

At first the various teachers did not appear to favor disqualifying the contestant, but by read ing rules and wrongly applying them, the Director finally brought the teachers to his point of view and the contestantw as illegally disqualified to enter and was asked to withdraw from the contest before the gaze of the entire assembly. This greatly mortified her and thoroughly disgusted her with such contests.

The writer was a witness of the proceedings and protested that the rules did not apply in her case as she was a high school student under separate department from the grammar school in a separate building.

If the committee of teachers had been familiar with the rules in the case under consideration, the result no doubt would have been different. Under Article 8 of rules for Interscholastic Events we read: "School principals and superintendents are charged with the responsibility of seeing that the rules are strictly observed by

We are appending the rule governing declamation for th purpose of proving our point Note four year rule. The four year rule allows a student four years participation while a student in high school grades. If a student is disqualified in the eighth grade on account of age, how is he to have four years of track events? Age limit. Article 7, section 7. "The age limits as prescribed in this article and else where in this constitution shall be determined by the age of the pupil on the first day of the pre-ceeding September." From this statement the student was disqual ified without reading the provisions in Article 7. section 1 as follows: "Who may enter the different contests-The junior division is open only to boys and girls under 14 and over 10 years of age the first day of September preceeding. Furthermore the junior division in declamation is not open to any pupils who have been regularly promoted to the ninth grade, nor to any pupils in a high school or junior high school where there are one or more complete wardschools under seperate principal and under a seperate building from the high school.
