The sum of the meeting of scientists at Temple the other day, to discuss root rot and what we know about it, amounted to the confession of failure. And the failure is now about a dozen years old. For, more than a decade ago, Dr. J. J. Taubenhaus of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas began his studies, with the princely sum of \$400 accorded him the first who year for the purpose.

Dr. Taubenhaus and other distinguished experts, despite the limited funds at their disposal even now, are making progress. The failure so far to conquer root rot does not make the task a hopeless one.
