SHALL WE AMEND OUR CONSTITUTION?

Read the delinquent tax list published in the Goldthwaite Eagle. You know these people do you not? Some of them are your friends and neighbors, and you know them to be good people, and people who try to pay their debts. What does this mean? That their homes will be sold for taxes they are unable to pay, if the don't pay them. What does this signify? Possibly nothing to the man who wants to spend the other fellow's money, but what about the home owner—the taxpayer? This is Mills County's delinquent list. Other counties have one equally as long or longer. What of the amendments the legislature asks us to adopt? 1st, the proposed amendment to give the legislature \$1500.00 per year whether they meet or not, and in addition thereto their traveling expenses in going and returning from Austin.

Under the present law, counting 120 days for a session (regular and called) it costs the people \$108,600.00. Under the proposed law it will cost in two years, \$216,000.00.

2nd, an amendment seeking to fix the salaries of the county officers instead of paying them. Under this amendment, we pay the county officers a salary whether they do anything or not. Fine for them of course, but what about the taxpayer? Why this amendment? You say it is because the law giving them fees is unconstitutional. This is not true, and has been so correctly held by the attorney general. The constitution of Ohio where this was held, as well as the laws of that state, are different from ours. Then why? I wonder if it is because the county officers in Texas have their organizations, and through these organizations are pressing this amendment? I don't know, but Why?

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

By Hight C. Moore

SUNDAY, JULY 31, 1927.

**DAVID AND JONATHAN**

1 Samuel 18: 1-4; 19: 1-7; 20: 1-42. 23: 15-18; 2 Samuel 1: 17-27  
**GOLDEN TEXT**—There is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother. Proverbs 18:24.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**

Within three or four years after the killing of Goliath, at least ten attempts, direct and indirect, were made by Saul upon the life of David: The uplifted spear while David was praying for him; the dangerous honor as captain of a thousand soldiers; the family insult of giving his daughter to another instead of to David, the insidious demand for the murder of a hundred Philistines before giving his younger daughter to the Giant-Killer; the handling of difficult diplomacy with Philistia; the perilous wars with David stationed in the heat of battle; the personal assault with the royal spear; the attempted capture in David's house; and the fruitless pursuit to Ramah. But under all this provocation David behaved wisely and he won the undying love of Jonathan, the son of Saul, who steadfastly befriended him.

**Lesson Text and Outline**

1 Samuel 18: 1-4; 19: 1-7  
**I. FIRST MEETING ON THE BATTLEFIELD** (1 Sam. 18).

And it came to pass, when he had made an end to speaking unto Saul, that the soul of Jonathan was knit with the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. 2 And Saul took him that day, and would not let him go no more home to his father's house. 3 Then Jonathan and David made a covenant, because he loved him as his own soul. 4 And Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that was upon him and gave it to David, and his apparel, even to his sword, and to his bow, and to his girdle.

**II. FIRST INTERCESSION AT COURT** (1 Sam. 19).

And Saul spake to Jonathan his son, and to all his servants, that they should slay David. But Jonathan, Saul's son, delighted much in David. 2 And Jonathan told David, saying, Saul my father seeketh to slay thee: now therefore, I pray thee, take heed to thyself in the morning, and abide in a secret place, and hide thyself: 3 and I will go out and stand beside my father in the field where thou art, and will commune with my father of thee; and if I see aught, I will tell thee. 4 And Jonathan spake good of David unto Saul his father, and said unto him, Let not the king sin against his servant, against David, because he hath not sinned against thee, and because his works have been three-ward very good: 5 for he put his life in his hand, and smote the Philistine, and Jehovah wrought a great victory for all Israel: thou savest it, and didst rejoice; wherefore then wilt thou sin against innocent blood, to slay David without a cause? 6 And Saul hearkened unto the voice of Jonathan: and Saul swore, As Jonathan liveth, he shall not be put to death. 7 And Jonathan called David, and Jonathan showed him all those things. And Jonathan brought David to Saul, and he was in his presence, as beforetime.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

The mutual love of David and Jonathan is historic. There are few, if any, instances, like it in all the world. Re-read the sacred story and glimpse the shining facets of their diamond friendship.

**1. FRIENDSHIP GIVING** (1 Samuel 18:1-4). Apparently the first meeting of Jonathan and David was just after the slaying of Goliath in the valley of Elah. It will be remembered that Jonathan had himself had experience with the Philistines, having with his armor-bearer attacked a garrison at Michmash and occasioned a riot similar to that following the fall of Goliath. Between David and Jonathan, therefore, there was something common not only in character and congeniality, but also in accomplishment. When David with Goliath's head in hand was brought before the king on the field of battle, it is said "that the soul of Jonathan was knit with the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul." The association that followed only served to cement the bond of friendship. And again we are told that Jonathan and David made a cov-

enant, because he loved him as his own soul. Love expresses itself and must do so. We are not surprised, therefore, that "Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that was upon him and gave it to David, and his apparel, even to his sword, and to his bow, and to his girdle." Thus friendship stands the test of sacrifice.

**2. FRIENDSHIP INTERCEDING** (1 Samuel 9: 1-7). When Saul, exasperated in his subtle attempt to kill David, made the open plot to do so and called upon Jonathan and all his servants to compass the horrible deed, then it was that Jonathan showed his friendship for David. And he did so not only by telling David of his danger, which David doubtless already knew, but also he appealed to his father in David's behalf. The plea that he made was so frank and genuine, so compelling and so true, that the impulsive monarch swore that David should not be slain. Not only so, but under the guidance of Jonathan, a complete though temporary reconciliation was effected between Saul and David. Thus friendship stands the test of intercession.

**3. FRIENDSHIP CONFIDING** (1 Samuel 20: 1-11). When again the rage of Saul drove David into the refuge of Ramah, to whom could the fugitive look for true friendship in this trying time? In all the land there was none other, not even Samuel, the seer, who could soothe and calm the distressed soul of David as Jonathan, his friend. Each poured out his soul to the other and neither violated the confidence of the other. Said Jonathan to David: "Whatever thou soul desireth, I will even do it for thee." Said David to Jonathan: "Deal kindly with thy servant; for thou hast brought thy servant into a covenant of Jehovah with thee: but if there be in me iniquity, slay me thyself; for why shouldest thou bring me to thy father?" Did ever two souls confide more completely in each other? Thus friendship stands the test of trust.

**4. FRIENDSHIP COVENANTING** (1 Samuel 20: 12-17). Out into the open field went David and Jonathan, where they could talk without danger of being discovered. Here Jonathan told David that he would ascertain the attitude of the king toward him and be faithful in revealing it to him whether favorable or unfavorable. And then he looked beyond the present difficulty into the future, when the enemies of David should be cut off from the face of the face of the earth. The two therefore made a covenant that David should not only show kindness to Jonathan during his own life, but also that he should show it to his descendants. "And Jonathan caused David to swear again, for the love that he had to him, for he loved him as he loved his own soul." Thus friendship stands the test of compact.

**5. FRIENDSHIP CO-OPERATING** (1 Samuel 20: 18-23). The feast of the new moon was at hand. Saul would expect his family, particularly David and Jonathan, to be present at the royal feast on that occasion. However, it was agreed between the two friends that David should be absent and that Jonathan would handle the matter as wisely as he could and report to David. He would lend a helping hand to David in a crisis. Thus friendship stands the test of effort.

**6. FRIENDSHIP DEFENDING** (1 Samuel 20: 21-29). When the feast of the new moon arrived Saul did not on the first day comment on the absence of David from his table. On the next day the king inquired of his son: "Wherefore, cometh not the son of Jesse to meat, neither yesterday nor today?" Jonathan replied that David had received permission from him to go to Bethlehem for the family sacrifice in that city. Thus friendship stands the test of defense.

**7. FRIENDSHIP SUFFERING** (1 Samuel 20: 30-34). The outburst of royal anger which followed fell with fury upon the head of Jonathan. Saul thundered: "Thou son of a perverse rebellious woman, do I not know that thou hast chosen the son of Jesse to thine own shame, and unto the shame of thy mother's nakedness? For as long as the son of Jesse liveth upon the ground, thou shalt not be established, nor thy kingdom. Wherefore now send and fetch him unto me, for he shall surely die." Jonathan remonstrated, declaring, "Wherefore should he be put to death? what hath he done?" The



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only reply Saul made was to cast a javelin at Jonathan, who at once left the table in fierce anger at his father's act toward David. Thus friendship stands the test of persecution.

**8. FRIENDSHIP FULFILLING** (1 Samuel 20: 35-40). Shall Jonathan tell David exactly what has transpired at the king's table? He has promised to do so, and friendship must and will be faithful. He, therefore, takes his bow and arrows and a lad to bring back the arrows after they have been shot, and proceeds to the field where David, by prearrangement, is in concealment. By the sign of the arrow beyond the searching lad, David was informed that safety lay only in speedy flight. The lad knew not the higher meaning of the commands given him, nor would they be comprehended by any spies which the king might have looking out for David. Thus friendship stands the test of fidelity.

**9. FRIENDSHIP GRIEVING** (1 Samuel 20: 41). When Jonathan sent the lad with the bow and arrows back into the city, he and David met each other in a spot of absolute retirement. "And as soon as the lad was gone, David arose out of a place toward the south,

and fell on his face to the ground, and bowed himself three times: and they kissed one another, until David exceeded." Thus friendship stands the test of sorrow.

**10. FRIENDSHIP SUFFERING** (1 Samuel 20: 42). Though they loved each other with a quenchless love, their friendship now demanded their separation. Simple yet sublime is the story left us: "And Jonathan said unto David, Go in peace, forasmuch as we have sworn both of us in the name of Jehovah, saying, Jehovah shall be between me and thee, and between my seed and thy seed, forever. And he arose and departed: and Jonathan went into the city." Thus friendship stands the test of separation and endures throughout the years.

ON HEALTH Subjects Edited By

## Answers

1. The Question Box is a free-for-all column for the discussion of health subjects. If you have a question which you wish answered, send it to Question Box, State Department of Health, Austin. Only initials of correspondents will be used in printed articles.
2. Cities having the lowest death rates are those having modern water and sewage disposal plants, supervised milk supplies, and other applied sanitary practices.
3. At the State Department of Health Laboratory, Austin. Write for instructions as to collection and shipment of water to be tested.
4. Rickets is a disturbance of nutrition that prevents or delays the depositing of lime and phosphorus necessary to sound bone formation. Children suffering from rickets have decayed teeth and deformation of the bones of the body.
5. If infants are placed in the direct rays of the sun for a part of each day and are fed cod liver oil for the first two or three years of life, rickets would be abolished, and much good would be done in preventing decayed teeth. It is best to consult one's physician as to the length of sun baths and proper doses of cod liver oil. In beginning sun baths for a child, start with his feet, exposing them to the direct rays of the sun for 5 minutes, gradually increasing daily, length of time of exposure and surface of body exposed. However, never expose Baby's head to direct rays of sun.
6. One percent of the invisible rays of the sun are especially beneficial to health, and these are the ultra-violet rays. These rays will not penetrate ordinary glass, such as is used commonly for windows, and for this reason, the sun shining through glass, loses this health giving ray. There are a number of appliances for supplying artificial ultra-violet rays.
7. The vitamins.
8. Cod liver oil is both high and constant in the amount of Vitamin D that it provides. It is the lack of Vitamin D that causes rickets. Vitamin D is not abundant in commonly used foods. Milk, butter fat, and egg yolk being commonly used foods, which contain Vitamin D in less effective degree.
9. Mosquitoes transmit malaria, dengue and yellow fever. There are many species of mosquitoes, and some are not considered disease carriers.
10. Flies are transmitters of such filthy diseases as typhoid fever, dysentery, diarrhea, enteritis, and cholera. Flies also transmit other diseases.

## A CORRECTION

In a recent issue of the Eagle, an article in reference to the Star Farm Loan Association with the Federal Land Bank, stated that money could be borrowed on a homestead to 50 per cent of its value. As this may leave a false impression, I wish to make this correction:

Money may be borrowed on a homestead to the amount of 50 per cent of its appraised value to take up valid liens against it. That is, money may be borrowed to take up purchase money notes, or valid materialman's and mechanics lien notes, only. Money may be borrowed on land not a

homestead, whether there be any existing indebtedness against it or not.

This statement is made for the benefit of those whose homestead is now clear, and who might be led to believe from the former article, that they could borrow money on it.

Now if we increase the pay of the legislators to \$1500.00 per year, and place the county officers on a salary, it necessarily follows that we must adopt the other amendment, called the Tax Amendment, removing Constitutional limitation as to taxation in matters for state purposes. That would be fine. Just the thing. Then the legislators could make just as many large appropriations as they wish, and the governor will not have to perform the unpleasant duty of vetoing them in order to hold the appropriations within the taxable limits. Our last legislature was not very modest in their expenditures, raising salaries etc, but when we take the tax limit off, then the

sky will be the limit. Oh, you say the limit is only taken of certain classes of property. Yes, but every one knows that the consumer pays this tax at last—the farmer in Texas. He has learned that long ago, just as he has learned damage claims against railroads and other public service corporations.

Now this tax amendment is nothing new. Minnesota tried it some years ago and after the burden of taxes became so great it almost bankrupted the state, they repealed the law. California adopted it WITH A LIMITATION ON THE RATE, and after six years the burden has become so great that the tax payers are seeking to repeal the law.

There is another amendment offered. It has some merit. It limits the number of Courts of Civil Appeals to 12. As it now stands, we

could have 100—just as many as the legislature sees fit to create in order to furnish soft berths for some friend lawyer. No we may not need them. Don't think we will, but what difference does that make? Adopt the tax amendment and we will have plenty of money and why not spend it? "Jones pays the freight." In this matter I am a little like Jim. I have no objection to the judiciary amendment though it is not what I want, but for fear we may get mixed up a little, I think we had better be "agin them all."

Now the conclusion:  
Do you want to increase your taxes?—vote for the amendments.  
Do you want to take the limit off taxation?—vote for the amendments.

Do you want your homes sold for taxes?—vote for the amendments.

Do you want to be "Jones"?—vote for the amendments.  
Do you want to raise salaries?—vote for the amendments.

Do you want to put county officers on a salary and let them take things easy?—vote for the amendments.

Do you want to increase your taxes for school purposes?—vote for the amendments.

Yes, there are lots of other reasons why you should vote for the amendments, IF YOU WANT TO PAY MORE TAXES. If the people want to increase their taxes, they should come out on August 1st and vote for all of these amendments. If they do NOT wish to increase their taxes, THEY HAD BETTER COME OUT AND VOTE AGAINST THEM, because the other fellow will be there. The man who wants salaries increased

will be there. The man who wants a salary instead of his fees will be there. The man who wants an appropriation for some pet scheme will be there. The man who wants to buy your home when it is sold for taxes will be there.

Why this jumped up election on such short notice on matters affecting the people so vitally? Why not give them time to inform themselves upon the questions? Was it because the legislators thought the farmer and working man would be too busy to consider the matter and come out and vote? I don't know, but WHY? YOU HAD BETTER COME OUT AND VOTE. You had better get your NEIGHBOR to vote. If you won't come out and vote, then don't whine if the amendments are adopted and you find you are "Jones"
