



Yet if a hundred people are burned to death in a fire which could have been easily preventable, the nation hardly gives it a second thought. It is a parallel case to the old newspaper dictum: "If a dog bites a man, that's not news; but if a man

bites a dog that is news." In the one instance the public is appalled mainly because of the death. We have come to regard unusualness of the agenecy of fire, to the contrary, as being usual and unavoidable.. This is a tragic situation. Every year lives, to say nothing of the hundreds of millions of dollars worth of property destroyed, deal of pain and trouble. Gas because of carelessness or ignorance.
