Mr. Landon must pick up a lot more delegates that can be seen now if he wins at Cleveland. He is not popular will some party leaders in the great eastern industrial states. It is not at all impossible that Hoover, Borah and Knox will cement their forces, if necessary, to prevent Mr. Landon's nomination.
