BOYS' CLUB CALVES AT THE FAIR

Twenty four Jersey heifers were shown at the State fair by members of the boys clubs, and one of them sold while on exhibition for \$220. The expenses of exhibiting these calves were paid by the American Jersey Cattle Club, which also pays some cash prizes to club exhibitors.

Hill county was represented by six animals, Erath by nine, Johnson two, Tarrant six, and Denton one. This is one of the favorite club members select high class Club, and his services in helping projects of D. T. Simons, secretary of the Texas Jersey Cattle animals are freely given.

Pioneer in Testing

A two year old Jersey cow belonging to an Erath county club boy, G. V. Bradley, produced 11,351 pounds of milk and 557.94 pounds of butter fat in 303 days, thereby breaking the state record in the 305 days division. She qualified for the register merit in the A A A class, having dropped a living calf within fourteen months from previous calving. She likewise qualified for a silver medal awarded by the American Jersey Cattle Club.

"This young breeder," says Mark Buckingham, County Agent "selected his foundation herd" on his own judgment. He has been offered \$100 for bull calf dropped last February and has refused \$375 for the cow. This boy is a pioneer in testing in the Shiloh Community, and his work has awakened more interest in good dairy cattle than any one thing in the past few years, unless it be the last year's cotton experience.

Last Tuesday night at about eleven o'clock Mrs. H. G. Bodkin passed away at her home in the southern part of town.

Mrs. Bodkin had been bothered with her tonsils for several weeks and had made arrangements to have them removed as soon as they were in shape. However, the latter part of last week she was in town attending to her duties as secretary of the Retail Merchants Association. Monday, however, her condition became serious on account of septic poison from the diseased tonsils and Tuesday three physicians from a sanitarium at Temple were called. These men, who were specialists in blood conditions, after an examination of Mrs. Bodkin, offered no hope of her recovery.

The funeral was Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The services were at the residence and interment was in the Odd Fellows cemetery here. Hundreds of sorrowing relatives and friends were in attendance at the last sad rites. The services were conducted by Rev. E. P. Neal, pastor of the Methodist church. Rev. Neal had been closely associated with Mrs. Bodkin several years in religious work connected with the Wesley Workers, of which Mrs. Bodkin was president, and he could speak authoritatively of her practical religion. Mountains of beautiful flowers attested the love of her relatives and friends for "everybody's friend."

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REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE T. J. RENFRO ON BRIBERY CHARGES

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House:

It is useless to speak further of the seriousness of the charge against our two colleagues. Indeed, it is a regrettable situation. It is all the more embarrassing to me and others who have been friends of the accused during our entire Legislative career. However, as hard as it is to vote to expel these two men from membership in the House, it is unthinkable to bring our State in disrepute and disgrace by allowing them to remain members of the House.

That bribery was regarded by the makers of our constitution as a very serious offense is shown by Section 41, Article 16, which provides that any member of the Legislature, who shall receive any money from any one for his vote or official influence, shall be guilty of bribery and shall incur the disabilities provided for such offenses with forfeiture of the offices they hold.

The testimony against these two members is so clear and convincing that there can hardly be a reasonable doubt as to their guilt, but the evidence has been thoroughly discussed, so there is no need of mentioning it again.

Gentlemen, in all the lists of crimes, there are few, if any, that stand higher than bribery in an office of trust. The foundation of our Democratic Government is firmly fixed on the principle of honesty in government. In a large measure, the success of our government to the present time is due largely to the great characters who have filled our positions of trust. Public offices demand the highest type of honesty. When the Government of our State becomes corrupted, our civilization will then receive a death blow. It is repugnant to every sense of decency that a Representative vote for, or against, any measure because of friendship or influence of any kind, except that he has adequate reason to believe that such action is better for the State as a whole. When a man promises to support or reject a certain bill for pay, it is not only repugnant to decency, but it is a disgrace to himself, to the Legislature and to the State. Both the Federal and State constitutions provide the death penalty for treason. Bribery is a form of treason—it is treason against a man's constituents, in that he violates the confidence reposed in him when he is elected to that office.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House, you and I love our State. We stand before the shrine of Stephen Austin, Sam Houston and James Stephen Hogg and dedicate ourselves to the betterment of our State. We look with admiration and pride at our magnificent State Capitol of rough granite, characteristic of those immortal characters who made Texas great. Now, shall we turn that Capitol Building over to bribe takers and with it resulting corruption; or shall we once, and for all, cleanse our government of greed and evil gain?

Duty demands that we cast our vote today for honesty in Government. It is an inescapable duty, we owe ourselves, our people, our State and our God. Let us say in undertones, that will ring out all over the nation, that we are now and forever will be dedicated to honesty and responsibility in government, and that we believe a public office is a public trust and he who violates the honor of his office should be regarded as unfit to appear among honorable men. From this day, let no briber and no bribe taker besmirch the fair name of Texas.
