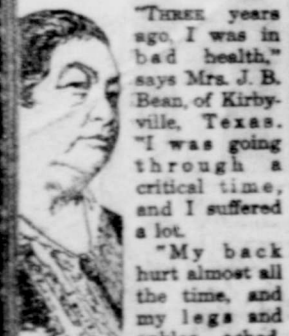

ORDER COWS AND BOARDER CREAMERIES

Comment upon the fact that there are several million boarder cows being milked in the United States, and the suggestion that proper testing and grading of herds would reduce cost of production, brings a letter from a Farm and Ranch reader intimating that we should turn our attention to short testing creameries.

From the beginning of the present methods of distribution and manufacturing of dairy products, undoubtedly short tests have been and are given producers by dishonest managers. The industry would be unique if there were not some crooks engaged in it. It is only fair to presume, however, that there is also as fair a proportion of honest men in creameries and milk plants as there are found on farms in their lines of business. We have heard of farmers putting water in their milk, but have never seen one do it. We have seen farmers milking in filthy stables with dirty hands, and we have seen milk and cream delivered that we would not buy at any price. Sometimes the quality of the product delivered has something to do with the price received. Sometimes, no doubt, short tests are given and the producer is cheated. We do not know this as a fact. We have only heard that such is the case. At any rate, that matter between the producer and the purchasers. If producers have evidence that they short tested—have been added right along—then the courts are open for redress and satisfaction. Merely talking about the matter and making charges without presenting the evidence will not change the situation.—Farm and Ranch.

WILDCAT OIL WELLS NECESSARY

There are two sides to the problem of oil conservation. Less than two per cent of the active oil wells in the United States produce over half of our petroleum output. It is for this reason that thousands of wildcat wells are continually being drilled when there is a need for curtailment because of over-production.

It is said on good authority that the necessity for curtailed production will probably not extend beyond the next nine months. Therefore, the industry, in spite of the low cost of oil and the high price of drilling, must search incessantly for new sources of supply. Six months or a year or more are required to drill the average discovery well. If exploratory work was discontinued during the period of conservation, under-production might result.

What is wanted, of course, is a happy medium, with neither under-nor over-production. The supply should be as nearly equal to the demand as is humanly possible. Definite steps forward have already been taken in a number of important fields in various states through the adoption of the unit system of production, gas conservation laws and similar measures.

The oil industry, while giving every intelligent effort to conserve our petroleum resources, is likewise assuring us that the present era of over-production will not be followed by a period of under-production.
