TRENT STATE BANK PURCHASES BONDS

Securities Bought By Local Bank

The Goldthwaite School Board is to be congratulated for the economical manner in which the school affairs and the school funds are handled. Especially is the Board to be commended for the expeditious and advantageous handling of the building bonds, recently voted by the taxpayers to build a new grammar school building. The bonds were sold at par and accrued interest and expenses to the Trent State Bank of this city, that institution being the highest bidder for the securities.

This should be a matter of pride with the people of Goldthwaite and Mills county that the bonds are owned by home people and Mr. Dew is entitled to commendation for his enterprise and patriotism in buying these bonds. No better security can be found than the bonds of the Goldthwaite school district, yet a much better interest could have been secured for the funds. The Trent Bank is a home institution, owned and conducted by home people and it is indeed gratifying to know that the bonds are held at home and that whatever interest is paid on them will go into local channels. It is also decidedly creditable to the community and county that a local financial institution is able as well as willing to invest \$40,000 of its funds in bonds the last of which do not mature for forty years and no interest is chargeable until the Board begins the payment of the building contract.

The Eagle's claim that Goldthwaite is the best town in Texas, located in the best part of the world and peopled by the best citizenship to be found on the top side of the earth is constantly being vindicated.

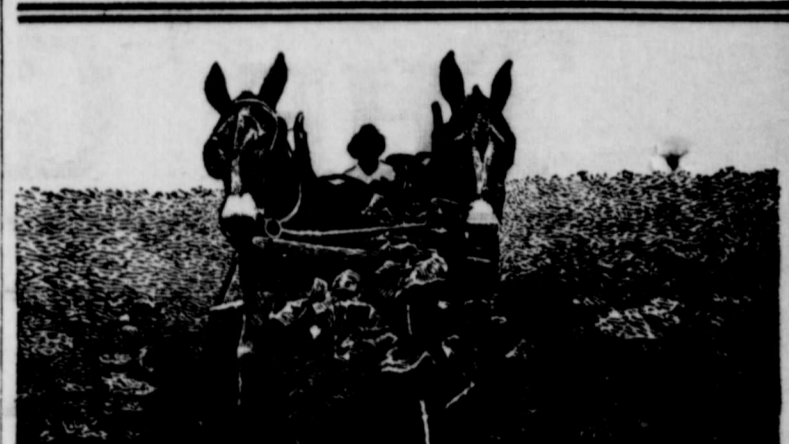

ELECTION ORDER

Whereas, the required number of taxpayers have petitioned the Commissioners Court for an election to determine whether or not the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools shall be created in Mills county, it was this day ordered by the Court that said election shall be held on Saturday, April 20, 1929, and that the polls shall be opened at the several voting places in said county at 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until 7 o'clock p. m. on said April 20, 1929, and the officers of election heretofore appointed for the various polling places in the county shall hold said election.

All property taxpayers of the county, who are otherwise qualified voters, shall be entitled to vote in said election. Those desiring the creation of said office of County Superintendent of Public Schools shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the creation of the office of County School Superintendent of Mills county," and those opposed to the creation of said office shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the creation of the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools for Mills county."

Presiding Judges of Election are hereby directed to proceed, in conjunction with the judges and clerks of said election, and in accordance with law, to count the votes, polled in said precinct at said election, and thereupon, after certifying correct returns thereof officially, in triplicate, in connection with said judges and clerks, to seal up and deliver, through one of the judges, on or before the Monday next following the day of election, one copy thereof to the County Judge of this county, one copy of said returns to the County Clerk of said county, to be kept by him in his office open to inspection by the public for twelve months following the day of election, and the third copy of said returns to be retained by the presiding officer of the election for twelve months from the day of election. Said returns must show: First, the total number of votes polled at such box; second, the number of votes polled for and against the creation of the office of county school superintendent.

This notice is given in conformity with the action of the Court and under its direction on this the 16th day of March, 1929, and is directed to be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle for four consecutive issues, to-wit, March 22 and 29, April 6 and 13, 1929.
