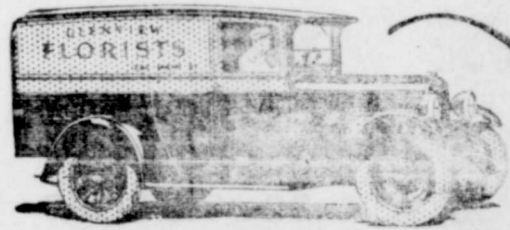

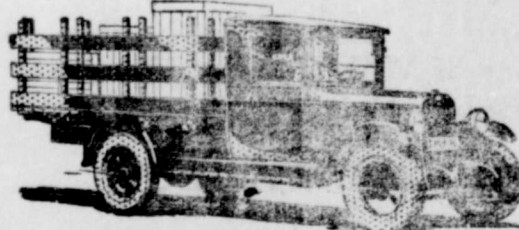

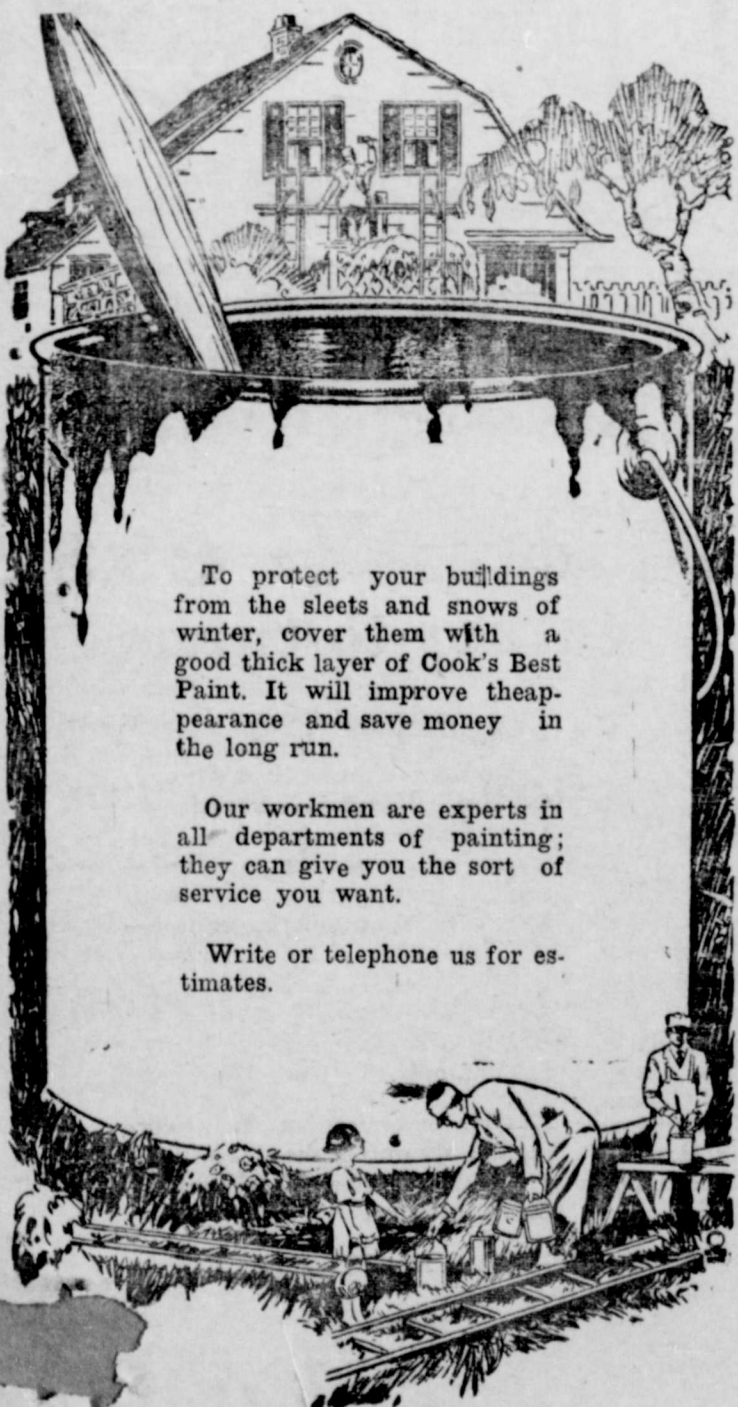

A TRIBUTE TO FATHER

(Written and read by Mrs. W. N. Griffin for last Mothers' Day at Big Valley, published by request.)

We have met today to pay homage to the Mothers and Fathers of all nations. It has been our custom for the past few years to observe Mother's Day, but Fathers have been left out. It has not been thru negligence but by custom that he has not been honored with Mother, for we love and honor him as the bravest hero of the world. So today we pay him the same tribute as we do to our dear mothers.

God in His wisdom in creating fathers and mothers, He so willed that mothers should come first in our hearts. She is first in our lives and last in our deaths. Even our blessed Savior, as He hung on the cross, his last earthly thoughts were of his mother.

A child is the most helpless being for the longest period of time of any living creature. And both parents usually give the best part of their lives that it may have the necessities and comforts of life. So while the mother rocks the cradle and cares for the little one at home the father is toiling from early till late for food and shelter and rament for his family. For it is upon his shoulders that the burden of being the protector and life sustaining force rests. And often in silence undergoing hardships, privations and self-denials of which his unselfish heart never complains—not even to mother.

It has been especially for a boy without means to start in married life and often in trying to maintain his family has gone far beyond his natural strength that his loved ones might have a home and the comforts and opportunities that he desires to give them.

He longs to give his wife a home as good as the one she left and his children better advantages than he himself enjoyed; that they might be able to grasp the opportunities of life as they are presented, and not be compelled to pass thru the struggles that he has experienced. So he toils on, year after year. His life is so full of care and his burdens grow so heavy at times they seem heavier than he can bear and under the strain he becomes stooped and gray. He goes shabbily dressed. His clothes are worn thin. Young folks, and sometimes even his own children think him old fashioned and foggy. Certainly he seems old fashioned. What person does not cherish the memory of the home coming of Father from town. One's heart still feels the thrills of rapture as he recalls the times in childhood when Father appeared in sight on these return trips. The things he brought us to eat were so good. Nothing since has tasted quite so delicious, and the costliest gift today would not mean half so much to us as some little trinket Father brought home years ago.

So today we honor the mem-

ory of the fathers gone on. Their labors were not in vain, but crowned with success. While to the living we bestow the highest honor ever placed upon man—that of being equal to mother. A king on his throne has never had a higher tribute paid to him than we offer to you today.

Then be brave and faithful, be guided by that all-wise hand so that when the evening of life draws near you will feel that the toils of the day have been nothing and that your life has been well spent. When dear children shall stand by you and say as the poet has said:

"Such dear, beautiful hands, They are growing feeble now, Time and toil have left their mark

On hand and heart and brow. Alas, alas! the nearing time, The sad, sad day for me, When 'neath the daises cold and white

These hands will folded be. But Oh! beyond the shadowy land,

Where all is bright and fair, I know full well these dear old hands

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1927

AMOS DENOUNCES SIN

GOLDEN TEXT—Seek good, and not evil, that ye may live; and so Jehovah, the God of Hosts, will be with you, as ye say. Amos 5:14

Lesson Setting And Survey
The lightnings of divine wrath were leveled at the national sins of the day by Amos, the herds-man-prophet of Tekoa about the middle of the eighth century before Christ. A native of the southern kingdom of Judah and prophet to the northern kingdom of Israel, he began by pronouncing the judgment of Jehovah upon neighboring nations; upon Damascus, the capital of Syria on the north; upon Gaza, the capital of Philistia on the southwest; upon Tyre, the Phoenician metropolis on the northwest; upon Edom and Ammon and Moab, the countries on the southeast and east. Then with culminative emphasis he centered his fire against Judah and Israel who, because of their greater light, were guilty of greater sin and worthy of heavier condemnation.

Lesson Text and Outline
I. DENUNCIATION OF JUDAH.

4 Thus saith Jehovah: For three transgressions of Israel, yea, for four, I will not turn away the punishment thereof; because they have sold the law of Jehovah, and have not kept his statutes, and their lies have caused them to err, after their fathers did walk. 5 But I will send a fire upon Judah, and it shall devour the palaces of Jerusalem.

II. THE DENUNCIATION OF

ISRAEL.

6 Thus saith Jehovah: For three transgressions of Israel, yea, for four, I will not turn away the punishment thereof; because they have sold the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of shoes: 7 they that pant after the dust of the earth on the head of the poor, and turn aside the way of the meek: and a man and his father go unto the same maiden to profane my holy name: 8 and they lay themselves down beside every altar upon the clothes taken in pledge, and in every house of their God they drink the wine of such as have been fined.

III. THE DESTRUCTION OF THE AMORITES.

9 I brought you up from the land of Egypt, and led you forty years in the wilderness, to possess the land of the Amorite. 11 And I raised up your sons for prophets, and of your young men for Nazarites. Is it not even thus, O ye children of Israel? saith Jehovah. 12 But ye gave the Nazarites wine to drink and commanded the prophets, saying, Prophecy not.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. **THE GODWARD ASPECT OF SIN** appears in the judgment pronounced upon Judah. The nation must reckon with Jehovah. He speaks in explicit and emphatic terms. He knows the catalogue of iniquities both individual and national. He will certainly punish sin and nothing but divine grace can avert its penalty. So the prophet calls attention first to the sins and then the penalty awaiting the people of Judah.

the kingdom of the south. (1) What were the sins? All other nations were judged for their hospitality to the chosen people. But Judah must be judged in the whiter light and on the higher ground of its relation to God. As to the word of God they had rejected it. As to the work of God they had failed to keep the divine statutes and perform the divine commandments. As to the worship of God they had turned away from the sanctuary only to accept the lies involved in idolatry which caused them to err from the right path and duplicate the deeds of the idolatrous fathers in the days of old. (2) What was the penalty? The standards of right and wrong are exacting. Pagan nations will not be punished while the chosen people guilty of the same sins go free. So the clear visioned prophet foresaw the fire that should consume the southern kingdom. Think, in the light of later events, how accurately the doleful prediction came true. The siege of Nebuchadnezzar was a conflagration which left in utter ruin the palaces of Jerusalem.

2. **THE MANWARD ASPECT OF SIN** appears in the judgment pronounced upon Israel. Ten glaring sins of the northern kingdom are depicted: (1) There was corruption through commercial chicanery and in judicial bribes in dealings with the righteous, because of their asserted goodness. (2) There was also bribery in the maltreatment of the needy who were caught in the whirlpool of misfortune. (3) There was continual oppression of the poor who could not extricate themselves from their hardship. (4) There was perversion of the meek who in their gentleness were thrust aside

from the way of rectitude. (5) There was immorality amounting to incest of the basest type. (6) There was irreverence which desecrated the altar and profaned the holy name of God. (7) There was idolatry of the most subtle type which worshiped idols while professing to worship God. (8) There was the most heartless illegality of retaining overnight the pawned clothes of the poor, contrary to the Mosaic law. (9) There was intemperance, for wine flowed freely and strong drink overthrew strong men and the body politic was weakened to the point of impotence. (10) There was rank and flagrant injustice in fines and bribes reeking in fraud and lusting after gold.

3. THE SELFWARD ASPECT OF SIN appears in indifference to the warning from the destruction of the Amorites

(1) The overthrown Amorites, representing the seven nations of ancient Canaan, were mighty in their day. They occupied their strongholds in security. They drove back the enemies in dismay. Unshaken and apparently invincible they possessed the stateliness of the tall cedar and he strength of the mighty oak. Was there nobody who could dislodge and destroy them? Let history make the answer. Jehovah alone could and did destroy them, root and branch. (2) The delivered Hebrews had every incentive to right living. It was God who had brought them with a mighty hand out of Egypt. It was he who had led them despite their unbelief and wickedness through the devious and dangerous wilderness. It was he who had stopped the flooded Jordan for their passage into the Land of Promise which he gave them in

fulfillment of his word. He had raised up among them prophets who revealed the divine law to them and Nazirites to live out their ideals among them. (3) The sinning Israelites, however did not learn the lesson of warning from the Amorites nor the lesson of mercy from their own national history. Instead of magnifying the Nazirites they sought to lead them astray through ceremonial defilements which they abhorred and by wine drinking from which they were totally to abstain. Moreover, the prophets among them were not permitted to open their mouths in proclamation of the word of God.

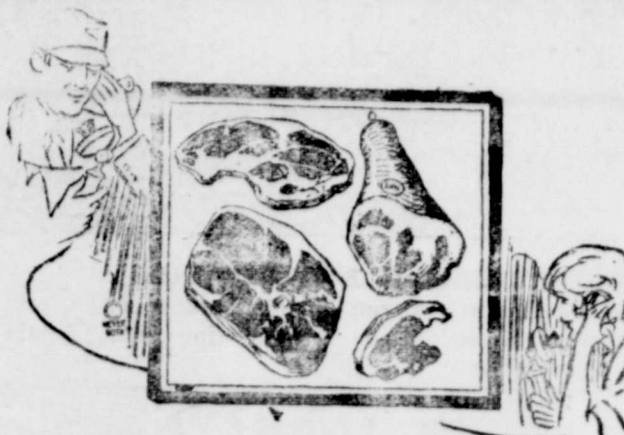

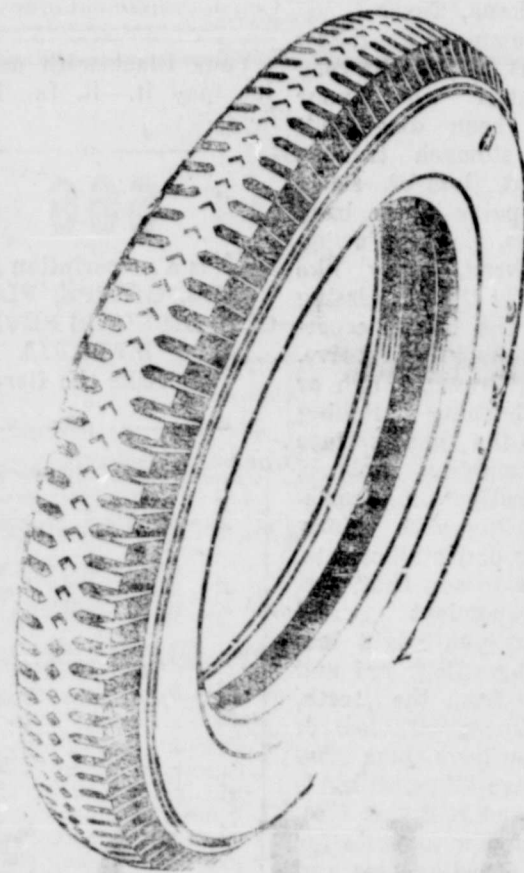

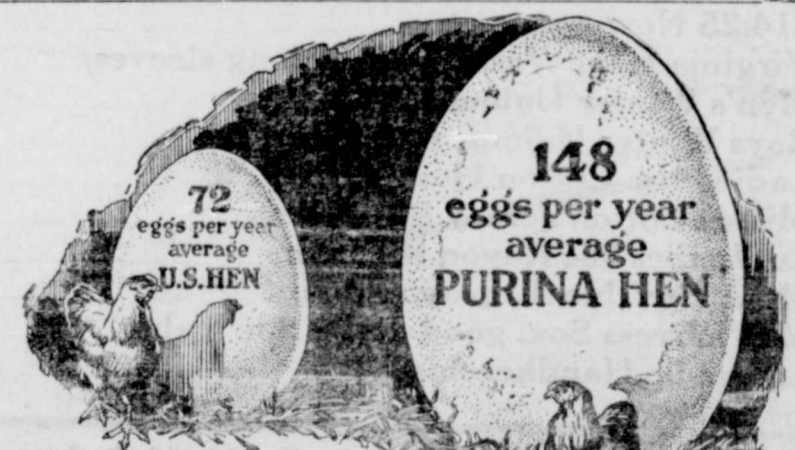
