FEW BREWSTER IN RACE FOR DISTRICT JUDGE

As has been known to many of the people of the district for some months, Few Brewster of Temple, present District Attorney, is a candidate for District Judge of Mills, Lampasas and Bell Counties, subject to the Democratic primary to be held July 28.

Mr. Brewster is 39 years of age. He is a graduate of both the academic and law departments of the University of Texas, holding the B. A. and LL. M. degrees from that institution. He graduated from Howard Payne College in 1909. During his last year in the Texas University he was quiz-master in law, a position awarded for good scholarship. He has been engaged in the practice of law since June, 1916, except for the time he spent in the military service during the World War. Waiving his number on the draft, he was sent at the head of the largest contingent sent out by the Temple board to Camp Travis and enlisted in the infantry. He soon received a commission and was discharged at Camp Custer, Michigan. In the fall of 1919 Mr. Brewster was appointed County Attorney of Bell County, to which office he was twice elected by the people of Bell County without an opponent. On January 1, 1923 he was appointed District Judge by Governor Neff, to which office he has been twice elected without an opponent, being now in service on his third term.

Mr. Brewster asks that the people of the district investigate the professional ability and standing and the general qualifications of both himself and his opponent and promises that if he is elected he will give his thoughts, talents and attention to the business of making you a good district judge, and that he will be fair, considerate and just to everybody having business with the court.

WHY YOU SHOULD VOTE FOR J. W. THOMAS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Do the people of Lampasas and Mills counties want law enforcement? That is the question. Remember that you will have no better law enforcement than you elect for your district attorney.

The trouble with your public officials is not that they do not have sense enough to know what their duty is, but the trouble lies in finding one who has courage enough to do what he knows his duty is. Elect me to this high office and I solemnly pledge you that for a season of one time you will have rigid law enforcement, and furthermore, you shall have a man who will treat everybody just alike who comes into your court.

Your courthouse is a place where law is to be enforced. You need a man on the job in this office who is not afraid of the powerful and influential. Just as long as you elect men to this office who feel around to see what folks say about the prosecution of certain law violations, just that long you are certain to have no law enforcement.

There has never been an hour in my life when I tried to straddle the fence on any question. What I believe and stand for I am willing to die for I do not think there should be any issue in this race except merit and ability to perform the duties of this high office, but if there is a man in Lampasas or Mills counties that desires to ask me a single question about anything on earth, try me and see if I do not answer your question candidly. I may not answer it to suit you, but this I cannot help. I will answer it. There is no office in America big enough to take my independence away.

Don't get confused in the race about promoting anybody. Culp, Taylor and myself are all poor men and need the offer of law to be enforced. You then in that respect. They both have wonderful wives and fine children, for whose welfare they are solicitous and ambitious. THERE IS NO ISSUE ON THIS EARTH IN THIS RACE EXCEPT ABILITY TO PERFORM THE DUTIES OF THIS HIGH OFFICE. Every man and woman owes his neighbor the high duty of voting for the man who can best fill the office. I do not seek any man's vote on any other basis. If this is not fair, I do not know how to be fair with. This country will never be safe until you vote solely on this basis.

The District Attorney's office is a man's task. He has great criminal lawyers to cope with. In both civil and criminal cases I have maoured lances with the ablest lawyers in

PECAN VALLEY SUMMER CAMP LOOKS PROMISING

The summer camp for the Pecan Valley Area, B. S. A. promises to be one of the largest Boy Scout Camps in Central Texas. Estimates furnished by Scoutmasters indicate that there will be approximately 300 boys in camp. Everything possible is being done to make this camp especially interesting to the boys.

Scout Executive Draper of San Angelo with his assistants will be present and have charge of all Life Saving instructions as well as the beginners instruction period. Executive Draper is a commissioned Red Cross Swimming Instructor, he has the happy faculty of knowing how to handle boys.

Chief Red Eagle, an Ojibway Indian Chief, Archery expert and instructor in Indian Lore, Beadwork, will be present in camp and have charge of the evening camp fire program. He will be assisted by other of his Indians.

The Camp Honor Belt System will be used. This system provides appropriate belt decorations and awards for special work done in camp. The following medals will be awarded:

Bronze Medals:
To scout who makes the most progress in swimming; to Scout who is voted best all-round camper; to Scout who makes the most progress in handicraft; to Tent Leader who's tent area receives most firsts on inspection.

Silver Medals:
To Scout who is voted the most efficient in life saving; to scout who is selected the most useful camper.

Scouts will be given an opportunity to complete their Second Class and First Class tests in camp. In addition there will be special classes of instruction in Life Saving, Life Guard, Leather Craft, Archery, Indian Lore and bugling.

All Scouts who expect to attend camp are urged to have their time registered so as to avoid rush that usually occurs during the last few days. All registrations must be in Local Headquarters by July 10th.

AN AUDIO AMPLIFIER

(By M. E. Boatman)

Now that we have the crystal set working, some of our listeners are going to get tired of sitting with the ear phones clamped on, especially if they are listening to long programs. And no matter how interesting the program is, wearing the phones, or passing them around the family is going to get old after awhile so it is the purpose of this article to describe an amplifier that will enable the whole family to listen in over a speaker.

The parts required are:
2 3 1-2 to 1 audio transformer.

- 2 sockets
 - 8 binding posts
 - 1 filament switch
 - 1 10 ohm rheostat
 - 1 amperite, No. 1A
 - 1 panel, 6x6 inches
 - 1 baseboard, 6x6 inches
- Wire, screws, etc.

On the panel mark and drill four holes, two in the upper left and two in the upper right corner, just like you did in the crystal set. Mark the left ones "in" and the right ones "out" or "ph". Then two inches from the left and three inches from the top drill a hole and two inches from the right and three inches from the top drill another hole. There are for the switch and rheostat, and the size of the holes will be determined by the instrument used. Drill two holes in the lower edge of the panel and mount it to the baseboard as you did on the set.

Mount the switch and the binding posts on the panel. Take a small strip of the material you are using for the panel, about one inch wide and four inches long, mount the other four binding posts near the edge of it and mount the strip on the back edge of the baseboard.

Now, with the panel facing you, place one audio transformer on the left side of the baseboard, with the side marked "pri" or "P" and "B plus" to the left, one of the sockets on the right side with the "G" and "I" side away from the panel and the amperite mounting between them. At the back side of the baseboard place the other socket and transformer, the socket on the left and both facing as the first two.

If you still have one wire left after wiring the crystal set you can use it to wire the amplifier. If you don't, any insulated wire from size 22 to 16 will do.

From the top "in" post run a wire to the terminal on the transformer marked "P" and from the terminal marked "B plus" run a wire to the bottom of "In" post. From the "G" terminal on the transformer run a wire to the "G" post on the back of the socket.

Run a wire from the third post on the back strip to the first post and then to the switch. From the terminal on the second transformer marked "F" run a wire to the "F" minus post on the right socket, then to one side of the rheostat over to the side of the switch not connected, then to the "F minus" terminal on the left transformer. From the other side of the rheostat run a wire to the "F" minus post on the back socket.

A wire goes from the second post on the strip to the "F plus" post on the backsocket, then to one side of the amperite mounting; the other side goes to the "F plus" post on right socket.

From the bottom "OUT" post drop a wire to the "P" post on the right socket. From the "G" post on the socket run a wire to the "G" terminal on the back transformer. From the last or right post on the strip run a wire to the "B plus" terminal on the back transformer and then to the top "OUT" post. A wire goes from the "P" terminal on the back transformer to the "P" post on the back socket.

Set the amplifier to the right of the crystal set and connect wires from the "PH" posts on the set to the corresponding "IN" wires on the amplifier, and take the speaker

or, or phones, to the "OUT" posts.

Connect the A battery minus wire to the first post on the back strip, the A plus to the second, B minus to the third and B plus to the last post. Turn on the switch and adjust the rheostat to regulate the volume.

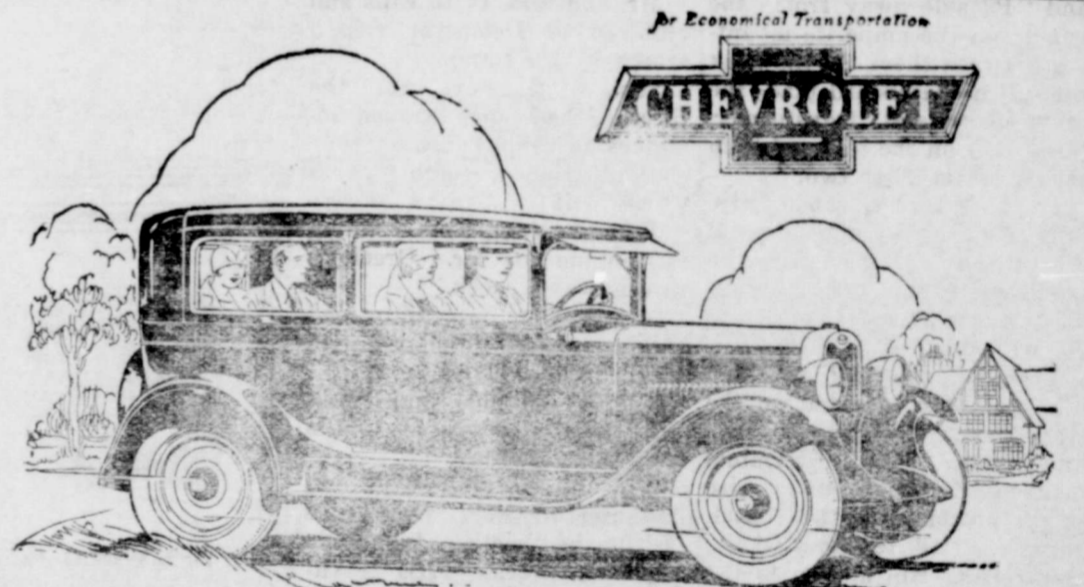

Goldthwaite Has Operating Radio Station

Eagle Only Weekly in Texas "On the Air" Daily. City Looking Prosperous

Special to the Telegram. GOLDTHWAITE, June 14.—The only weekly newspaper in the United States owning a broadcasting station is the Goldthwaite Eagle.

It is "on the air" from 11:30 a. m. until 1 p. m., and from 8:30 p. m. until 11 p. m. KGKB operates on 1070 kilocycles—280.2 meters—and can be tuned in at around 25 on the average radio. Its radius is easily 100 miles in the daytime and twice that distance at night. These figures are very conservative however, as under favorable conditions, it can be heard for much greater distances.

The equipment represent the the expenditure of thousands of dollars. It was installed by M. E. Boatman of Rising Star and he will be in charge of operating the station. Gus Obenhaus, a cleaver entertainer, is the announcer.

Naturally, the station will be glad to receive messages from listeners. Interesting programs are arranged.

Many have visited the studio, which is very attractive. The furnishings are beautiful and the walls are lined with velvet, this being not a luxury but a necessity for broadcasting stations.

Goldthwaite, the county capital of Mills county, has one of the finest courthouses in West Texas. It is a prosperous and progressive city and its newspaper is one of the city's biggest assets. The Eagle building and equipment are exceptional and, in installing a broadcasting station, the newspaper has set a pace for publications of the nation—Eastland Telegram.

Radio Station at Goldthwaite

Only One Owned by Weekly Newspaper on Air First Time Friday Night

Radio Station KGKB, the only radio station owned by a weekly newspaper in the United States, was on the air for the first time Friday night with a general program of introducing features, including talks by the mayor, other business men, and also musical numbers. The station, owned and operated by the "Goldthwaite Eagle," at Goldthwaite, Texas, plans to be on the air every night hereafter. The business men of Goldthwaite, including the mayor, pledged their moral support to the advertising undertaking, and will sponsor the different programs to be given in the future, it is said.

The Eagle Print, local subdivision of the Eagle Publishing Company, is to have one night per week at which time it will sponsor the program, according to C. T. Wilson, manager of the Eagle Print.

Station KGKB is on a wave length of 280.2 meters, 1070 kilocycles. Gus Obenhaus is to be the announcer, according to Mr. Wilson. M. E. Boatman will be the operator. The cost of the station is \$3,500.—San Angelo Standard.

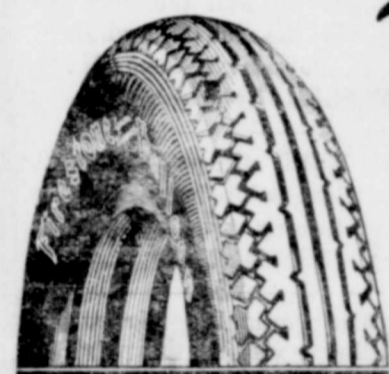

DR. BROOKING WRITES CONCERNING VACATION

Winnipeg Manitoba, June 22, 1928.

Friend:

I have thought of writing you for some time, but you know how it is. When you do not have much to do you do not feel like doing much. When Mrs. Brooking and I left Goldthwaite June 1st it was dry. By the time we reached Fort Worth it was raining and has been raining more or less every since.

We visited my sister in Indiana. It rained almost all the time and was cool enough to have fire in the house. We stayed in Chicago four or five days and put in two half days at the museum. It is a wonderful place. All sorts of stuffed and mounted fossil animals were seen in cases arranged as naturally as possible. The room used for repairs. The Egyptian room was especially interesting with mummies and their cases; also the old Egyptian funeral tablets, and their inscriptions and translations. There is a facsimile of the Rosetta Stone: the stone found in Egypt about 100 years ago that has an inscription in three languages of writing. First the hieroglyphic or picture writing of the Egyptians of about 2000 B. C. then the modified Egyptian and last in Greek. This gave the archeologists a key to the interpretation of the early Egyptian writings. The mummies dated from 2000 B. C. to 500 B. C. There is a boat used to carry the dead down the Nile to the place of interment. 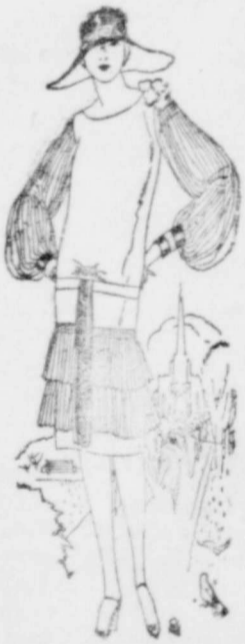
