Ladies and Gentlemen:
I want to go on record here and now as committing myself to the three following propositions and pledging my best energies and untiring efforts to accomplish them.

First, the reduction of the State Ad Valorem Tax rate and curtailment of the tendency to increase taxes with the view of relieving real estate and small home owners of part of the unequal burden of taxation.

Second, Legislation providing for the election of a board of Highway Commissioners by vote of the people, instead of continuing a commission appointed by the Governor, making the elected commissioners directly responsible to the people, so that the people will be assured that the \$40,000,000.00 (forty million dollars) spent annually in this state will be justly and wisely prorated in all sections of the state.

Third, the reduction of the registration fee on the family owned and operated automobile.

I am running for Representative because it is an honorable undertaking and because I believe I am qualified for the office. I am 28 years old and have had ten years business experience. I am also a graduate of the Law School of the University of Texas. I have worked three years under the Capitol dome, and have had opportunity to observe and study, and to familiarize myself with the State's business and the workings of its governmental departments. If elected, I have in mind a program to which I will devote my best efforts. I have already mentioned the three principal purposes which I shall attempt to accomplish but I want to show you that these things can be done.

In my opinion the State ad valorem tax rate can be decreased to some extent by economy, that is, by appropriating only such money as is necessary for the needs of the different departments and state institutions, and also by refusing to create new offices and jobs except where a public necessity exists, in order to take care of the public interest.

Agriculture and ranching is the basic industry of our commonwealth. It is the very foundation of our livelihood, essential to the life of the people of the state and nation. It is now at a low ebb, and needs encouragement and aid by every measure consistent with the constitution and the principals of democracy. If there is a farm in this entire district that is not for sale it is the exception rather than the rule, and why? Simply because the farmer can sell out, move to town, and place his money out at four per cent interest and make more money than he can by working and sweating like a slave in the field. Instead of encouraging the farmer and rancher, who has always borne the burden of government, his load has been increased, until at the present time it has become so heavy that he is stooped-shouldered, bow-legged, and flat-footed. One man can't remedy this situation, but he can do his bit, and if he can make others see the necessity for such relief then it is a victory won. This situation can be remedied to a great extent by cutting down governmental expenses and by refusing to create new offices, because the state tax rate, as before mentioned, is fixed by the tax board only after appropriations have been made by the Legislature and this tax rate must necessarily be such as will take care of these appropriations. When the farmers and stockmen make money and prosper business in general prospers. It is the one kind of prosperity that is enjoyed by all.

As to my second proposition, that is, the election of highway commissioners, my view is this: In order not to create any new office and yet have a marked improvement, the state could be divided into

three highway districts with a highway commissioner elected from each district. One of these members could be selected as Chairman by the three elected, thus taking the business of the highway department out of the hands of the Governor and his appointees. The duties of the Governor are so many that it is impossible for him to personally supervise the expenditure of \$25,000,000 annually. The three commissioners receiving their appointment necessarily represent only their local interests, and do not feel the pressure of the duties that an elected commissioner would feel toward all the people. I say they represent only their local interest, because it is there that pressure is brought to bear on the governor to secure their appointment. Their friends having secured the commissioner's appointment, expect a favor to be returned and pressure is then brought to bear on the commissioner in order to secure the necessary amount of road work in his locality, while certain other sections of the state suffer as a result. If these Commissioners were elected by the popular vote of the people their feelings of responsibility to the people would make them try to cut down office expenses and place more money in road work. It would be necessary for them to get over the state and see the actual condition of the roads in many counties. If he sought the office again he as an elected commissioner would try to make a record of which he would be proud and one which he could call the attention of the voter with pride.

My third proposition, and another matter of interest that should be remedied is the registration fee for the family owned and operated automobile. Such registration fee should be reduced to a nominal amount, say three or four dollars, this to be used for the payment of expenses incurred by the Highway Department in providing license number plates and the balance of the fee retained in the county where paid for construction and maintenance of lateral roads in that county. Today the family car that make a trip to town once a week pays the same license fee as the traveling man's car of the same make, that uses the highways 365 days in the year. While tractors are not used extensively on the farms in this district, yet where they are used, the farmer pays the three cent gas olene tax without deriving one cent benefit from the tax. Understand I have no objection to the gas tax. It is really the only fair and equitable way of providing money to build roads, because in that way you pay according to the amount you use the roads. And since in Texas it is estimated the Highway Department will receive \$20,000,000 from the gasoline tax alone this year, it is my contention that the registration fee can be reduced and the sum derived from the gasoline tax plus the several million dollars per year in federal aid will provide ample funds for the construction and maintenance of a connected system of highways. Some people may regard this plan as one that might have the effect of retarding the program of the State Highway Commission, but even so, highway construction should not progress so rapidly that the people will be burdened with taxes to the extent of confiscation of their earnings and property. Some twenty odd million dollars a year properly spent would in time provide Texas with one of the greatest systems in the world. And, ladies and gentlemen, 25 million is all the money three men can judiciously spend in one year.

There is a limit somewhere. I believe the taxing power of the state has been exercised to such an extent that the total amount of taxes paid should be materially reduced. It is time to recede from the high pressure program of increasing tax burdens, however, such reductions of taxes should not interfere with or weaken our public

school system. It is not necessary to reduce the amount of money spent on the schools to reduce the taxes the people are required to pay.

I come before you, ladies and gentlemen, asking for your vote and influence to elect me to the office, which I seek. I see opportunities for public service for one who will go and work and I promise that I will do just that. The pay is a mere pittance, but I want you to know this, that I have no axe to grind when I get there, no special legislation to get through, nor have I received one cent to carry on this campaign from anyone. So I am free to say that no one has any strings on me. I seek the office because of its opportunities for public service, and because I see an opportunity for it to serve as a stepping stone to bigger and better things if one makes good.
