## My Dear Mr. Editor:

It appears to me that its high time Goldthwaite should be put on the map. I don't mean the map of Mills County, Texas. I mean the Aerial Map of the United States. It is being urged now by our rapidly developing aerial commercial, passenger and mail service that all towns of 500 to 50,000—or even greater or smaller, have the name of the town placed conspicuously on the roof of one or more of its most prominent buildings, to the end that the aviator, when flying across the country may be well advised as to his whereabouts as the man who rides the train or auto.

This is a suggestion of Col. Lindbergh, who has done more to bring aviation into practical use than any one person of his generation.

Let us put Goldthwaite on the Aerial Map. Possibly in a few years we will have an aerial landing here that will be thronged by our citizens like the depot used to be for several years after the railroad penetrated our western country.

I would suggest this job to our Chamber of Commerce—the body that does things; the body that helps the town to grow and keep in step with the modern progress. With the help of the Eagle and the Chamber of Commerce Goldthwaite can do anything that it's practical for it to undertake. This would cost only a few dollars. Let us place the name of our town where the sun, the moon, the stars and the aviators can all read it as they pass over. Who knows but the demions of the upper air might account it a great discovery to find Goldthwaite peeping up at them in letters ten to twenty feet long.

There were 25 men who authorized their names to be signed as members at the meeting and a number more expressed themselves as being ready to do so, after they know what plan would be presented.

The directors met in executive session and the following officers were elected: J. A. Holland, Mullin, Chairman; R. F. McDermott, Goldthwaite, Secretary.

The board authorized the secretary to secure copies of the laws and constitution from other wool associations and to report for a meeting as soon as these were received.

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**EXTENSION CELEBRATION TO BE HELD FEB. 5-7 AT HOUSTON**

College Station, Texas, Jan. 31—Outstanding thinkers in the United States along educational and agricultural lines will join in the three-day program of discussion that has been prepared for the silver anniversary celebration of co-operative demonstration work to be held in Houston Feb. 5-7, final draft of the program discloses. This commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of agricultural and home making Extension work, which had its practical start in Texas a quarter of a century ago, will be sponsored by the Extension services of agricultural colleges, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers. The thirtieth annual convention of the latter organization will be held in Houston during the same period as the Extension celebration.

The general scheme of the celebration calls for consideration of the work of the last twenty-five years, an appraisal of the present in agriculture and an attempt to look ahead toward development to come, Extension workers particularly.

The program for Feb. 5 will include discussion of the following subjects: "The Present Agricultural Situation," John Fields, vice-president Federal Land Bank, Wichita, Kan.; "American Womanhood and the Home Demonstration Work," Mrs. John D. Sherman, former president of General Federation of Women's Clubs Estes Park, Colo.; "The Railroad Interest in Agricultural Extension Work," L. W. Baldwin, president of the Missouri Pacific Railway Co., St. Louis, Mo.; "The Contribution of the Press to Agriculture," C. A. Cobb, editor "The Southern Ruralist," Atlanta, Ga.; "Extension Work and the Colleges," E. C. Brooker, president State College of Agriculture, Raleigh, N. C.

The programs for the 6th and 7th days of February follow a similar line as that of the first day.

Business session of the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers will be held on the morning of Feb. 7.

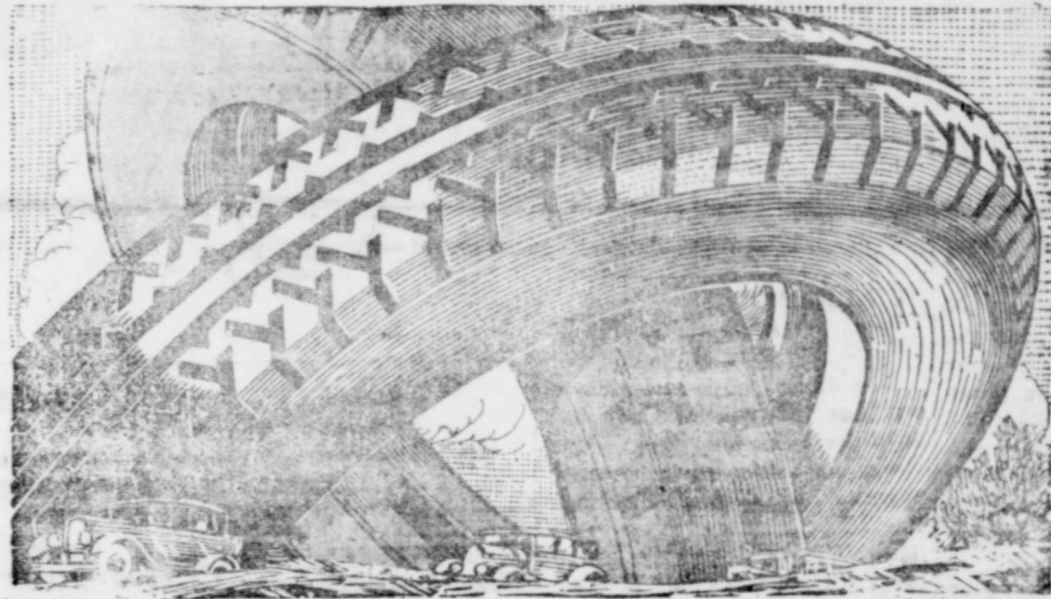

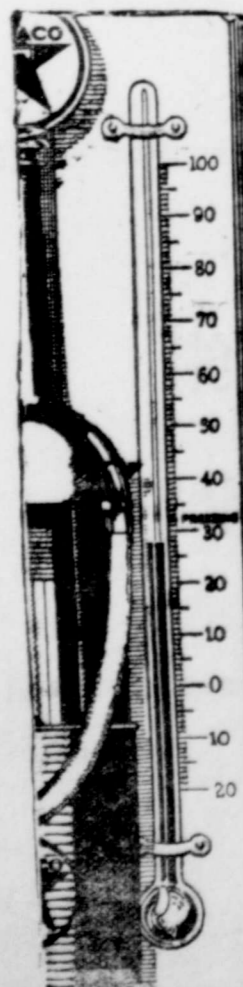

**J. O. KERLEY, STOCKMAN  
BLOWS OUT HIS BRAINS**

Word was received here last week of the death of J. O. Kerley, brother of Mrs. Walter Brown and Mrs. Ed Brown of this city. Following is the story of the tragedy as told in The Big Spring Herald:

Rumors ran rife over the city last night as vague whispers crept down from an isolated ranch home telling of tragedy stalking the ranges. J. O. Kerley was dead.

Dame Rumor, with her many tongues, had various versions of the method of the passing of a well-known resident of Howard County.

Sheriff Slaughter and Deputy Sheriff Andrew Merriek returned late from the scene of the tragedy and gave details to a Herald reporter.

Kerley had stayed out alone for some time, outside the home of Bob Dorwood, finally jumped to his feet and started walking back towards the house; when about 40 yards from the house, he stopped, drew his gun, placed the muzzle to his right temple and pulled the trigger. His hand dropped, loosing the weapon to fall to the ground and the body collapsed and lay stiff as the on-lookers, aghast at the horror of the self-enacted killing which had taken place before their eyes, rushed to him.

He had died practically instantaneously and although medical aid was called for from Big Spring, nothing could be done for him.

Kerley lived about half a mile from the Dorwood home, about 25 miles north of town on the Gail road and it is now clear that he had been brooding for some time past over his financial condition and relatives state that his health had also been very poor for about a year.

This had preyed on his mind and it is apparent from a letter he left, addressed to his relatives, that he had contemplated his rash act for some time.

His nephew, Robert McPherson, who lived with him stated that his uncle had not shown any signs of mental change for at least a year; he had gone about his daily tasks in the same routine manner, although he seemed quieter.

Yesterday he had gone over to the Dorwood home a little before six in the evening and at 6:30 he allowed his finger to pull the trigger that sent the fatal ball crashing through his brain.

He had a wide circle of friends who were shocked to learn of the tragic occurrence.

He leaves four sisters, Mrs. Walter Brown and Mrs. Ed Brown of Goldthwaite, Mrs. John Dean of Lovington, New Mexico, and Mrs. A. F. McPherson of Byers.

The funeral was held today and interment was made in the Gail cemetery at 3 p. m.

The funeral was conducted by the Erberley Undertaking Company.

**FORD SPRINGS AID  
IN RIDING COMFORT**

No feature of the new Ford car has been the subject of more enthusiastic approval than its riding qualities. To persons accustomed to ride in a car in the so-called light or medium weight class, the degree to which the Model A absorbs road shocks and resists side sway is little short of unbelievable.

It is possible to explain the new car's efficiency in these respects in a simple, non-technical way.

The traverse, semi-elliptic springs of the Model A are heavier, stronger, and more flexible than those used on any previous Ford car.

One of the chief essentials in riding comfort is a high proportion of sprung weight and a low proportion of unsprung weight. Sprung weight is all the weight suspended by the flexible ends of the springs; unsprung weight is the dead weight below those flexible ends. It follows that the higher the proportion of unsprung weight, the more powerful and violent will be the road shock delivered against the frame, body, and motor of the car, and the more difficult to absorb.

Some semi-elliptic springs rest on their middle, or heaviest and thickest portions, below the line of sprung weight. Thus, the weightiest sections of the springs themselves form part of the unsprung weight, adding to the size of the "hammer" and the power of the blows dealt by the highway against the body, frame and motor of the car.

In Ford design, the traverse springs rest on their flexible ends, with their heavy

mid-portions uppermost, in which position they form part of the sprung, or cushioned weight.

Aside from the question of weight, the transverse spring contributes again to the comfortable riding qualities of the Model A.

The ordinary car is pushed forward by way of the rear axle and rear springs—the rear springs actually serve as driving members! The front halves of these springs must therefore be made stiff enough to serve this purpose, and their flexibility, which enables them to perform their cushioning function, is reduced in a corresponding degree. Moreover in order to be efficient, their front ends must be fastened firmly to the frame of the car. This means that the lengthen-

ing of the spring as shocks are encountered must be entirely toward the rear, for only the wheels are moved backward and forward on the chassis. Both ends of the springs, therefore, are shackled and hinged, and all leaves are as flexible as their efficiency and cushioning members require. The flexing of the springs has no effect on the length of the wheelbase whatever.

In addition to the special spring design, the Model A Ford has as standard equipment a very fine type of hydraulic shock absorbers which add materially to the smooth riding qualities of the car.
