\$50,000.00 SCHOOL BOND ELECTION ORDERED FOR GOLDTHWAITE BY BOARD OF TRUSTEES AFTER PETITION

A PLEA FOR A HIGHER EDUCATION AMONG THE MASSES

(By Dr. Em. Wilson)

There is a move to have the next Legislature consider a bill providing for two years of college work in designated high schools and thereby relieve the overcrowded condition. About two years ago I wrote two articles to the Dallas News advocating a board of education with power to designate by order subjects that should be taught in order that the grades would be uniform, and that through its powers the two years work could be placed in designated high schools throughout the state for the convenience of the pupils. The first public call advocates the placing of two years college work in grade A high schools. The first installment follows: Reliable statistics furnish us with the estimate of the cash value of an education. It is placed at \$72,000.00. In the working span of life from age 22 to 70, the average college graduate receives for his services about \$72,000.00, more than does the average high school graduate.

Less than one per cent of American men are college graduates. How appalling! This one per cent are amply able to take care of themselves. From the following statistics compiled by the government for the use of insurance companies and others we learn that taken from five million averages, those of no schooling only 31 attained distinction; those of elementary schooling of 33 million only 808 reached places of note. Those of high school education of every million 1245 reached distinguished stations. Those with college educations of every million 5,768 became noted.

Less than one per cent are college graduates, yet from that number came 55 per cent of our Presidents, 36 per cent of our members of congress, 57 per cent of our speakers of the house, 54 per cent of our Vice-Presidents, 62 per cent of our Secretaries of State, 50 per cent of our secretaries of the Treasury, 65 per cent of our Attorney Generals, and 69 per cent of our Supreme Judges. A writer for the "Magazine of Wall Street" claims that 85 per cent of every 100 men who are alive at the age of 65 are dependent upon children or charity for a living. This leaves 15 per cent dependent upon self. There is very little of this 15 per cent which comes from college graduates.

Government statisticians place it this way according to complements made by insurance companies: of 100 young men at the age of 25 years, forty years later, one will be rich, four will be comfortable financially, five will be forced to keep working in order to live, fifty-four will be dependent upon charity or relatives, and thirty-six will be dead.

A careful study of the foregoing statistics will reveal that a man with a college education has about nine and one-fifth times better chances for the attainment of distinction than the high school graduate.

There has been a great awakening along educational lines lately and we estimate that 10 per cent of our high school graduates are attending college this year. But 90 per cent are forced to stay at home on ac-

count of financial circumstances or others over which they have no control. Of course all the remainder would not attend college if it were placed at their door, but a possible 50 per cent would be glad of the opportunity to make a place higher for themselves, and it is for these that I am making this plea.

If the State Superintendent, together with the Board of Regents and other bureaus of control, working with our legislative bodies, would work out a system whereby four college credits, equaling the first year in college, could be given in grade A high schools in counties where no higher institution of learning exists, it would go a long way toward educational lines.

If a high school graduate could have the first year in college work given in an accredited high school in his own county he could attend this term as easily as he did the high school work.

The value of one year of college work cannot be over-estimated. It would place the recipient in an independent position as to further advancing his education. By his own efforts he could complete his education, whereas if he had not been able to get the first year of higher education he would possibly never go, but would settle down to some avocation within his limited knowledge with little chance to go higher—higher—his chance of attaining distinction over nine times less than the college graduate.

We venture to suggest a tentative plan whereby a working basis may be had. The State Board of Education, together with the faculty of the University, shall adopt a curriculum whereby four subjects usually taught in the University shall be taught in the designated (Continued on last page)

HERE'S A GREAT WAR TIME STORY

"Mademoiselle," Made in England, Has Scenes of Dramatic Power

"Mademoiselle from Armentiers," the magnificent British Gaumont war film distributed by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer and to be shown at the Dixie Theatre next Monday and Tuesday, combines the comedies and tragedies of war in most stirring fashion. The early scenes in the film are chiefly concerned with the humors of life in billets and the beginnings of a spy drama in which Mademoiselle is represented as a patriot helping the British G. H. Q. to disseminate false information to the enemy. This leads to a misunderstanding between the French girl and her British sweetheart and the action of the play is transferred to the front line and an attack in which Tommy takes part. The drama develops with the increasing intensity of the bombardment of hundreds of guns, big and little, from giant howitzers to machine guns and trench mortars. And at the zero hour of the attack, is played an inspired passage between an old soldier and a recruit receiving his first baptism of fire. The old soldier stirs his companion with the sking of "Old Soldiers Never Die," and presently when the young soldier, lying on a stretcher at an advanced dressing station, murmurs the last line, "They simply fade away," one sees a picture of the old soldier lying alone in no man's land.

The film finishes appropriately enough with victory and a laugh—and a surprise climax to the romance of Mademoiselle and her soldier sweetheart.

Estelle Brody, new to American audiences, plays the title role with much skill, combining charm and humor with

GOLDTHWAITE WATER SITUATION IS ACUTE

Goldthwaite has a more or less critical condition confronting her in the water situation. For some reason all the wells have gone on a strike. Following a contemplated shortage of water this summer, the city council drilled a number of wells on the city property in the northeastern part of town. When first tested these wells showed 20 gallons of water per minute. However, after pumping operations were started sand began to give trouble and it was necessary to clean out the wells and fill the cavity with gravel. Another thing, the pumping of four wells in such close proximity, according to Joe A. Palmer, of the water committee, drained each other and all of them failed to a certain extent.

City Engineer Harry Allen states that at present the north east wells are producing about 35 gallons of water per minute. He states that there has been an extraordinary increase in the water consumption this fall and that it would very likely increase hereafter.

At present there is no water in the upper reservoir and the other one is not full of water. The danger is that should a fire break out there will be insufficient pressure to efficiently fight it. It would seem to the Eagle that the upper reservoir should be filled with water and kept full for fire fighting purposes.

Election Called for Fifteenth of October

Following the presentation of a petition signed by twenty-five qualified voters of the Goldthwaite Independent School District, the Board of Trustees ordered an election for the purpose of passing a bond issue for \$50,000.00 to build a new grammar school building. This contemplated building will replace the present antiquated rock structure. The 15th day of October, or 30 days after the board passed the order.

Badly Needed.

Goldthwaite is in sad need of a grammar school building. The present rock structure has wooden floors and stairways and is a fire-trap of the worst order. Both stairways are interior ones, while there are iron fire escapes on the outside, the young folks who are on the upper floors—in case of fire—would not have presence of mind enough to use these iron ladders. Any fire which started in the lower portion of the building would close out all exits of both floors.

In addition to the fire hazard, the lighting and room arrangements are not adequate nor satisfactory. The Goldthwaite Schools have grown to such proportions that sufficient room is not available—and this condition is getting worse every year.

Will Not Increase Tax.

The issuance of these bonds—should the election pass—will not increase the tax rate of this district, as the legal limit—\$1.00—is now being assessed. It will merely give the board of trustees authority to set aside a certain amount of the present tax to create a sinking fund to care for the bonds as they come due and to issue sufficient bonds—up to \$50,000.00—to pay for the building.

Goldthwaite has good schools, among the best in the state, and this fact has attracted quite a number of scholars to Goldthwaite—thus benefiting every person in town. Adequate buildings are necessary and each citizen should make it a point to see to it that this item is not neglected.

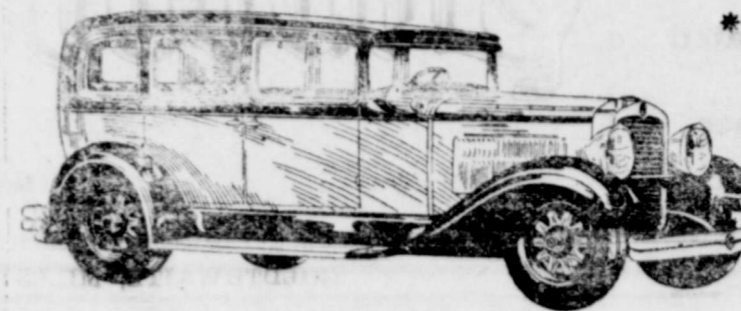

high schools over the state. The subjects shall be such as will not require a great expenditure by high school board of additional equipment and rooms.  
Then in designated high schools especial emphasis shall be given to the fifteen subjects required at present to enter the University, and that the other four shall be taught by a teacher selected by the governing body of the University and under their direct control, but working in conjunction with the high school teachers.  
Then when a pupil has completed the 19 subjects as required by the University he shall be entered into the University for second year work. It appears that some plan along these lines suggested in

the foregoing could be worked out, and if so it would be the greatest boon imaginable to the poor, struggling boy or girl who wants to do things worth while and make men and women worthy of the citizenship of this great commonwealth. Help the poor, the rich can take care of themselves. If poverty and ignorance is the cause of 50 per cent of crime why not eliminate some of it by giving the poor a better education—lifting them to independence. By so doing you would receive the everlasting gratitude of thousands of boys and girls who are not able to acquire an education otherwise.
