Thousands of dollars spent by the Fair Association for improvements will be loaned to the school children of Mills County in order that their meet might compare favorably with those of other counties.

EVANGELISM IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

(Methodist Reporter)
The heart of Sunday school teaching effort is the establishment of personal faith in the soul of the scholar, whether child or adult. This is the aim of the whole endeavor. Short of it the work is incomplete and without avail. Religious education has no worthwhile meaning until the soul is reached and brought into conscious and saving relationship to Christ. Our Sunday school leaders recognize this and zealously strive to bring all powers to bear upon having every member of the schools make definite commitment of himself to Christ as Saviour.

The Sunday School Board has adopted a plan of evangelism which is this:

That three months of the year, or three periods in consecutive order, be devoted as follows to evangelism in the Sunday school: That the first month or period be

given to the preparation of the forces, the training of teachers and other Sunday school workers in mind and spirit for the work of evangelists; that the second month or period be given to active evangelism in the Sunday school, in the classes, and by personal effort, this period culminating with Confession or Decision Day; and that the third month or period be given to special preparation of pupils for reception into Church membership.

The Board suggests that the program begin with January as the month of the preparation of the forces, that February be devoted to the active evangelistic campaign leading up to Decision or Confession Day, and that the remainder of the time before Easter be used for careful preparation of those who are to be received into Church membership on Easter Sunday.

After the public confession there follows more instruction. A child is kept under the care of a devout Christian. How different this is from the all too frequent practice of calling the child to the altar, propounding the disciplinary questions and giving no

further attention to him. Many wise pastors are now conducting classes in which for weeks they teach children the meaning of salvation, of Church membership, and the way of the Christian life.

Evangelism in the Sunday school applies to unsaved adults as well as to children who are to be brought into the Church. During the three months of this effort careful planning should provide for personal interviews with every adult non-Church member, and for that matter with every approachable adult not living a Christian life, appropriate work with the children going on also.
