1. THE CONFESSION OF CHRIST is fundamental. Men are lost without the right idea of his character and mission. Mark how Jesus, when they were alone in the mountainous region of Caesarea Philippi, drew out of the disciples the popular opinion of himself as leading to the great confession which Peter made.
