## NEW GOLDTHWAITE SANITARIUM TO BE OPENED TO PUBLIC NEXT SUNDAY—YOU ARE INVITED OUT

The new \$15,000.00 sanitarium which has been built for Dr. R. A. Swanger in the western portion of Goldthwaite is about completed and a house warming program will be held there next Sunday. The public is cordially invited to attend and inspect Goldthwaite's sanitarium. A program will be given during the day.

The expenditures of this Health Home exceeds \$15,000 and fully \$10,000 of the total amount has been spent with home people. All labor and the project was done by Mills County men with the exception of one rock mason, who lives at Lometa and the architect and contractor, Mr. D. B. McCall of San Antonio, and well does the building bespeak of his ability and intelligence as an efficient architect and builder.

There is no doubt that this institution will be a boon to the health seekers of this section of central Texas.

### 60 GALLON STILL CAPTURED BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPT.

This still—of about 60 gallons per day capacity, was an exceptionally well made one. 14 barrels of mash was found with it. The plant was located on the Mrs. A. J. Kelso place across the Bayou. No one lives on this place.

The sheriff's department had located this still a few days before and a watch was kept on it all night Friday. At about 8:00 o'clock Saturday morning—having decided that no one would appear—Sheriff Bledsoe and R. V. Littlepage went from their hiding place to the still and found Frank Williams there. Mr. Williams stated that he had just happened upon the still. However, he was arrested and brought to town. A complaint was filed against him. He waived examining trial and was released on \$500 bond.

### J. W. DRISKILL DEAD

J. W. Driskill, pioneer cattleman of this section, but who had lived in south Texas for the past few years, died at his home Tuesday and was brought to Goldthwaite on the Wednesday morning train. His funeral was held at the Christian church at 10:00 o'clock Wednesday morning and interment was at the Old Fellows cemetery immediately afterwards.

Mr. Driskill, for many years was one of the leading citizens of Mills County, having been engaged in business a number of times and having been one of the wealthiest cattlemen in this section.

He leaves several children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, none of whom live in this county now. However a son and a daughter live at Zephyr.

This year the Fair will hold July 17, 18, 19, and is the first Fair in the newly formed Heart of Texas Circuit. Under the new arrangement there will be no more conflicting dates as have been heretofore. To bring this about, we had to accept this early date.

Stockholders in the Fair Association might be interested to know that in two years the original stock has returned nearly 75 cents on the dollar invested and the earnings have been applied to premiums and to expanding the equipment. When sufficient equipment has been installed, this stock should pay a handsome dividend.

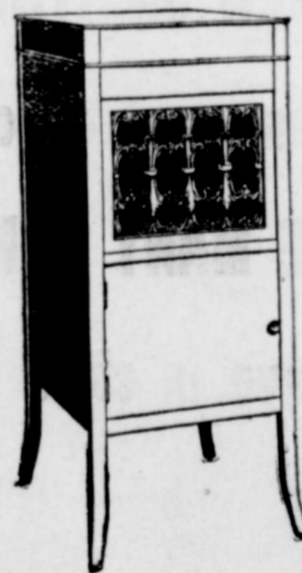

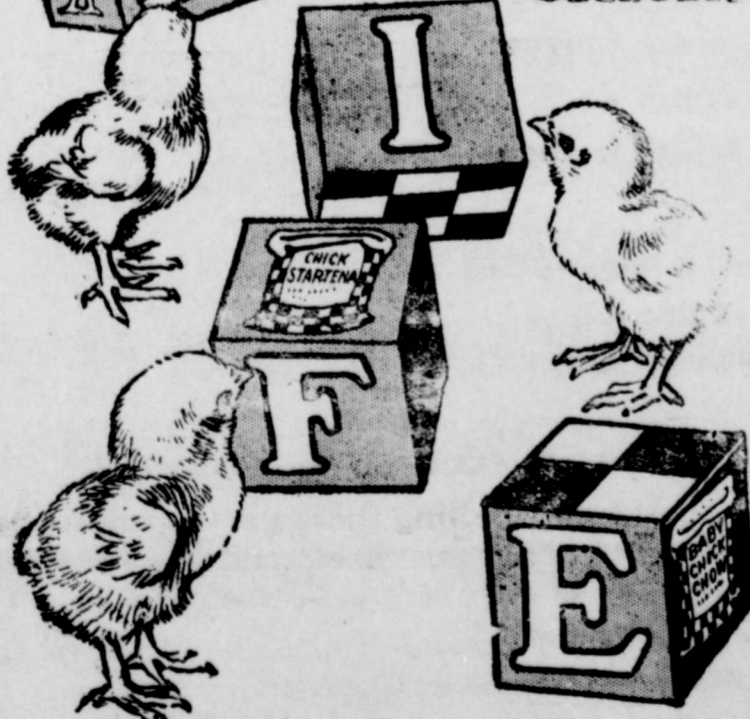

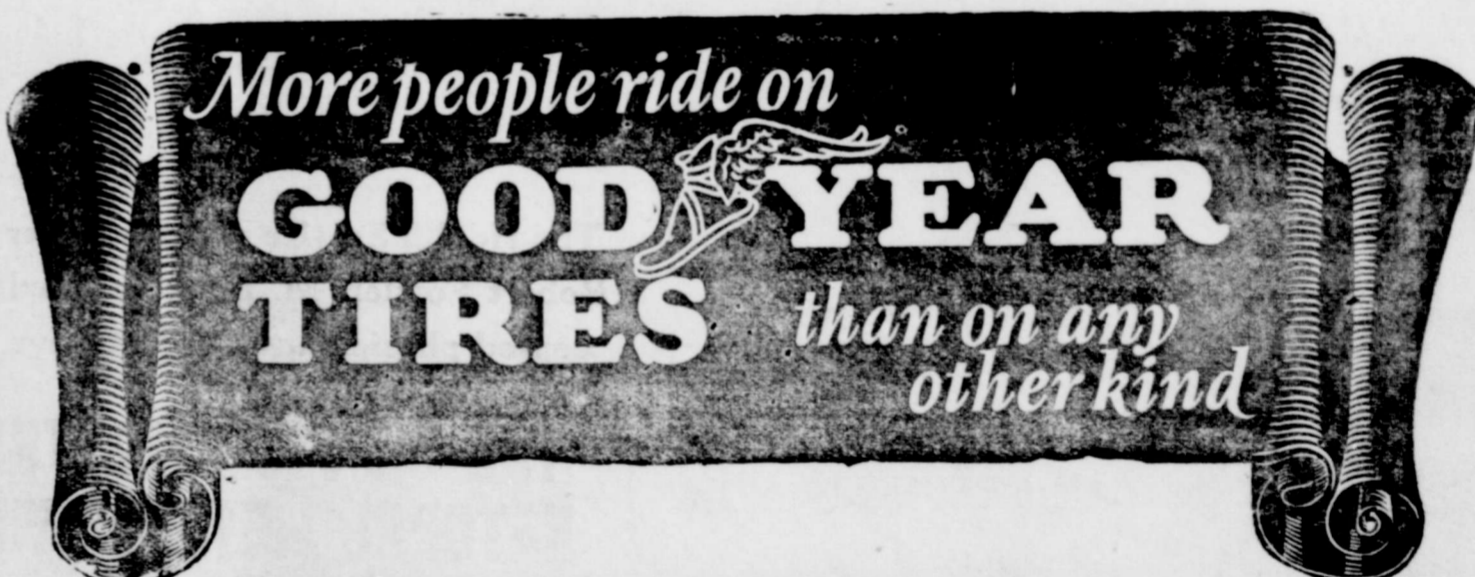

gresses would be cut in half,  
which would cut taxes in half,  
for every dollar comes from  
the people in taxes. I have  
never yet taken any junket;  
neither has any member of my  
family. I carefully compare  
all annual supply bills with  
those of previous years, and  
have saved millions by knock-  
ing unauthorized riders with  
my proper points of order. By dig-  
ging up records and briefing  
facts, I have blocked many bad  
claims. By posting myself, I  
have stopped many pet schemes.  
But I made enemies both of  
my Colleagues and the Press  
Gallery. It was hard work that  
should be done by somebody.  
I did it. I have not missed a  
roll call this session. I did not  
miss any last session. During  
the last two sessions of the 67th  
Congress, Mr. Ricketts and  
myself were the only two mem-  
bers who answered all roll calls.

Some involving \$100,000,000 still  
pending; with the business con-  
nections and the idiosyncrasies  
of Senators, Congressmen, and  
lobbyists, with whose shrewd-  
est leaders we must measure  
swords; and I have spent all of  
my vacations in investigating  
and checking up every estab-  
lishment of Government. I have  
found out exactly what they  
do with their annual millions,  
and just how little some of  
them benefit the people. Many  
should be abolished. I have  
found waste galore, extravag-  
ance beyond computation and  
much graft. And I am making  
against them all a determined  
fight. If we people could get  
100 cents value for every dol-  
lar expended, our annual ex-  
penditure would be \$100,000,000.  
**For All Good Measures;**

**Against All Bad Ones**

During my eleven years in  
the House I have helped to pass  
every good law, and have vig-  
orously and uncompromisingly  
fought every bad measure. By  
years of close study and appli-  
cation I have mastered the  
rules and precedents of both  
House and Senate. They are  
tools without which one is im-  
potent. I know how to find  
camouflaged legislative riders  
in appropriation bills, and how

when, and where, to make  
proper points of order to elimi-  
nate them. I am intimately fa-  
miliar with the business, func-  
tions, scope and history of all  
departments, bureaus, commis-  
sions, and independent offices  
of the Government; with im-  
portant past legislation; with  
the history of all old claims  
graft from the business of  
this Government, and that

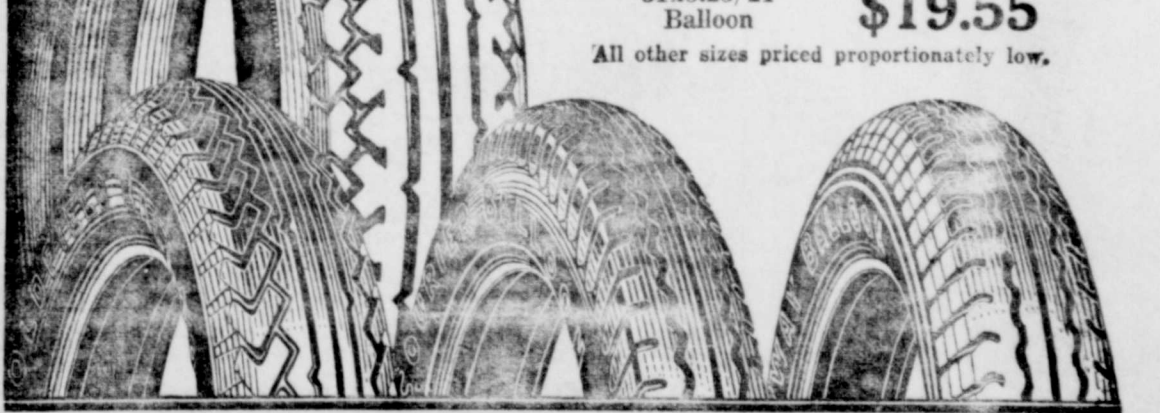
