## "Veteran Campaigners"





### Lowly American Hogker Helped Suppress Reds, He Declares



Consider the humble hog! The probability is that should any sane American be approached by a stranger and informed in so many words that the lowly American swine was responsible for the early demise of anarchy and bolshevism in Central Europe, he would do one of two things—call a policeman or take to flight.

Yet, it is not such a far-fetched analogy of the hog, at that. Frank W. Surface, economist, who has just published a volume dealing with the part played in the world war by the hog and its grower, does not hesitate to give credit where credit is due.

What are Dr. Surface's disclosures? "American Pork Production in the World War" is the historical volume by Dr. Surface, and it makes several disclosures hitherto unpublished.

Dr. Surface's revelations should interest farmers. He tells of the earnest pleas by the Allied governments just after this country entered the war to have the American farmers provide more fats for shipment to Europe. The United States Food Administration, then newly-organized, found this to be no easy task. The farmers were being a good price for their grain and were naturally not so favorable to hog raising because of possible financial loss. Finally, however, the Administration, through Herbert Hoover, promised them to keep the prices for pork products at a relative ratio of about so many bushels of corn to so many pounds of pork, and they were content. There ensued a production of pork that far exceeded expectations. The farmers, eager to do their share in the successful prosecution of the war, worked with good devotion to raise an adequate supply. It was readily purchased, although there may have been some anxiety due to unreasonable marketing, inadequate railroad facilities or lack of allied ships. Then came the Armistice and a trouble-free period was ushered in for the American farmer.

The allies arbitrarily cancelled their orders and began to turn to the Southern Hemisphere for their pork products where they believed they could buy cheaper, because of the long embargo which had been imposed on that section of the world. All representations by the Food Administration were futile, although they notified the British in no uncertain terms that they should continue their purchases, as they had promised, or assist in the disposal of the pork products now piling up in this country. The plea was in vain.

The problem at hand, then, was how to find a market for this produce and thus save American farmers from losing millions of dollars. The Food Administration representative in Europe after many overtures found it necessary to create its own market in the beginning by instructing its Grain Corporation and the American Commission for Relief in Belgium to purchase American pork to be available at some future date when it could be shipped into Germany or used for relief purposes. Herbert Hoover prevailed upon France and Italy to reinstate their orders for January and February shipments (1919) and by several other methods succeeded in establishing an inter-allied relief organization for operation in the newly-liberated European countries. He also managed, before the market could break, to have the German blockade relaxed and to sell to that country millions of pounds of the American pork of which the people were in dire need in return for German gold. Thus the situations were saved through the market created by Americans in Europe, through relief deliveries and other channels. The historian says that if it had not been for the relief measures undertaken by the inter-allied organization perfected by the American representative the people would have been gripped by famine and would have resorted to the extremes of anarchy or bolshevism in the ensuing panic. And in the rations distributed, the humble American hog occupied a prominent place.

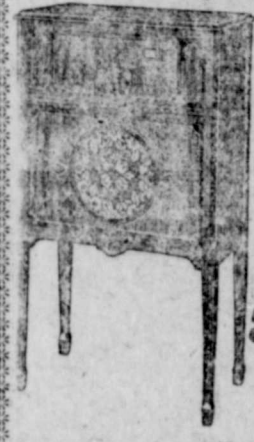

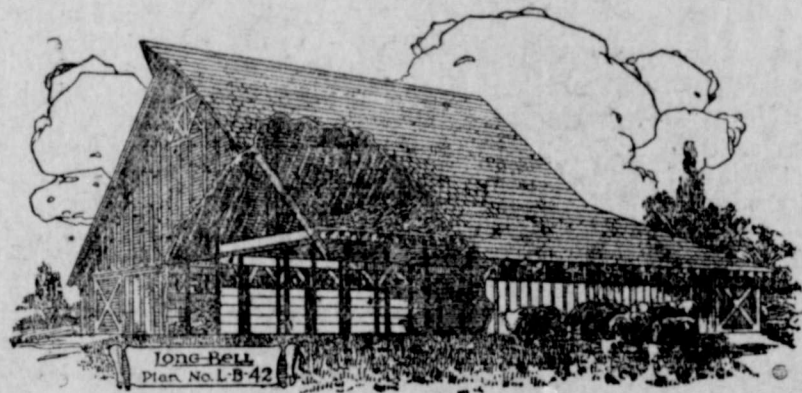

## Present Bobbed-Hair Fad Many Centuries Old

Bobbed hair has joined the list of things that are not new, as a result of research by a French doctor who has listed three previous epidemics of feminine bobbing since the French revolution. The first followed immediately after the overthrow of the king, when women cut their locks in memory of Marie Antoinette, and others, who were shorn before being led to the guillotine. The fad revived in 1836, when the princess of Orleans exhibited her painting of Joan of Arc, showing the famous saint, as she is always pictured, with a bob. It was known as the Joan of Arc style. Short hair, resurrected again in 1871 was then called the Ninon style, in honor of the famous seventeenth century beauty.

## Monkeys Captured with Rum

An easy way to capture monkeys has been discovered by African bushmen. They place a bottle of

native liquor under a tree where the monkeys play. The animals, attracted by the odor, drink and become intoxicated, then fall asleep. They awake in cages. Twenty-nine taken in this way were recently brought to this country by George M. Bistany of the Bronx zoo. He declared that they dance, play and sometimes fight when under the influence of the drink.

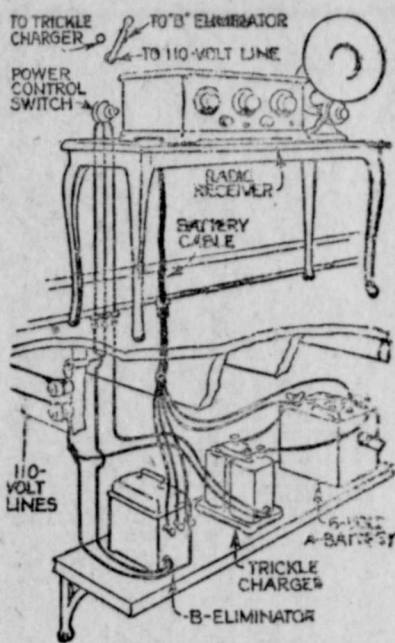
## Color of Diamonds Altered by Exposure to Radium

Yellow diamonds, comparatively cheap and plentiful, can be changed into valuable blue-white stones through exposure to radium, a New York investigator has discovered, according to reports. His tests have been conducted for four years and in that time, none of the altered gems has reverted to its original hue, but there is no way of telling definitely whether the change will be permanent. About \$8,000 worth of the substance was required to change one diamond in four days. The scientist admits that the process is yet too costly to be commercially practical and is somewhat dangerous to the workers.

## Simple Power-Control Switch

A simple power control for trickle chargers and B-eliminators may be obtained by means of a switch mounted on the wall, or at some other convenient place near the set. Power-control devices are now on the market, but for those who prefer to make their own, this simple switching device will give good service. The equipment consists of a three-point switch, of either the snap or push-button type, and the illustration shows the connections clearly. The switch lever and contact points merely illustrate the action of this snap switch and are not a part of the hookup. If the house has a cellar, it is always desirable

to place the batteries, charger and eliminator there. When tapping the 110-volt line, one side is connected directly to the trickle charger, and to the B-eliminator; the other side of the line goes to the post on the bridged contacts of the control switch. The remaining two posts on the switch are connected, one to the other input wire on the trickle charger, and the second to the wire on the B-eliminator. With a snap-switch the eliminator and charger will alternate on or off with each snap of the switch. If the flush push-button type of switch is used, pressing one button will shut off the charger and connect the eliminator, in which position the set can be operated. Pressing the other button will shut off the elimi-



nator and connect the charger. It will be seen that the filaments of the tubes must be operated independently by the filament switch on the set, or by turning the rheostats to the off position, if the set is not equipped with a switch.
