Gypsy moth and Japanese beefle are two other pests that are kept down by efficient use of spraying and dusting machines developed by manufacturers to meet the demands of chemists and entomologists for the pests being fought.

on the curb. When the pedestrian is given the signal to go he should be permitted to go without having to hurry by the approach of vehicles coming around







bush that was burning without being consumed, commanded him to go to Egypt to deliver his people. In Egypt Moses demanded of

Pharoah that he let his people go into the wilderness to celebrate a festival to Jehovah. But in spite of the miracles he wrought Phoreah's heart was hardened and he would not accede to the request. Moses, therefore, performed with his rod or his out stretched arms a series of miracles, including the hange of the water in the river into blood, plagues of frogs, lice, flies, boils, hail, locusts and darkness and culminating in the slaying of the first born of man and beast. None of these blows affeeted the Hebrews in Goshen. Pharoah at last yielded, and Moses led the people, consisting of 600,000 armed men, besides the women and children, and a mixed multitude joining them by succoth, Ethans and Pihahiroth, to the Red Sea. Persued by the Egy-ptian army, the Hebrews seemed to be caught in a cul de sac, but Moses stretched out his arm over; the sea and Jehovah made the sea dry land, the waters standing up as a wall on the right and on the left, while the people crossed over. The Egyptians were drowned by the returning waters. Having thus delivered his people, he "led them by Shur, Marah and Elim to the wilderness of Sin, providing them miraculously with quail and manna to eat and water from the rock which he struck with his rod. As Moses and the people approached Sinia they met Jethro who had with him Moses' wife and sons. Jethro rejoiced with Moses over the deliverance that had been wrought and offered sacrifices to God. From the top of Mount Sinia Jehovah spoke to Israel amidst lightning, thunder and smoke. As the people could not endure this, Moses went up into the mount and was alone with Jehovah 40 days and forty nights, receiving the Ten Commandments, as well us many other laws, ad directions as to the construction of the tab ernacle. 



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
