FINE RAINS INSURE BUMPER HARVESTS

Tuesday and Wednesday of this week fine rains fell throughout Mills county, and over most all of Texas. In places water-spouts were reported.

The rains in Mills county followed goods rains of two weeks ago, which had crops in excellent condition. Corn and cotton are both looking fine, in fact a good yield of corn is assured. Cotton is growing as fast as possible and is fruiting nicely. The cotton flea is prevalent over most of the county and it is feared that the damage from this pest will be considerable. Boll weevil infestation is reported in some sections. The last few days of cloudy weather have been ideal of insect pests.

Mills county is now harvesting a mighty good grain crop. While the yield per acre of the oats is light—about 20 bushels—this is, to a great extent offset by the increased acreage and the higher prices. Wheat and barley yields have been fine—better than for a number of years and the prices are good.

The price of oats is declining, around 33c being paid now, compared with 43 cents a week ago. All in all, Mills county is fortunate this year in the crops she has already harvested and the very bright prospects for the others yet to be gathered. And not the least of the crops in making is our "turkey crop", the price of which bids fair to be very high this winter and the cost of raising and gathering practically nothing.

Truly, the farmer in this county which is making a side-line of farming and turning his attention more to goats, sheep, chickens, turkeys and milch cows, is "sitting on top of the world" with money in the bank and an income not altogether dependent upon rain or the absence of insect pests for its surety.

ZEPHYR BANK ROBBED; TWO MEN ARE CAUGHT

Tuesday at about 11:00 o'clock the First State Bank of Zephyr was robbed of about \$1200.00 by two masked men, one of whom entered the bank while the other stayed in a waiting automobile to take care of the get-away.

Assistant Cashier D. A. Johnson was alone in the bank when the robber entered and, with drawn pistol, demanded that Mr. Johnson hand over the money. This Mr. Johnson did, hiding, however, several hundred dollars by purposefully overlooking it. When the robber started to leave he came face to face with Everett Lee, another employe of the bank. The bandit ordered Mr. Lee inside the rail and succeeded in convincing him that that was the healthiest place.

As quickly as the robbers had gotten away, Mr. Lee and Mr. Johnson notified officers at both Brownwood and Goldthwaite and pursuit was quickly started. The men started towards Goldthwaite and Sheriff Bledsoe and Deputy Sheriff E. O. Priddy, accompanied by others, left towards Zephyr to intercept them. The bandits, however, came about three miles down the road, changed into another automobile and circled back towards Zephyr, finally passing through the town again.

Goldthwaite and Brownwood officers traced the car, found where the overalls which had been used in robbing the bank had been hid in some brush, and trailed these two men to near Brownwood, where they came upon them. These men were arrested and lodged in the Brown county jail. The men were placed in separate cells and while both stoutly denied participation in the crime, officers have hopes of a confession, if these are the guilty men. The \$1200 loot was not found, although the route taken by the men was carefully searched.

CONTROL OF COTTON FLEAS

Bulletin No. 356, issued by the A. & M. College records the results of tests for the control of cotton flea hoppers with sulphur and sulphur compounds.

It has been found that super-fine dusting sulphur, flowers of sulphur and various compounds of sulphur and tobacco dust have proved very effective in controlling the pest. When applied at the rate of 20 pounds per acre these insecticides remained effective in controlling the flea hopper for a period of six or seven days under favorable climatic conditions. In a series of tests various sprays did not prove effective in controlling the pest.

Many farmers are interested in the machine for applying sulphur fumes being built for Mr. Cryer.

CHAPTER

AN ORDINANCE to be a part of the code of ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, levying taxes for the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, upon all Real and personal property, and on certain occupations for the year 1927, and providing for the collection of the same.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas: That there shall be and is hereby levied a city tax for the year 1927, on all real estate situated lying and being in the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, and on all personal property that was in said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first day of January A. D. 1927, not exempt from taxation by the laws and constitution of the State of Texas for the purposes hereinafter provided as follows:

1st. For General Revenue Purposes, to be known as the General Fund, Fifty cents on the One Hundred Dollars Valuation which is hereby set aside for general revenue purposes.

2nd. To provide interest and for creating a sinking fund for outstanding water works bonds, twenty five cents on the Hundred Dollars valuation.

3rd. For a road, street and bridge fund, to be known as the street fund, twenty five cents on the Hundred Dollars valuation.

4th. For the purpose of taking up time warrants, issued by the City for permanent improvements, thirty five cents on the Hundred Dollars valuation.

5th. It is further ordained and ordered that the City Council levy an occupation tax, and the same is hereby levied, equal to one half the occupation tax now levied by the State of Texas, on the respective occupations now taxed by the State of Texas, as shown and set out in the revised Statutes of the State of Texas, the same to be collected for general revenue purposes.

6th. All such taxes so levied except the occupation tax, shall be due and payable on the first day of October, A. D. 1927, and on and after said date, the City Tax Assessor and Collector of Taxes is hereby authorized to collect and receipt for same, before and until the first day of February A. D. 1928 and if said taxes are not paid by such time, there shall be taxed against the owners of said real and personal property, and against said property, ten percent additional on the amount then due as penalty, as the same is provided for and authorized by the laws of the State of Texas, and the said City Assessor and Collector of Taxes is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce the payment of said taxes according to the laws of the State of Texas, and ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas; and all taxes not paid on or before the 31st day of January A. D. 1928, shall be deemed delinquent and the same, together with the above penalty together with the above penalty shall be apportioned among the several different funds, and the City Tax Assessor and Collector, shall by virtue of his office, levy upon, seize and sell said property real and personal, for payment of taxes thereon according to law.

It is further ordained and provided that taxes levied hereby if not paid on or before the 31st day of January A. D. 1928, shall bear interest at the rate of six

percent per annum from the first day of February, A. D. 1928, until paid.

An imperative public necessity exists that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and the same is hereby suspended, and this ordinance is passed to its third and last reading and passed by vote of the Council on this the 30 day of May A. D. 1927.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Hight C. Moore
SUNDAY, JUNE 19, 1927
PETER TEACHES GOOD CITIZENSHIP
(Temperance Lesson)
1 Peter 2: 11-17; 4: 1-5

Golden Text—Love worketh no ill to his neighbor. Romans 13:10.
Lesson Setting and Survey

In the sixties of the first century the churches in Asia Minor were subjected to many reproaches among their neighbors; by the Jews for abandoning ceremonial observances, and by the Gentiles for not joining in idolatrous festivities as of old; and this feeling broke out in violent persecution. On hearing through Silvanus from the troubled churches in the West, Peter, then laboring among the many Jews in Babylon, wrote his first letter addressing Christians generally in Asia Minor, naming the countries from northeast to south and west. His evident object was the encouragement of those who were suffering on account of their faith. In this lesson for today he teaches a fine lesson on good citizenship.

Lesson Text and Outline
1. Character of The Good Citizen (1 Peter 2)

I Beloved, I beseech you as sojourners and pilgrims, to abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul; 12 having your behavior seemly among the Gentiles; that, wherein they speak against you as evil-doers, which they may be your good works, which they behold, glorify God in the day of visitation.

II. Conduct of the Good Citizen.

13 Be subject to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake whether to the king, as supreme; 14 or unto governors, as sent by him for vengeance on evil-doers and for praise to them that do well. 15 For so is the will of God, that by well doing ye should put to silence the ignorance of foolish men: 16 as free, and not using your freedom for a cloak of wickedness, but as bondservants of God. 17 Honor all men. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the king.

III. Consecration of the Good Citizen. (1 Peter 4).

Forasmuch then as Christ suffered in the flesh, arm ye yourselves with the same mind; for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin; 2 that ye no longer should live the rest of your time in the flesh to lust of men but to the will of God. 3 For the time past may suffice to have wrought the desire of the Gentiles and to have walked in lasciviousness, carousings, and abominable lusts winebibbings, revellings, idolatries: 4 wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them into the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you: 5 who shall give account to him that is ready to judge the living and the dead.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. The Personal Aspect of Good Citizenship reflects the character of the good citizen. His life is devoted to good works. His upright behavior cause maligning foe to glorify God. Notice: (1) The doers of good works are "beloved" of the Apostle, "sojourners" on earth for a time and "pilgrims" on the way to the Better Country. (2) The phases of good works include abstinence and achievement: the first engaging confining and controlling fleshy cravings of all sorts on the ground that they wage war upon the soul; the second consecrating and reentering every energy upon "seemly behavior" which would influence others to better lives. (3) The foes of good works exhaust every device of slander and villification, only to set believers in better light and to strike the sharp edge of their own consciences. (4) The goal of good works is to glorify God, and this is done even by the persecuting Gentiles themselves in their way providential visitation.

2 The Civic Aspect of Good Citizenship presents the conduct of good citizen. (1) Think of the good citizen and the Lord. What he does in "for the Lord's sake." He undertakes to make the will of God the rule of his life. He is himself a bondservant of God and thus bound to serve the Supreme Ruler of all nations. (2) Think of the citizen and the law. He is law abiding. He submits to every ordinance governing the body politic. He cheerfully complies with regulations designed for the common wealth. (3) Think of the citizen and the leaders. Those in positions of responsibility are entitled to respect, support and co-operation.

Those to whom Peter wrote were to honor the emperor of the universal empire of Rome. They were to give due honor to the provincial governors and to all government officers down the line. (4) Think of the citizen and the people. There are evil doers who must be punished and segregated from society. There are many in public and private life who do well who ought to be envious men whose ignorance is appalling and must be counteracted. (5) Think of the good citizen and his liberties. He is entitled to freedom and ought to enjoy it as guaranteed him by his government. But he ought not to use his freedom as a pretext for evil designs upon his fellowmen. No good citizen will do so many mean things as possible within the law. As a bondservant of God he will perform the acts of righteousness which should feature every true man's life. (6) Think of the citizen and his civic attitudes. He ought to honor all men, having proper respect for the race. He ought to love the brotherhood and thus fulfill the law. He ought to fear God who is the arbiter of nations and individuals. He ought to honor the king or whoever occupies the highest seat of power in his government.

3 The Spiritual Aspect of Good Citizenship emphasizes the consecration of the good citizen. The man who puts Christ in the center of his life and of his world will come nearest the ideal of good citizen. (1) He accepts the divine Christ who is the Son of God and Son of man, the best citizen earth ever knew. (2) He trusts the suffering Christ who, thought maligned and misunderstood, laid down his life in vicarious atonement for the sins of men and left an example which inspires us to do and be our best. The same mind which he had when he endured the cross should animate us in the midst of any suffering we may be called on to endure, for suffering makes sinless attraction and takes the edge off temptation. (3) He follows the directing Christ. He is not dominated by the desires of the flesh but yearns after the will of God desiring to make it the rule of his life. (4) He is indebted to the delivering Christ. His past record like that of Peter's readers, may not be without sin and stain. They used to be inflamed with the desire of the pagan Gentiles about them. They walked in every path of vice. They knew the byways of lasciviousness and lust. They had indulged in drunk on brawls. They had caroused in idolatries abominable. But Christ had delivered them from the galling chains of their iniquity. (5) He takes sides with the dividing Christ. There is a difference between the good citizen and the bad citizen. And when, at the word of Christ, a redeemed and reformed citizen refused to run with his old associates into former excesses, they first think it strange and then they begin to gossip and speak evil about him. But if he is a good citizen he stands his ground. (6) He acknowledges his responsibility to the judging Christ. He is accountable not merely as an individual or as a member of the family, but also as a citizen who realizes that Christ is ready to judge those who are living as well as those who have passed away.

(1) Be Loyal to Restraint. "Abstain from lusts." Wrong desires checked instantly and desires which are sinful and detestable must be held in abeyance. (2) Be Loyal to "Having Many Enemies." true heart for defiance or disobedience of law. God has ordained that we should live together in governments. We ought to see that our laws are good and obey them faithfully.

(5) Be Loyal in Law Enforcement. "For vengeance on evil doers and for praise to them that do well." Righteous legislation ought to be enforced righteously. Criminals must be punished. Good people who do well for their country deserve the thanks of their countrymen. Every good citizen ought to co-operate with every other good citizen in heightening public respect for law.

(6) Be Loyal in Liberty. "Fret and not use your freedom for a cloak of wickedness." Liberty does not mean license, as we all know. But the highest use of our freedom is an art which too few of us attain. The liberty to do right is the greatest liberty in the world.

(7) Be Loyal in Conscience. "As Christ suffered arm ye yourselves with the same mind." The Roman Empire's foremost citizen was caught in the intriguing clutches of Roman law. Yet a light was kindled by him in Gethsemane and on Golgotha which has gone out through all the earth. If we can show the spirit of the Great Sufferer, we shall be worth more to the world. Conscience is the core of citizenship.

(8) Be Loyal in Ideals. "No longer live to the lust of men but to the will of God." Too much of our machinery is keyed to the gratification of human appetites and passions. We live not for ourselves alone. There is a nobler investment to be made of life. The far and lofty heights are ahead. We cannot reach them unless we live to the will of God. Then our ideals send us climbing starward.

(9) Be Loyal in trial. "They think it strange—speaking evil of you." The testing time comes and we must be true. The hour of temptation arrives and we must resist. The sword of persecution is unsheathed before us but we must not quail. We must be faithful under fire.

(10) Be Loyal in View of Judgment. "Shall give account to him that is ready to judge." His eyes are ever upon us. He knows our every motive and deed. Our record is written on the imperishable tablets of memory and conscience. We are responsible. We must give account. The good citizen will be ready for the judgment.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Hight C. Moore
SUNDAY, JUNE 19, 1927
PETER TEACHES GOOD CITIZENSHIP
(Temperance Lesson)
1 Peter 2: 11-17; 4: 1-5

Golden Text—Love worketh no ill to his neighbor. Romans 13:10.
Lesson Setting and Survey

In the sixties of the first century the churches in Asia Minor were subjected to many reproaches among their neighbors; by the Jews for abandoning ceremonial observances, and by the Gentiles for not joining in idolatrous festivities as of old; and this feeling broke out in violent persecution. On hearing through Silvanus from the troubled churches in the West, Peter, then laboring among the many Jews in Babylon, wrote his first letter addressing Christians generally in Asia Minor, naming the countries from northeast to south and west. His evident object was the encouragement of those who were suffering on account of their faith. In this lesson for today he teaches a fine lesson on good citizenship.

Lesson Text and Outline
I. Character of the Good Citizen
(1 Peter 2)

I Beloved, I beseech you as sojourners and pilgrims, to abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul; 12 having your behavior seemly among the Gentiles; that, wherein they speak against you as evil-doers, they may be your good works, which they behold, glorify God in the day of visitation.

II. Conduct of the Good Citizen.

13 Be subject to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake whether to the king, as supreme; 14 or unto governors, as sent by him for vengeance on evil-doers and for praise to them that do well. 15 For so is the will of God, that by well doing ye should put to silence the ignorance of foolish men: 16 as free, and not using your freedom for a cloak of wickedness, but as bondservants of God. 17 Honor all men. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the king.

III. Consecration of the Good Citizen.
(1 Peter 4).

Forasmuch then as Christ suffered in the flesh, arm ye yourselves with the same mind; for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin; 2 that ye no longer should live the rest of your time in the flesh to lust of men but to the will of God. 3 For the time past may suffice to have wrought the desire of the Gentiles and to have walked in lasciviousness, carousings, and abominable lust's winebibbings, revellings, idolatries: 4 wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them into the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you: 5 who shall give account to him that is ready to judge the living and the dead.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. The Personal Aspect of Good Citizenship reflects the character of the good citizen. His life is devoted to good works. His upright behavior causes maligning foe to glorify God. Notice: (1) The doers of good works are "beloved" of the Apostle, "sojourners" on earth for a time and "pilgrims" on the way to the Better Country. (2) The phases of good works include abstinence and achievement: the first eking confining and controlling fleshly cravings of all sorts on the ground that they wage war upon the soul; the second consecrating and reentering every energy upon "seemly behavior" which would influence others to better lives. (3) The foes of good works exhaust every device of slander and vilification, only to set believers in better light and to strike the sharp edge of their own consciences. (4) The goal of good works is to glorify God, and this is done even by the persecuting Gentiles themselves in their way providential visitation.

tion. Those to whom Peter wrote were to honor the emperor of the universal empire of Rome. They were to give due honor to the provincial governors and to all government officers down the line. (4) Think of the citizen and the people. There are evil doers who must be punished and segregated from society. There are many in public and private life who do well who ought to be foolish men whose ignorance is appalling and must be counteracted. (5) Think of the good citizen and his liberties. He is entitled to freedom and ought to enjoy it as guaranteed him by his government. But he ought not to use his freedom as a pretext for evil designs upon his fellowmen. No good citizen will do so many mean things as possible within the law. As a bondservant of God he will perform the acts of righteousness which should feature every true man's life. (6) Think of the citizen and his civic attitudes. He ought to honor all men, having proper respect for the race. He ought to love the brotherhood and thus fulfill the law. He ought to fear God who is the arbiter of nations and individuals. He ought to honor the king or whoever occupies the highest seat of power in his government.

3. The Spiritual Aspect of Good Citizenship emphasizes the consecration of the good citizen. The man who puts Christ in the center of his life and of his world will come nearest the ideal of good citizen. (1) He accepts the divine Christ who is the Son of God and Son of man, the best citizen earth ever knew. (2) He trusts the suffering Christ who, thought maligned and misunderstood, laid down his life in vicarious atonement for the sins of men and left an example which inspires us to do and be our best. The same mind which he had when he endured the cross should animate us in the midst of any suffering we may be called on to endure, for suffering makes sin less attraction and takes the edge off temptation. (3) He follows the directing Christ. He is not dominated by the desires of the flesh but yearns after the will of God desiring to make it the rule of his life. (4) He is indebted to the delivering Christ. His past record like that of Peter's readers, may not be without sin and stain. They used to be inflamed with the desire of the pagan Gentiles about them. They walked in every path of vice. They knew the byways of lasciviousness and lust. They had indulged in drunk on brawls. They had caroused in idolatries abominable. But Christ had delivered them from the galling chains of their iniquity. (5) He takes sides with the dividing Christ. There is a difference between the good citizen and the bad citizen. And when, at the word of Christ, a redeemed and reformed citizen refused to run with his old associates into former excesses, they first think it strange and then they begin to gossip and speak evil about him. But if he is a good citizen he stands his ground. (6) He acknowledges his responsibility to the judging Christ. He is accountable not merely as an individual or as a member of the family, but also as a citizen who realizes that Christ is ready to judge those who are now living as well as those who have passed away.

The Lesson of the Lesson
Be Loyal to Commonwealth and Kingdom.

(1) Be Loyal in Restraint. "Abstain from fleshly lusts." Wrong desires must be checked instantly and completely. Also desires which are selfish and sinister, no matter how respectable, must be restrained. Self must be held in abeyance. We must learn to do without. If we cannot abstain we cannot attain.

(2) Be Loyal in Behavior. "Having your behavior seemly." Many eyes are watching us. Everybody has an opinion about us. We may win commendation from unexpected quarters. Even the debased recognize the good in others. Seemly behavior exerts a powerful influence for good.

(3) Be Loyal in Good Works. "They may be your good works which they behold glorify God." That is what Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount. The early Christians found it true. We know it is a fact today. We ought to let our light shine through our good works not that men should see them and praise us but see them and magnify God.

(4) Be Loyal in Law Observance. "Be subject to every ordinance." There is no place in a true heart for defiance or disobedience of law. God has ordained that we should live together in governments. We ought to see that our laws are good and obey them faithfully.

(5) Be Loyal in Law Enforcement. "For vengeance on evil doers and for praise to them that do well." Righteous legislation ought to be enforced righteously. Criminals must be punished. Good people who do well for their country deserve the thanks of their countrymen. Every good citizen ought to co-operate with every other good citizen in heightening public respect for law.

(6) Be Loyal in Liberty. "Free and not use your freedom for a cloak of wickedness." Liberty does not mean license, as we all know. But the highest use of our freedom is an art which too few of us attain. The liberty to do right is the greatest liberty in the world.

(7) Be Loyal in Conscience. "As Christ suffered arm ye your selves with the same mind." The Roman Empire's foremost citizen was caught in the intriguing clutches of Roman law. Yet a light was kindled by him in Gethsemane and on Golgotha which has gone out through all the earth. If we can show the spirit of the Great Sufferer, we shall be worth more to the world. Conscience is the core of citizenship.

(8) Be Loyal in Ideals. "No longer live to the lust of men but to the will of God." Too much of our machinery is keyed to the gratification of human appetites and passions. We live not for ourselves alone. There is a nobler investment to be made of life. The far and lofty heights are ahead. We cannot reach them unless we live to the will of God. Then our ideals send us climbing starward.

(9) Be loyal in trial. "They think it strange—speaking evil of you." The testing time comes and we must be true. The hour of temptation arrives and we must resist. The sword of persecution is unsheathed before us but we must not quail. We must be faithful under fire.

(10) Be Loyal in View of Judgment. "Shall give account to him that is ready to judge." His eyes are ever upon us. He knows our every motive and deed. Our record is written on the imperishable tablets of memory and conscience. We are responsible. We must give account. The good citizen will be ready for the judgment.

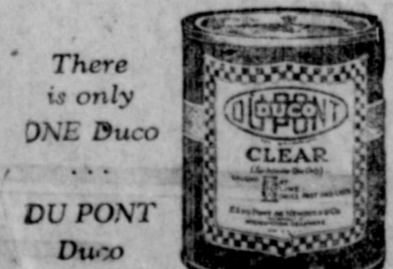
