THE GOLDTHWAITE EAGLE

A few days ago Eugene Black of Clarksville, Texas, took the oath of office as a member of the United States Board of Tax Appeals, and went to work immediately. Mr. Black's appointment makes 2 members of the board from Texas, the other being Judge William D. Love of Uvalde. Mr. Black served fifteen years in Congress from the Clarksville district.

The Federal Farm Board has loaned \$498,000 to the Oklahoma Cotton Growers' Association, Oklahoma City, to supplement loans obtained by the association from commercial banks. This supplemental loan will enable the Oklahoma association to make advances to its grower members of 16c a pound on graded and classed cotton.

Leon Trotzy, exiled Bolshevik leader of Russia who is now living on an island in the Sea of Marmora near Constantinople, has been refused permission to reside in Denmark. Trotzy applied for it through the Norwegian labor party, but the Danish Government, following the precedent set by Great Britain, rejected his application.

Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, left Washington Thursday for El Paso, where he will remain while his conviction for accepting a bribe in the leasing of the Elk Hills Naval Oil Reserve is being taken on appeal to higher Federal Courts. He was sentenced to a year in jail and fined \$100,000 on the bribery conviction. He may as well make his arrangements to go to jail.

The Forty-First Texas Legislature, which labored thru a regular session and three called sessions, will receive a vote of thanks from the Dallas Real Estate Board to be presented at the next session of the lawmakers; it was decided Thursday at the board's luncheon in the University Club. Among the acts of the Legislature the most beneficial to real estate was the law making a tax certificate of payment to date on the certificate conclusive evidence that all prior taxes had been paid, said the Board.

Secretary Christensen of the Federal Farm Board Friday telegraphed Governor Moody of Texas that the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association met requirements of the agricultural marketing act and that upon receipt of applications for loans the board would act without delay. Governor Moody has asked the board to protect Texas cotton growers from losses, saying many farmers had held cotton with the understanding the board would make a loan to the Texas Farm Bureau which would assure advances of at least 16c on cotton raised by grower members.

Announcement that the Arlington Downs race meeting would be extended one day, with a program Monday, Nov. 18, was made at the track this week. Arrangements have been made by William G. Bryce, J. Waddy Tate and William Hiett, Mayors of Fort Worth, Dallas and Arlington, respectively, to hold the meet over for a program to be run for the benefit of the community chest in the three cities. Fifty per cent of the total proceeds will go to this cause with 20 per cent each to Dallas and Fort Worth and 10 percent to Arlington. Six events will be run, five each for \$500 purses and one for a \$1,000 stake. It is planned to bring together the winners of the meeting in the feature race. All of the owners have agreed to hold their horses over for the card.

CHEESE FACTORY HELPS

Mills county is not alone in the benefits from a cheese factory, but in every section where these factories are located there is prosperity. One of the first factories of the kind to be established in Texas was built at Round Rock and it is managed by a brother of Mr. Kaufman, manager of the factory at this place. A newspaper report of the benefits derived from that factory says in part:

The factory has over 300 milk patrons at this time, from whom it receives daily contributions of raw milk going into its product. Because of the consequent discouragement of poor cotton crop this year, and farmers in the cotton business dairy herds are being increased in the Round Rock territory with reports from all parts of the community, showing that materially increased acreage will be planted to feed another season. Already a great many farmers have planted winter oats, barley and other pasture crops, which will supplement the farm feed supplies.

RED CROSS ROLL CALL

Governor Dan Moody in a proclamation has designated the period between Armistice Day and Thanksgiving for the annual roll call in Texas for the American Red Cross, and urged the people to join the Red Cross.

"The American Red Cross, as the national official disaster relief agency, should enjoy the confidence and fullest cooperation of the citizenship of our country," Governor Moody said. "With a background of forty-five years experience, the Red Cross has a record of large results. It is certain that men can not prevent natural calamities. The Red Cross has proved its worth in times of catastrophe the world over. It provides relief and supplies the needs of individuals overwhelmed by flood, fire and other disasters. In Texas alone the Red Cross rendered aid to the victims of the tornado in Angelina county Dec. 21, of the tornado in Anderson county April 24, of the flood in southeastern Texas May 31, and of the tornado in Castro and Hale counties June 10.

"Responsible today for disaster relief, this organization must have funds, the replenishment of which is dependent on the enrollment of membership by the local chapters of the Red Cross."

Making The Nation Smaller

Seven transcontinental highways, as part of a road system penetrating every section of the country, would be provided for in a bill which, according to announcement, is to be introduced at the next session of Congress. Whether or not this project ever becomes a reality, it is indicative of the steadily increasing importance of highways in our development as a nation. States are bound together by smooth, shining pavements. They are necessities of modern life, an integral part of business and social relations. The time is near when practically every community, no matter how small or isolated, will have contact with the outside world through the medium of a paved road. To the farmer, as well as the city-dweller, highways are basic commodities which pay for themselves many times over. Good roads have made the United States smaller.

SANTE FE MOTOR CAR

One of the Brownwood-San Angelo trips on the Santa Fe is being made daily now by a motor car and trailer, an engine of the same type as this road uses at about thirty other points on its lines.

This car is propelled by electricity which is generated by means of a gasoline engine. Baggage and passengers compartments are also on this car, and it pulls a specially made trailer for additional passengers.

It takes the place of steam trains numbers 75 and 76, leaving Brownwood at 9:15 p. m., arriving at San Angelo at 1 a. m.; leaving there at 5:15 a. m. and getting back to Brownwood at 7:50 a. m. Engineer E. J. Swain who ran on this route heretofore, is at present engineer of this train. —Brownwood Bulletin.
