Dr. Osterhout, with the assistance of Mrs. Osterhout, who is a trained nurse, has performed quite a number of more or less serious operations in the few months here and they have been universally successful.

Thousands of dollars have been going away from Goldthwaite which can now be kept at home. As Doctor Osterhout has proven conclusively that he can deliver the goods, the Eagle believes he should receive the wholehearted support of Mills County citizens in a surgical way.

Approximately 150,000 pounds of first class wool is being shipped this week from Goldthwaite through G. H. Frizzell. This wool will fill four cars and will be sent direct to an eastern mill.

The average price of 34 cents per pound will net the Mills county growers something in the neighborhood of \$50,000.00.

More and more the people of Mills county are turning their attention to sheep, goat, and poultry raising, and as fast as they are doing it they are becoming independent, to a great extent, of crop conditions. 100 per cent profit each year on a bunch of sheep or goats seem to be the rule and there is something out of the ordinary wrong if a bunch of sheep or goats don't net its owner 100 per cent each year.

"Youth Movement" in Agriculture Gaining

CHICAGO—The farm has its "youth movement" in the 600,000 organized club boys and girls headed by S. Noble, secretary of the National Boys' and Girls' Clubs, stations, with Corn Clubs in the South, some fifteen years ago, the movement in rural life has swept into every state, says the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers. Pig clubs, garden clubs, poultry clubs, cotton clubs, calf clubs, sewing clubs and dozens of others have come. Now comes a plan for a "Farm Junk Club," aimed to fit into Smith-Hughes schools and give the farm boy training in agricultural engineering by tearing down obsolete farm implements on the farm, sorting out the bolts, nuts,

clevises, neckyokes, single and double trees, poles, etc., and starting a bank account with the remainder of the material sold for junk, at the same time learning how the machines are assembled.

A Southern club leader hit on the plan of having his club boys on annual vacations taught the gas engine and its starting and servicing. As the little farm gas engine is one of the most important servants in farm life today, furnishing the potential power of some 15,000,000 "hired hands" that will work night or day, Sundays or holidays, its more extended use on farms is a certain road to increased profit and less drudgery. Boys of the present day have been brought up with automobiles, and running a tractor is

second nature to them.

In the oval above is Miss Inez Hardie of Mississippi, champion farm girl in the Health Club, as she appeared at Chicago, where boy and girl champions from every state competed. Last year, Missouri and Iowa farm girls tied for honors. Involved in farm health is the drinking water supply, and clubs for the inspection of wells, springs, and other sources of drinking water are to be formed, so as to add 10 years to the life of the farm family by eliminating sickness from polluted water. Drilled wells with safe curbs are supplanting the old oaken bucket of poetry and poison. Automatic water systems and new safe pumps are also being installed on farms throughout the nation.

The Commissioners Court met as a board of equalization the first of this week and raised the renditions about \$37,582.00 which will increase the county's funds about \$2254.32 above what the people themselves thought their property was worth.

The fact that commissioners found it necessary to increase the valuation of certain properties indicate that town properties indicate that those properties were unreasonably low.

**H. J. R. No. 25**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article VIII by the insertion of Section 1-a therein, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the separation of the objects of taxation for State purposes and for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and Counties, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax or other form of tax for State purposes, only; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the classification of objects of taxation and providing that rates shall be equal on the same class of property, and fixing limitations upon taxation.

**Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**SECTION 1.** That Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein Section 1-a, as follows:

Section 1-a. The Legislature may separate the objects of taxation for State purposes from the objects of taxation for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and counties; and may provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax, or other form of tax, on certain classes of taxable property, or other objects, for State purposes only (including school purposes); or upon certain classes of property, or other objects, for county or local purposes only (including school purposes). In no event shall the rate of such taxes exceed the sum of the limits of such taxes fixed by this Constitution for State, county and other local purposes. The Legislature may pro-

vide for the classification of objects of taxation. Taxation shall be equal and uniform.

**SEC 2.** The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

"Against the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

**SEC. 3.** The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

**ATTENTION RURAL PATRONS**

The post office department is, at this time, very ardently stressing the thought of improving the unsightly appearance of rural mail boxes throughout the country. To this end it is urging, where there are three or more boxes at the same point, the erecting of a shelf about four feet above the ground and fastening all boxes at such point securely on this common support. This can be easily done by the use of two posts with a piece of 2 inch lumber extending across the tops. The whole support can be painted more cheaply and will greatly improve the appearance of the rural receptacles and their arrangements.

Such a support, when properly erected, will retain its fixed position longer than either a single post or the traditional old buggy wheel; besides twelve to twenty boxes can be supported in this manner on three or four posts and will be uniform in height and will be more easily kept in position than if on single posts.

I have recently inspected the routes emanating from this post office and do you know what they reminded me of? They appeared as long and short men standing along the roadside laboring under different degrees of intoxication. And when we drove up to the traditional buggy wheel, it reminded me of a bunch of jolly pals, none of whom had drawn a sober breath for a week. They seemed to be saluting from every angle of a fixed horizontal plane for which none of them seemed to have any respect and when one attempted to revolve the wheel they bowed and tottered like drunk men who, without either music or rhythm, were trying to do the "old Virginia reel" in honor of your presence.

Now we are strict prohibitionists through this section and let's make our mail boxes testify to our orderly sentiment by straightening them up, having a uniform height, on upright, substantial posts with names in bold, black letters on each side of the box. Listen, regular carriers will be going on their vacations to be gone two weeks. Tell me how a substitute carrier is going to deliver your mail when he finds no box by the roadside with your name on it?

Many of you will tell me that your name is on the box, but look again. There may be traces enough that you can make it out because you know what's supposed to be there, but how can a stranger guess what those marks stand for when he never knew what was originally there. In many instances he would have to be more than a mind reader to tell.

I have had excellent co-operation with the road authorities, all of whom I wish to thank; I have had excellent co-operation with the patrons in all things pertaining to the service and I wish to thank them too. Now let's cooperate to put over this improvement and when it's done we will feel proud of each other. I have as good patrons as it is possible for any postmaster to have. Come in and talk with me about this work and let's put it over. I think I can help you, think we can help each other and know that we can improve the looks along the roadsides along our rural routes.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

S. J. R. No. 33.  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows:

Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of Legislature

are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, and no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

The salary or compensation of any member of the Legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after the adoption of this amendment.

SEC. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed there on:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers as to be provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

"Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority

of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

SEC. 4. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

Fruit Tonics For Spring

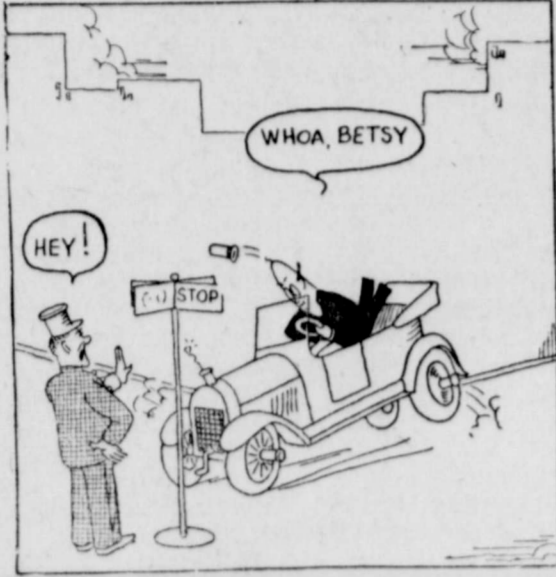

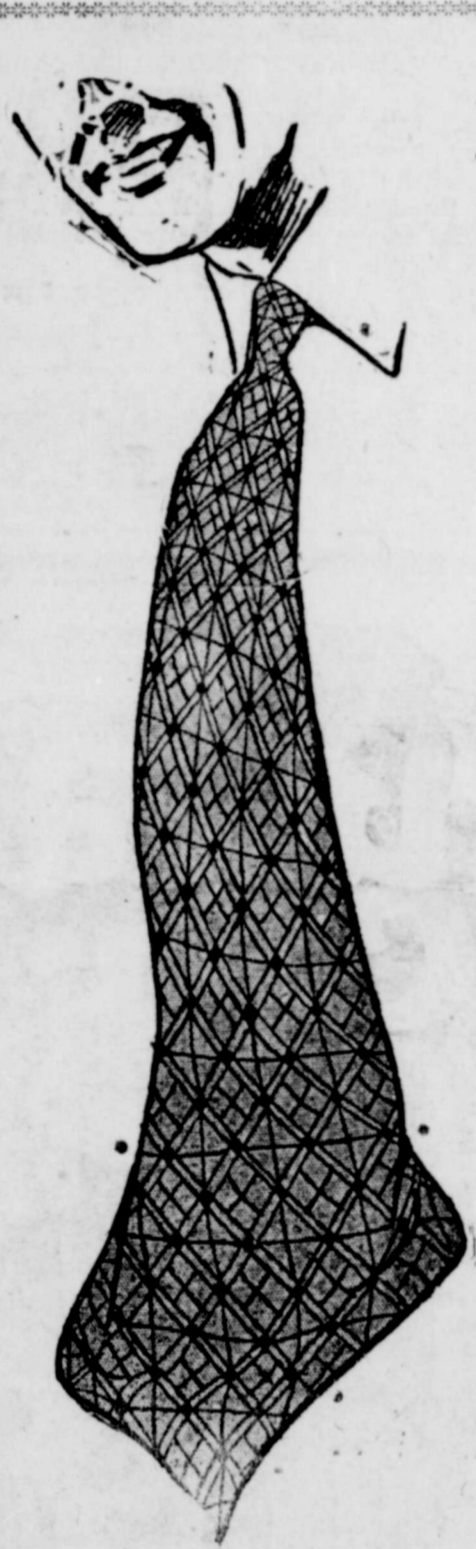

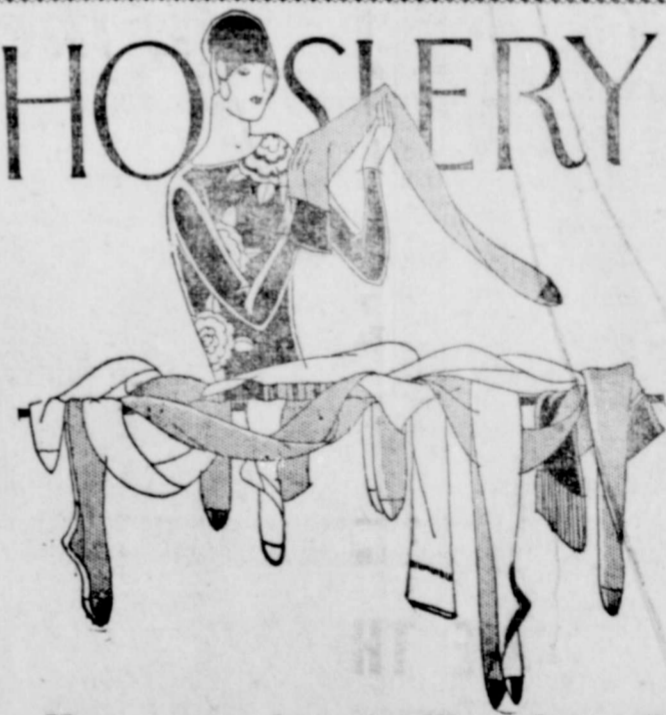

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

By Hight C. Moore

SUNDAY, MAY 29, 1927.

**PETER UNDAUNTED BY PERSECUTION**  
Acts 5: 17-42

**GOLDEN TEXT**—We must obey God rather than men. Acts 5:29.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**  
The activity and success of the Apostles in Jerusalem brought on the second persecution which, like the first, originated with the materialistic Sadducees. Under the direction of the high priest and his associates Peter and others were rudely attested and cast into prison. During the night, however, the prison doors were thrown open by the angel of the Lord who brought forth the Apostles and bade them continue their work in the Temple. When the Sanhedrin assembled the next morning and sent to the prison for Peter and his companions the officers found the doors shut and the keeps on duty but no prisoners within. Upon hearing this report the members of the Sanhedrin were amazed and the marvel grew when they learned that the disciples were at that moment teaching in the Temple. Without violence the Gallileans were brought before the Sanhedrin.

**Lesson Text and Outline**  
Acts 5: 27-35, 38-42

**I. THE CHARGE OF THE HIGH PRIEST.**

27 And when they had brought them, they set them before the council. And the high priest asked them, 28 saying, We strictly charge you not to teach in this name; and behold, ye have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us.

**II. THE DEFENCE OF PETER.**

29 But Peter and the Apostles answered and said, We must obey God rather than men. 30 The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew, hanging him on a tree. 31 Him did God exalt with his right hand to be a Prince and a Savior, to give repentance to Israel, and remission of sins. 32 And we are witnesses of these things; and so is the Holy Spirit, whom God hath given them who obey him.

33 But they, when they heard this, were cut to the heart, and were minded to slay them.

**III. THE SPEECH OF GAMALIEL.**

34 But there stood up one in the council, a Pharisee, named Gamaliel, a doctor of the law, had in honor of all the people, and commanded to put forth a little while. 35 And he said unto them, Ye men of Israel, take heed to yourselves as touching these men, what ye are about to do.

38 And now I say unto you, Refrain from these men, and let them alone; for if this council or this work be of men, it will be overthrown: 39 but if it be of God, ye will not be able to overthrow them; lest haply ye be found fighting against God.

**IV. THE SENTENCE OF THE SANHEDRIN.**

40 And to him they agreed: and when they had called the apostles unto them, they beat them and charged them not to speak in the name of Jesus and let them go.

**V. THE MINISTRY OF THE APOSTLES.**

41 They therefore departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the Name. 42 And every day, in the Temple and at home, they ceased not to preach Jesus as Christ.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

**1. THE CHALLENGE OF CHRISTIAN COURAGE** is involved in the charge of the high priest, Peter and the apostles with him were humble preachers of a new faith that was under fire. Many people, however, believed their message and held them in such high esteem that the officials dared not infuriate the guard by maltreating them. Yet they sought the opportunity and were able to put the Apostles in the public ward over night. Though release by the angel departed and complicated the arrangement yet the preachers were brought by the Temple captain and guard into the hall of the Sanhedrin. They were placed in the proper position before the imposing supreme court of the Hebrews normally composed of seventy-two elderly and influential men.

The high priest in his court robes and with a tinge of injudicial animation, if not anger, reminded the apostles of the court order that they were not to teach any more in the name of Jesus. He went on to assert that they had wilfully violated the order and had actually filled the capital city with their teaching. He went on to aver that the Apostles' success implied that the Sanhedrin was responsible for the death of Jesus. Thus the council shrank from the responsibility of "this man's blood" when at their instigation during his trial, the crowd shouted, "His blood be upon us and our children!"

**2. THE CONVICTIONS OF CHRISTIAN COURAGE** are suggested in the defence of Peter. With becoming deference, yet calmly and bravely, Peter for himself and associates, declared why they had disobeyed the order of the court. It was simply a question of obedience either to God or to man; and they had not hesitated in the dilemma to obey God. But he went on to say whom they had disobeyed; for directly, though not defiantly, the Apostle addressed the Sanhedrin as the murderers of his Master—"Jesus whom ye slew, hanging him on a tree." Then he went on to define more clearly whom they had obeyed: God the father who raised up the Son from the dead and exalted him; God the Son who is Prince in his sovereignty and Savior in service, giving repentance and remission of sins; and the Holy Spirit who has been divinely given to those who obey God.

Further he declared who had been disobedient: "We are witnesses of these things," for they were personally acquainted with the whole story of the suffering, death and resurrection of the Lord. It was no wonder that the imposing council was struck as by a thunder bolt. The words of Peter cut them to the heart, and they, if they could, would have leaped upon him like devouring wolves upon a lamb.

**3. THE COMMENDATION OF CHRISTIAN COURAGE** is implied in the speech of Gamaliel. He was an honored member of the council and perhaps had been for many years. He was a Pharisee in his faith and so accepted the doctrine of the resurrection, though probably not convinced and so a teacher in the theology of the reality of the resurrection of Jesus. He was a doctor of law and seminary at Jerusalem, being the preceptor of Paul. He was held in the highest esteem by every body. What he did on this occasion was first to call the Sanhedrin into executive session and then give a bit of common sense advice. He advised his colleagues to be careful in disposing of the prisoners at the bar. He cited two well known examples of leaders of recent movements which had fallen of their own weight and come to naught. He declared that the present Christian movement as crystallized in the work of the Apostles, would soon be overthrown if it were of men. However if it were of God the Sanhedrin could not possibly destroy it but would itself be thereby destroyed. He advised, therefore, that the case be dismissed. And his voice became the unanimous verdict of the court.

**4. THE CONDEMNATION OF CHRISTIAN COURAGE** is expressed in the sentence of the Sanhedrin. Peter and the other apostles with him were now called again before the court. They were given a cruel flogging in order to emphasize the court's authority. The solemn charge was then laid upon them that they speak no more in the name of Christ. There upon they were released.

**5. THE CONQUEST OF CHRISTIAN COURAGE** is shown in the continued ministry of the Apostles. Discharged from the court the Apostles at once left the court-room. But they did not go forth as scourged criminals or cowards into some hidden lair. On the contrary, they left with light hearts and beaming countenances and joyous words. They were happy in the honor of their dishonor for the honor of Christ. Nor were they deterred or delayed in their labors. They resumed their ministry with even greater courage and zeal. Every day they were at work. They wrought in the Temple and in the homes of the people. They engaged both in teaching and preaching. And their unvarying theme was, Jesus is the Christ.

The Lesson of the Lesson

(1) Be Courageous in Attitude—"Brought them—set them before the council—the high priest asked them." They were at work for Christ. They were arraigned because of their loyalty to Christ. The high priest haughtily interrogated them and charged them with disobedience to the law of the land. But they were true to their Lord. And they flinched not in doing their duty.

(2) Be Courageous in Activity—"Charged you not to teach—ye filled Jerusalem with your teaching." The Apostles were active and alert. They knew what the Sanhedrin had charged them not to do. Yet they added fervor to their fidelity. They penetrated every part of the city. Everybody knew what they taught. And the circle of believers was widening every day.

(3) Be Courageous in Application—"Intend to bring this man's blood upon us—Jesus whom ye slew." The Sanhedrin was right in its surmise. They were responsible for the crucifixion of Jesus. Peter told them so to their faces in open court. Who ever did a braver thing?

(4) Be Courageous in Defence—"Peter and the apostles answered and said—they when they heard this were cut to the heart." There was nothing to conceal. There was much to be said. But Peter did not mince matters. He seized upon the great essentials. His remarks were germane. Like a good marksman he hit the target. No wonder the Sanhedrin wined.

(5) Be Courageous in Obedience—"We must obey God rather than man—the Holy Spirit whom God hath given to them that obey him." We must obey God. We must obey him rather than man where there is conflict. We must be courageous in our obedience. If we obey, we are assured of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit.

(6) Be Courageous in Testimony—"We are witnesses of these things." Peter testified concerning the death of Jesus in the presence of the men who brought about his crucifixion. He advocated the resurrection of Jesus when most of the court being Sadducees ridiculed the idea. He testified to the character and work of Jesus when his very name was hated and despised by all the judges. Yet his witness was not in vain.

(7) Be Courageous in Hardship—"Called the Apostles—beat them—charged them—let them go." They were summoned before the court as if they were criminals. They were scourged as if they were felons. They were roughly charged as if put under bond for their good behavior. They were released under threat of law if they should go on with their work. But they endured hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ.

(8) Be Courageous in Resignation—"Rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the Name." They did not submit stoically to their suffering. Like the Master, they endured their cross despising the shame. They even rejoiced in their affliction because it enabled them to share something of the ignominy heaped upon their Lord. More over instead of narrowing, it rather widened and deepened their influence.

(9) Be Courageous in Perseverance—"Every day, in the Temple and at home, they ceased not." Persecution did not stop Peter and his associates for even a day. So they kept up their ministry. They went into the homes of the people, doubtless holding many cottage meetings. They also continued in the Temple, during the busy and crowded hours of the day. And they held their services not only on the Sabbath and the Lord's Day but every day.

(10) Be Courageous in Doctrine—"To teach and to preach Jesus as the Christ." The disciples had the one message which the world needs more than all things else. It was the gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. They taught it faithfully. They preached it fervently. Their persecution simply put them on a pedestal where they could reach wider audiences. They were not ashamed of the gospel. They declared the whole counsel of God.
