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SYNOPSIS OF SPEECH OF HON. THOS. BLANTON HERE LAST THURSDAY

Congressman Thos. L. Blanton in a speech in the district court room here last Thursday afternoon, brought out the following points:

High office should not be used for pleasure getting, money making, globe-junketing, or personal aggrandizement; but solely as a means of rendering maximum service at best benefits alike all of the people.

Proper Standards of Qualification

Senators should not be social butterflies, lazy, indifferent, ease-loving, and yoke-bound, but should be sober, law-abiding, honest, conscientious, sincere, industrious, tireless, pains taking, courageous, unselfish, dependable, in good health, punctually present at all sessions, wholly uncontrolled by special interests, and representing no selfish sects, but faithfully representing all of the people.

For All Good Measures; Against All Bad Ones

During my eleven years in the House, I have helped to pass every good law, and have vigorously and uncompromisingly fought every bad measure. By years of close study and application I have mastered the rules and precedents of both House and Senate. They are tools without which one is impotent. I know how to find camouflaged legislative riders in appropriation bills, and how, and where, to make proper points of order to eliminate them. I am intimately familiar with the business, functions, scope and history of all departments, bureaus, commissions, and independent offices of the Government; with important past legislation, with the history of all old claims, some of them involving \$100,000,000 still pending; with the business connections and idiosyncrasies of Senators, Congressmen, and lobbyists, with whose shrewdest leaders we must measure swords, and I have spent all my vacations in investigating and checking up every establishment of Government. I have found out exactly what they do with their annual millions, and just how little some of them benefit the people. Many should be abolished. I have found waste galore, extravagance beyond computation, and much graft. And I am making against them a determined fight. If we people could get 100 cents value for every dollar expended, our annual expenses could be cut in half, which would cut taxes in half, for every dollar comes from the people in taxes. I have never yet taken any junket; neither has any member of my family. I carefully compare all annual bills with those of previous years, and have saved millions by knocking out unauthorized riders with proper points of order. By digging up records and briefing facts, I have blocked many bad claims. By posting myself, I have stopped many not wanted. THE CRYSTAL SET Part Four

(By M. E. Boatman)

Well, here we are again after two weeks absence. The writer has been pretty busy, the past two weeks—not too busy to write his weekly article, but too busy to think of writing it. First I want to correct a seeming impossibility in the last paragraph of my last article. Where it reads "the remaining two taps and the end of the coil" should have read "the remaining four taps and the end of the coil, etc." In going over the article before handing it in I made several changes and failed to notice that particular mistake until it was pointed out to me by one of our radio readers.

Most of you know how to put up an aerial, but for the benefit of those who do not the following is given: Any copper, brass or phosphor bronze wire will do, about size 14 or larger, insulated or not. Take a piece about 75 feet long and loop it securely through one eye of an insulator, then scrape it bright and clean about six inches from the insulator. Scrape the end of your lead-in wire and fasten it on the aerial wire where you have cleaned it. Pull an insulator on the other end of your aerial wire and string it between two of the highest points convenient. From the house gable to the barn or a tree is good.

Place the lightning arrester near the window, and place the lead-in strips over the sill and bend them to fit so the window will close down over them. Bring the lead-in wire to the side of the lightning arrester marked "ant" and then to the first lead-in strip. From the other lead-in strip run a wire to the post on the arrester marked "G" or ground, and then to the water pipe or a ground. Connection to gas piping inside of a house usually does no good, as a rubber washer is used in coupling between the meter and the pipe leading into the house, and a waterproof insulating compound used on the metal sleeve over the coupling running the wire to the street side of the meter seems to be all right in most cases, but is never to be recommended. If a water pipe is not available drive a metal rod or pipe several feet into the ground and connect it.

Now put set on a table near the window, connect the aerial lead-in strip to the post marked "A", then to ground strip to "A" then the ground strip to phones to the "PH" posts.

Adjust the contact to the crystal, called the "catwhisker," until a click is heard as there will be some static almost all the time. Then turn the switch arm at the top of the set from one point to another until a signal is heard.

No squeals or whistles should be heard on this type of set, unless you hear someone else set when it is oscillating or when two broadcasting stations are interfering with each other. When a set is oscillating it is really a small transmitting station, and causes interference accordingly. When two stations are so close together on a band that their waves overlap, the listener hears a note that is pitched to the difference between the frequencies of the two stations. This is called heterodyning, and will be discussed more fully in a later issue.

CHEVROLET SHATTERS PRODUCTION RECORD

Chevrolet production May 1 was 7075 finished cars and trucks—the highest single day's volume in the history of the company. The record resulted when the sales organization asked the production department to over-run quota for the month.

St. Louis, Mich., June 11—All previous production records in the sixteen years existence of a Chevrolet Motor Company are shattered here in May when the company turned out 10,700 units.

The output for a single day so reached a new level when on May 28 when 7075 finished cars and trucks rolled off the assembly lines.

These figures, released here day-by-day by W. S. Knudsen, president and general manager, lent substance to the growing feeling in automotive circles that Chevrolet would not only equal 1927 volume of a million cars but before the close of 1928, that it would also duplicate 1927 performance of building and selling more cars than any other manufacturer in the world.

Production of Bigger and Better models to June 1 was 100,000 units, Mr. Knudsen stated. He pointed out that this includes production since the first of the year as well as 2,000 new cars built in December so that dealers in all parts of the country would have cars for immediate delivery when a new model was publicly announced on January 1.

Up to June 1 last year the company had built 513,000 new models; in 1926, 326,000 units, and in 1925 less than one-third of volume achieved during the corresponding period this year, according to Mr. Knudsen.

The output for the month just ended was 25,000 units in excess of the 115,000 cars and trucks built in May 1927, which, until this year, had been the largest production month in the history of the company. In May, 1926, the turn out was 74,000 units, and in May of the previous year 52,000 units.

The record set up last year was bettered by 2,000 units during the past February. March a turn was 17,000 units ahead of February; and April with a volume of 135,800 cars and trucks exceeded the March performance by 2,000 units.

In view of the high May volume, and the schedule for June,

Mr. Knudsen stated that by the middle of the year the number of new cars built would be well beyond the three-quarter million mark.

All production operations of the company have been running at capacity since early in the year, Mr. Knudsen said. He explained that the high May volume was made possible because several of the domestic plants have been expanded and because a new assembly plant has recently been opened at Atlanta, Ga., to relieve the other fourteen domestic manufacturing operations got in its full month's production during May.

Another new plant of similar size to the one at Atlanta, recently announced for Kansas City to supply the territory immediately North and West of that city, with a capacity of 350 cars a day, will make possible even greater volume achievements in the future, Mr. Knudsen stated.

"Month by month our sales organization is making increasingly heavy demands upon the production facilities of the company to provide cars for immediate delivery in the domestic market," Mr. Knudsen said. "More than 80 per cent of the may output was absorbed in the United States alone despite the fact that the number of units going into the export field was more than ever before."

"We interpret this expansion in volume and sales to a growing public confidence in us and our product. This is our greatest asset, and to the public is due whatever credit may be

due from the records now being established."

Mr. Knudsen stated that extraordinary achievements of his company may also be taken as a trade index of the country. "The automobile is a sensitive barometer of business conditions in every territory where it is marketed in quantity," he said. "The fact that our sales have been consistently good in every area of the United States indicates the healthful purchase

power of the great mass of people. That means, of course, general distribution of present wealth and a satisfactory future outlook."
