The cost of living is now 6 per cent lower than for the cor responding period of 1929 and is at the lowest point since 1918 the 17th annual national business conferences was told

"This is a very important ing survey, the waste of local fact, which has been more or less overlooked in the wave of pessimism and depression, which dollars a year, or ten per cent has filled everybody's thoughts during the past year," declared Creighton J. Hill, labor expert of the Babson statistical organi. zation
