BROTHER OF A. J. HARRISON DIES AT BROWNWOOD HOME

G. N. Harrison, prominent lawyer and financier and brother of Postmaster A. J. Harrison, died at his home in Brownwood suddenly last Saturday afternoon. Death resulted from heart failure. The funeral was at Brownwood Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock and was attended by quite a number of Goldthwaite friends of Judge Harrison, by A. J. Harrison and family and Mr. and Mrs. Haynes Harrison.

The report of Mr. Harrison's death and burial, as given by the Brownwood News, and which shows the esteem in which he was held by Brownwood folk, follows:

"Judge Gilbert Newton Harrison died suddenly at a result of a heart attack at his home at 803 Center Avenue, Saturday afternoon, November 26, about 2 o'clock. Funeral services were held at the family residence at 3:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. John Power, rector of the St. John's Episcopal church officiating. Rev. C. A. Johnson, pastor of the First Christian church assisted in the services, and Judge C. L. McCartney intimate friend of deceased, made a brief talk, paying a loving tribute (Continued on last page)

SOME BULL

Recently an article appeared in a well known political organ under the caption "More Bull" which was suggestive of the contents of the entire discussion. We hope to discuss the need of better dairy cows in Mills County in subsequent issues of this paper and here after may appropriate the en- phamous caption "More Bull."

The need of better dairy cows in this section is apparent. No one disputes this. But we are not making the progress. Rather we are going backward steadily and rapidly.

As long as scrub bulls are used the offspring of our best cows will produce less than their dams. Even scrub bulls might improve the offspring of our average cow.

The logical way to improve our dairy herds is by the bull route. The logical bull route is by bull circles. The organization of four bull circles means that four communities or groups of farmers will get the service of good bulls for eight years for the cost of one bull.

U. S. Department of Agriculture Bulletin No. 3, "Proved Dairy Sires," gives this conclusion:

"The daughters of average sires in cow testing associations produced 18 pounds, or 5.1 per cent more butter fat than the dams of the daughters. The daughters of average "proved" sires produced 38 pounds, or 10.9 per cent, more butterfat than the dams; and the daughters of average sires and average cows produced 121 lbs, or 67.6 per cent more than their dams.

"Good proved dairy sires should double the production of the average dairy herd on two or three generations. A tabulation of 100,000 yearly individual cow records has shown that cows that produce twice as much as the average cows of this country require about 40 per cent more feed.

ISIAH TEACHES RIGHT LIVING

GOLDEN TEXT—Pure religion, and undefiled before our God and Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world.

Lesson Setting and Survey

In Isiah's parable of the vineyard there is a vivid picture of Israel and Judah which despite all the care of the Divine Owner bore nothing but wild grapes. Of course wickedness invites woe, and so the curtain falls upon the wreck that results from such fruitlessness and rebellion against God.

Lesson Text and Outline
I. OPPORTUNITY FOR RIGHT LIVING.

Let me sing for my well-beloved a song of my beloved touching his vineyard. My well-beloved had a vineyard in a very fruitful hill: 2 and he digged it, and gathered out the stones thereof and planted it with the choicest vine, and also built a tower in the midst of it, and also hewed out a wind press therein: and he looked that it should bring forth grapes, and it brought forth wild grapes.

And now, O inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, judge, I pray you, betwixt me and my vineyard. 4 What could have been done more to my vineyard, that I have not done in it? wherefore, when I looked that it should bring forth grapes, but brought it forth wild grapes? 5 And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard: I will take away the hedge thereof and it shall be eaten up; I will break down the wall thereof, and it shall be trodden down; 6 and I will lay it waste; it shall not be pruned nor hoed: but there shall come up briars and thorns: I will also command the clouds that they rain no more upon it.

7 For the vineyard of Jehovah of hosts is the house of Israel, and the men of Judah his pleasant plant: and he looked for justice, but behold, oppression; for righteousness, but behold, a cry.

II. WOES UPON WRONG LIVING.

8 Woe upon them that join house to house, that lay field to field, till there be no room, and ye may be made to dwell alone in the midst of the land! 9 In mine ears saith Jehovah of hosts, Of a turnth many houses shall be desolate, even great and fair, without inhabitant. 10 For ten acres of vineyard shall yield one bath, and a homer of seed shall yield but an ephah. 11 Woe unto them that rise up early in the morning, that they might follow strong drink; that tarry late into the night, till wine enflame them! 12 And the harp and the lute, the tabret and the pipe, and wine, are in their feasts; but they regard not the work of Jehovah, neither have they considered the operation of his hands.

The Lesson of the Lesson
Live Right

(1) Live the Godly Life. "My vineyard." We are purchased with a price. We are not our own. We belong to God. Ought we not to be like him? Ought we not live for him? How else can we please him than by doing what he desires?

(2) Live the Grateful Life. "Let me sing." God is the giver of all good. We ought to be grateful for his goodness. In everything it is our duty to give thanks. Christianity is a singing religion. Our lives should be rich in melody and sweet in song.

(3) Live the Nourished Life. "In a very fruitful hill." God did not take Israel into the wilderness without providing manna for their sustenance. God never sends us to the task of

any day without giving the ration needed for the day. He plants his vineyards in fertile soil. If we are not nourished into strength, the fault is ours alone.

(4) Live the Cultivated Life. "He digged it." It takes more cultivation than we are aware to keep us growing spiritually. It may be that we sometimes question, if we do not resent, the divine digging about us. But he is simply putting at our disposal a wider richness of soil.

(5) Live the Cleansed Life. "Gather out the stones thereof." What spot of human nature is not overstrewn with unproductive boulders? It may be that actually we take some pride and pleasure in some of them. But they do not fit into the purpose. Let the rocks go! God himself gathers them out, for he has no use for them. Certainly we can spare them if God wants them removed.

(6) Live the Consecrated Life. "Planted with the choicest vine." God has a plan for every life. He knows what it is capable of producing. He sets in it the choicest vine not alone that it can sustain but the choicest care that can be found anywhere. He consecrates that life to that particular task. Why should we be ever unwilling to fit ourselves into the plans and purposes of God?

(7) Live the Protected Life. "Built a tower in the midst of it." The watchman is needed night and day. He is needed particularly at the time of fruit-bearing. The tower therefore has its place in every heart. God provides it for our protection. Are we willing for the watchman to keep his eye upon us?

(8) Live the Projected Life. "Hewed out a windpress therein." The anxious husbandman expected from his vineyard not only the rich cluster of grapes when they were ripe, but also the fruit of the vine that could be kept for another season and transmitted to others than those who could visit the vineyard personally. So our good deeds are to be conserved for later use and transmitted to others beyond our horizon.

(9) Live the Productive Life. "He looked that it should bring forth grapes"—he looked for justice—for righteousness. The owner had a right to expect something from his vineyard. He had bought it. He had planted it. He had cultivated it. He had pruned and developed the vines. And his entire purpose was to gather fruit from it. Of what use to anybody at anytime is an unproductive life?

(10) Live the Learning Life. "Regard the work of Jehovah—considered the work of his hands." Be warned by those who failed and fell. Seek first the Kingdom. Put uppermost the work of Jehovah. Consider what he has done and what he wants us to do. Learn daily and diligently from him. Thus life will grow in capacity, in power and influence for good.

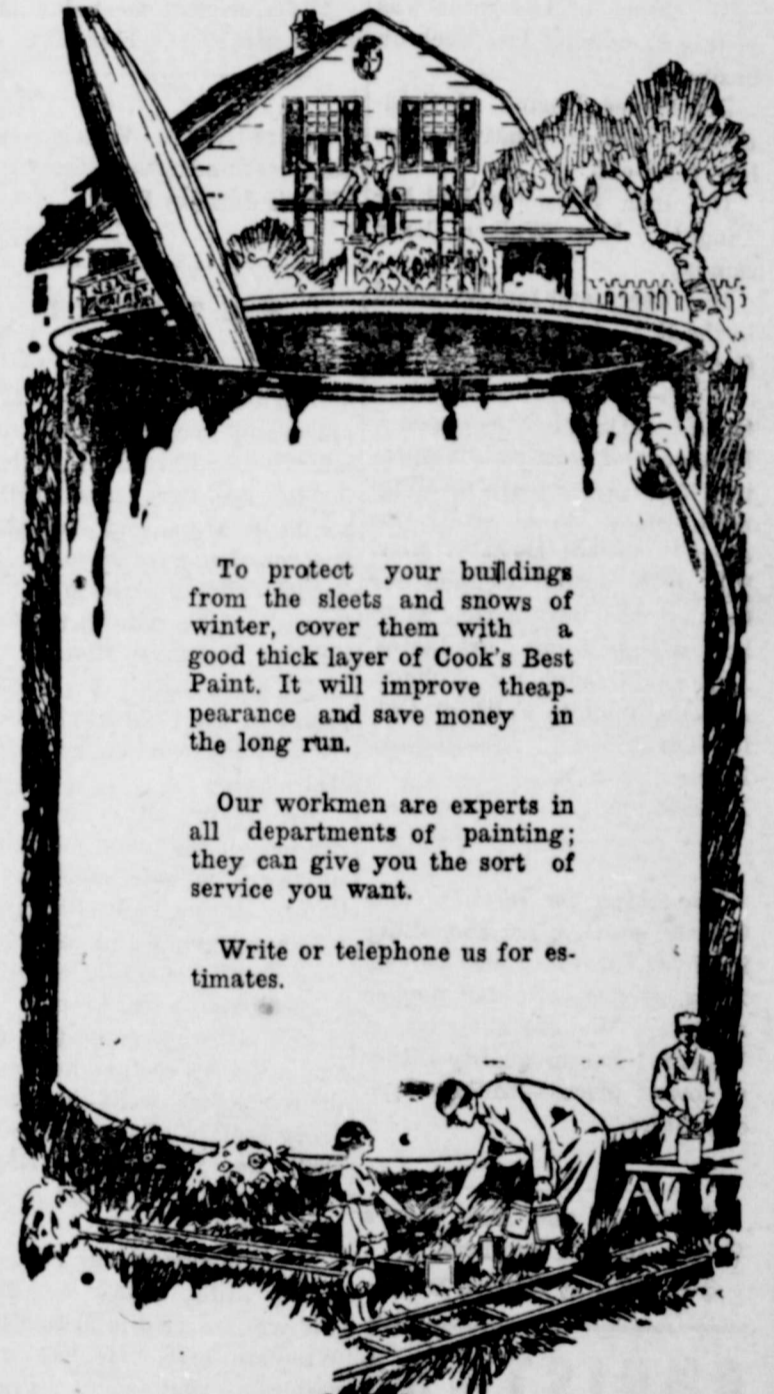

Mrs. Gillespie they will join the Eagle in offering what sympathy it is possible to bestow on account of their inestimable loss.

The Monday evening's Dallas Times-Herald had the following account of the accident:

Falling into a tailspin shortly after taking off against a treacherous wind, two youthful aviators were killed at Love Field Monday noon as their plane crashed from an altitude of 300 feet and burst into flames, burning their bodies beyond recognition.

They were:
Jack Gage, 18, licensed pilot, 4616 Ross avenue.

J. C. Gillespie, mechanic, 109 W. Tenth street.

Both were employed by Goode and Foster, commercial aviators, and were flying a company "Curtiss Canuck" plane.

The flyers appeared to have had engine trouble shortly after taking off, and were banking for a turn to return to the field.

Plane Falls Into Spin.

Witnesses saw the plane tilt over, as though caught by a sudden gust of wind and fall into a spin. Gage at the controls, strove to "straighten it out," the ship plunged downward, crashing at the southwest corner of the field.

The ship burst into flames before would-be rescuers could reach it, and the bodies of the occupants were practically cremated.

Gusty weather conditions was blamed for the tragedy, which was the first fatal crash at the local flying field since Carter Leach, also a youthful pilot, was killed in a crash on June 15, 1925.

Was Licensed Pilot.

Gage was a licensed pilot and is said to have had about fifty hours experience. Fellow flyers said that he was a competent pilot and the ship he was flying with Gillespie as a passenger, was in good condition.

Flying officials at the field were making a thorough investigation of the crash in an effort to determine the exact cause of the accident Monday afternoon. Their findings will be turned over to Parker D. Cramer, government inspector for the department chamber of commerce, who will conduct a formal investigation, it was announced.

Thousands of persons attracted to the scene of the tragedy by the sirens of ambulances, gathered to see the funeral pyre of the two dead flyers. The flames were extinguished by the Love Field fire apparatus, but only after the machine had been reduced to charred, twisted wreckage.

Byron Goode, owner of the hangar where the two men worked, declared that he could not account for the crash. He was not at the hangar when the accident occurred. He was deeply affected by the tragedy.

Gage had been flying at the field for about two years, he said.

Ross Arnold, expert pilot, declared that the plane suddenly went into the spin and turned around twice before hitting the ground and bursting into flames.

Within a few minutes after the crash the field was crowded. Four ambulances arrived before the bodies were taken to the morgue of Loudermilk & Sparkman.

Both flyers appeared to have received injuries which caused instant death. So far as could be learned, neither made an effort to escape from the plane after the crash before it burst into flames.

Mr. Goode, Ross Arnold and other flyers at the field declar-

to his friend and fellow citizen.

Interment was made in Greenleaf cemetery. Mrs. J. J. Timmins had charge of the service. The entire membership of the Rotary Club, and members of the local bar attended in a body.

Active pall-bearers were: E. P. Woodruff, Robert Holloway, F. W. Greber, John T. Yantis, J. H. McKee, Dr. W. H. Paige, Jas. W. Wayman and S. E. Morris. Honorary pall-bearers included about sixty prominent lawyers, bankers, and business men from all parts of the state, in addition to members of the local bar and other prominent citizens of Brownwood.

Judge Gilbert Newton Harrison was born in Green county, Tenn., on May 7, 1866. Three years later his parents moved to Carroll county, Mo., where he grew to manhood. His father died when he was only five years of age, and the mother passed away when he was a lad of sixteen. Up to this time, young Harrison had had no opportunity to attend school and it was not until two or three years later that he was able to take up his studies and get an education.

After completing high school, he took a short normal course, and began teaching school, in the meantime studying law. In the fall of 1892 he entered the law department of the University of Michigan, and so assiduously did he apply himself, that he completed the course within a year, leaving the institution with an LL. B. degree.

Coming to Texas in 1893, he located at Goldthwaite, where he practiced law for three years, and then came to Brownwood, which place he had

ed the plane was in good condition and was inspected each day under the rules of aviation set down by the federal government.

The same ship which crashed Monday has been used at the field for teaching pilots. It was licensed under the federal regulations, and the log which is kept shows the ship had been regularly inspected.

Gage lived with his mother at 4516 Ross avenue. He had been at Love Field for eighteen months. In his immediate family he is survived by his mother, two sisters, Helen and Mada, and a brother, Guy E. Gage. He also is survived by an aunt, Mrs. C. H. Sherman, and two uncles, B. M. and G. E. William son.

since made his home, and where he continued the practice of his profession, and in which he was eminently successful.

On February 14, 1905, Mr. Harrison was married in this city to Miss Belle Grinnan. To this union three children were born, all of whom, together with the wife, survive. The surviving children are Mrs. W. Franklin Jones of Marshall, Texas; Gilbert N. Harrison, Jr., who is a student in the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, Michigan; and Miss Anna Belle, who is a student in the Miss Hockady School for Girls at Dallas. He is also survived by one brother, A. J. Harrison, of Goldthwaite and two sisters, Miss Emma Harrison of Goldthwaite and Mrs. A. W. Beck of Hale, Mo., besides a large number of nieces and nephews in this and other states. One of the nephews is N. A. Cropp, well known farmer-ranchman of this county.

In 1904 Judge Harrison organized the West Texas Telephone Co., and from the date of its organization until his death had served as its president. He was also vice president of the First National Bank in this city; a director in the Universal Automobile Insurance Co. of Dallas, and a heavy stockholder in the Texas Power & Light Co.

Judge Harrison had, for many years been prominent in Texas Republican political circles, and on several occasions in the past had been selected by leaders of that organization as their candidate for some important state office. He had always been a delegate from this state to several of the Republican national conventions.

As a mark of respect to this worthy and well-beloved citizen, the banks of the city were closed during the afternoon of the funeral, and all the switchboards of the West Texas Telephone Co. were silent for one minute at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

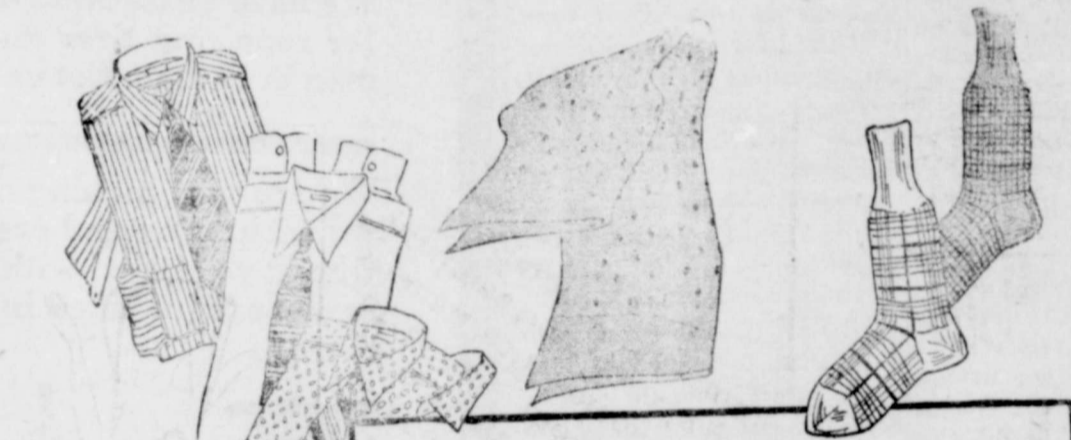

REPORT ON SALES OF STATE COTTON

Up to the 21st of October, 1927, State Cotton Classifier W. E. Williams had classed and sold a total of 6,731 bales of cotton grown upon the State Prison Farms.

This cotton weighed better than three and one-third millions pounds of lint and averaged approximately 23 cents, bringing a grand total of slightly under \$750,000.

The premiums received for this cotton above Houston quotations for same grades on date of sales, averaged nearly \$13 per bale. This makes a total premium of all State cotton sold up to this date of \$85,435.88.

This enormous premium is the result of the improvement in the character of cotton grown on the State farms and proper grading, stapling and selling of same, which has been conducted by Mr. Williams, one of the Cotton Classers of the State Department of Agriculture.

If the four million bales of cotton grown in Texas could be sold on its proper grade, staple and weight, and average only five dollars per bale premium, it would amount to twenty million dollars saved to the farmers. Why don't they organize and sell cotton on proper grade and staple through their own agency and save this tremendous loss?

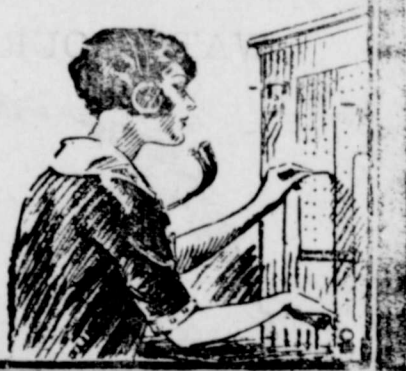

IV. The Fire Stifled. If the fire is not actively spreading, it dies, stifled in its own ashes. Spread the fire, by devoted love and work for others.

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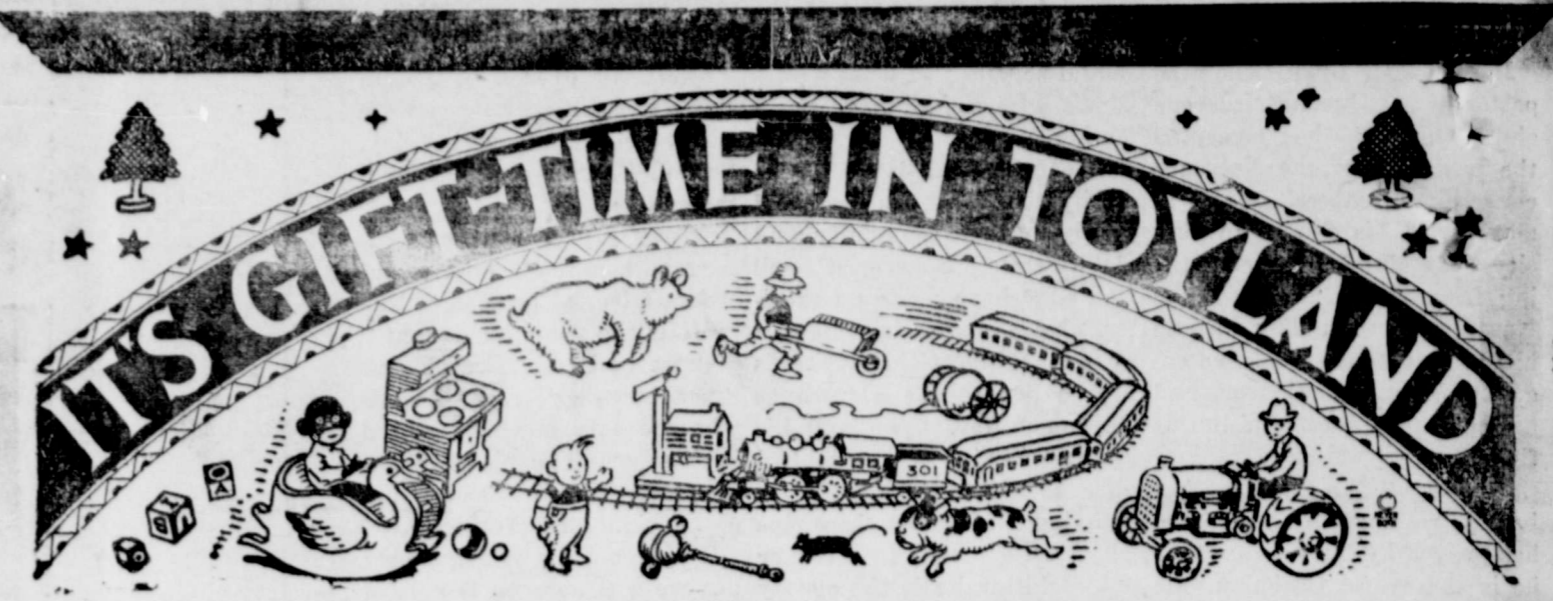
