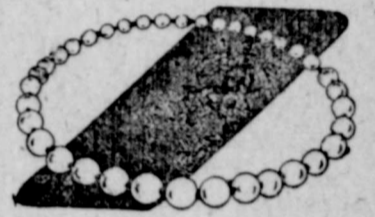
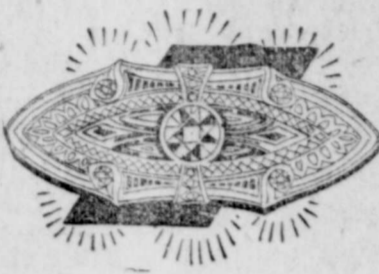

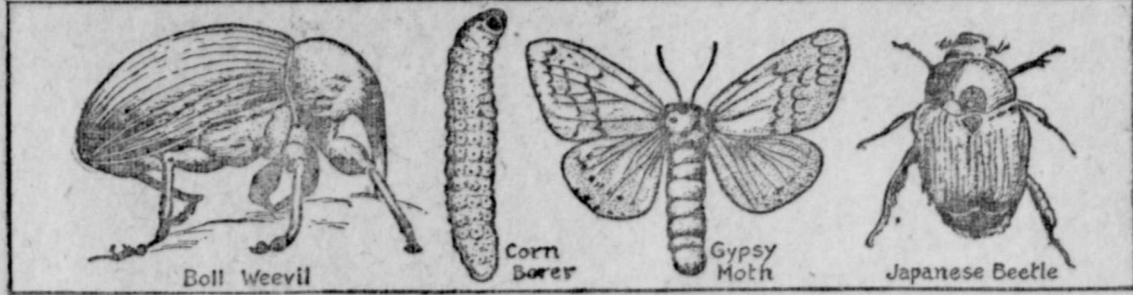

CHICAGO—Has man's greatest fight for existence since he appeared in this world now begun with the "Battle of the Bug," and is he capable of winning? So ask the scientists of today as they survey the agricultural field and report an annual loss of two billions of dollars directly traceable to the pests that bite and suck the life from our food crops and tax every meal set before the consumer.

Just now, the European corn borer looms as the most feared imported pest that has ever immigrated to our fields. Engineers, chemists, entomologists and manufacturers have all joined hands to whip the pest that threatens to cut the value of Corn

Belt farm lands in half and upset the agricultural system of this nation. The use of the silo, with an ensilage cutter that chops the corn finely; the husker-shredder, the stubble shredder, the disc and plow, the dump and side delivery rakes, are all recommended by the agricultural college experts as means to killing the corn borer each season and preventing his spread over more territory.

The cotton boll weevil has caused more talk, misery, investigation, migration of people, white and colored, and change in cotton growing areas over the world than any other pest that has been known in the history of the world's agriculture, says the

Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers. Only where old methods are abandoned and modern farm equipment is introduced to speed up farming to beat the boll weevil, has it been whipped. Texas and Oklahoma have become so successful that they can produce at about a quarter of the average cost of the older sections and make money regardless of the price of cotton.

Gypsy moth and Japanese beetle are two other pests that are kept down by efficient use of spraying and dusting machines developed by manufacturers to meet the demands of chemists and entomologists for the pests being fought.

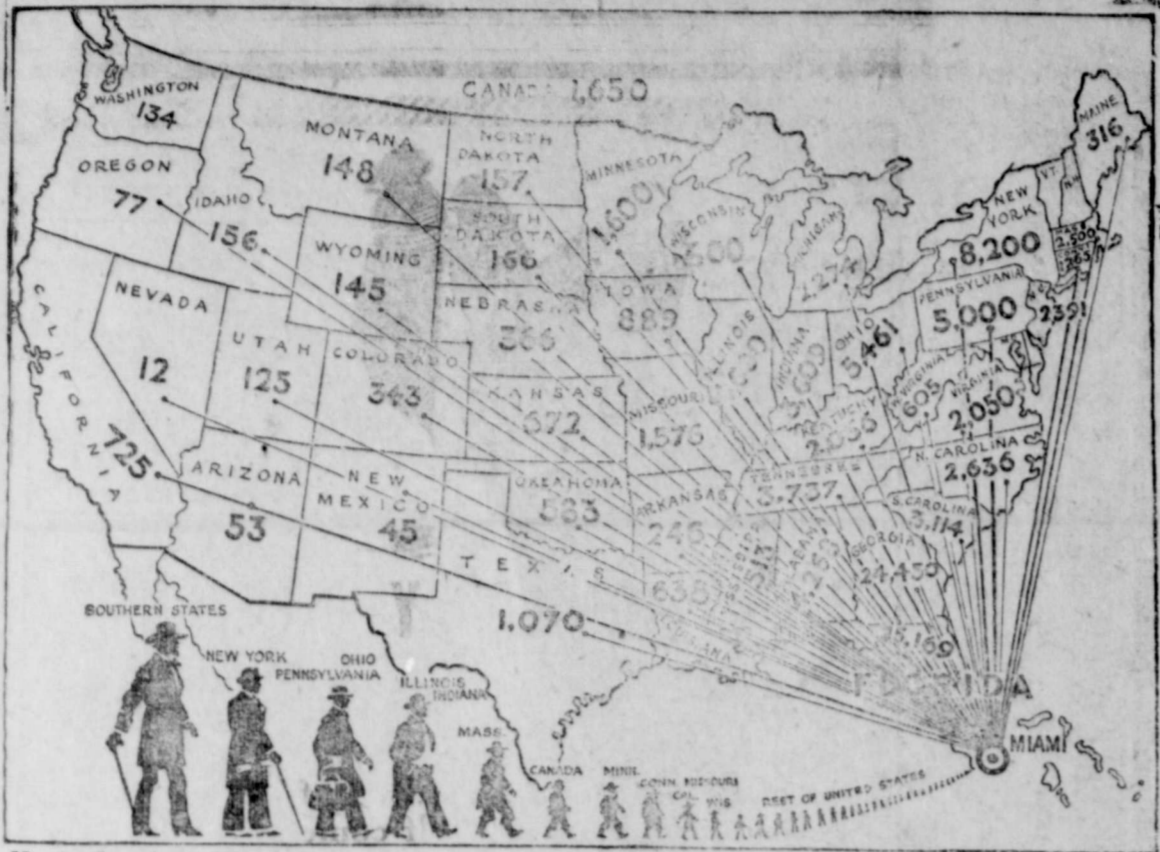

MIAMI MOST COSMOPOLITAN CITY OF ENGLISH SPEAKING PEOPLE



Newly Completed Miami Census Reveals That Population of This Florida City Was Drawn from Every State in the Union, and from Canada.

CLAIMING to be the most cosmopolitan city of English-speaking people, Miami offers in proof the fact that native Floridians compose but one-fifth of the city's population. Every state in the country and 1,650 English from Canada and the home country are represented in the census just completed. This census shows a "normal" population of more than 181,000, not including transient winter visitors, an increase of more than 100,000 since 1920.

New York's quota of Miami residents heads the list with a total of 8,200. Outside of Southern states, Ohio is next with 5,461. Natives of Illinois to the number of 4,600 have settled in Miami. From California have come 725, Wisconsin sent 2,636, and former Nebraska residents number 366. New England is represented by 2,500 people from Massachusetts, 1,285 from Connecticut, and smaller numbers from other states. A questionnaire recently sent to thousands of workers brought forth replies showing that practically one

hundred per cent preferred employment in their new home because they "made just as much money and get more out of living."

With the augmented force of smaller capitalists and skilled workers Miami is building up an industrial community that gives economic foundations to what once had only blue sky and sunshine as its main attractions. More and more people who go to Florida only to enjoy themselves remain to re-establish there the businesses in which they had been engaged at home.

WHAT THE WORLD OWES MOSES

A few weeks ago the Philathea class at the Methodist church Mrs. C. A. Eacott gave the following:

This is so beautifully gotten together that others will enjoy reading it.

The subject of our lesson is: "What the World Owes Moses."

To appreciate a person we must know his works. All people can't do big things like Moses, but God sees our works and appreciates the small as well as the great.

Moses was the deliverer of Israel from Egyptian bondage, recipient of the law, and the author of Pentateuch.

The leading events of the life of Moses, as set forth in Exodus - Deuteronomy are the following: He was born in Goshen at the time when the Egyptian king was oppressing the Hebrews, forcing them to hard labor in the building of the cities Pithom and Ramesses and ordering their two midwives to slay all male infants, and when they disobeyed, commanding the Egyptians to kill the children.

His father was Amram, a grandson of Levi, and his mother was Amram's aunt, Levi's daughter, Jochebed. The date of his birth is about 1576 B. C. To save her child from the massacre, Jochebed put the infant in an ark of bulrushes and set it out on the river. Rescued by the daughter of Pharaoh, Moses was brought up as her own child. When he was grown up he murdered an Egyptian who had killed one of the Hebrews and fled to Midian, where he married Jipporah, the daughter of a priest, Jethro, (or Renel) whose flocks he tended until he was 80 years of age. Then the God of his fathers appeared to him in a bush that was burning without being consumed, commanded him to go to Egypt to deliver his people.

In Egypt Moses demanded of Pharaoh that he let his people go into the wilderness to celebrate a festival to Jehovah. But in spite of the miracles he wrought Pharaoh's heart was hardened and he would not accede to the request. Moses, therefore, performed with his rod or his outstretched arms a series of miracles, including the change of the water in the river into blood, plagues of frogs, lice, flies, boils, hail, locusts and darkness and culminating in the slaying of the first born of man and beast. None of these blows affected the Hebrews in Goshen. Pharaoh at last yielded, and Moses led the people, consisting of 600,000 armed men, besides the women and children, and a mixed multitude joining them by Succoth, Ethans and Pihabiroth, to the Red Sea. Persued by the Egyptian army, the Hebrews seemed to be caught in a cul de sac, but Moses stretched out his arm over the sea and Jehovah made the sea dry land, the waters standing up as a wall on the right and on the left, while the people crossed over. The Egyptians were drowned by the returning waters. Having thus delivered his people, he led them by Shur, Marah and Elim to the wilderness of Sin, providing them miraculously with quail and manna to eat and water from the rock which he struck with his rod.

As Moses and the people approached Sinai they met Jethro who had with him Moses' wife and sons. Jethro rejoiced with Moses over the deliverance that had been wrought and offered sacrifices to God.

From the top of Mount Sinai Jehovah spoke to Israel amidst lightning, thunder and smoke. As the people could not endure this, Moses went up into the mount and was alone with Jehovah 40 days and forty nights, receiving the Ten Commandments, as well as many other laws, ad directions as to the construction of the tabernacle. Meanwhile Aaron made worshipped. When Moses descended from the mountain and saw this his indignation was such that he broke the tablets of stone but he afterwards interceded for the people, who were spared after 3,000 had been slain by the Levites. Moses then went up again into the mountain, where he spent 40 days and 40 nights with Jehovah, neither eating bread nor drinking water during the time. As he descended with new tables on which he had written the Ten Commandments his skin emitted rays, so that he must henceforth put on a veil when he spoke to Israel. The tabernacle was constructed by Bezaiel, a sacrificial code was given, Aaron and his sons were installed in the priesthood, dietary laws and a holiness code were promulgated, a census of the holy

people was taken, and Moses led the people from Mount Sinai toward the promised land. On the way Eldad and Medad prophesied and Moses refused to censure them for it. Miriam and Aaron opposed Moses because of the Ethiopian woman whom he had married. Miriam was therefore stricken with leprosy, but recovered when Moses interceded on her behalf.

Israel then settled at Kadesh Barnea. From there Moses sent forth spies, whose reports discouraged the people. A rebellion started by Levite Korah, and the Dathan. Abriam, was severely punished; the earth opened itself and swallowed up these men, with their families and their supporters. 250 men were consumed by a fire that went out from Jehovah, and on the following day 14,700 were stricken by a plague because they murmured. When the people requested Moses to give them water he did indeed strike the rock and produce water but acted so proudly and failed so completely to glorify Jehovah in the matter that he was severely rebuked for it. Miriam died and was buried at Kadesh and Aaron died at Mount Hor. Since Edom refused to let the people pass through its land, it was necessary to go around by the Sea of Sedges in order to invade the land of Moab, then largely in the hands of Sihon, King of Heshbon. On the way the people suffered from bites of serpents, until Moses set up a brazen serpent, which brought healing to those who looked up to it. The Arnon was crossed, and Heshbon fell into the hands of Israel, as well somewhat later

the Kingdom in Bashan. Nothing could check the progress of Moses and his people. Balaam, who was called by Balak to curse who was obliged to bless Israel, and Midianites who seduced Israel to worship Basal Poor were utterly routed. In the land of Moab Moses gave his farewell address, proclaimed some additional laws, saw the promised land of Canaan from the top of Pisgah, was buried in the valley at the foot of Mount Nebo by Jehovah himself, so that no man knew his grave and was mourned by Israel 30 days. He was 120 years of age and his death occurred 1456 B. C.

The death of a man like Moses stirs the world, and how he died was not a hundredth part as important as how he lived. Living grace is ours at this moment, dying grace cannot be used until dying comes. Our part is to make the most of the grace which is at hand and which is given to make life worth while.

I think the true aim of the lesson is to see clearly how true religion blesses the world.

For most of us the task would have been too great amid the disappointments and disloyalty of the people, but he never lost heart. He was at home in the wisdom of the world but he had paid the price for knowing that man's dependence is upon God. In Moses relationship to Jehovah there is no finer or more descriptive phrase than that he talked with God "face to face." It was the secret of his whole life, and it was the strength of his leadership. It was this fellowship with God that broke down the prison doors of

a great empire, controlled the tides of the sea, and conquered the tides of passion and discontent which he encountered in his own people. Through his own devotion he taught Israel to commune with God, he brought them to know of fellowship with God and to depend upon his wisdom for guidance. No finer expression of confidence in God ever formed upon the lips of man than the part of this lesson where Moses tells Israel that their life, and their future are bound up in God.

The Task Ended

After the farewell address and after the anthem, Moses delivers the benediction. It contained a blessing for each tribe individually, and then, like a song, closed with a note of joyous congratulation for the whole nation, "Happy art thou, O Israel."

Moses ended his earthly labors. It would be hard to estimate the value of his contribution to the world's civilization. His life's work began after 80 years of preparation. The forty years following were filled with unselfish service. It was not an easy task. It was not easy to arouse his fellow countrymen in Egypt to appreciate their promised inheritance. They had been so long in slavery that freedom seemed neither possible nor desirable. It was not easy to break the fetters that held them in Egyptian bondage, for a proud and selfish king had to be forced to yield. It was not easy to lead an unorganized multitude through the wilderness

and transform them into an orderly nation. He enacted laws that have been the marvel and model of modern civilization. He gave a form of government that still furnishes guiding principles to the nations of the earth. He set up religious institutions that have left their impress upon the churches of today. He molded a nation through whom the whole world has been blessed. Truly then, we might say that of all the men of

ancient times, the world owes to Moses its greatest debt.

Of him Cecil Frances Alexander wrote:

"This was the truest warrior
That ever buckled a sword
This the most gifted poet
That ever breathed a word
And never earth's philosopher
Traced with his golden pen
On the deathless page truths half
so sage
As he wrote down to men.

Not long since, I read in The Eagle an account of Prof. Newton's chapel lecture on consideration one should have for others. His points give me a good starting place. The esteemed and popular writer began to get impatient and as the skipper came leisurely by as though unconcerned, he addressed him saying, "Say, can't we get out of here some way? We wired our people from Dover and they are waiting for us at the wharf now."

The officer replied by saying, "It's quite nice for you to wire your friends, but we are on a ten thousand ton liner. We could go right on up the channel and crumple up those little vessels as though they were made of paper, but you see we must always think of the other ships." The noted passenger comments on the worthy rebuke and really enjoyed it because it was in keeping with his own views of human ethics. In over anxiety he is not likely to forget "the other ships." His wealth of care and thought for others is no doubt why he became very popular in his home city and also in Australia. I remember to have heard some suggestive advice from a good man, a man in this state known to be of high standing and wide influence. A friend sought his advice and among other things, he said, "Keep your mind more on others. Others are more important than we are, you know." To think of others as important, is the point to work at. We carry about with a false criteria about ourselves and of course it hinders proper

and best consideration for others. It doesn't mean that others may be more important to our own life, duty or personal interest, but it does mean that others are more important to our own happiness. We are absolutely dependent on others to create a happy atmosphere for us to breathe.

So I am back where I first started saying that true philosophy of life is in bestowing kindness, care and service. There is a reason why some of us have so little joy and heart happiness, for it says, "What measure ye mete (to others) it shall be measured to you again.—SAM SAYS."

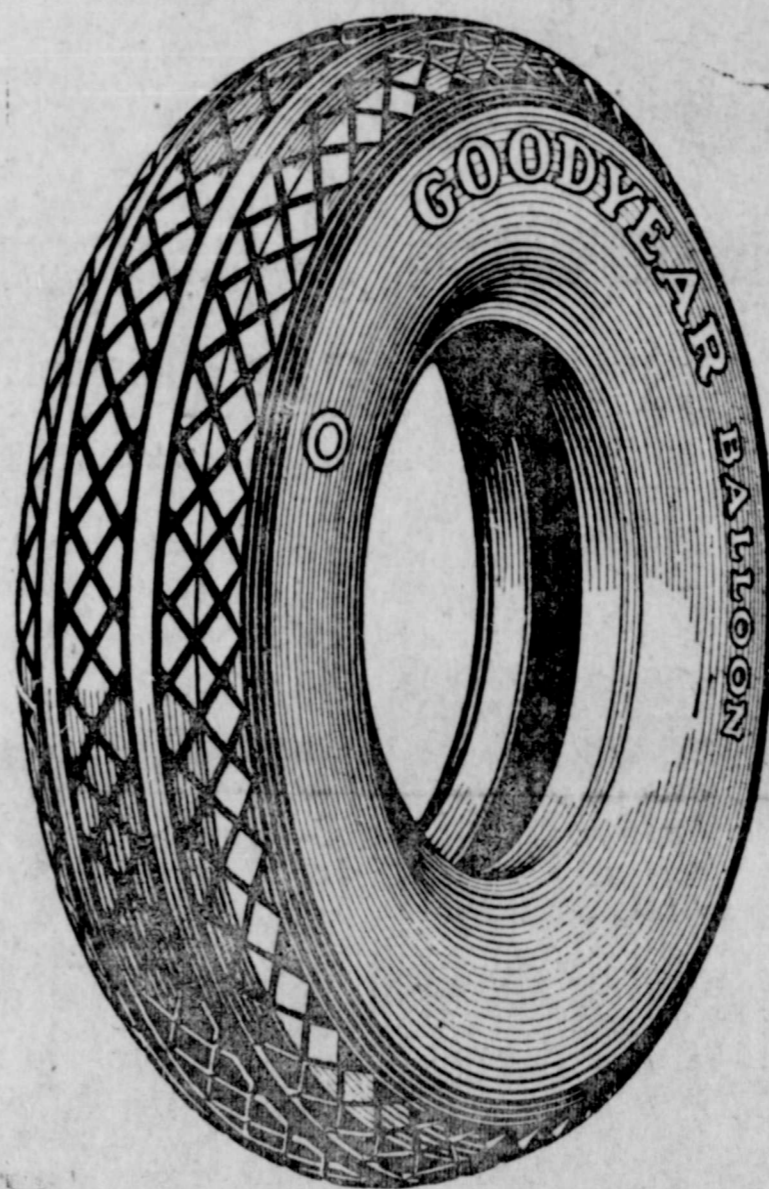
