W. W. CONDON DEAD

W. W. Condon, pioneer citizen of Mills county and Goldthwaite, but who for the past few years has resided at Abilene, died at that place Wednesday afternoon at about 3:00 o'clock. The remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows cemetery here yesterday afternoon, Rev. Ira Dance conducting the services.

Mr. Condon had been having trouble with his heart for some little time. A couple of hours before his death he had been feeling bad and had gone to the doctor's office. It was there that he died.

Mr. Condon was 59 years of age at the time of his death. He had been a member of the Missionary Baptist church for a great many years. He was known and liked by a large circle at Goldthwaite and in Mills county. In 1907 he was married to Mrs. Maude Miller. Mr. Condon is survived by his wife, a boy and a girl and several other relatives. The Eagle joins their many friends in offering the bereaved ones the greatest measure of sympathy in this sad hour.

The fiscal year of the State Highway Department is now drawing to a close and I wish to take this opportunity to report to the people of Mills County the work that has been accomplished during the past year.

The Goldthwaite-Star highway has been re-located at many points and sharp turns eliminated. The entire highway has been re-graded and new wide bridges constructed.

The Pecan Belt has been re-graded and many new wide bridges built.

It is hoped that during the coming year a new location may be obtained on the Goldthwaite Mullin highway and grade crossings eliminated and the road straightened.

During the past year our forces have worked faithfully and well and have kept the highways in splendid condition and we feel sure that our efforts have been appreciated by the people of the county.

MILLS COUNTY

This county has now been organized in accordance with the new Vital Statistics Law, by the appointment of registrars for each justice precinct and each incorporated town or city. In some cases, two or more precincts have been combined into one district, where it seemed best so to do.

Every birth is required by law to be reported to the local registrar of the district in which it occurs, by the attending physician or midwife, or if there was neither, then by the father or mother, within five days after the birth.

The law prohibits the burial or removal of a dead body before a death certificate properly and completely filled out, has been filed with the local registrar, and a burial or removal permit has been secured.

The immense legal value of these records makes it important that the citizens of Texas be given this protection by having a complete, legal record properly filed in accordance with this law.

During the first three months of 1928 there were reported from Mills County 36 births and 13 deaths. This would indicate that only about 64 per cent of the births and 44 per cent of the deaths were reported. Let's go 100 percent from now on.

Below is a list of the local registrars of your county, and it is urged that you make every effort to comply with the law and to aid in securing complete registration in your county. For further information address State Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics, Austin, Texas.

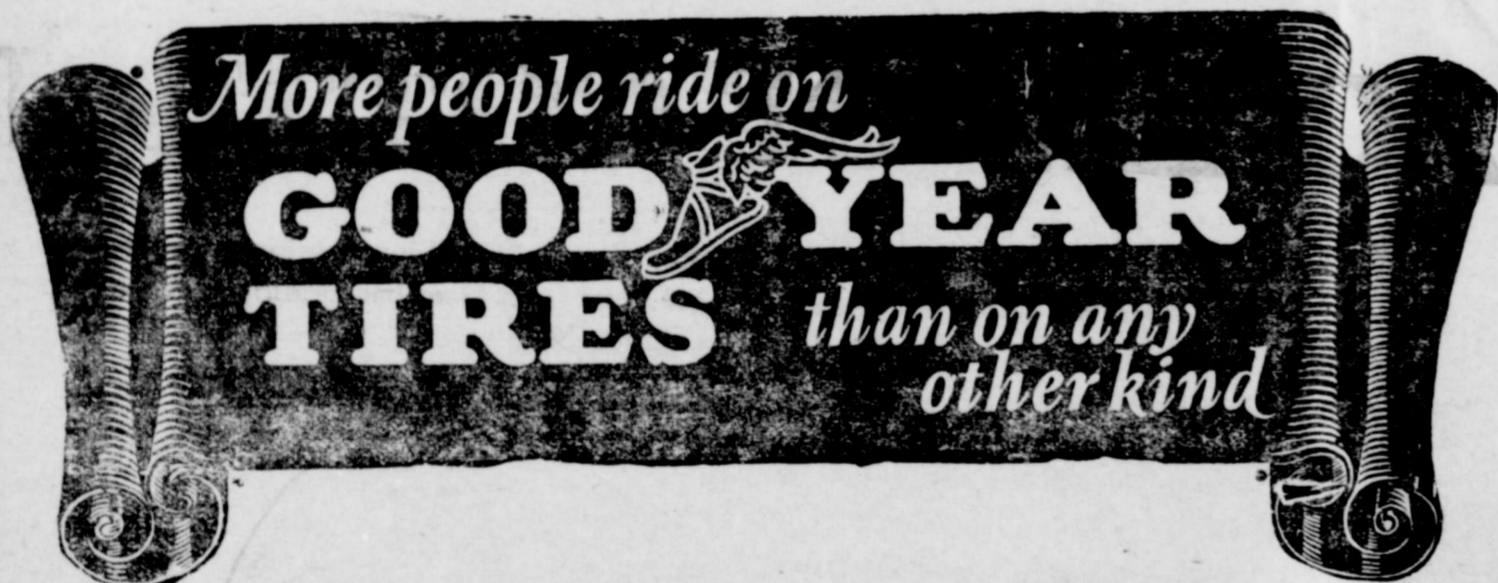

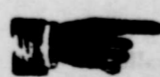

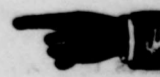

CHAPTER

AN ORDINANCE to be a part part of the Ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, levying taxes for the said City of Goldthwaite, upon all Real and Personal Property, and on certain Occupations for the year 1928, and providing for the collection of same.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas: That there shall be and there is hereby levied a city tax for the year 1928, on all real estate situated within and being in the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, and on all personal property that was in said City of Goldthwaite, Texas on the first day of January A. D. 1928, not exempt from taxation by the laws and constitution of the State of Texas, for the purpose hereinafter provided as follows:

1st. For General Revenue purposes, to be known as the General Fund Fifty Cents on the One Hundred Dollars valuation, which is hereby set aside for general use and purposes.

2nd. To provide interest and for creating a sinking fund for outstanding water works bonds Twenty-five cents on the one Hundred Dollars valuation.

3rd. For a road, street and bridge fund, to be known as the Street Fund, Twenty-five Cents on the Hundred Dollars valuation.

4th. For the purpose of taking up time warrants, issued by the City for permanent improvements, Thirty-five Cents on the One Hundred Dollars valuation.

5th. It is further ordained and ordered that the City Council levy an occupation tax, and the same is hereby levied, equal to one half the occupation tax now levied by the State of Texas, on the respective occupations now taxed by the State of Texas, as shown and set out in the revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, the same to be collected for General revenue purposes.

6th. All taxes so levied, except the occupation tax, shall be due and payable on the first day of October, A. D. 1928, and on and after said date, the City Tax Assessor and Collector is hereby authorized to collect and receipt for same, before and until the first day of February A. D. 1929, and if said taxes are not paid by such time, there shall be taxed against the owners of said real and personal property and against said property, ten per cent additional on the amount then due as penalty, as the same is provided for and authorized by the laws of the State of Texas, and the said Assessor and Collector of taxes is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce the payment of said taxes, according to the laws of the State of Texas, and ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas; and all taxes not paid on or before the 31st day of January, A. D. 1929, shall be deemed delinquent and the same, together with the above penalty of ten per cent, shall be apportioned among the several different funds, and the City Tax Assessor and Collector shall, by virtue of his office, levy upon and sell said property, real and personal, for the payment of taxes thereon, according to law.

It is further ordained and provided that taxes levied here by, if not paid on or before the 31st day of January A. D. 1929 shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the first day of February, A. D. 1929.

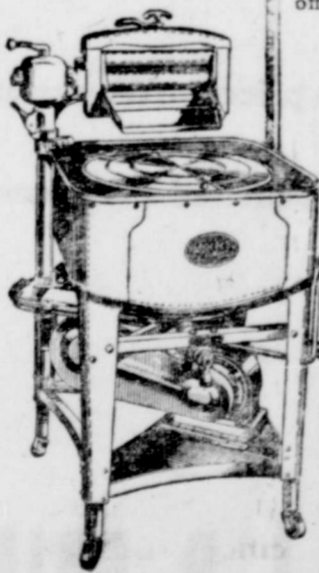

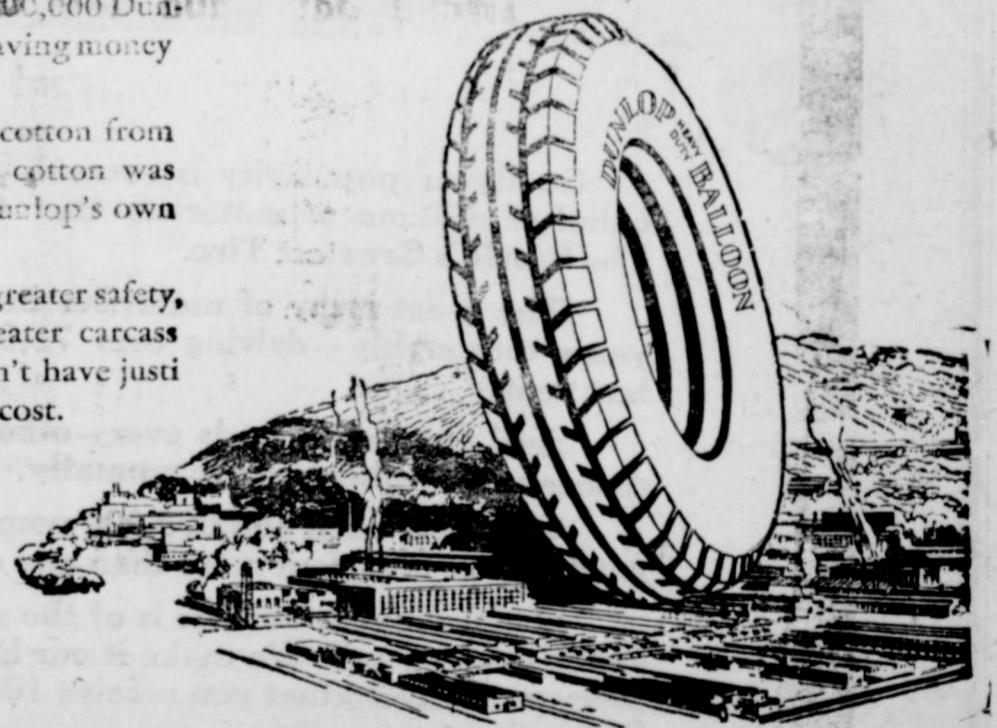

R. Q. LEE CONDEMNNS RESERVE BANK POLICY

West Texas has just begun its fight to restore the Federal Reserve Bank to the principles which brought about its creation and west Texans are not discouraged by the action of Senator Carter Glass of Virginia who left the state without holding the hearing on the Federal Reserve Bank which he declared would be held immediately after the Democratic Convention adjourned in Houston. R. Q. Lee does not accept the statement of Senator Glass that there is no interest in the Bank question which the Senator gave to the newspapers when he went back to Virginia. In this statement the Virginian declared that since none of the complaining bankers had notified him that would attend the meeting, he took it that there was no demand for the hearing, hence, he cancelled the date.

Mr. Lee states that the west Texas bankers did not feel that Mr. Glass being but one of the committee, could hold the hearing alone. The west Texas bankers felt that any hearing should be attended by the entire committee or at least by a majority and did not care to prejudice their chances for future hearing by letting one man judge the case. Hence, they did not entuse over the proposed meeting which Senator Glass proposed to hold.

Mr. Lee declares that the Federal Reserve question is one of the vital problems before the country today. The Eleventh District bank located at Dallas has failed to serve the needs of the banks in the agricultural sections of the territory it serves. The total of the bank's agricultural paper is painfully small as contrasted with the industrial paper and securities which it holds and the policies of the bank are forcing the country banks to actually take money needed for agricultural development and invest this

money in New York industrial securities.

This policy Mr. Lee condemns. He takes the position that the Federal Reserve Bank should extend flexible credit to provide for the needs of agricultural sections, particularly in times of stress, to the full extent that it is possible to go consistent with good banking. The Dallas bank has not followed this policy he declared.

Mr. Lee helped start the movement against the present policies of the bank almost exactly a year ago. The meeting was held in his office in Cisco and was attended by the resolutions committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce directorate. Some of the members of the committee opposed to the resolution touching the Federal Reserve and Mr. Lee actively fought to secure passage of the resolution. He has been a consistent supporter of the resolution since. He believes that the proper relief lies in changing the policies of this Bank and is basing his fight on the bank's policies as formulated by its directorate. Officers of the bank can only carry out the policies of the board, hence, he believes in changing these policies by congressional action if necessary.

Unless some other organized effort is launched before the West Texas Chamber of Commerce executive board meets in Coleman July 16th, Mr. Lee plans to call upon the body to immediately get behind this proposition with all the influence which the organization can bring to bear and plans to ask the directors to use the same energy and initiative which the Chamber has used in its past fights for the welfare of West Texas.
