**PROFITABLE DAIRY COWS**

A dairy cow to be profitable must produce enough butter fat to more than cover the cost of feed, shelter, and labor necessary for her care and the delivery of the milk.

In selecting a dairy cow special attention should be given to amount of production and the test of the milk. This considered together with the cost of proper feeding should determine if the cow will prove profitable.

It is well known that to attempt dairying with improved cows is to court failure. Cows of high production of high-testing milk will repay their upkeep and pay a profit.

Furthermore a proven cow cannot make profit if she is not properly fed and cared for. Balanced feeds, green pasture and plenty of roughage must be constantly before the cow if her owner succeeds.

Conditions are most favorable at this time for dairying as a sideline with profitable cows properly fed and comfortably sheltered.

**CHEESE FACTORY  
BUSINESS IS IN-  
CREASING RAPIDLY**

As the milk gathering organization for the cheese factory is being perfected more and more milk is being delivered to the Mills County Cheese & Butter Company each day.

The daily receipts are now around 1500 pounds, compared with about 1000 pounds last week.

A price of 50c per pound on the amount of butterfat in the milk—all of it—is being paid, and the milk is then returned to the seller.

A daily production of 10,000 pounds of milk has been provided for in the equipment and this amount is the necessary goal if a year-round high market from cream is maintained.

Real, steady, drought and weevil free, incomes can be made by utilizing this market and farmers and ranchmen should not delay in taking advantage of it.

The Trent State Bank is offering aid to those farmers who want to embark in this business and who are not financially able to secure good milk cows.
