BOY SCOUT NEWS

It is a pleasure to be able to report that great progress has been made in our Council activities during the past two months. We began work in practically virgin territory, very much interested in the scouting program. We have received numerous requests from citizens and school teachers throughout the area asking for help and advice in organizing scout troops. It is of course impossible to rush to all these places and get troops organized at once. From the first we decided to go slowly and have every troop project set squarely. We are adhering to that policy and the result is we have built some new organizations that are already showing themselves capable of putting on a scouting program.

A total of 124 new scouts have been enrolled during this period. In addition we have carefully purged the rolls of dead timber and as a result have dropped 22 scouts. We have also transferred 4 scouts. This leaves a new enrollment of 318 active scouts in the council.

Training Leaders

In addition we have three Scoutleader's Training Schools in operation. The total attendance exceeds 200 at present. The school at Brownwood is in its fifth week. The school in Comanche and Stephenville are respectively in their second and third sessions.

During this period the Scout-Executive has travelled a total of 3522 miles. He has visited all parts of the area. Troop 21 at Thurber carries off honors for discipline and program and troop spirit. Scoutmasters in the area are going to have to step to catch up with Scoutmaster LaGrone of Troop 21.

Beginning at eight o'clock this evening the Eagle's Radio Broadcasting Station KGKB will be on the air for several hours. This will be the first program from the first radio station owned and operated by a weekly newspaper in the United States. A. & M. SUMMER SESSION OPENS JUNE 11, 1928

College Station, Texas, May 17—The summer session at the A. & M. College of Texas will begin June 11 and continue until Sept. 1, Dean C. H. Winkler, chairman of the faculty executive committee for the session, has announced. Registration for the last summer and the various short courses, exclusive of the Farmers Short Course was in excess of 800, and indications point to an enrollment as large or larger this summer.

The summer session proper will be divided into two terms the first term from June 11 to July 21, and the second from July 23 to September 1. Registration will be open to both men and women. In addition to the academic work in the college, the first term will also include the following divisions: Summer School of Cotton, June 11 to July 21; Course for Public Utility Men, June 11 to June 15; Course for Cottonseed Oil Mill Operators, June 11 to June 20. Short Course for Graduate Veterinarians will be held June 18-22, and three weeks course for vocational agriculture teachers, July 2-21.

Short course in cotton breeding will be held during the second term, the dates being July 23-27. Dates for the Farmers Short Course are July 30-August 4. During this period the fifth annual conference of the county school superintendents will be held. Bulletin of the summer session schedule at the college.

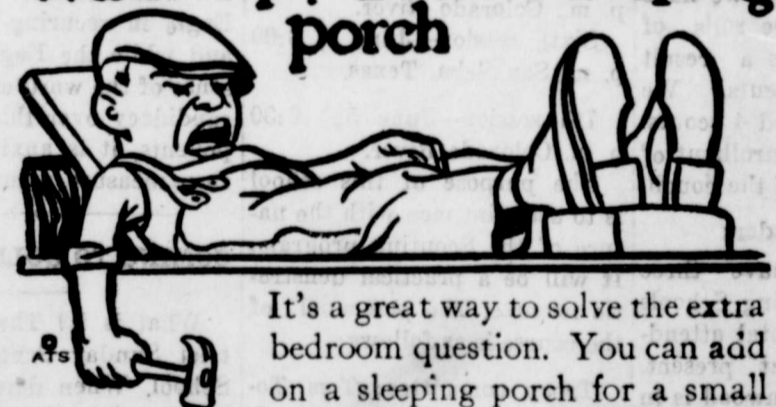

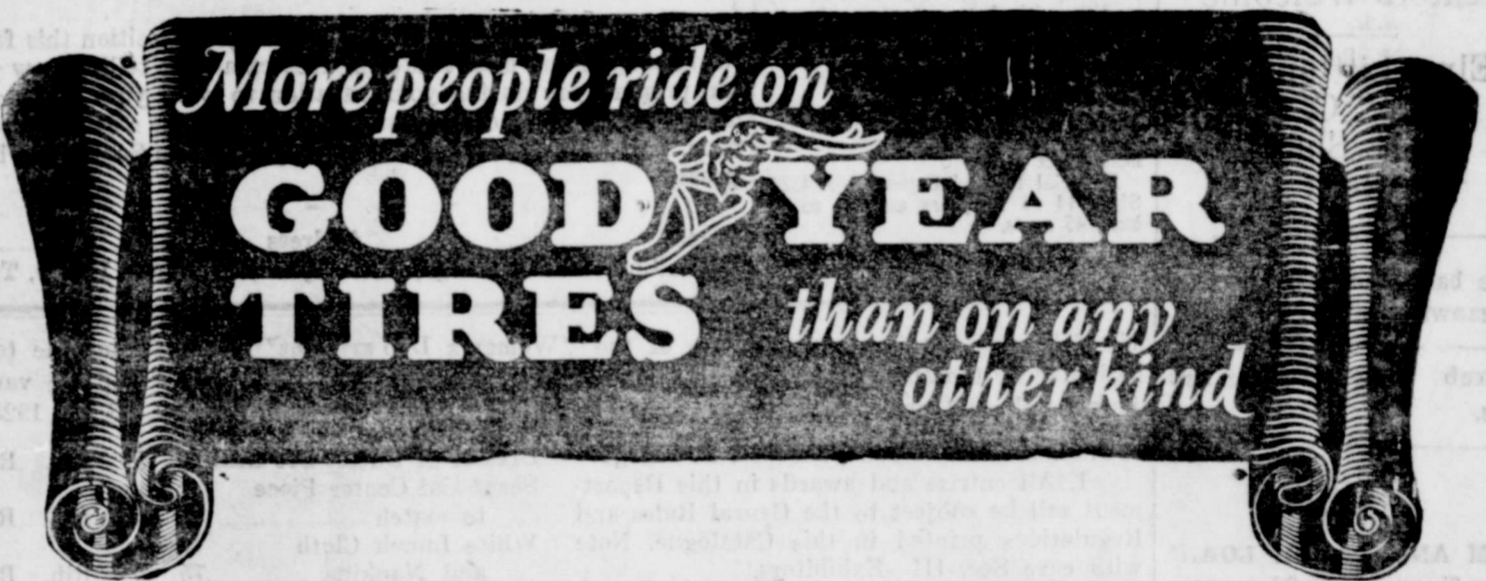

POLITICAL EVENTS

JUNE

4th—Last candidates for State offices can file applications with State Chairman for placing names on ballot. (Art. 3098).

4th—Last day for District candidates to file applications for place on ballot with District Chairman. If there be no District Chairman, such candidates must file applications with each County Chairman in such district. (Art. 3100).

11th—State Executive meets to certify names of State candidates to County Chairman and select place for holding State Convention. (Arts. 309-3137).

16th—Last day to file applications to have candidates' names placed on ballot for county and precinct nominations. (Art. 3101).

18th—County Executive Committee meets to determine order of candidates names on ballot, estimate amount each candidate shall pay for ballot fees, appoint ballot committee to meet July 8th, and transact other necessary business. (Art. 3094-3103 and 3106).

25th—Last day on which candidate can pay ballot fees. (Art. 3104).

JUNE 28 to JULY 2 (inclusive) First expense account. During this period each candidate must file a sworn itemized statement of campaign expenses with County Clerk. This is the first expense account.

JULY

15th to 19th (inclusive)—During this period all candidates must file second expense account with County Clerk.

8th to 17th (inclusive)—Absentee voting arranged. (Art. 2939).

28th—Primary Election Day. (Art. 3086).

Precinct Conventions to elect delegates to County convention and to elect Precinct Chairmen.

AUGUST

1st—Last day for making primary election returns to County Chairman. (Art. 3121).

4th—County Executive Committee meets at Court House to canvass primary election results.

County Convention to be held at Court House to elect delegates to State and District Conventions. (Art. 3123).

7th—On or before this date all candidates, losers and winners, must file sworn statements of all expenditures and receipts, one with County Clerk and one with County Judge. (Art. 3145 and 3174 1-4 G.)

N. B.—Each sworn expense statement must show all items included in all former statements. (Art. 3172).

25th—Second or run-off primary SEPTEMBER

1st—County Executive Committee meets to canvass returns of second (or run-off) primary. The above is a brief sketch of the laws governing the political affairs of Texas as they apply to the selection of candidates for the various offices. I have tried to be careful about getting this together, but there may be some errors. It may be well for all persons interested to look up these references for themselves.
