FOR CONSIDERATION OF RURAL DELIVERY PATRONS

On account of the busy time of the year, I will postpone reporting patrons for failing to comply with the Department's direction to set their rural delivery boxes in order according to requirements indicated by defects checked on form 4056 and delivered in rural mail boxes during the last of May and the first of June.

Many patrons seem to hold the opinion that this request to remedy defects in their rural boxes has originated in the mind of the postmaster and the carriers. Nothing from the facts. The postmaster and the carriers of the Department are the servants of the patrons. They never assume to originate rules or attempt to infer their personal opinion in the service. They have no authority except delegated authority. For your information and through the courtesy and usefulness of our county paper the contents of form No. 4056 is reproduced below. you will please note every thing contained therein and especially the regulation requiring the postmaster to report delinquents to the Department and to withdraw all of the service from those who fail to comply with requests to remedy defects pointed out to them.

After August 1st the postmaster will report all delinquents, not on his own motion but on direction of the Department to report every delinquent.

The information mailed you on dates above mentioned is reproduced below. I am hoping you will read it and understand.

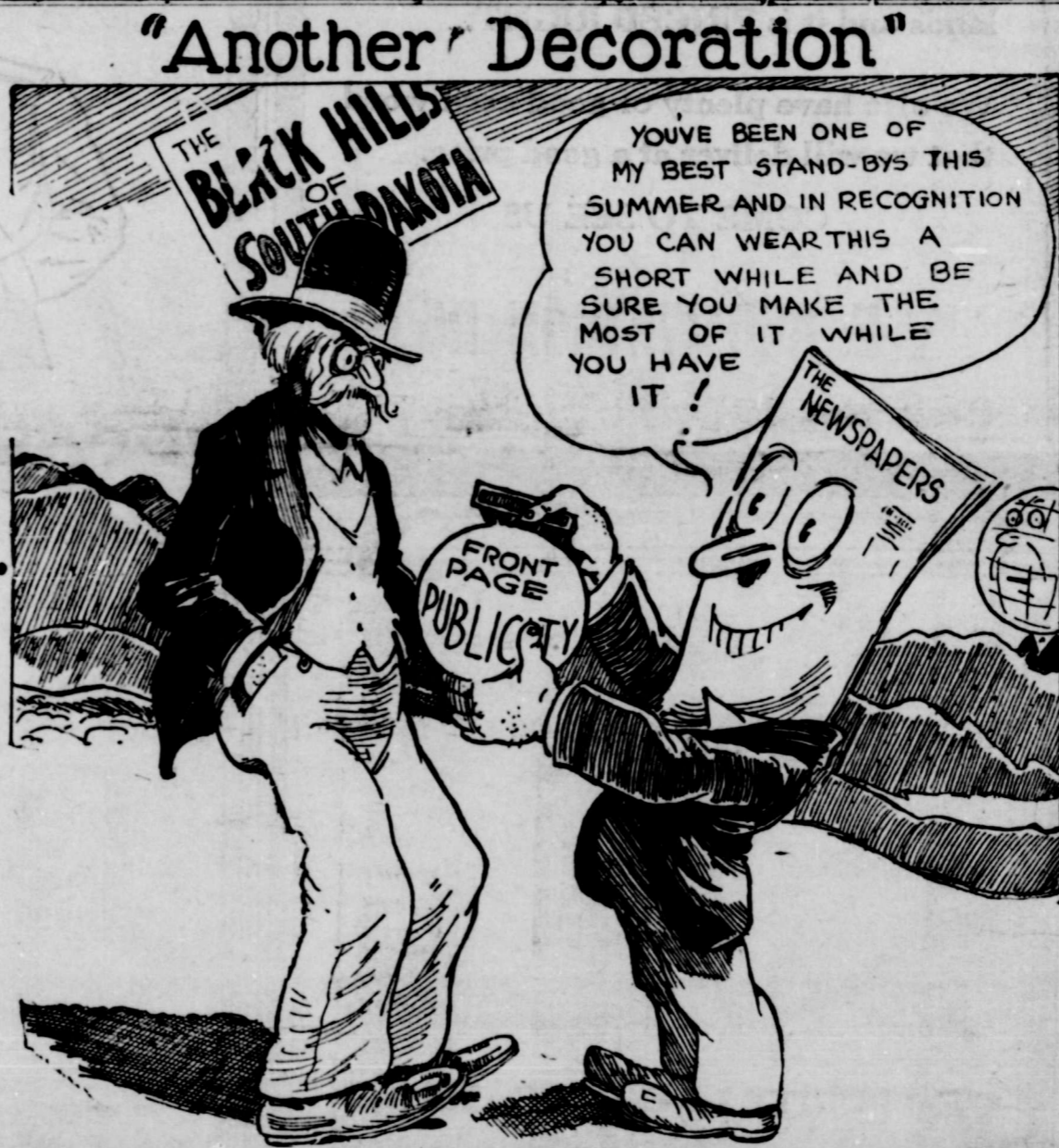
Form 4056

The regulations of the Department prescribe that persons desiring rural delivery service shall provide and erect at their own expense boxes conforming to official specifications and requirements, and that all boxes shall, if practicable, be erected on the right-hand side of the road regularly traveled by a rural carrier and in such position as to be easily and safely accessible for the delivery and collection of mail by the carrier without leaving his conveyance. It is required by the Department when, because of traffic conditions, to travel from side to side of the road would endanger the life of the carrier and the safety of the mails, or would be a violation of State and local ordinances in respect to the use of the highways, that all boxes be erected on the right-hand side of the road as regularly traveled by the carrier.

Carriers are directed to report to postmasters of any boxes which do not conform to the regulations, or which are improperly erected, and postmasters are required to notify patrons maintaining boxes to remedy the defects, and if the patrons fail to do so to make a report thereof to the Department. In this event the facts are reviewed, and if such action is found to be warranted, instructions are issued for the withdrawal of service until the requirements are complied with.

An observance on the part of patrons of the regulations noted requested to confo-operate in an effort to maintain the best possible service by promptly correcting the irregularity in your box as indicated by item or items checked below, thus facilitating work of the carrier and avoiding any interruption in the delivery and collection of your mail.

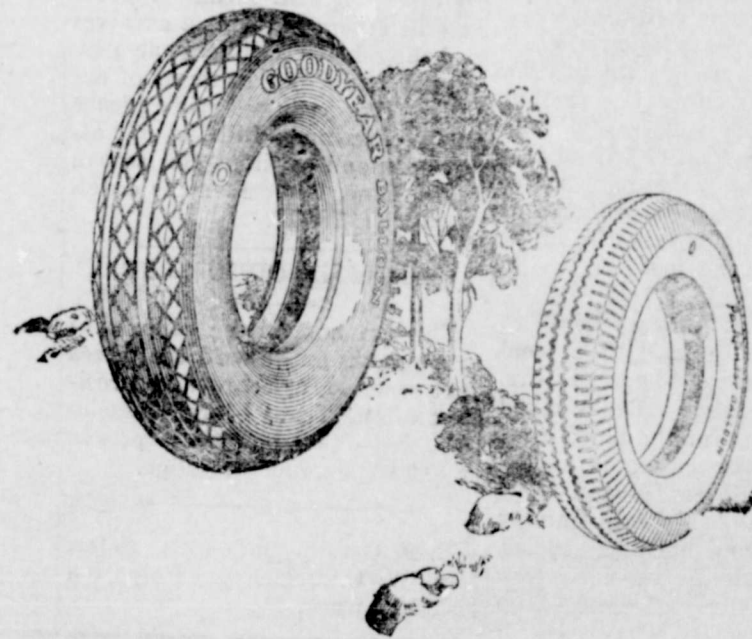

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Hight C. Moore

SUNDAY, JULY 24, 1927
DAVID AND GOLIATH
1 Samuel 17

GOLDEN TEXT — Jehovah is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?—Psalm 27:1.

Lesson Setting and Survey

The Philistine and Hebrew armies were drawn up against each other. The giant of Gath challenged the hosts of Saul and struck terror into their hearts. The appearance of David and the slaying of the giant constitute one of the most remarkable episodes in military history.

Lesson Text and Outline

1 Samuel 17: 31-37, 40-42, 48-51
I PREPARING FOR THE PHILISTINE.

31 And when the words were heard which David spake, they rehearsed them before Saul; and he sent for him. 32 And David said to Saul, Let no man's heart fail because of him; thy servant will go and fight with this Philistine. 33 And Saul said to David, Thou art not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him; for thou art but a youth. 34 And David said unto Saul, Thy servant was keeping his father's sheep; and when there came a lion, or a bear, and took a lamb out of the flock, 35 I went after him, and delivered it out of his mouth; and when he arose against me, I caught him by his beard, and smote him, and slew him. 36 Thy servant smote both the lion and the bear; and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be as one of them, seeing that he hath defied the armies of the living God. 37 And David said, Jehovah that delivered me out of the paw of the lion, and out of the paw of the bear, he will deliver me out of the hand of this Philistine. And Saul said unto David, Go, the Jehovah shall be with thee.

II: DISDAINED BY THE PHILISTINE.

40 And he took his staff in his hand, and chose him five smooth stones out of the brook, and put them in the shepherd's bag which he had, even in his wallet; and his sling was in his hand; and he drew near to the Philistine.

41 And the Philistine came on and drew near unto David; and the man that bear the shield went before him. 42 And when the Philistine looked about and saw David, he disdained him; for he was but a youth, and ruddy, and without of fair countenance.

III PREVAILING OVER THE PHILISTINE.

48 And it came to pass, when the Philistine arose, and came and drew near unto David, that David hastened, and ran toward the army to meet the Philistine. 49 And David put his hand in his bag, and took thence a stone, and slung it, and smote the Philistine in his forehead; and the stone sank into his forehead, and he fell upon his face to the earth. 50 So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and with a stone, and smote the Philistine, and slew him; but there was no sword in the hand of David. 51 Then David ran, and stood over the Philistine, and took his sword, and drew it out of the sheath thereof, and slew him, and cut off his head therewith. And when the Philistines saw that their champion was slain, they fled. **Notes Analytical and Expository**
Study the story given in First Samuel 17.

1. THE CHALLENGE OF GOLIATH (Verses 1-10). Again the Philistines had invaded Israel, perhaps with a view of plunder, and doubtless also in retaliation for the victory recently won by Israel. The point of attack was near the head of the Valley of Elah, about sixteen miles southwest of Jerusalem. Saul, of course, gathered his force to meet the enemy. The opposing armies were drawn up on opposite sides of the valley, but for many days the battle had not joined between them. From the Philistine camp descended day after day for full forty days the giant Goliath who was about ten feet high, his brazen helmet overtopping his colossal form, his coat of mail weighing more than 150 pounds, his legs covered with greaves of brass, his immense javelin like a weaver's beam, and his shield bearer accompanying him. The bold and bitter words that fell from his lips rang up the slopes challenging the Children of Israel, demanding a warrior to meet him in the open and decide

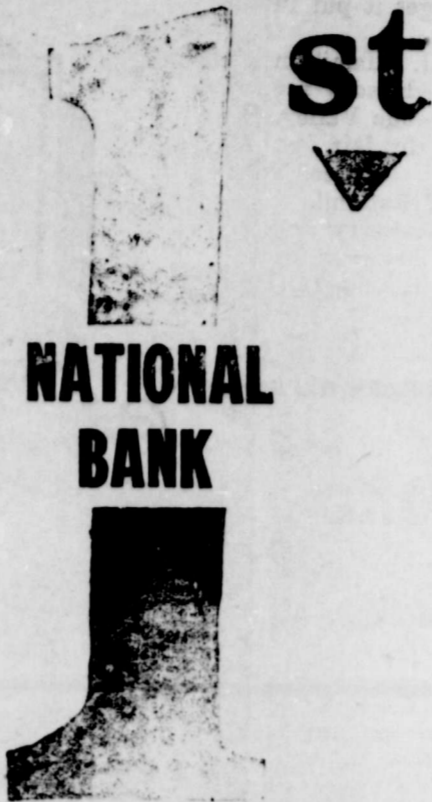
the issue of the conflict, and blasphemously defying the armies of the living God. The bigness and bluster of the giant struck terror to the hearts of the Hebrews. They were utterly dismayed in his presence, and not one of them dared descend into the valley and meet him.

2. **THE VISIT OF DAVID** (verses 11-27). In the army of Israel there were three sons of Jesse the Bethlehemite. The youngest, as we have seen, was David, now about twenty years of age; and he was detained at home. Just now he was sent by his father to the army about 22 miles away with 1.11 bushels of parched grain for his brothers, and ten cheeses for the captain of their thousand. He arrived at his destination just as the host was forming in battle array. Hardly had he saluted his brethren when he heard the challenge of Goliath and saw the dismay of Israel. His soul was stirred within him, and more anxious still did he become when the men of Israel said that any man who would conquer Goliath should have riches, wed the king's daughter, and secure freedom in Israel for his father's house. Agitated, though calm, he repeated the challenge of the giant and the repeated offer of the king for a triumphant soldier to meet him.

3. **THE ANGER OF ELIAB**. (verses 28-30). The inquiry of David was heard by his oldest brother, Eliab, who thereupon became angry and reflected upon the youth as proud, haughty and curious. The reply of David showed self-control, sanity, and good sense. Nor was he deterred from the great business ahead of him. He continued to make inquiry in that portion of the army, perhaps hoping that some stalwart soldier would be roused to duty. Since no one appeared, his own courage and patriotism must, if possible assert itself in this hour of national need.

4. **THE PERMISSION OF SAUL** (verses 31-40). No sooner had the suggestion of David reached the ears of Saul than the king summoned the lad before him. Said David to his king concerning the giant: "Let no man's heart fail because of him; thy servant will go and fight with this Philistine." It was a bold proposition and Saul could not at first grasp it; for he said: "Thou art not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him! for thou art but a youth, and he a man of war from his youth." On the surface of things, it looked as if Saul was right. However, David pursued the subject further. He told the king of his experience as shepherd and how the lion and bear had fallen before him as he cared for his flock. Moreover, he asserted his faith in God and declared that even now in the name of Jehovah he could conquer the giant. With his courage and faith Saul was impressed and gave him permission to carry out his purpose. However, the young man must be equipped for the difficult task ahead of him. Saul thought that his armor, which of course was the best in the army, should be fitted upon David in order to insure victory. Obedient to the monarch David tried on the king's armor but found it ill-fitting, heavy and cumbersome. He, therefore, laid it aside and took his shepherd's equipment: staff, wallet, sling, and stones. Then he sped down into the valley to meet the giant.

5. **THE COLLOQUY OF THE COMBATANTS** (verses 41-47). Was there ever a greater contrast between two men on the field of battle than between Goliath in his glittering armor and David in his shepherd's attire? The giant saw the contrast and felt insulted. He looked upon the approaching lad with consummate disdain. The only weapon he saw was the shepherd's club and so he scornfully queried: "Am I a dog?" Then he heaped curses upon David and voiced the bloody threat that he would now give the flesh of David to the birds and beasts. Undismayed on his part, David acknowledged the contrast between them in size, strength, and equipment, but he declared that he had come to the conflict in the name of the Lord of Hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom Goliath should be eaten by wild animals, that the Lord would deliver the lad defied. He further declared giant into his hand, that he would behead him, and that his carcass And all this he would do "that all the earth might know that there

is a God in Israel, and that all this assembly may know that Jehovah saveth now with sword and spear; for the battle is Jehovah's and he will give you into our hand." How lofty and spiritual was the purpose of David!

6. **THE TRIUMPH OF ISREAL**. (verses 48-54). When the Philistine approached David confidently and scornfully, the young man ran to meet him and as he ran he took a stone from the wallet and slung it with such force and accuracy that the stone sank into the Philistine's forehead so that he fell upon his face to the earth. The giant's shieldbearer must have fled in dismay. But with agility,

7. **THE INQUIRY OF ABNER** (verses 55-58). It may have been due to the confusion or to his malady that Saul did not recognize David. He, therefore, inquired of his commander-in-chief, "Abner, whose son is this youth?" But the general was unable to answer at the moment. Later, however, when David was returning from the slaughter of the Philistine, Abner took him before the king with the Philistine's head in his hand. When Saul inquired of him the name of his father, he replied: "I am the son of thy servant, Jesse the Bethlehemite." Thus from the

depth of obscurity David emerged as the hero of the army of Israel. David, who had no sword, leaped upon the fallen champion, took his sword from its sheath and beheaded him. The two armies drawn up on either side of the valley in full view of the combat could hardly believe their eyes. In utter confusion the Philistines, unmindful of their compact that the issue of the conflict would depend upon the battle between the two, broke ranks and fled down the valley toward their own country. The Israelites were quick to seize the advantage afforded them and fight and their camp with all of its booty fell into the hands of the pursued the enemy until they reached the fortified cities miles away. Many of the Philistines were killed and wounded in the Israel. It was indeed a great victory.

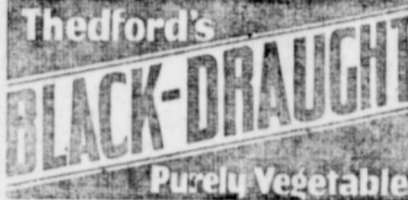

ON HEALTH subjects Edited By
STATE DEPARTMENT of
HEALTH

THIS column will be given to discussion of matters pertaining to public health. Any questions regarding public health administration, prevention of diseases, child care, sanitation, etc., will be answered in succeeding issues of this paper. Questions in regard to cure of diseases will not be answered, as the scope of this Department includes only disease prevention. Address Question Box, State Department of Health, Austin.

Questions

1. What bills affecting public health were passed by the special session of the Legislature?
2. What are some of the specific changes made by the bill authorizing the re-organization of the state health department?
3. Who are the present members of the State Board of Health?
4. Who is the present state health officer, and when does his term of office expire?
5. What are the Divisions of the State Department of Health?
6. What is the Texas Public Health Association, and is it a division of the state department of health?
7. Why is Texas not in the registration area of the U. S.?
8. Is there a state law requiring the registration of births and deaths, and what is the law called?
9. Whose duty is it to register births?
10. Whose duty is it to insist on birth registration?

Answers

1. The bill providing for the re-organization of the state department of health, and the bill for the enactment of a new Vital Statistics law. Both of these bills were signed by the Governor.
2. The state health officer is now appointed by the state board of health. This board has six members, who have been appointed by Governor Moody. Two members will serve two years, two for four years, and two for six years. Thus each incoming Governor will have the privilege of appointing two members.
3. Dr. Joe Gilbert, Austin; Dr. A. A. Ross, Lockhart; Dr. C. M. Rosser, Dallas; Dr. E. W. Wright, Bowie; Dr. W. A. King, San Antonio; and Dr. J. M. Frazier, Belton.
4. Dr. J. C. Anderson, of Plainview. His term of office will expire December 31st, 1928.
5. The Main division, comprising the state health officer, private secretary, chief clerk, and secretary of public health education; the division of child hygiene; the sanitary engineering division; vital statistics division; division of communicable diseases; food and drug division; hygienic laboratory.
6. The Texas Public Health Association is a branch of the National Tuberculosis Association, and is not officially connected with the state department of health. Funds for the Texas Public Health Association are raised through the sale of Tuberculosis Christmas seals.
7. Texas cannot be admitted within the registration area of the United States until at least 90 per cent of the births and deaths occurring in the state are reported for legal record.
8. The Vital Statistics law, which was first passed in 1903, requires the registration of all births. This law was rewritten and passed in a new form by the last Legislature.
9. It is the duty of the physician, mid-wife or other person officiating at the birth of a child to report this birth within five days after occurrence.
10. It is the duty of parents to see that the birth of their child is registered. Many physicians do not report births at all. If not sure whether your baby is registered, write the state department of health, giving name of child, place and birth date.
