The fact about American cotton and wheat and wool is that they are not in such demand throughout the world as they once were. Substitution is eating the vitals out of them. It would seem that there could be no substitution for grain, but there is. The world, in warm spots, is now growing vegetables all the year 'round. These vegetables do interfere with bread consumption. And ice cream interferes with pastry consumption, just as rayon takes some of the market away from wool and cotton. There are changing fashions in food as well as in clothing. The Farm Board has a huge task. It must stabilize the dependa-
