The Goldthwaite High School Eagles came through with their most colorful victory of the season when they defeated the Gatesville Training School on the Fair Park gridiron last Wednesday afternoon.

Before the game started a few fans made up a purse of \$5.00 for each Goldthwaite ball player to make a touchdown, which cost those fans \$15.00.

At the end of the first quarter there had been no scoring and it looked as though the Eagles had matched a tough fight but in the second quarter of the game, after working the ball down to the twenty-yard line, Evans tossed a forward pass to Harvey which he took nicely and ran across the line for the first counter.

At the end of the half the score was Goldthwaite 7 and Gatesville 0.

When the Eagles went back in to begin the second half it appeared that Coach Stringer had put dynamite into the boys for they surely were fighting all the time. "Bull-Dog" Ducey ran about twenty-five yards for the second touchdown and carried the ball three yards for the extra point, making the score 14 to 0. Then in the last quarter (Leakage) Evans carried the ball over for the third touchdown of the game and when they tried for the extra point some of the Goldthwaite boys were off-side and they failed to get the extra point.

The final score of the game was Goldthwaite High 20 Gatesville 0.

The boys played a wonderful game from the start to the finish and every man in the backfield starred.

**CHEESE PRODUCTION INCREASING RAPIDLY**

Every day shows marked increase in the quantity of milk supplied to the Mills County Cheese & Butter Company plant in the southern part of Goldthwaite. Beginning a few weeks ago with a daily amount of about 1,000 pounds, now 3,500 pounds daily are being received and prospects are bright for this steady gain to continue until 10,000 pounds or more per day are being received.

Reports from men who have carefully checked their milk checks against their cream checks indicate that 100 per cent more profit can be realized from selling the milk whole and quite a bit of investment and work of separating the milk is saved.

New milk routes are being established and a few weeks should see every person within a radius of twenty miles of Goldthwaite accessible to a truck or marketing his surplus milk.

**RINKYDINKS TO PLAY SAN SABA RIVER RATS**

**About Diamonds**

**INTERESTING QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

During our Thirty Years of Jewelry and Diamond merchandising certain questions have so often been asked that we repeat some of them with answers thereto which we believe will be of interest to readers who are contemplating the purchase of a Diamond.

**Question—What is a carat diamond worth?**

**Answer—**This question is best answered by the statement that diamonds are like horses. A plug may be had for \$20.00 or \$25.00, whereas there are fancier animals for \$2,000.00 and up. The same is true of diamonds. Severely imperfect or off-colors may be had as low as \$25.00 per carat. Other fancier colors or cuttings range up to \$2,500.00 per carat.

**Question—What are the most expensive colors in Diamonds?**

**Answer—**The finer grades command the biggest price. Then comes blue, white, and so on down to yellow and brown, which are the more inferior. The value of each color, of course, depends upon the degree of color.

**Question—What's an imperfection in a diamond?**

**Answer—**An imperfection, the most common of which is the carbon type, is simply the work of nature during the million of years required in its period of crystallization and is generally just a tiny speck of dirt or other foreign substance which has become lodged in the diamond during its period of crystallization.

**Question—To what extent does an imperfection affect the value of a diamond?**

**Answer—**Naturally the stronger the imperfection the more effect it has upon the stone's value. A pin point imperfection, for instance, would not affect the price so greatly as some defect noticeable to the naked eye. In other words if a firm accurately grades their stones, the value of each diamond is based on the stone's cleanliness.

**Question—What is the formation of a diamond?**

**Answer—**Pure carbon which has been crystallized under tremendous heat and pressure and which science estimates has required millions of years.

**Question—Where is the best place to buy a diamond?**

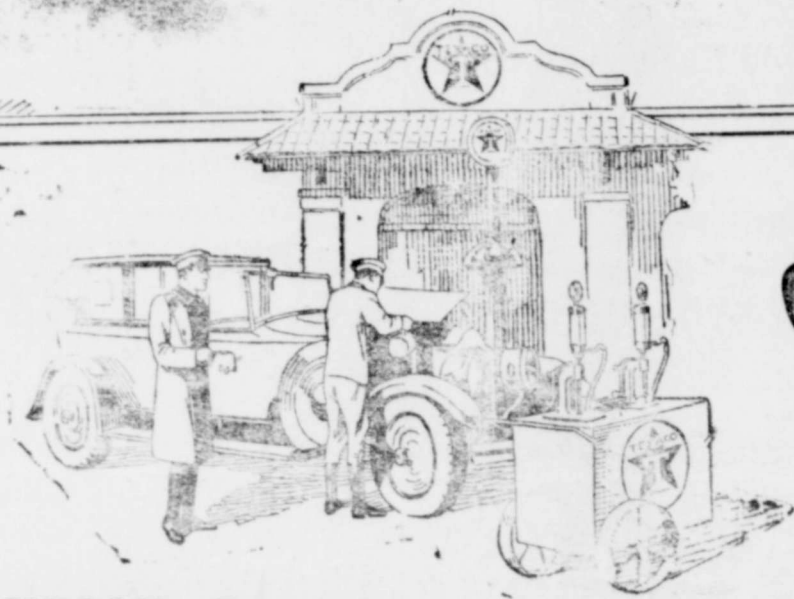

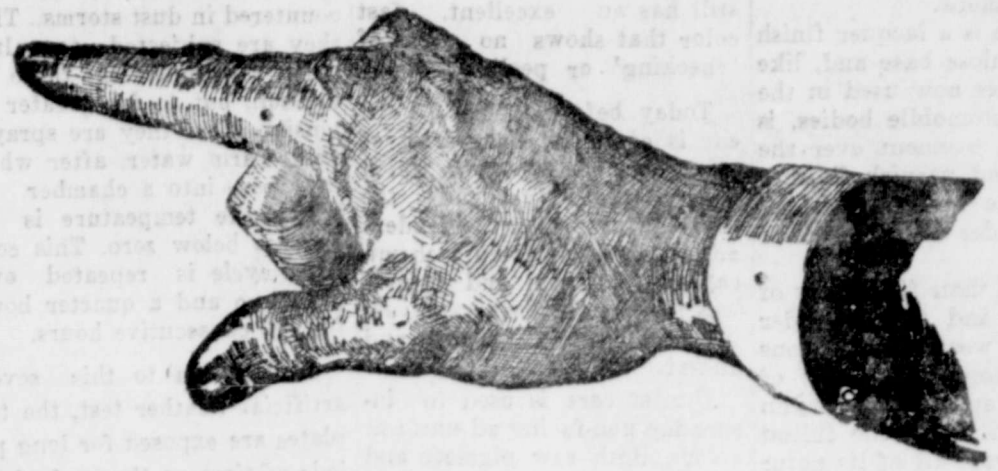

**FORD LABORATORIES  
TEST "PYROXYLIN"**

The "pyroxylin" finish of the new Model A Ford cars is the result of many years of experimental and testing operations in the Ford laboratories and paint shops.

Pyroxylin is a lacquer finish with a cellulose base and, like most lacquers now used in the finish of automobile bodies, is a great improvement over the old paint and varnish finishes that used to crack, "check" and fade under the exposure of weather.

But more than five years of experiment and testing under all sorts of weather conditions have developed methods of mixing and applying pyroxylin so as to utilize to the fullest possible degree all of its natural advantages.

The result is a uniform, smooth, durable finish in attractive and lasting colors which has attracted particular attention wherever the new Model A Ford cars have been seen.

Long before the Model A Ford was designed, the Ford Motor Company was experimenting with pyroxylin. For several years approximately

300 company service cars painted with various pyroxylin finishes have been under observation by the testing laboratory in the Highland Park paint factory. One of the earliest of these cars, after five years of exposure to all sorts of weather still has an excellent, fast color that shows no signs of "checking" or peeling.

Today before the new Ford car is given its final dress of color, both the pyroxylin which goes on the body and the enamel with which the fenders are finished are given a chemical and artificial and natural weather tests. These analyses insure uniform flexibility and adhesive quality.

Utmost care is used to insure the non-fading uniform colors. Both raw pigments and finished lacquers are tested in a specially designed "fade-o-meter" for fading and durability. They are also examined both before and after the above tests in a color analyzer. This, splitting any color into its simplest hues, detects and accurately measures the slightest fading or variation from standard.

The weather and durability tests are interesting. The system gives, in a period of 100

hours, a test equivalent to about seventy days of exposure to weather. Panels painted with pyroxylin pass from ordinary room temperature into a dust chamber where they are sprayed with wind-driven dust similar to that likely to be encountered in dust storms. Then they are subjected to ultraviolet rays much like those of the sun, but to far greater intensity. Next they are sprayed with warm water, after which they pass into a chamber in which the temperature is 15 degrees below zero. This complete cycle is repeated over each two and a quarter hours for 100 consecutive hours.

In addition to this severe artificial weather test, the test plates are exposed for long periods of time on the roof of the factory. Here the effect of the sun, wind, rain and snow are carefully observed, and a very close relation between the real and artificial tests obtained.

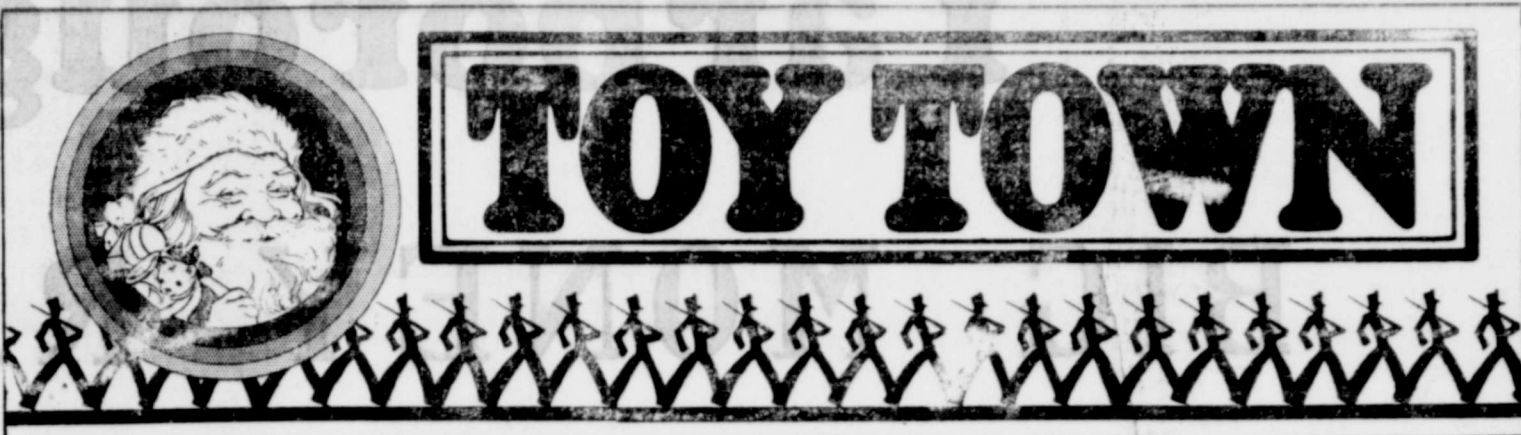

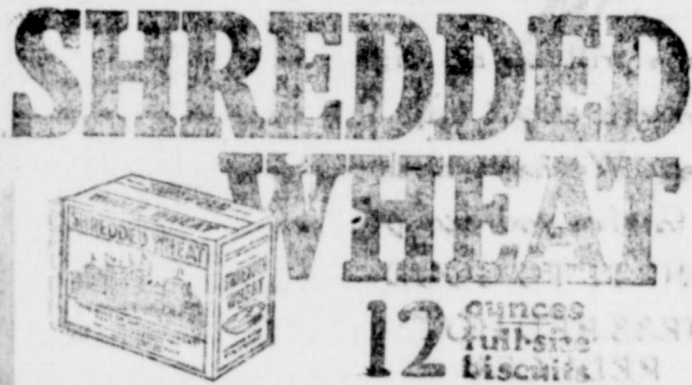

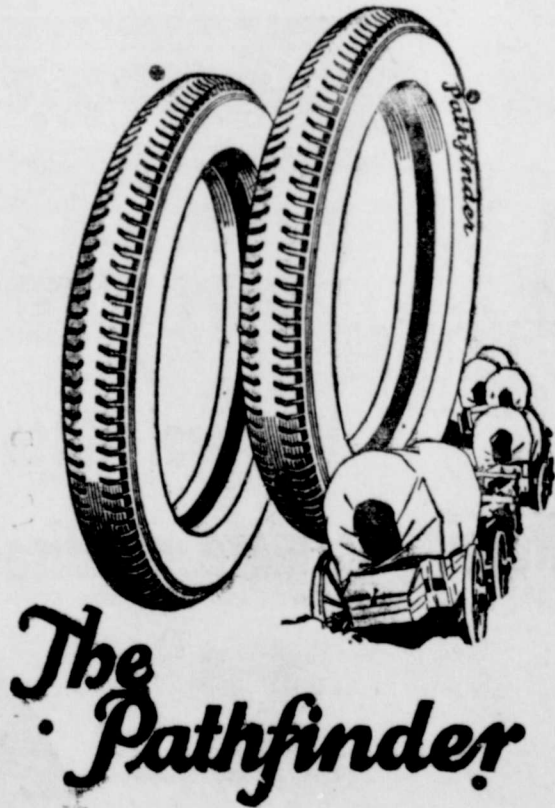

The newspapers of the country are gradually learning that making a noise about buying at home does no good. Country people as a rule who have the money buy where they please, just like merchants and business men do. Newspapers have been in the habit of howling themselves hoarse about trading at home and the very merchants and business men they are trying to help turn around and string them by ordering their printing from a mail order house. This is their privilege of course, but why should the newspapers hawl themselves hoarse about buying at home when it is not noticed nor appreciated.

Following are a few observations from other newspapers along the same line:

The old weatherworn stage which used to be handed out with almost every issue of a country paper beseeching the people to buy all their goods of home merchants, is no longer used by many of the editors. Most of them have grown wise to the fact that people usually trade at home if the home merchants in the home papers offer sufficient inducements, and that no other argument takes the place of that. Neither does any other source of advertising. Everyone who has any money to spend at all, is a patron of at least one home paper and that is the source to which they look for trading information.—Stephenville Empire.

The Progress has fallen into the habit of constantly harping on the buy-at-home subject. We together with hundreds of other small town newspapers throughout the United States, consume reams of paper in yelping and begging, pleading and appealing. We'd all we can to arouse community pride to the extent that home made dollars will be spent with home merchants. We do these things gladly, willing and with out remuneration. But this question confronts us; does it have

any effect? Do merchants and business men themselves appreciate it? Speaking in open frankness, we doubt if the majority of them do. Why do we think so? Simply because seven or five per cent of the merchants and business men of Dublin, and other small towns expect the home town paper to do all the pleading and do it unassisted. They don't think enough of newspaper advertising to devote their time and money to proper exploitation of it. Getting down to brass tacks, how often have you seen a Fort Worth or Dallas newspaper advocate the buy-at-home movement? They take the position, and rightly so, that if the merchants of Fort Worth and Dallas want the business they will go after it and they will get it through newspaper advertising. And any issue of the Dallas News or Fort Worth Star-Telegram will bear witness that they use newspaper space to go after the business. Take Washer Brothers in Fort Worth, as an example. They spend five per cent of their gross business in advertising. Imagine it! Out of every dollar taken in they set aside 5 cents for advertising! How many merchants in Dublin spend three per cent for advertising in all forms? We'll venture to say that not many as half the fingers on one hand. Here's what a Chicago man and other cities choose from says: "Merchants in Chicago their stocks, which, by the way, aren't as large as is generally supposed, a few certain items and advertise them, directing attention to the values offered. The mere fact that he advertises them shows assumption that people want to buy. And they do buy." There's the secret of buying-at-home success.—Dublin Progress.

If you have milk you can spare, get in touch with either of these men and they will arrange to bring it in for you every day except Sundays.

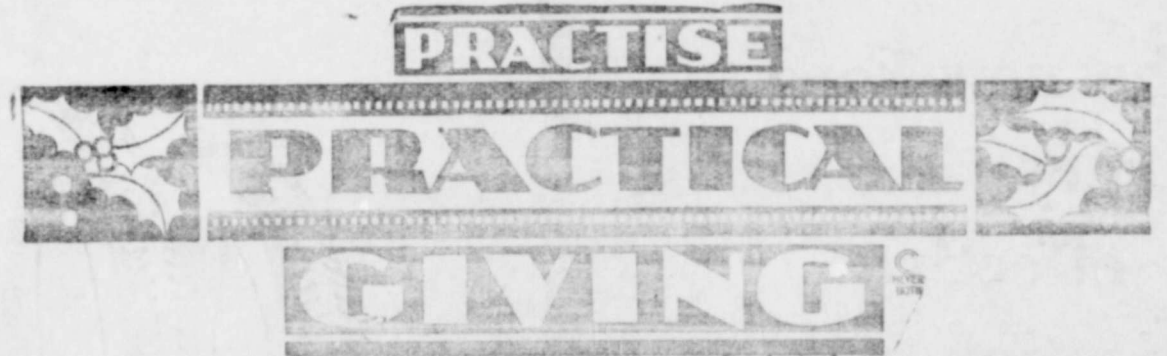
