

Blaming the Motorist

Traffic accidents throughout the country continue at a high rate and there seems to be little hope for any material decrease * * * * * * * for a long time. All efforts to place the blame naturally center around the motorist, who undoubtedly is responsible for a lot of accidents, but one must drive in the traffic to thoroughly understand the difficulties under which motorists make their way and the idiocy of many people on the highways and in the lanes of traffic. Still, when one undertakes to drive a motor vehicle he should realize the responsibility that is his, regardless of the ac tion of other people-pedestrians and drivers. Reports indicate that 1934 is seeing more men, women and children killed in automobile accidents than in any previous year. Figures supplied by the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters show that for the first six months of this year about 20 per cent more people were killed than in 1983, and the worst driving months are yet to come-September, October and November, In 1933, nearly \$1,000 persons were heled. If you add 20 per cent to this number # will amount to 37 330, with more than 1,000,000 persons injured, The economic loss will jump into the billions. If people will not exercise care for themselves, society as a whole, must exercise it light showers to near-floods for them. There appears to be no other way out.

Governmen experts unofficially say that the increase will be around \$1,000,000,000. Thus, there is conalderable difference of opinion as to how much more the farmer will have to spend when 1934 closes-but every agency is certain his pockets will be better lined than they have been for several

The prevention of pellagra deends upon eating the right aind of food at all times. To nake sure that the diet is right, should always includes plenty of milk daily, some fresh meat, and as many fresh vegetables as ossible. Tomatoes, whole wheat roducts, salmon, brewer's yeast and fresh fruits are especially valuable. Having provided these essentials of a proper diet, the rest may be arranged according to family and personal likes. In this way pellagra may be avoid-


