Radio Waves
(By Melvin Boatman)

After all that has been said and written about radio waves and their measurements some radio listeners still fail to understand the why of wave lengths and kilocycles, and it is the purpose of this article to ybrief discuss the question so that it can be understood.

In the first place, radio waves are nothing but electromagnetic vibrations, or alternations, changing direction, or alternating from one direction to the other, at such a high rate of speed that they have a great penetrating power. This applies to 60 cycle current in the city light mains, but when you think of the difference between a current changing direction 120 times in a second, as that of the city mains does, and 1,500,000 times per second as in a station sending on a wave length of approximately 200 meters, you can readily see that the current in the station will have a much greater penetrating power. And when we can pick up the hum of the 60 cycle current with a set fifty feet, and more, away, that will give some idea of the distance that can be covered by a radio station.

Now don't get the idea that it is the wavelength of a station that determines how far it can be heard. This is true only to a certain extent, the greater portion being determined by the amount of current put into the antenna, and the degree or amount of coupling between the primary and secondary of the oscillation transformer; this latter determines whether the station is sending a pure and sharp wave or not.

Radio waves travel at the same rate of speed as light waves, which is approximately 186,000 miles per second, or 299,820,000 meters. This may be hard to take at first, but that's that. And here's another: the

length of a wave is the distance from the place where the current is flowing in one direction, to the place where it is again flowing in the same direction. As I have said before the current reverses its direction a great number of times per second. To illustrate, we'll say that the current flows in one direction from the set, then reverses and goes in the opposite direction, or down the antenna to the set. As the current does this it sets up the electromagnetic waves around the antenna so rapidly that they are propelled outward through space and as the current has to build up to its greatest value in each direction, the radio waves, were it possible to see them, would look like the wave on a pond when a stick or rock is dropped into it. Now, we will say that the wavelength is the distance from the crest of one wave to that of the one following or preceding it, or from the trough between two waves to the next trough in either direction. That's a little easier to understand.

Now if we send out one wave each second, that wave will have traveled 299,820,000 meters before the next wave starts, because that is the rate they travel. Now if we double the frequency, that is, send out two waves per second, the first wave will have traveled only half the distance when the next wave starts so we will be using a wavelength of 149,910,000 meters. This shows that the wavelength varies inversely as the frequency. To find either one, divide 299,820,000 by the other. Dividing speed by wavelength we find the number of waves sent out, or frequency in cycles, and dividing speed by frequency in cycles we find the length of each wave in meters. As kilo mean 1,000, we drop the last three zeros of the speed, leaving 299,820, and also of the frequency whatever it is, and then we find the frequency in kilocycles instead of cycles, making it easier to think and write.

This brings us down to the question of the crowding of stations at the lower end of dial figures. The broadcast band runs from approximately 200 meters to about 500, but for convenience we will say 600. On the dials that will be four meters to the mark, or 400 for the 0-to-100 dial. From 1 to 20 on the dial would be from 200 to 280 meters; 20 to 40, 280 to 360; 40 to 60, 360 to 440; 60 to 80, 440 to 520; 80 to 100, 520 to 600 meters.

Now, the Federal Radio Commission has spaced the broadcast stations 10,000 cycles, or 10 kilocycles apart. So we convert the wavelengths into kilocycles, giving the dial a range of 1,449.1 to 499.7 kes, or we will say 1450 to 500. From 200 to 280 meters this would be a range of approximately 379 kes, allowing room for approximately 38 stations; from 280 to 360 meters, 239 kes or 24 stations; 360 to 440, 152 kes or 15 stations; 440 to 520, 103 or 10

stations; 520 to 600 meters, 76 or 8 stations. This gives the 95 stations for the 950 ke difference between 200 and 600 meters, but look at how they are spaced. Thirty-eight, 24, 15, 10 and 8, where the meter separation would have been evenly spaced.

This crowding of stations is because the old sets have the old straight-line capacity or straight-line wave length condensers on them. Straight line frequency condensers will help the trouble to a great extent, and, in time, will prove a very effective cure for station crowding. Several of these condensers are on the market now and set manufacturers are now beginning to use them on their latest sets.
