Farmers should watch closey and be prepared to fight

them if necessary. The formula for poison bran mash to control grasshoppers is as follows:

Coause wheat bran, 25 lbs., Paris Green or White Arsenie, 1 pound, Cane or surghum molasses, (avoid corn syrup). quarts; 3 lemons for flavorng; water sufficient to make moist mash.

Mix the bran and poison horoughly. Mix the molasses in about 2 gallons of water adding the lemon juice. The prospective price for both barley and oats looks like about 1 cent per pound. Ground feed, which is often adulterfeed value, and shipped in here and sold for sheep, goat, and cow feed at from two to two and one half cents per pound can hardly compare, in feed value, with a pound of ground oats or barley. Yet we sell at a loss and buy back at a big profit to someone, feed that is not nearly so good as what we have sold at half the price a few months before.

I am advised by those who have used it, that there are few ground feeds that can be classed as good as ground oats and barley for milk cows, sheep and goats and where they can be classed as good they usually cost from two and one half to three times the amount we get for our oats and barley.

The milk cow, with the present demand for her product, (the demand now seems to be unlimited at the cheese factory) is becoming a fixed source of revenue for the county and the thing most necessary to do is to reduce the cost of her feed bill, which will greatly augment levy a tax of \$1 a ton on sulthe profit derived from her product. Separate funds are raised for the state highway department by gasoline tax and automobile registration fees.

Various methods have been presented of getting funds. The income tax bills do not propose more funds. They propose merely raising \$25,000, 000 a year by taxing incomes and releasing property taxes. One bill proposes to do this by providing whatever amount is obtained by income tax shall be deducted from the total state needs before computing an ad valorem tax. Another bill proposes to make the deduction for each individual.
