methodist Reporter)

A new day has dawned upon the Church and blessed are that pastor and congregation that can adjust themselves to the modern programme. In the days of the early apostles the doors of places of worship were always open and worshippers frequented those holy places every day during the week. But unfortunately, we of the twentieth century have considered the Church as a place to go to on Sunday only and during the six days of the week, the doors of God's house have been closed and His business has been neglected. But the Church is saving the world, she is profiting from the experiences of other institutions. We are coming to see more and

more that Christianity is an every day life calling. The pastor's preparation and delivery of two sermons a week, and the layman's semi-weekly visit to the church will never save humanity.

While the dry goods business, the grocery business, and the lumber business have been advertised through every medium conceivable, the Gospel and religion have remained unmentioned. But not so now. Newspapers, church publications, bulletin boards are being used to call the attention of men and women everywhere to church. One church in San Francisco is spending \$10,000 a year for advertising. There is in America, an organization known as "The Church Department of the Associated Advertising Club." It is composed of writers who have felt that they might make

some substantial contribution to the progress of the Church through their art. Why should the Church advertise? Did her great founder not say, "Let your light shine" and "A city that is set upon a hill cannot be hid"?

There is an unquestionable value in Church advertising, provided we have something worth advertising, but advertising alone cannot make a bad church a good one.

EVANGELISM

(Methodist Reporter)

The term Evangelism formerly had reference only to special revival occasions—"Protracted Meetings." But we have come to think of it in a much broader sense. "The church is of God and will be preserved to the end of time

for five things; first The promotion of God's worship; second, the due administration of His word and ordinances; third, the maintenance of Christian fellowship and discipline; fourth, the edification of believers; and fifth, the conversation of the world. That is evangelism. There has been, and is now, a great need of the "Old Fashioned Revival," but it is possible for a church to be distinctly evangelistic without holding a "protracted meeting." Evangelism should begin with the child while it is in the cradle and "Brings it up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" and see that it does not depart from its religious training "even when it is old." The Sunday school offers a unique field for this type of evangelism and out of the Sunday school, between 85 and 90 per

cent of our church membership is coming today.

THAT AERIAL OF YOURS

There are three characteristics that every efficient radio set must have. They are; selectivity, volume, and tone quality. A radio set without these qualities is not worth having. Selectivity is the ability to cut through all other stations and get the station you want without having to listen to other programs while you do so.

Selectivity is almost entirely controlled by the aerial which is fastened to your set. Make your aerial too long and your radio set, regardless of how good it is, and regardless of who made it, will be ruined, because you will hear all kinds of programs while you are trying to listen to one. Make your aerial too short and you will lose the volume your set is capable of, and at the same time you will ruin the tone qualities of your set, because you will not be able to hear all of the music from the station as a result of tuning too sharply. The same is true of a high aerial and a low aerial, with the exception that a long, low aerial is not worth fastening to any radio set.

There is then a happy medium for the construction of aerials. But how can we find this happy medium? By experiment? No, because the most of us have neither

the time, money, or knowledge with which to do so. The best way is to find what experts have said about aerials, and do likewise.

According to those who know, the best aerial for an ordinary five tube radio frequency set is one not over eighty feet long which is fastened to the tops of two poles which are not less than thirty feet high. Some exceptionally good five tube sets can retain their selectivity with an aerial about a hundred feet long, but they cost in the neighborhood of two hundred dollars and are therefore scarce. The three tube regenerative set will be selective on an aerial of one hundred feet, but selectivity is built into them. If you want the best aerial, build it as the experts build theirs. There are many more good points on a good aerial, but this article would be too long if they were discussed now. Look for another article describing the actual construction of a good aerial, in this paper next week.

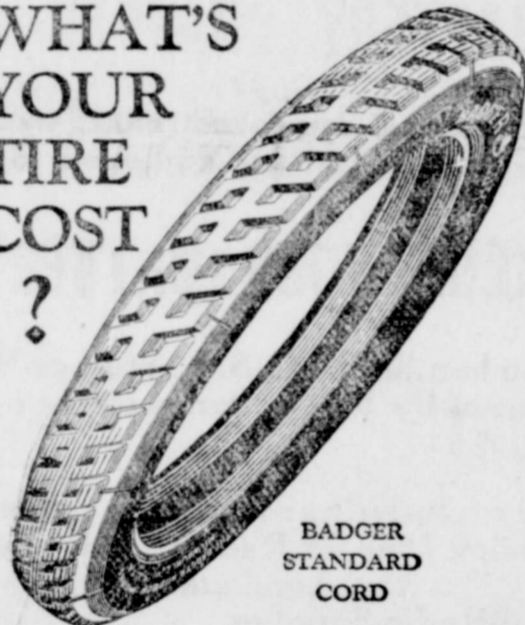
