DISTRICT COURT IS NOW IN SESSION

In district court this week the case of the State of Texas vs. John T. Lee, charged with robbing the Star State Bank in October of last year, has been occupying the limelight. Apparently the case will use the remainder of this week. The State's contention is that Mr. Lee robbed the bank at Star at about 11:30 o'clock on the morning of October 11 and that he went directly from Star to his home east of Lometa. Witnesses have been brought on the stand in an effort to prove his. The alleged confession of Farmer, who stated that he helped plan the robbery but had withdrawn from the scene at the last minute, is the nucleus around which the State attorney, Few Brewster, assisted by Attorney F. P. Bowman, is building its case. The practically positive identification by Miss Hattie Barr, assistant cashier of the Star State Bank, and who was in the bank at the time of the robbery, of Mr. Lee as being the robber, is one of the State's strongest pieces of evidence.

The introduction of the testimony of Dr. Beach of Hamilton yesterday afternoon changed the complexion of the case considerably. Dr. Beach testified that during January of this year a man by the name of Smith was brought to his sanitarium suffering from gun wounds and that when Smith was admitted his condition was such that he could live only a few hours he said that if he died the officers would never know who robbed the Star bank. A Mrs. Oglesby, also of Hamilton, testified that she had heard Smith state that he had locked a beautiful girl in the Star bank and scooped up the money. This evidence, backed by the testimony of several men that Mr. Lee was at Lampasas that particular day, has been the defense's main points up to date. Mr. Lee went on the stand in his own behalf late yesterday afternoon.

ON HEALTH Subjects Edited By

THIS column will be given to discussion of matters pertaining to public health. Any questions regarding public health administration, prevention of disease, child care, sanitation, etc., will be answered in succeeding issues of this paper. Questions in regard to cure of diseases will not be answered, as the scope of this Department includes only disease prevention. Address Question Box, State Department of Health, Austin.

Questions

1. How can the malarial mosquito be differentiated from other kinds of mosquitoes? (D. R., Greenville.)
2. Does the malarial mosquito also transmit the germs of dengue?
3. What are the symptoms of hookworm in children? (S. N., Bay City.)
4. What are the symptoms of whooping cough? (Mrs. A., Belton.)
5. What is the cause of measles? (Mrs. A., Belton.)
6. How is measles transmitted? (Mrs. A., Belton.)
7. Is salt necessary to life, and how much salt is needed annually by the human body? (Schoolboy, Bonham.)

8. Give what you think is necessary for the good care of the feet. (A. J. M., Hendersan.)

Answers

1. The Anopheles mosquito which is the malaria carrier, is dark brown in color, slender, and has spotted or dusky wings. It is larger than Culex, the petiferous, small mosquito that bites at any and all times, and when biting the malarial mosquito has the appearance of "standing on its head."
2. The mosquitoes that are different from the malaria carriers. The dengue carrier is known as the Aedes mosquito, and is also the carrier of yellow fever germs.
3. The usual symptoms of hookworm in children are: sal-

low complexion, lack of energy, mental dullness, and bloated abdomen.

4. Whooping cough is caused by a small bacillus which reproduces itself on the mucous of the trachea. This disease is most common up to the sixth year of life, and declines rapidly after that time. Adults rarely suffer an attack.

5. The infectious agent causing measles is yet unknown, but it is an infection of the respiratory tract.

6. Measles is contracted through direct personal contact or direct contact with fresh nasal or throat discharges from a measles victim. It is the most easily transmitted of any of the communicable diseases. The infectious agent is present in the blood of the patient as well as in the secretions from the nose and throat, even before the rash appears. Then, too, the disease is most contagious during the few days just preceding the appearance of the rash, which is a big factor in the rapid spread through a community, as numbers of children are often exposed through contact with a child, who is thought to be suffering only from a cold.

7. Ever yliving thing would perish without salt. This is true because every tissue of the body has a small content of iodine, and this is renewed by the consumption of salt. Perhaps a conservative estimate of the amount of salt required by each person for a year's time is 16 to 18 lbs.

8. Feet are marvelously built and if well treated, will give marvelous service. Faulty shoes cause more foot misery than anything else. Shoes should be fitted to the feet and not the feet forced into shoes to which they are not adapted. Ordinary care of feet require a daily bath, frequent change of hose, with shoes and hose both well

fitter, and good care of toe nails, which should be cut straight across and not slanting at the sides, as this tends to cause ingrowing toenails.

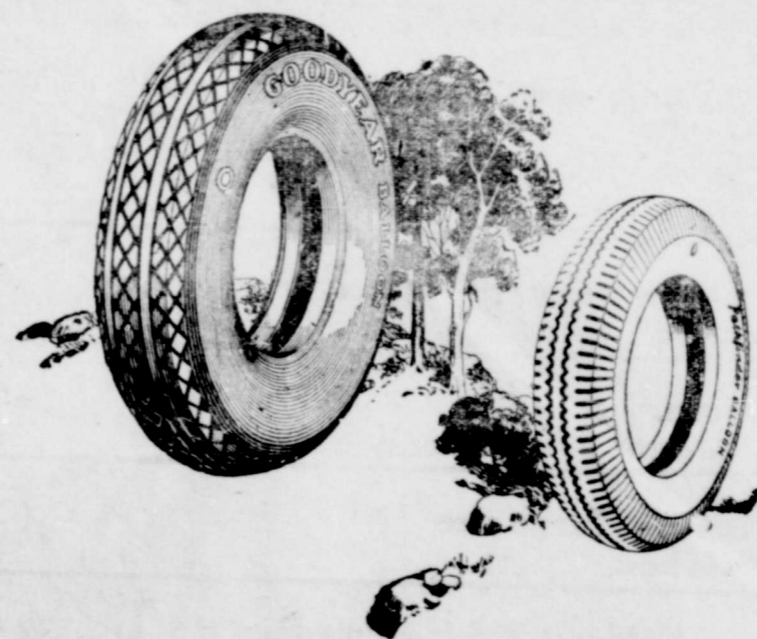

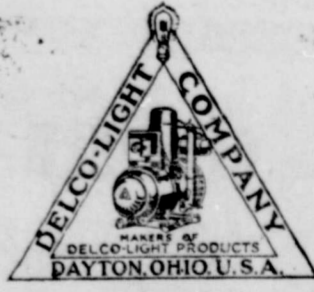

ELIJAH HEARS GOD'S VOICE

GOLDEN TEXT—Wait for Jehovah: Be strong and let thy heart take courage Psalm 27:14 Lesson Setting and Survey

The lesson of Elijah on Mount Carmel, culminating in the popular verdict for Jehovah, the slaughter of the false prophets and the bringing of the long-desired rain, was speedily followed by chilling reverses, Elijah who ran before the chariot of Ahab the eighteen miles from Carmel to Jezreel was ready to promote the reformation so spectacularly in augurated. But Bezebel threatened his life and so he fled southward 100 miles to Beer-sheba where he was strengthened for the further journey of 250 miles to the cave of Horeb among the mountains of Sinai. It was here probably in 906 B. C. that God claimed his soul and pointed out the path of future service.

Lesson Text and Outline

I LODGING IN OHIE CAVE.
9 And he came thither unto a cave, and lodged there; and, behold, the word of Jehovah came to him, and he said unto him, What doest thou here, Elijah? 10 And he said, I have been very jealous for Jehovah, the God of hosts; for the children of Jehovah have forsaken thy covenant, thrown down thine altars, and slain thine prophets with the sword; and I, only I, am left; and they seek my life, to take it away.

II. STANDING ON THE MOUNT.

11 And he said, Go forth, and stand upon the mount before Jehovah: And, behold, Jehovah passed by, and a great and strong wind rent the mountains, and brake in pieces the rocks before Jehovah; but Jehovah was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake; but Jehovah was not in the earthquake; 12 and after the earthquake a fire; but Jehovah was not in the fire; and after the fire a still small voice.

III. WRAPPED IN THE MANTLE.

13 And it was so, when Elijah herad it, that he wrapped his face in his mantle, and went out, and stood in the entrance of the cave. And, behold, there came a voice unto him, and said, What doest thou here, Elijah? 14 And he said, I have been very jealous for Jehovah, the God of hosts; for the children of Israel have forsaken thy covenant, thrown down thine altars, and slain thy prophets with the sword; and I, even only I, am left; and they seek my life, to take it away.

15 And Jehovah said unto him, Go, return on thy way to the wilderness of Damascus; and when thou comest, thou shalt anoint Hazael to be king over Syria; 16 and Jehu the son of Nimshi shalt thou anoint to be king over Israel; and Elisha the son of Shaphat of Abelmecholah shalt thou anoint to be prophet in thy room. 17 And it shall come to pass, that him that escapeth from the sword of Hazael shall Jehu slay.

Yet leave me seven thousand in Israel, all the knees which have not bowed unto Baal, and every fourth which have not kissed him.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. THE VOICE OF ATTENTION

arrested Elijah when he lodged in the cave. He was in the mount of God, rich with historic association. He may have been in the very cave occupied before by Moses. The law-restorer, like the law-giver, had just reproved a wayward and idolitrous people. To both came the divine manifestation. Elijah was far beyond the dominion of Ahab and Jezebel. But he was not beyond the reach of Jehovah. So it was that the word of Jehovah came to him in the cave: "What doest thou here, Elijah?" Was it a word of revroof for the fleeing prophet who for once had taken a journey without express direction of God? Perhaps so, though it was shot through with divine tenderness. It may have been simply the word of attention to rouse the dejected prophet and set him to new and larger tasks in the future. The answer of Elijah showed the utter agony of a bruised and saddened heart. As none ever before him he had been jealous of Jehovah, and his soul flamed when he saw Israel turn from Jehovah to idols dig down the sacred altars abolishing places of worship, killing the prophets even in depths of dejection.

II. THE VOICE OF AUTHORITY impressed Elijah when he stood on the mount. Coming out of the cave at the word of Jehovah and standing on a knoll at its mouth, he witnessed the sublimed exercise of natural forces as Jehovah passed by. First there was the rock-moving miracle that howled through the mountain gorges; then there came the crashing earthquake that shook the hills to their foundations; then the incessant lightning flamed about the rocky peaks and filled the defiles with reverberant

thunder. But out of none of these had the divine voice spoken in articulate tones to Elijah. At last in an intense, brooding, all-pervading silence the prophet heard a 'still small voice.' He knew that God was near. And what is the message to the man of deeds?

3. THE VOICE OF ACTION directed Elijah when he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood in awe at the entrance of the cave. And again to him came the question, probing his heart and proving his life: "What doest thou here, Elijah?" And again his answer flamed in burning words down the same red-hot channel as before. He pleaded his jealousy, solitariness and insecurity because of Israel's apostasy. But he was readier now to resume his labors and do what Jehovah would have done. Three commands therefore were given him: Anoint General Hazael, king of Syria as the instrument of Israel's punishment from without; Anoint Captain Jehu as king over Israel to overthrow the dynasty of Ahab and accomplish a revolution within; and anoint Elisha, from a rich valley near his own home, as successor to lead in the reformation of Israel. Elijah was further assured that the sword of Hazael, like the Horeb hurricane, would destroy many enemies; that the sword of Jehu, like the Siniatic earthquake, would also destroy many idolaters; and that the sword of Elisha, like the thunderstorm, would clear the air for a better day. Moreover he was assured that the still small voice had been heard and was being heeded by the 7,000 who had not bowed to Baal in reverence nor kissed his image in adoration. Thus Elijah learned that gentleness is a part of om-

nipotence and that toil is a relief from care.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT YOUR WATCH

A watch ticks 5 times per second, 300 times per minute, 18000 times per hour, and 432,000 times per day. The tick is caused by the impact of the escape wheel tooth against the pallet jewels. Some high grade watches are under construction for approximately a year and require more than 3500 operations to complete them. Approximately eighty five per cent of the cost of a high grade watch is labor. Your watch should be cleaned and oiled at least every eighteen months to give the best results. If your watch misses one tick every hour, it will lose approximately 33 seconds a week. Your watch should be wound at regular time and always wind it fully up. If you should ever get your watch wet, open the case and immerse the entire watch in kerosene oil or gasoline. This will prevent the watch from rusting and save the loss of your watch. If your watch fails to tick and perform its duty as it should take it to a reliable watchmaker that has a reputation of knowing his business, and as a reliable work man and then you will get dependable service and your watch will be put in perfect order for time keeping and will last many years.

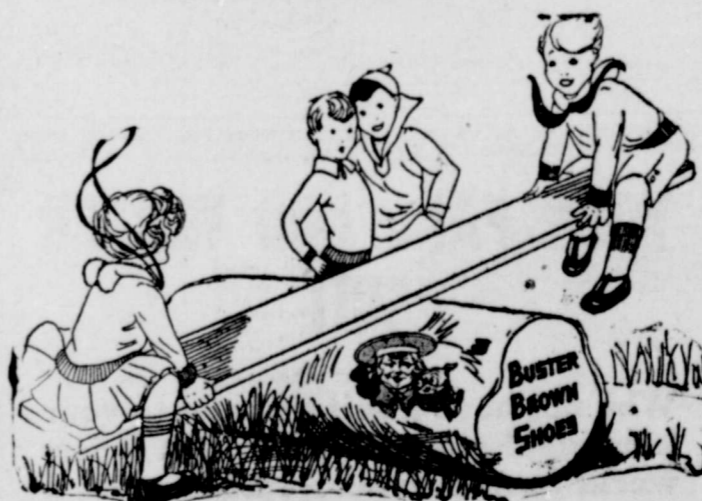

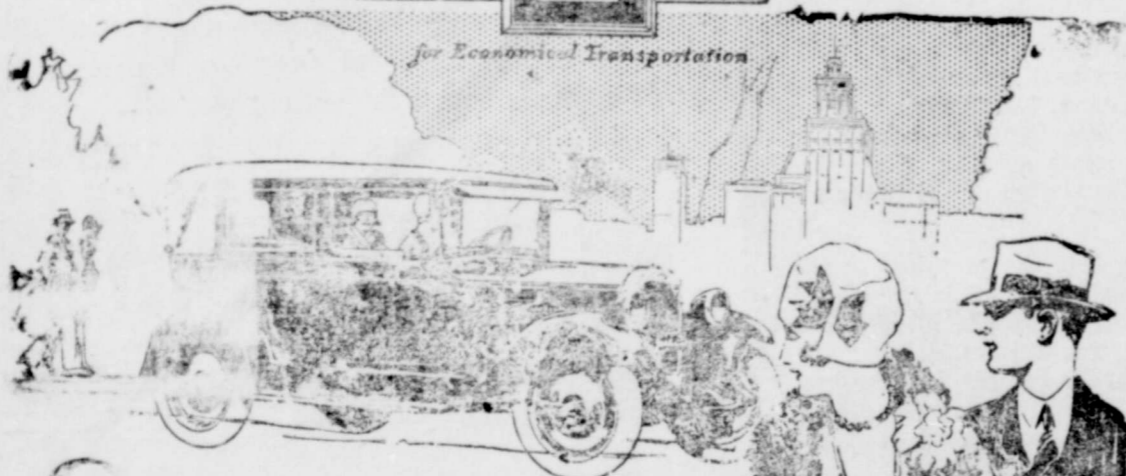
